Ukrainian President Scathes Complainants' Anti-Semitic Tendencies (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Sept. 13.—Ukrainian workers who charge the government with giving preference to levish apprentices were rebuked for their anni-Semtito lendencies by Petrowsky, president of the Ukrainian Wzik, the Central Executive Committee.

The case centered around the decis-ion of the Ukrainian National Commissariat of Trade to allo: 300 of the SC vacancies in the Ultrainian mills and factories to Jewish pyrennices. As a result of this, the Unarisof daily com-munist papers received numerous letters from their readers, expressing hostile surprise at the decision of the Commissariat.

These acts are being carried out with unusual cruelty in full daylight."

These acts are not perpetrated for the purpose of robbery, we are told by the paper, which believes that "an orga-nizing and encouraging hand is visible," and declares "it is thought that the intention of those who organized these attacks is to 'convince' the world that the opinion of Col. (Jewish Daily Bulletin) Washington, D. C., Sept. 13.—"Admit nothing; give no figures: divulge no program," is the slogan of the Klans-men with regard to the parade of the Ku Klux Klan to be held here today.

having taken place, this did not give these aliens a right of entrance, without an affirmative finding that they were eligible, but that the fundamental question was whether they were fugitives from religious persecution, before a literacy test was authorized, and it could not be inferred that this question had been decided against them, in the obsence of a finding to that effect on their claim of exemption.

The Secretary was directed by the Court to pass on that question and if his ruling was adverse, to decide as to a new test. Meantime Mrs. Waldman was subjected to a new test in her home in Providence, while the case was awaiting Supreme Court action, and it was announced that she had passed the test and deportation proceedings against them had been dropped, but the immigration authorities declared that this determination was reached merely because the Supreme Court decided to entertain the Government appeal, and that the Secretary had not adopted the new test. Judge Bondy sustained this claim. Mrs. Waldman declined to take a new literacy test, until the main question had been decided as to her exemption, and the Secretary has finally decided that she and her daughter were religious refugees, when they landed here, but the youngest daughter is required to give a bond against becoming a public charge and that she will continue her schooling until 16 years old.

Their very character and nature is wicked!" Propaganda against the lews has often been employed for nolitical purposes, and not without success. The anti-Semitic movement, however, has never taken the proportions of a popular uprising, and acts of vio-lence have never assumed the character of a pogrom. The difference between the position

of the Jews in Serbia and in Croatia is especially explained by the fact that this last-named country is still under the influence of the old Austro-Hungary, aristocratic and feudal, where anti-Semitism was always pronounced. In addition, the Croatians are Catholics, and unlike the Serbians, very devout The Jews resent bitterly the hostility

to which they are subjected. In all Jugo-Slavia they are united in a Zionist organization, whose president, Dr. David Alcalay, enjoys extreme popularity. Hundreds of Jews have departed for Palestine as colonists. There are in Jugo-Slavia three Jew-
