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LITHUANIAN GOVERNMENT REORGANIZES AFFAIRS OF JEWISH COMMUNITIES

**New Instructions Issued When Agudath
Rabbinical Council Is Dissolved**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Oct. 5.—Reorganization of Jewish communal affairs in the Lithuanian communities is now taking place as a result of new orders issued by the Lithuanian government.

The orders were issued following the decision of the present Liberal government to dissolve the Rabbinical Council formed by the previous government with the advice and cooperation of the Agudath Israel.

The functions of the former Rabbinical Council were delegated to various other bodies. The Ministry of the Interior was intrusted with the registration of vital statistics and with the payment of the rabbis' salaries. The annual government subsidy for rabbinical salaries amounts to 25,000 litas. Under the new instructions, rabbis will have the right to appoint religious teachers. The cabinet is now preparing a law which will authorize the municipal governments to carry on the registration of vital statistics, but will also allow Jews to register with the local rabbis.

LITHUANIAN JEWISH SOLDIER IS SENTENCED TO 9 MONTHS; CASE AROUSES INTEREST

Kovno, Oct. 5.—The case of a Jewish soldier in the Lithuanian army, who was sentenced to nine months imprisonment, has attracted wide attention here.

The accused soldier, Leiser Moser of Szesmer, was accused of having killed a Christian soldier who came to relieve him at sentry duty. Moser declared that he did not know that the soldier who came up to him while he was on guard was to relieve him. The soldier demanded that Moser leave his post. His manner was very aggressive and for this reason Moser shot him, in accordance with military instructions.

Moser was defended by Attorney Simon, who was formerly the only Jewish prosecutor in Lithuania. He argued that Moser cannot be held for murder as he acted in accordance with military instructions.

MANCHESTER JEWS JOIN IN CIVIC WEEK CELEBRATIONS

Manchester, England, Oct. 5.—The contribution of English Jews to the development of the Manchester industries will be demonstrated during the celebrations of Civic Week here.

As a part of the celebrations there will be parades and a pageant depicting the history of Manchester.

A united non-denominational open air service will be held on Sunday, at which Rabbi Berend Salomon will be among the speakers.

TRANSJORDANIAN NOTABLES CHARGE EMIR ABDULLAH WITH MALADMINISTRATION Spent Money But Did Nothing. They Say

Jerusalem, Oct. 5.—A protest against the administration of Emir Abdullah in Transjordan was submitted to the British Colonial Office, it was learned here today.

The criticism was voiced in a memorandum of a group of Transjordanian notables in which Emir Abdullah is charged with mal-administration and medieval practices. The memorandum states that since Abdullah was appointed ruler of Transjordan he has spent £30,000, doing nothing. The Transjordanian notables demand that his salary be reduced from £24,000 annually to £5,000 and that the remainder be used for developing agriculture in the territory. Emir Abdullah is now in Palestine endeavoring to bring about a reconciliation among the Arab parties.

HEBREW IS VICTORIOUS IN RUSSIA, BRAININ SAYS

Paris, Oct. 5.—The contention that the Hebrew language is victorious in Soviet Russia in spite of the persecutions directed against it was made by Reuben Brainin, American Hebrew writer, at a reception given in his honor last night by the Organization for Hebrew Culture recently formed here.

The vitality of Hebrew is shown by the fact that Hebrew is victorious in Russia in spite of the persecutions, he stated. It is necessary to concentrate all efforts for the creation of a large organization for Hebrew culture because the small Hebrew groups when left to themselves are doomed to failure, he stated.

SKIRMISH IN JERUSALEM CAUSED POGROM RUMOR

UNITED FEDERATION OF FRENCH JEWRY PLANNED; BASCH HEADS MOVEMENT

**Appeal Issued by Prof. Basch to All
Jewish Groups**

Paris, Oct. 5.—The Jewish population of France is to be knitted together under the auspices of a new organization which is to be known as the United Federation of the Jews in France.

An appeal was issued by Professor Victor Basch, president of the Federation of Jews of France, an organization which is now in process of formation, to all Jewish organizations in France, urging them to join the new federation. The federation is to be the legal representative of French Jewry, according to the plans outlined.

It is also planned that all the activities of the federation are to be concentrated in one building which will be called Maison Juive. The building will have meeting halls, a library and a restaurant, it was stated.

Dr. Basch is professor of aesthetics and the science of art at the Sorbonne. He is vice-president of the League of Human Rights and is editor of "L'ère Nouvelle" and "Progress de Lyon."

PRESIDENT OF WISCONSIN UNIVERSITY DENIES ANTI- JEWISH DISCRIMINATION

Madison, Wis., Oct. 5.—A ban on Jewish students may be the individual policy of some employe, but it is not and never can be the policy of the University of Wisconsin.

President Glenn Frank emphasized this in discussing the complaint of a Milwaukee Jewish organization over a letter written by Miss Alice King, university employment officer, in which she spoke of "barring students of Jewish faith from work in the school library."

The student in question was Alex Stern, Milwaukee, who was highly recommended for a position by M. S. Dudgeon, Milwaukee public librarian. The letter that aroused the controversy was sent by Miss King to Mr. Dudgeon.

President Frank declared that in any large organization some employe is likely to make the mistake of inferring that his personal policy is the policy of the institution.

President Frank added that he had made it plain to the library heads that

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EDITOR WAS THREATENED WITH PUNISHMENT FOR PRO- TESTING JEWS' EVACUATION

London, Sept. 21.—An interesting revelation concerning the attitude of the Allies during the war to the Jewish "evacuations" in Russia is made by the "Jewish Chronicle" here.

The "Jewish Chronicle" points out that it was the first organ of the press to call attention publicly to the "evacuation" in Russia. On July 23, 1915, "Mentor" devoted his weekly comment to a summary of the situation. "The 'Jewish Chronicle,'" says the editorial, "was the first organ of public opinion to unmask this piece of utter villainy, and we are gratified to recollect that the amelioration of the local Jewish condition, although months had gone by before this 'evacuation' had become known in Western Europe, was largely due to the 'Jewish Chronicle' expose.

"The reward for protesting against this bare-faced inhumanity," the paper states, "was a serious and severe threat on the part of the authorities in this country of condign punishment for the editor of this journal, on the ground that he had published without leave an account of a military Order issued to one of the Allied forces! It was a risk which having regard to the spirit then prevailing was recognized, although the Order was months old. The risk, however, had to be taken with all its consequences, for the alternative was the hushing up of a grave and intolerable wrong to a large population of the Jewish people."

ECONOMIC ADVISER TO Z. O. EXECUTIVE IN PALESTINE

Jerusalem, Sept. 2.—Dr. A. J. Kasteliansky, the newly appointed economic adviser to the Zionist Executive has arrived here from London.

Dr. Kasteliansky, who served during the war in the War Office, is a well-known authority on economic and international questions. He will study the development of commerce and industry in Palestine.

Distinguished Visitor Advocates Peace Between Zionists and Non-Zionists

That the misunderstanding between the Zionists and the non-Zionists on the subject of Palestine and Russian colonization is "a dangerous and needless schism in Israel" which may have the fatal consequence of ruining "the prospect of Jewish regeneration," is the opinion of Solomon Poliakov, noted Russian-Jewish political publicist, author, dramatist and communal leader who arrived in the United States last week. Mr. Poliakov, who is a Zionist but not a party man, last Spring visited Palestine in company with Dr. Chaim Weizmann.

Urging the participation of the Jews in both the Russian colonization work and Palestine reconstruction, Mr. Poliakov declares:

"To begin with, it is wrong to look upon the Russian colonization work as harmful. The economic condition of Russia is by this time too well known to be dwelt upon here. No emigration to the United States, no sound economic activity within. Palestine, too, cannot afford the luxury of a million hungry Jews desperately knocking at its doors and insisting on immediate entry. Reason and pity, statesmanship and humanity dictate alike the urgent necessity of immediate help for Russian Jewry. Tilling the soil is the best way to save them. It is so in every other East European country, and tenfold so in Russia where political conditions, bad as they are, offer no other way out, and at the same time are particularly favorable to colonization. Nobody knows for sure how many families will find bread and shelter in the new colonies; but one thing is evident: those are in the right who do something, and not those who merely offer criticisms and objections. Acts endure while words fade away. It was so with the old anti-Zionists who kept on saying: 'Nothing will happen, nothing will be accomplished.'"

"The Joint Distribution Committee, the Ica, the Ort, etc., are doing wonderful work, work deserving every encouragement, work never to be forgotten by the starving Jews of Russia and Poland."

"But—
"This spring I visited Palestine, and that was the most thrilling experience, the most overwhelming experience of all my life. I experienced the rare joy

of seeing a new people, a new race arising from the hard soil of the ancient Land of Israel. I saw happy, merry Jews, workers proud of their labor, men looking forward with courage and calm assurance, beautiful and healthy, children speaking the revived language of David, Solomon, and Isaiah. I saw a young commonwealth emerging in which the purely human and the Jewish elements blend in perfect harmony. I heard ancestral voices from our glorious past whispering the marvels of a Jewish future under a sky of unimaginable beauty. And there I understood the Zionists' legitimate jealousy of anything that may hinder or delay the realization of this great work. I understand that if Russian colonization is a current event (though no doubt a most important one), the colonization of Palestine is history. The Russian colonization work possesses a purely material and local significance, while the work in Palestine has a significance unprecedented in history. There, in Palestine, is the pride and glory of every Jew the world over; there is the justification of two thousand years of struggle and martyrdom. . . . Nowhere else can a Jew, conscious of the call of his ancestors, be as happy, as serene, as proud, as productive as in Palestine. . . . If abstention from the work in Russia is a mistake, what shall we say about abstention from the work in Palestine?"

Wants Mixed Commission to Study Jewish Situation Abroad

A suggestion that a mixed commission, of Jews and Gentiles, be appointed for the purpose of studying the Jewish situation abroad and working out a program to cover European relief and Palestine reconstruction in place of the present separate periodic drives, is put forth by Charles Joseph in his Random Thoughts appearing in the "Jewish Review and Observer" of Cleveland.

"I suggested some time ago," Mr. Joseph writes, "that a mixed Commission, (Jews and Gentiles) composed of the best financial and political minds make a complete survey of the Jewish situation abroad: that a program be outlined that will have for its purpose the correcting not merely of the economic but of the political situation of the Jew. It may cost fifty million dollars, it may cost a hundred million dollars to bring about the desired result, but at any cost it will be much cheaper than this constant raising of millions every little while as a palliative. What is needed is a radical operation, not a poultice."

The Hadassah Organization and the Histadruth Ivrit have officially joined the Zionist Council of Greater New York, it was announced by the Council.

Hadassah elected Mrs. Adolph Slomka and Mrs. Anna Markowicz Cross as members of the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Council and Holman Whitman represents the Histadruth Ivrit.

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT GIVES JEWISH SCHOOLS \$10,000

Jerusalem, Sept. 10.—The Government has officially informed the Palestine Zionist Executive that a sum of £10,000 has been allocated in the forthcoming Education budget for the purpose of the Jewish schools.

JUDAISM AND CHRISTIANITY HAVE CLOSE CONTACT, DR. WM. ROSENAU SAYS

Speaks of Rabbis' Role in Community
at Jewish Institute of Religion

Declaring that the contact of Judaism with established Christianity is much closer than ever before, Dr. William Rosenau, Associate Professor in Post-Biblical Hebrew at Johns Hopkins University, in his address "The Call for Readjustment," delivered at the opening exercises of the fifth academic year of the Jewish Institute of Religion, New York, asserted that the time had come for a readjustment of religious values, and that to the Jew the call for readjustment comes with exceptional urgency.

"Judaism in the western world is put on a double defensive. It is compelled to vindicate itself not only against its grandchildren, heralding innumerable modern solutions of life's riddle, but also against every one of its daughters, more particularly the Christian Church, declaring its specific tenets." Dr. Rosenau declared that the problem of survival is agitating all existing creeds.

"The present defection from Judaism, noticeable among young and old, men and women, poor and rich, is traceable to our unpardonable delay in heeding the unmistakable call for sweeping propaganda and timely adjustment," he stated.

In speaking of the necessary readjustments that religion must make in order to be acceptable to modern youth, the speaker noted that "modern secular features introduced by many Church and Temple Centers are not, as such, calculated to prove rich wells of necessary salvation. Before they can develop a healthy religious appreciation, they must be differently conceived, planned and operated, from what they now prove themselves to be. Centers attached to a House of God should be religiously motivated and religiously conducted. They should subserve the specific interest of the denomination under the aegis and for the furtherance of which they declare themselves to work."

"Of course, Judaism will survive as a system of thought by the very essence of its truth," declared Dr. Rosenau, "but as a definite movement it cannot expect to remain abreast of the times unless it be by proper organization of all available forces for the dissemination of its truth."

In outlining the tasks that confront the modern rabbi, Dr. Rosenau, in addressing the students of the Jewish Institute of Religion, urged them to remember that "in Jewry, we have often, on account of warrentedly stressing scholarship, gone to the extreme of underestimating the rabbi's pastoral and community endeavor. Abundant proof exists that Jewish affiliations have been not infrequently saved, and even re-established, through the rabbi's intelligent and tactful social intercourse. Moreover, the rabbi is truly the proper person to help settle Jewish social service problems. It is certainly commendable in the rabbi to be active as community worker, for he thus demonstrates that he would translate his preaching into practice, and would be-

NUMERUS CLAUSUS BARS JEWISH STUDENTS WITH BRILLIANT WAR RECORD

Budapest Paper Cites Cases of Glaring
Injustice

Budapest, Sept. 17.—A list of typical cases of Jews who have been refused admission to the Hungarian universities because of the operation of the Numerus Clausus Law is given in the current issue of the Jewish weekly here, "Egyenloseg," in order to illustrate the manner in which the Numerus Clausus is being administered against the Jewish population of Hungary.

The cases quoted include one of a Jewish student named Ladislav Wall who was refused admission by the Medical Faculty of Budapest University although he had matriculated with honors. His father renewed the application backing it up with certificates showing that two elder brothers of the applicant who had passed their matriculation summa cum laude, one of them being a war-cripple, had been refused admission to the University and had been compelled to go abroad to continue their studies. Two other brothers, he writes, have been spared the necessity of leaving their native country in order to be able to study at a University, having found their death on the battle-field fighting for Hungary. The family, the father adds, sent 45 of its male members into the army; all of them were in active service at the Front and 10 of them were killed on the battle-field.

GREAT SACRAMENTAL WINE SCANDAL IN N. Y. CHARGED BY PROHIBITION OFFICE

600 So-Called Rabbis Under Investigation
of U. S. Grand Jury

The United States Federal Grand Jury for New York is investigating the activities of the 600 rabbis in New York City. This was learned through an affidavit filed in the District Court by David H. Blair, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, and Chester P. Mills, Prohibition Administrator for this district in answer to a motion made by Rabbi Jacob Waters for a temporary injunction to restrain the Government from interfering with the possession of wine stored at No. 124 East 107th Street, according to the New York "Evening World."

Up to the present time three rabbis and a salesman have already been indicted for filing false applications for withdrawal permits. It is expected that when the October Grand Jury completes the investigation started by the August body, many others will be added to the list.

Those indicted so far are Rabbi Max Brooks of the Congregational Dlugoschader Independent Relief Society; Bernard Portnoy, Rabbi of the Congregation B'nai Israel; Abraham Greher, Rabbi of the Congregations Adath Israel and Erste Tzyner K. U. Verein, and Abraham Dembar for causing Rabbi Ephraim Spiegel to make false reports in the filing of his withdrawal permits.

The indictments all charge the defendants with having falsified their applications in that they wrongfully stated the number of members belonging to their congregations eligible for the issuance of wine for religious purposes, the "Evening World" states.

These indictments together with the affidavit confirm the report which has been in circulation that United States District Attorney Buckner is making a determined drive against the rabbis of the city. His assistant, Horace G. Hitchcock, has charge of the investigation and has been presenting his evidence to the jury for two months.

The affidavit filed by Major Mills sets forth the methods used by the Government permits and describes the means employed to violate those permits. In applying for a withdrawal permit the rabbi is compelled to state the number of members in his congregation requiring sacramental wine and upon the granting of the application he is permitted to withdraw one gallon a year for every adult in his church.

That application must be indorsed by the Secretary or President of the congregation before it is granted. For the purpose of aiding in the distribution of this wine former Administrator John B. Foster allowed the rabbis to store this wine in what is commonly known as sacramental wine stores. Those stores were intended merely as a distributing centre from which members of the congregations might obtain their lawful amount of wine without placing the rabbis under the necessity of distributing it themselves.

The affidavit states further that since

HADASSAH PRESIDENT GIVES \$7,500 DIAMOND TIARA FOR HOSPITAL FUND

A gift of a diamond tiara valued at \$7,500 has been made by Mrs. Irma Lindheim, president of the Hadassah Women's Zionist Organization, towards a fund of \$1,000,000 for building hospitals in Palestine. Mrs. Lindheim presented her gift to Dr. Nathan Ratnof, chairman of a joint body representing the American Jewish Physicians Committee and the Hadassah Women's Zionist Organization, under whose auspices the undertaking to raise the \$1,000,000 has been launched.

A fully equipped modern hospital to be part of the Medical Department of the Hebrew University at Jerusalem is included in the Committee's program. In addition, smaller hospitals are to be built in the other cities of Palestine and in the large agricultural centers, particularly in the Valley of Jezreel which, in the past four years, has been covered with a network of thriving Jewish agricultural settlements.

the establishment of those wine stores many rabbis have been falsifying or padding their application lists. In the cases of these already indicted it is alleged that the defendants claimed as high as 1,900 members, whereas facts show that there were no more than 300.

Major Mills also states that since his investigation of the sacramental wine stores and denial of permits to operate these stores withdrawals of sacramental wines has fallen from over 1,000,000 gallons in the five months from May through September, 1925, to slightly more than 6,000 in the corresponding period of 1926.

Assistant United States Attorney U. S. Grant argued the motion before Judge Winslow, who reserved decision.

The "Southwestern Israelite," an Anglo-Jewish weekly, published in Dallas, Texas, appeared with its first issue on September 24. Rabbi David Lefkowitz is editor, Rabbi M. N. Taxon, associate editor and Arthur Adams, managing editor and publisher.

An essay contest to be conducted among workers in the fur industry in New York was announced by the Charity Chest of the Fur Industry. Prizes amounting to \$1,000, controlled by Michael Hollander, will be awarded.

The Ku Klux Klan has challenged the Walker Civil Rights Law of New York and asked the Supreme Court to declare it unconstitutional. A case appealed from Buffalo is to be argued in Washington, D. C., within the next ten days.

The Klan attorneys, in a brief filed with the court, contend that the Walker act is aimed at their order, and it is "unconstitutional and void in contravention of section 1 of the fourteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States, in that it deprives the relator (George W. Bryant) and the organization to which he belongs of liberty, without due process of law, and denies him and his organization the equal protection of the law."

Bryant was arrested for violation of the Walker law, the Klan having failed to furnish the State a roster of its members.

"We could demonstrate to the satisfaction of this Court beyond a reasonable doubt that the sole purpose of this legislation was indirectly to legislate the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan out of existence so far as the State of New York is concerned," the brief says.

"The Legislature has deprived the relator, his brethren and his organization of liberties guaranteed by the Constitution without due process of law and denied them the equal protection of the law by finding the organization guilty of high crimes and misdemeanors without trial."

The Klan brief carries Invisible Empire propaganda.

Stabilization of the currencies of all European countries on a gold basis, which already has been adopted by many States, was urged at the Pan-European Congress in session in Vienna. Other steps toward an economic union of the European countries were: To allow a longer term in commercial treaties for stabilizing currencies.
