

## SOVIET EDUCATION MINISTER URGES MEASURES AGAINST ANTI-SEMITISM IN RUSSIA

Sees Rapid Growth of Movement;  
Terms It "Wild Beast"

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Oct. 8.—Energetic steps to combat the rapidly growing anti-Semitic movement in Soviet Russia were urged yesterday by Lunatcharsky, Soviet Commissar of Education, in a long article published in the "Emes," the organ of the Jewish section of the Communist party.

The reason for anti-Semitism at all times and in all countries lies in the high intellect, ability and enterprising spirit of the Jews, Lunatcharsky declares. These qualities of the Jews evoke a fear of competition and hatred on the part of the middle classes and the intellectuals who are the lightning conductors for the ruling powers. Urging that the Jews are useful to the country, Lunatcharsky says in his article that it is the duty of all Communists, progressive intellectuals and workmen, to fight "that wild beast which is called anti-Semitism."

"Enlightenment for the ignorant, contempt for the cultured anti-Semites, but where anti-Semitism becomes aggressive drastic measures should be taken, just as against hooliganism," he declares.

## PILSUDSKI CABINET PURSUES POLICY OF FORMER GOVERN- MENT, VICE PREMIER SAYS

Warsaw, Oct. 8.—The attitude of the new Pilsudski government toward the problems of the Jewish population in the Republic of Poland was made clear yesterday at a conference of representatives of the Club of Jewish Deputies and Professor Bartel who holds the post of vice premier in the new cabinet.

The leaders of the Club of Jewish Deputies asked for a definition of the stand of the new cabinet and pointed out that the demands of the Jewish population have remained unfulfilled. Vice-premier Bartel declared that the attitude of the new government is identical with that of the previous government and that it is striving to meet the demands of the Jewish population.

## FIRST GRANDSON OF BARON EDMOND ROTHSCHILD BORN

Paris, Oct. 8.—A new member was added today to the famous Rothschild family through the birth of the first grandson of Baron Edmond de Rothschild, head of the French branch of the family and known throughout the world for his role in the rebuilding of Palestine.

The father of the newly-born, Maurice de Rothschild, has just been re-elected as member of the French Parliament.

## RABBIS AND COMMUNAL LEADERS IN CLASH OVER CHARACTER OF KEHILLAH'S

Conference of Noted East-European  
Rabbis Considers Question

Vilna, Oct. 8.—The rabbinate and the communal boards of the Eastern provinces of the Polish Republic are in disagreement over the character of the Kehillahs which are to be formed in the near future.

This was brought to light today when a conference of rabbis in the Eastern provinces was opened here with the presence of Chofetz Chaim, one of the oldest rabbis of Eastern Europe and an influential religious leader. The purpose of the rabbis' conference is to consider ways and means of seeing to it that the government ordinances which are to be issued shortly concerning the reorganization of the communities should accord the communities a religious character.

The conference was called immediately following a conference of Jewish communal leaders held here recently at which it was demanded that the Kehillahs be given a secular character.

## RABBI'S VALET DIES OF GRIEF OVER HIS MASTER'S DEATH

Unique Bond of Devotion Revealed

Riga, Oct. 8.—Bonds of friendship, and devotion between master and valet, demonstrated through history as far back as King Saul, were evidenced in the case of Rabbi Meir Simchah Ha'cohen of Dvinsk and his valet.

Much comment was current today when it was learned that the twenty-eight year old "shammes" of the late Rabbi Ha'cohen, who passed away recently at the age of seventy, died. The rabbi, who was a famous Talmudic scholar in Eastern Europe and his valet were close friends. The death of the rabbi greatly affected his young valet. He grieved for several months and yesterday died of heart failure.

## CZARIST GENERAL ASKS AID OF JEWS IN OLD AGE

Riga, Oct. 8.—The generosity of Jewish philanthropic organizations in Latvia was invoked today by General Nekudov, former Czarist general.

General Nekudov, who was formerly governor of Livonia and of the Kovno district under the Czarist regime, is now living in Riga in great poverty. In a request submitted to the Jewish deputy Nurok, he implored him to obtain the aid of Jewish philanthropic organizations for him as he is too old and weak to earn a livelihood. General Nekudov submitted proof in his letter that he had helped the Jewish population under the Czarist regime.

## PALESTINE MAY HAVE ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE ON AMERICAN PATTERN

Leader of Dry Forces Arrives in  
Jerusalem, Explains Plans

Jerusalem, Oct. 8.—An anti-saloon league modeled after the American pattern, to introduce prohibition, may be formed in Palestine, according to "Pussyfoot" Johnson, who arrived here.

When interviewed today by the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Mr. Johnson stated that he came to Palestine for the purpose of studying the alcohol question here. "There are many followers of the prohibition idea in Palestine and it is possible that an organization for that purpose will be established in the country," he declared.

Mr. Johnson will go from Palestine to Constantinople where the anti-Saloon League numbers 1,200 members. He will then proceed to Bulgaria, from where he will go to England and thence to the United States. Mr. Johnson stated that during his stay in Egypt he conducted an anti-saloon campaign and a strong prohibition organization was formed. The Egyptian anti-saloon league is under the patronage of Prince Omar Toussoun.

## RUSSIAN "LIVING CHURCH" MAY CLAIM PROPERTIES IN PALESTINE, IS FEAR

Jerusalem, Oct. 8.—A new color may be added to the colorful conglomeration of religious communities in Palestine, according to advices received by the Russian Greek Orthodox community here.

The Greek Orthodox community in Palestine is greatly disturbed over the report that the Greek Patriarch has officially recognized the "Living Church" of Soviet Russia. The fear is held that the Red "Living Church" may present its claim to the properties of the Russian Greek Orthodox religious community in Palestine, which are now under the administration of the old Russian Church.

## LLOYD GEORGE AIDS JEWISH PHILANTHROPIC ENDEAVOR

London, Oct. 8.—David Lloyd George, former British Prime Minister, will extend a helping hand to the philanthropic endeavors of the Jewish community of London, it was learned here today.

The former prime minister has consented to be present at a festival dinner given by the London Jewish hospital to be held at the Hotel Savoy on October 29. The purpose of the dinner is to raise the amount of £25,000 necessary for the completion of an extension building of the hospital.

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# **LIPSKY STATES POSITION OF ZIONISTS IN J. D. C. ZIONIST CONTROVERSY**

A statement of the Zionist position in the controversy between the Zionists and the leaders of the Joint Distribution Committee on the question of Palestine and relief, was made by Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, at a meeting of the Palestine Chamber of Commerce in New York Thursday night. The meeting was held as a welcome to Judge Jacob S. Strahl, who returned from a trip to Europe.

Declaring that the Zionists uphold Palestine's supremacy in all Jewish activities, Mr. Lipsky said:

"In this controversy, as a matter of fact, the Zionist position in this country has been so clear from the very beginning, that it is surprising that in the middle of the proceedings it has become confused and muddy through the process of discussion and partisan debate.

"The fact is that the instinct of every Zionist was favorable to the relief. The instinct of every Zionist dictated to him that in the Jewish relief movement new features were to be introduced, a new understanding of the problem was to be brought in. A feeling of sympathy and interest from every point of view was to be brought in that connected with this relief the question of the rebuilding of Palestine, but when the Zionists felt that the relief movement became a movement which excluded the conception of the rebuilding of Palestine and that it was paramount to the building of an organization that was for the establishment of the Jewish home, naturally friction of all sorts and all sicknesses that go with the assertion of an illogical idea in Jewish life, as talk of constructive relief without taking in consideration within that conception the ideal of building the Jewish National home, arose. In spite of that the Zionists throughout the country went into the relief and helped the relief in every city, and they simply said, we

## **HEBREW PAPER PUBLISHES DETAILS OF PALESTINE- ARAB NEGOTIATIONS**

Jerusalem, Sept. 16.—A full account of the negotiations conducted some time ago between Arab notables and Mr. E. Mills, acting Chief Secretary of the Palestine Government, on the question of Arab cooperation with the Government, and the possibility of creating a Palestine parliament, is published by the "Ha'Aretz," Hebrew daily here.

The Arab negotiators, the paper states, interviewed the responsible Arab leaders during the course of the conferences, which lasted through four days, regarding the Arab demands and their aspirations, the alleged unsuitability of existing legislation to Arab demands, reasons for the Arabs' negative attitude to the Government, refusal to participate in the elections to the Legislative Council and rejection of the offer for the creation of an Advisory Council and Arab Agency. The Arab negotiators pointed out the necessity of amending the present policy in Palestine, forming a regime on the lines of that in Iraq, Lebanon and that being formed in Syria, and limiting the international responsibility of Great Britain so as not to encroach upon the national, political, economic and religious rights of the Arabs. The Palestine Constitution was dealt with, and Mr. Mills promised finally to send a memorandum on the negotiations to the Arab side, in which they would be given details of the

### **From Baltimore to Chicago**

The hope that the pressure of Jewish public opinion will cause the leaders of the J. D. C. and the Zionists to establish peace on the question of Russian colonization and Palestine, so that the division into "J. D. C. Jews" and "Palestine Jews" will be done away with, is expressed in the "Day" (Oct. 8), by S. Dingol, who discusses the Chicago conference under the above caption.

Mr. Dingol, recalling the Baltimore Zionist conference of November 29, 1925, on which occasion Mr. Louis Marshall urged on American Jewry the duty of supporting Palestine reconstruction simultaneously with East-European relief, declares that this principle has not been acted upon by the J. D. C. "We do not doubt the sincerity of Mr. Marshall's words," he writes, "and we are far from accusing him that he deliberately misled public opinion. We are inclined to believe that the Zionist Organization, too, has a large share in the guilt for the chasm which has been created between the Palestine work and the relief work of American Jewry. The American Jew has remained the same from Philadelphia to Chicago and he has a right to ask why there is no unity in the relief work of American Jewry and he has the right to demand that American Jews should not be divided into 'J. D. C. Jews' and 'Palestine Jews'.

Mr. Dingol finds that whereas the leaders of the J. D. C. have made their point of view clear, the Zionists have not done so. "The J. D. C. leaders," he avers, "have made their attitude to Palestine clear. In Mr. Marshall's Baltimore address he brought out two points: first, that the urge toward Palestine is strong and that it is the duty of every Zionist and non-Zionist to support the reconstruction of Palestine; and secondly, that Palestine and relief must go hand in hand. This assertion was uttered clearly, without any strings attached to it. We have followed the Zionist press, however, and as many reports of speeches as possible and have failed to find even one address of a Zionist leader referring to Russian colonization that did not conclude with the statement that this is a scheme of the 'Yevsektsia' (Jewish section of the Communist Party). In other words, on the part of the J. D. C. we have an open, definite call to support Palestine; on the part of the Zionist Organization, we have seen nowhere a clear call to support Russian Colonization.

"What is necessary at this moment," the writer emphasizes, "is for the Zionist Organization openly to state its position—should Zionists support the J. D. C. campaign, or not? This would be clear. Every Zionist would then know where he stands. . . . Just as the J. D. C. so does the Zionist Organization now play with words. . . . The pressure of public opinion

# WELL POISONING CHARGE IS LEVELLED AT JEWS

Warsaw, Oct. 8.—The charge of poisoning the wells, directed against Jews in the Middle Ages, was insinuated by the "Dwa Grosze," the leading anti-Semitic Polish newspaper.

The insinuation was made by the newspaper when it reported the fact that 214 soldiers of the Sawalki Infantry Regiment were suddenly taken ill. An analysis made by the military medical authorities disclosed the fact that the soldiers were taken sick because they had drunk water from an unclean well. The "Dwa Grosze" pointed out the fact that the soldiers were taken ill on the Jewish high holidays when the Jewish soldiers were excused from the regiment. The newspaper, emphasizing the fact that the Jewish soldiers did not suffer because of their absence, makes the insinuation that Jews had poisoned the well.

should compel both sides to create a mutual ground for cooperation, determining in advance the share that is to go to Palestine and the share that is to go for other countries. This would perhaps be the best means of securing money for both purposes, for then American Jewry, regardless of opinions or leanings, would really be able to throw itself into a campaign for both causes."

The "Jewish Morning Journal" of Oct. 8, dealing with the Chicago conference, observes:

"It is to be hoped that the Chicago conference will be free of the controversies and the bitterness of the Philadelphia conference. There can be at present no two opinions regarding the importance of the relief work in Poland and the colonization work in Russia. It was the latter activity that led to the controversies, but even those who had complaints against the colonization work emphasized frequently that they have no objections to colonization work in Russia as a relief measure. They merely complained against certain phases of the publicity connected with it and the difference of opinion on this question need not be so great as to lead to a diversion from the chief purpose, namely, to create some kind of a foundation for the tens of thousands of declassified Jews in Russia who have no other means of securing their bread and butter. If there will only be the necessary goodwill, all disputes regarding this can be settled. The large sum of money which was allotted by the United Jewish Campaign for Palestine should serve as a proof that the responsible leaders of the Campaign are not enemies of Zionism and desire to serve the whole Jewish people."

### Palestine Mandate Primarily a Matter for League of Nations, Declares Sir Herbert Samuel

(By Our Berlin Correspondent)

Berlin, Sept. 20.—Although the Jews of England have a bigger responsibility falling upon them in regard to cooperation in Palestine reconstruction, the Mandate is not a purely British affair but primarily a matter for the League of Nations. This was the assertion made by Sir Herbert Samuel, the former High Commissioner of Palestine, in the course of his address delivered in Munich on Sept. 16, at the reception arranged for him and Lady Samuel by the leading Jews of the city.

Dwelling on the political problems in Palestine, Sir Herbert said that when he had arrived in Palestine six years ago, the relations between the Jews and the Arabs had been strained. The Arabs feared that they had been prejudiced by the Balfour Declaration and that they were to become slaves under a Jewish State. That was the reason for the political unrest observed in Palestine during the first few years after the Balfour Declaration. The British Government felt it its duty to declare that this was not its aim. This explained the British White Paper in which the intention of the British Government was definitely laid down in relation to the Mandate.

"The White Paper," Sir Herbert said, "had been necessary not only because of the Arabs, but also because of those Jews who were disturbed by a misinterpretation of the phrase 'National Home' which appeared in the Balfour Declaration. Many Jews had feared that the establishment of a Jewish National Home would prejudice their citizenship in their respective countries. The Balfour Declaration had already made it clear that the establishment of a Jewish National Home could not affect the citizenship of Jews in other countries. But the White Paper had once again put right this misconception which appeared the more necessary because the idea had gained ground that Palestine was to become as Jewish as England is English. The White Paper which had cleared up the position had to a certain extent calmed both sides. The Arabs of Palestine were being treated with absolute justice with the result that there was contentment in the country.

"Although the Jews of England naturally had a bigger duty falling upon them in regard to cooperation in the Palestine work," Sir Herbert continued, "it was a mistake to think that the Mandate was a purely British affair. It was primarily a matter for the League of Nations. The League of Nations had set up a Mandates Commission which had to deal with all the questions affecting the Mandated countries. All the States of the world today were following with interest the development of Palestine under the direction of the Mandatory Power. Germany's entry into the League of Nations would undoubtedly be followed

## APPEALS FOR FLORIDA JEWS; CHARGES NEGLECT

An appeal for aid for the Jewish population in Hollywood, Fla., was made by Rabbi I. S. Ravetch of Daytona Beach, Fla., in a telegram addressed to the "Jewish Daily Bulletin." Rabbi Ravetch's telegram read:

"I have just received the following telegram from Hollywood, Florida: 'As yet there has not been any relief for Hollywood Jews. Some are in dire distress, one having been taken to the hospital, suffering a nervous breakdown due to the financial depression. Miami ignores us. What can we expect?' The telegram was signed for the Hollywood Jewish Center by I. Louis Seligman, chairman.

"The indifference of American Jewry to the cause of their own flesh and blood is lamentable. American Jews gave millions to suffering European Jewry. Will they not give thousands to their American brethren who are in despair? Most we wait for suicide, insanity and nervous breakdown before offering aid. It is surprising that the United Jewish Appeal has not taken control of this matter. If that institution is indifferent the Jewish newspapers and organizations should ask for funds and this must be done immediately. Has American Jewry forgotten the maxim 'Kol Ha'makayem Nefesh achath?'"

## VIENNA STUDENTS OBJECT TO JEWISH DEAN AT SCHOOL

Vienna, Oct. 8.—A fight is now being waged between the Senate of the University of Vienna and a group of German students. Recently Prof. Hupka, a Jewish scholar, was appointed dean of the College of Jurisprudence at the University. A group of students who are members of the Deutsch Voelkische party submitted a memorandum to the Senate, in which they protest against the appointment, declaring that they refuse to be examined under the chairmanship of a Jew and they refuse to receive their doctorate degree from the hands of a Jewish dean.

For these reasons, Sir Herbert declared, it was incomprehensible to him that any Jew should not feel a sympathetic interest in the future of Palestine. He emphasized that an English, German or French Jew who took part in the Palestinian reconstruction work would not be considered because of such participation as any the worse Englishman, German or Frenchman.

**\$3,000,000 FUND LAUNCHED FOR DAUGHTERS OF JACOB HOME**

A fund of \$3,000,000 to constitute a permanent endowment, the income from which would meet carrying charges for operating the Home of the Daughters of Jacob, started at a dinner given at the Home Thursday night to 150 donors and members of the board of trustees by Judge Otto A. Rosalsky. It was decided that the inauguration of a campaign to raise the fund should be made with a \$100 per couple dinner to be given at the Hotel Astor on December 14, the thirtieth anniversary of the establishment of the Home.

An executive council was appointed as a campaign committee to raise the fund. Samuel D. Friedman is president of the Council which includes Samuel Weinstein, Moses F. Dworsky, Joseph Zelenko and Edward Potter.

Samuel D. Friedman, Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, Samuel C. Lampert, Joseph Baroness and Mrs. Samuel Bernstein addressed the meeting.

Samuel C. Lampert eulogized Mrs. Bertha Dworsky, who, until her death last year, was the President of the Home since its founding. He stated that it was necessary to create a fund to perpetuate the maintenance of the institution which houses more than 500 men and women, 200 of whom are incurables and are confined to hospital wards.

**POLISH MANUFACTURERS TO EXHIBIT AT TEL AVIV FAIR**

Warsaw, Oct. 8.—Polish manufacturers will send exhibits to the Palestine Near East Exhibition and Fair arranged in Tel Aviv by the Judea Industrial Corporation.

Arrangements to this effect were made by the Palestine-Poland Chamber of Commerce. It was also learned that the Polish Ministry of Commerce intends to establish a special Polish pavilion at the fair.

Goldstein; Dietary Laws, Mrs. Bernard Kevell; The Bible, Mrs. David de Sola Pool; The Training of Our Children, Mrs. Leo Jung; and Jewish Family Life.

Selig, Executive Director of the Yeshiva College Building Fund. sittings and to present this memorandum to the High Commissioner.

When the Arab party received the memorandum, the paper further states, they found that it was necessary to introduce certain changes, declaring that it was foreign to the spirit that had prompted the negotiations, and preparing a memorandum of their own for transmission to the High Commissioner. Mr. Mills stated that the publication of the Municipal Elections Ordinance was a great concession on the part of the Government and a step forward towards internal liberty in Palestine.

The paper gives the full text of the memorandum submitted by Mr. E. Mills. It covers the points of the negotiations—the creation of a Parliamentary administration so that the population may assist in the legislation of the country; the difficulty of according the proposal with the Balfour Declaration; the introduction of an explanation of the British policy contained in the White Paper of 1922, into the Palestine Constitution; the introduction of a clause into the Constitution that while the Palestine population is aware of the Government's acceptance of international obligations, it does not necessarily accept them; the creation of a Senate and lower Chamber, the first being composed of Government officials and picked notables, and the second of elected delegates—one to each 20,000-25,000 inhabitants—both Chambers to have the power of enacting internal legislation, but not the veto of financial expenditure and international obligations. The other clauses deal with the method of procedure in both Houses and the examination of financial bills and international obligations, the division of the population into three election sections—Moslems, Christians and Jews, the basis of voting being proportional representation, the electors and elected being Palestinians only.

David Glickman, Brooklyn real estate operator, died Thursday in the Jewish Hospital, Brooklyn. He was forty years old.

Mr. Glickman was born in Philadelphia and lived many years in Chicago, where he was a member of Universal Lodge, F. and A. M. He had lived in Brooklyn ten years and was active in civic and philanthropic work. He was active in the Brooklyn Chamber of Commerce and in Brooklyn Lodge, B'nai B'rith.
