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NON-PARTISAN CONFERENCE ON PALESTINE ECONOMIC PROBLEMS OPENS IN LONDON

Sir Herbert Samuel Presides; Prominent European Economists and Bankers Present; Discuss Possibility of Palestine Loan, Advisability of New Land Concessions and Proposals for Hastening Country's Development

London, Oct. 13.—The participation of European non-Zionists in the economic task of upbuilding Palestine as the Jewish national home came closer to realization when the Palestine economic conference was opened here last Monday in the conference room of the Zionist Executive at 77 Great Russell Street. Prominent European bankers, industrialists and economists are engaged in the deliberations of the conference.

Sir Herbert Samuel, former High Commissioner of Palestine and candidate for the leadership of the British Liberal Party, was in the chair. He was assisted by Deputy Leon Blum, leader of the Socialist party in France and Senator Della Torre, director of the Bank of Milan.

The conference, which was scheduled to be opened on Sunday was delayed due to the fact that several of the expected participants were delayed in their journey from the continent because of the bad weather.

A message was read from the Mar-

quis of Reading, who regretted his inability to attend, due to his absence from England, but he wished the conference every success. In a message Armand Dreyfus, banker of Switzerland, deplored his absence because of illness, but promised his cooperation. A similar message was received from Mr. Belisha.

Prior to the formal opening of the conference, Sir Herbert Samuel at a preliminary meeting held on Sunday suggested that several sub-committees be formed for the purpose of starting the work immediately. These sub-committees were formed consisting of Sir Herbert Samuel, James de Rothschild, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Bernard Feiwel, Dr. Arthur Ruppin, Senator Della Torre, Dr. Ernest Kahn, financial authority of the Frankfurter Zeitung, Mr. Harold

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COMPLAINT OF ROUMANIA'S MISTREATMENT OF JEWS NOT SUBMITTED TO LEAGUE

Report Emanating From Roumanian News Agency Incorrect, Lucien Wolf Affirms

Bucharest, Oct. 13.—A denial of the report that a complaint against the mistreatment of the Jewish population in Roumania was lodged with the League of Nations was circulated by the Rador, the Roumanian official news agency.

The report originated with the "Pestnaplo," a Budapest daily, which stated that the Board of Jewish Deputies of England had lodged a complaint with the League against Roumania's treatment of the Jews.

London, Oct. 13.—Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Board of Jewish Deputies and the Anglo-Jewish Association, when interviewed by the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here stated that the report of the Roumanian news agency was correct. No complaint was submitted to the League at this time, Mr. Wolf stated.

UNION OF AMERICAN HEBREW CONGREGATIONS FACES FINANCIAL CRISIS

Organization Works Under Budgetary Deficit of \$100,000, May Lead to Curtailment of Activities; Generosity of American Jews for Relief Abroad Causes Neglect of Home Institutions; Ludwig Vogelstein Calls on Reform Jews to Provide Sineqs of War for Aggressive Policy

That American Reform Judaism, after more than fifty years of continuous growth, is facing a financial crisis which may be the turning point of its development, was emphasized in a statement made public by Ludwig Vogelstein, Chairman of the Executive Board of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. Mr. Vogelstein declared that the Conference of Liberal Jews held recently in London had given a decided impetus to religious movements in America. But at the same time, he said, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations which gives direction and development to Reform Judaism in the United States is confronted with the necessity for curtailment of the budget required for its activities because of the inadequacy of funds. The Union's Board of Finance, of which David A. Brown is chairman, has hesitated to go before the public to raise the sum required to maintain the Union's activities because of urgent appeals for funds for relief and reconstruction from their coreligionists in many lands, Mr. Vogelstein stated.

Mr. Vogelstein declared that the Union had been able to carry on its large program which includes the maintenance of the Hebrew Union College

at Cincinnati, two teachers' training schools at Cincinnati and New York, the Hebrew Union College library and museum, and a Department of Synagogue and School Extension through the use of a reserve fund which has now been wiped out. At the last meeting of the Executive Board of the Union a budget calling for \$600,000 for the Union's activities was presented, and it was necessary to cut this by \$100,000. The wider field of development opened to liberal Judaism by the organization of a World Union, Mr. Vogelstein declared, and the imminent possibility of detriment to the Union's present work by curtailment of its budget, make it imperative to call upon the Jews of America to support this work.

"Up to the present time Reform Judaism has made progress without any unusual effort," Mr. Vogelstein declared. "It has succeeded because, in the nature of things, it is the answer to those who are seeking a way of adjusting Jewish tradition to the necessities of modern life. Reform Judaism has developed an organization which is complete in its outline, but its leaders are now realizing that the carrying out of this program requires

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**JEW, PIONEER OF POLISH
TEXTILE INDUSTRY, DIES
AT 83, IN DIRE POVERTY
Sold His Real Estate to Meet Financial
Obligations**

Warsaw, Oct. 13.—Moses R. Wiener, one of the pioneers of the Polish textile industry, former multi-millionaire ruined during the war, died in extreme poverty yesterday. He was eighty-three years old.

Mr. Wiener, who was the oldest citizen of Lodz, the Polish textile center, and was the first Jewish textile manufacturer, was a strictly observant Jew and a member of the Lodz Jewish communal board. He was a follower of the Chassidic Rabbi of Gora Kalwarja and was the financial supporter of the rabbi's enterprises.

During the world war, when the Germans entered Poland, Wiener was ruined because the machinery of his factories was requisitioned by the occupation authorities. He sold his real estate to meet his obligations which were mainly held abroad, leaving himself penniless.

COLUMBUS WAS MARRANO**

Madrid Paper Offers Prize for Essay

Madrid, Oct. 13.—The Spanish or Spanish Jewish origin of Christopher Columbus has come up again in connection with the celebration of Columbus Day yesterday.

The "A. B. C.", the leading Spanish newspaper, announced yesterday that it offers a prize of 50,000 pesetas for the best essay which will prove that Columbus was a Spaniard and not an Italian. This consequently would prove that Columbus was a Marrano, a Crypto-Jew.

The final date for submitting the essays was set by the "A. B. C." as April 1, 1927. Persons of any nationality and country are eligible to participate in the contest.

**SIR HERBERT SAMUEL WILL
PROBABLY BE NEXT LEADER
OF BRITISH LIBERAL PARTY**

London, Oct. 13.—Sir Herbert Samuel, former high commissioner of Palestine, will be the next choice of the English Liberal party as its leader in the House of Commons. This is the opinion of Lord Edward Dovedale, former M. P. and prominent Liberal leader, organizer of the Liberal Party, in an article which he published yesterday in the London "Daily News." Pointing out that of the three suggested leaders, the Marquis of Reading, Earl Beauchamp and Sir Herbert Samuel, two are lords and according to party traditions it is not customary that the leaders in both houses should be lords. The only candidate for the House of Commons remains Sir Herbert Samuel, he writes.

"Sir Herbert is one of the ablest administrators and parliamentarians of our time," Lord Dovedale writes. "He has justified this description by finding the only solution of our disastrous coal dispute. He is also the author of the policy of industrial social reform which was drafted twelve years ago and is still waiting to be put into operation," he writes. Lord Dovedale expresses his conviction that under the leadership of Sir Herbert Samuel, all sections of the Liberal party will work with enthusiasm and unanimity.

**AUSTRALIA ENTERS FIGHT
BETWEEN LEAGUE COUNCIL
AND MANDATES COMMISSION**

Sidney, Australia, Oct. 13.—Australia will enter the fight between the League Council and the Permanent Mandates Commission over the question of the jurisdiction over the mandated territories, it was learned here today from a government announcement.

The federal government of Australia declares that it intends to protest to the League Council against the proposed new questionnaire of the Permanent Mandates Commission concerning the mandated territories.

Senator George F. Pearce, minister for home territories, declared that it is practically the unanimous opinion of the empire that the questionnaire of the Permanent Mandates Commission is too inquisitorial. It asks information on points of administration of the former German possessions which are held by Australia under a mandate. These questions are entirely within the jurisdiction of the Australian government, he declared.

**SWISS ZIONISTS ENDORSE
DR. WEIZMANN'S POLICY**

Geneva, Oct. 13.—The policy of the Weizmann administration in the Zionist movement was endorsed by the Federation of Swiss Zionists at its thirtieth annual convention which opened here last Sunday.

Thirty-nine delegates attended the conference which was held under the chairmanship of Dr. Becker. The conference unanimously voted a resolution

The Passing of Maxim Vinaver

The passing in Paris of Maxim Vinaver, one of the outstanding figures produced by Russian Jewry, is commented on by the Jewish press, which dwells on his dual role as a great leader in Russian political life and a leader in the Jewish field.

Vinaver's great personality and his brilliant abilities, declares the "Jewish Morning Journal," would have made him an outstanding statesman of the age, had he not been born and lived in Russia. Relating Vinaver's role in the establishment and leadership of the liberal "cadet" party in Russia, the paper says it was due to Vinaver's position as its guiding influence that the Russian reactionaries termed the "cadets" a "Jewish party," despite the fact that at its head stood a number of representatives of Russia's cultured class, such typical Russians as Miliukov, Maklakov, Raditchev and Prince Lvov. As for his position in Jewish life the paper writes:

"In the Jewish life of pre-revolution Russia Vinaver represented the tendency which does not become inspired for ideals and programs, but which takes into consideration only the present and attempts to bring about such immediate improvements as it thinks possible. In this respect, he was always under fire from the Zionists as well as from the Socialists. The Zionists accused him of being an assimilationist, in adjusting the interests of the Jews to the tactical interests of the Cadet party. The Socialists accused him of compromising with Czarism, of avoiding a conflict in principle for general Jewish interests.

"Nevertheless, despite his isolated position, Vinaver occupied the leading place among all the Jewish politicians in Czaristic Russia, and there was not one among them who could be compared to him in power and influence. Everybody respected his vast knowledge, his forceful speech, his brilliant logic and his strong inherent integrity."

"The 'Jewish Daily News' observes: 'The death of Vinaver has removed one of the outstanding personalities in the Jewish life of pre-Bolshevik Russia.'

His Jewish activities were not limited to the political field, he was also the founder of the Jewish Historical-Ethnographic Society, and he wrote on various phases of the Jewish problem. Vinaver was a man of many parts and he was great in the legal field. He had an inexhaustible supply of energy. Among the Jewish communal leaders and politicians of our time he held a place in the very forefront. . . . Despite the difficulties he encountered he succeeded in doing much good for the Jews of Russia."

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more than "general" interest. Reform Jew have been content to vote the Jewish ticket but now realize the necessity of organizing a Reform Jewish party which is to supply the sinews of war for an aggressive campaign.

"The unusual number of causes calling for assistance in America," he went on, "and especially the supreme cause of Jewish suffering in foreign lands, has for a number of years overshadowed the real problem which faces the American Jew, namely, the problem of providing for his self-preservation, not only for the preservation of Jewish bodies but for the preservation of the Jewish soul. The time has come when adequate provision must be made for that part of our heritage without which the preservation of human bodies is apt to turn into a tragic thing.

"While Jewish liberalism was born in Germany," he said, "it came to fruition in America, and here it developed organization and technique which had made the Reform movement the outstanding achievement of American Jewish life. The one important thing brought out at the London conference was the fact that the work of Liberal Judaism has only begun, that this has developed moderately by the force of the momentum of liberal thought; that we have created organizations which need more than the momentum of thought, which require the organized effort of creative genius and the supreme force of sacrifice."

Mr. Vogelstein detailed the probable effects of the budgetary curtailment upon the present activities of the Union, and said:

"The Hebrew Union College, which requested \$313,000 may have to reduce its teaching staff. This would indeed be a calamity, as the number of men in the whole world available for professional work of this kind is limited and as men of this description have to be especially trained over long periods of years. The cessation of activity along these lines will produce a discouragement in the development of Jewish learning that may take years to make good.

"The Hebrew Union College may also have to reduce the number of students applying at its doors for admission, at a time when the country is crying for Jewish religious leadership. The congregation is the unit of organization in American Jewish life and unless we are prepared to furnish congregational leaders we are sapping Judaism of its vitality.

"The Hebrew Union College may have to cease purchasing books for its library which by reason of recent acquisitions has become America's center of Jewish culture. In Europe the schools of higher Jewish learning have been practically disbanded. The teachers have scattered. Many have passed away. The libraries have been destroyed. The Jewish world is looking

to America as the future home of Jewish learning.

"The Hebrew Union College may have to close its summer school. The closing of this school would be a hardship to the earnest men who aim to increase their usefulness in the Jewish field through its assistance.

"The Hebrew Union College may have to close its school for teachers in New York City.

"The Department of Synagogue and School Extension of the Union may have to reduce its field work. Considering that the whole body of Re-

form rabbis is comparatively small, this represents a very large activity for which no salaries are paid, but the expenses of which are borne by the Department of Synagogue and School Extension. The Department may also have to reduce the number of its regional rabbis.

"The Department may have to reduce its activities in the field of Jewish education. After many years of experimentation in the organization of schools, in the production of literature, the Department has at last created a Jewish Bureau of Education called the Commission on Jewish Education which is training teachers, producing literature, organizing schools throughout the United States. On the eve of this development, whose ramifications reach out into every Jewish hamlet, into the large and neglected metropolitan areas, into the secluded universities, the Department faces the possibility of a reduction of funds and the possible breaking up of this Department which has been so auspiciously inaugurated.

"The Department of Synagogue and School Extension may have to relinquish the publication of its teacher's magazine and its children's magazine called "Young Israel."

"The National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods is engaged in intensifying the Jewish life within the organized congregations by proposing a series of projects to the especial attention of women.

"At a time when problems of relief and reconstruction agitate sympathetic

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Laski, prominent banker of Manchester, Dr. George Halperin, director of the Anglo-Palestine Bank and Mr. Polak of the Nesher Cement Company of Palestine.

Although no official statement was issued concerning the subjects under discussion by these committees, it was learned that the question whether or not and under what conditions the Zionist Organization is to acquire concessions of certain new areas of land for Jewish colonization in territory adjacent to Palestine was debated. The situation of the Zionist financial institutions was examined. The operation of the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth were discussed and the possibility of providing larger resources for the upbuilding of Palestine through a loan were taken up.

Among those who have arrived to participate in the conference are Herr Oscar Wassermann, director of the Deutscher Reichsbank, Judge Visser of the Supreme Court, Holland, and Mr. Adler, banker of Rome.

The Monday morning session was opened by Dr. Weizmann who welcomed the gathering on behalf of the Zionist Executive and expressed his gratitude to Sir Herbert Samuel for assuming the chairmanship of the conference.

Sir Herbert joined Dr. Weizmann in welcoming the visitors to England and in his address described the outstanding facts of the present situation in Palestine. The Jewish population of Palestine has increased from 50,000 to 150,000 and a marked increase is also seen in the Jewish agricultural population of the country, he stated. Pointing to other developments in the country, Sir Herbert stated that this conference, although it takes into regard the political aims and the sentiments concerning the establishment of a Jewish national home, must concentrate its attention on the economic development, to seek ways and means of facilitating the agricultural and industrial conditions in Palestine. This can be done by the conference either jointly with the Zionist Organization or separately, he stated. Palestine, he continued, will become self-supporting in time, but there are numerous difficulties in the way. In a way, it is well that there are difficulties, because if Palestine had been fully developed already, the Jews would have had no opportunity for developing the country and creating a home there. He concluded his address with an expression of hope that the de-

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American Jewry, we are more than a little hesitant to present the needs of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. But we feel that unless we do secure adequate and immediate support, a great achievement into which fifty years of labor, thought, zeal and prophetic inspiration have gone, will be forced into disintegration," Mr. Vogelstein declared.

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liberations will be of great service to Palestine.

Dr. Weizmann, whose address followed Sir Herbert's outlined the Zionist position. The pace of upbuilding Palestine could have been forced, but there was a lack of means, he said. He showed how the development could be advanced through the provision of agricultural and industrial credit. Although this conference is a very sober gathering, dealing mainly with facts and figures, beneath it lies the aspiration to build up the Jewish homeland, he stated.

A variety of financial and economic subjects were then debated in the general discussion which followed and in which M. Blum, Herr Wassermann, Dr. Kahn, Judge Visser, Sir Herbert, Dr. Weizmann, Dr. Rupp and Dr. Feiwel participated. Following the discussion, the committees to which were added Dr. Wassermann and Dr. Blum retired for their deliberations. The committees worked all through Monday evening and early Tuesday morning with a view to arriving at certain definite proposals which will be placed before the conference.

At the noon session on Tuesday, Herr Wassermann submitted his report on behalf of the finance committee, reporting progress in the work of the committee. The various other proposals are still under discussion.

The conference will last until Wednesday evening or Thursday, when definite decisions will be made. A luncheon in honor of the visiting experts and bankers will be given by Dr. Weizmann at the Ritz Hotel on Wednesday.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR VINAVER FUNERAL ARE MADE IN PARIS

Paris, Oct. 13.—Arrangements for the funeral of Maxim Vinaver, famous Russian Jewish jurist and leader of the Jewish community in Russia under the Czarist regime, are being made here. A Vinaver memorial committee was formed here last night on the initiative of Dr. Leo Motzkin, chairman of the Committee of Jewish Delegations. Addresses will be delivered at the funeral by Dr. Motzkin, who will speak in Hebrew, Dr. S. Goldstein and Heinrich Sliosberg in Russian and M. Joffroykin, who will speak in Yiddish.

The installation ceremonies for Rabbi Solomon N. Bazell were held last Friday night at Temple B'nai Shalom, Louisville, Ky. More than 10,000 persons attended the exercises.

Dr. Julius J. Gormanstein, president of Hebrew Union College, delivered the principal address. Rabbi Joseph Kauch of Temple A'dath Israel, and Benjamin Rosenbaum, president of B'nai Shalom, welcomed the rabbi.

The 125th anniversary of the founding of the oldest Reformed Jewish synagogue in Philadelphia, Rodeph Shalom Congregation, will be celebrated October 23, 24 and 25.

Plans for the new building which will be erected by the Jewish Community Center of Jersey City, N. J., were discussed by the board of directors of the institution.

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JEWISH COMMUNAL ACTIVITIES

With the opening of the new season of the Jewish Community Center, Young Men's Hebrew Associations, and Young Women's Hebrew Associations, in numerous cities, which are constituent societies of the Jewish Welfare Board, the Board announces that there are strong indications of an unusually active year.

A larger number of the constituent societies than in previous years have sought the aid of the Jewish Welfare Board in planning and carrying out their programs of educational and recreational activities during the coming season. The tendency has been marked on the part of these organizations to plan their year's work in advance, and the Jewish Welfare Board has assisted them in doing so by issuing concrete materials on various aspects of the program. Under the encouragement and leadership of the Board, the Jewish Welfare Board character is being infused into both the mass and the club activities, the announcement of the Board declared.

Five hundred women will meet at the home of Adolph Lewishson, New York City, on October 19, to pledge one day's service in the tenth anniversary \$7,200 campaign for the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies.

Each of the five hundred women will be asked to give three things in behalf of the Federation: one day's service from an additional woman and one day's service from a man. The five hundred additional men and the same number of additional women, together with the group which is to meet at the Lewishson home, will join with the Business Men's Council of the Federation in the rally of the campaign at Hotel Pennsylvania, November 7, at which an attendance of 5,000 is expected.

Forty-five professional and business men, representing thirty-six professions and trades, have agreed to work with Adam L. Gimbel, vice-president of Saks Fifth Avenue in the raising of New York's \$1,200,000 quota for the National Farm School Expansion Project. Mr. Gimbel is chairman of the Business Men's Council of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies. Other members of the group are Abraham Erlanger, Manny Strauss, and Ex-Governor Sproul of Pennsylvania, which is heading a movement to raise \$5,000,000 for the National Farm School.

In twelve non-sectarian settlement houses, Bible classes maintained by the Women's League of the United Synagogue of America will begin for more than one thousand Jewish children on October 15th. These classes meet each week to instruct boys and girls, who otherwise would be without any form of religious instruction.

Mr. S. M. Cohen is chairman of the School Committee of the Women's League.

Plans for the cornerstone laying of the Yeshiva of America were made Tuesday night when presidents and representatives of orthodox congregations throughout the city met at the Jewish Center, 131 West 86th Street, New York.

The conference, which was attended by over one hundred delegates, was called by Gedaliah Bublik, Editor of the "Jewish Daily News" and Chairman of the Congregations Committee for the cornerstone.

The cornerstone laying, which will be held Sunday morning, December 5, will be followed by exercises throughout the day, ending in a dinner which is expected to be attended by four thousand people. Judge Otto A. Rosalsky is chairman of the morning program and Samuel Lampert will preside at the dinner.

The United Palestine Appeal campaign in Baltimore, Md., will be launched the latter part of November. It is expected that Dr. Leo Weizmann will address the city on the launching of the campaign. Invitations have been sent to one hundred and fifty Jewish organizations to send representatives to a conference to be held on October 24 to prepare for a reception in honor of Dr. Weizmann.

Harry Friedewald is honorary chairman of the Baltimore campaign and H. L. Caplan is chairman.

An eight-week special course for volunteer social service workers was opened yesterday in the Synagogue House, 40 West Sixty-sixth Street, New York City.
