VII.NA JEWS TO FURNISH CORPSES FOR UNIVERSITY CLINIC ON POLES' DEMAND Decision of Jewish Physicians Follows Anti-Jewish Excesses

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Vilna, Oct. 21.-Anti-Semitic excesses over the Jewish corpse question in the Medical College of the Vilna University continued yesterday.

Anti-Semitic students surrounded the clinics, refusing to permit Jewish students to enter. Many skirmishes oc-curred, following which the dean of the medical college ordered the clinics closed temporarily.

Vilna, Oct. 22 .- A conference of Jewish physicians in the city of Vilna and representatives of the rabbinate took place yesterday to consider ways and means of solving the question of fur-nishing Jewish corpses for the clinic of the medical college of the Vilna University.

Several days ago Polish students at the University of Vilna demanded the exclusion of Jewish students from the clinics, giving as a condition for the admission of Jewish students that eight (Continued on Page 4)

Mr. Handy also intimated that representatives of the Southern Baptist Convention would seek an audience with Queen Marie in reference to the alleged persecution of Baptists in her country.

JEWISH EX-SERVICE MEN RECOGNIZED AS EQUALS BY HUNGARIAN FRONT FIGHTERS

Budapest, Oct. 22.—Jewish soldiers who fought in the Hungarian army during the war will be treated on an equal level with non-Jews in the new exservice men's organization which was formed here.

The organization is to be known as the Club of Front Fighters and was formed under the leadership of Col. Bela Horthy and Col. Stefan Sziros. In a statement published in the press today the leaders of the club declare that the aim of the front fighters club will be to further among civilians the unforgettable comradeship of soldiers. The Jewish ex-service men will be given full rights in the club, the statement declares.

PALESTINE NATIONAL COUNCIL ADOPTS ONE POINT IN ZION-IST-REVISIONIST PROGRAM Adopts Resolution Urging Jewish

BILL TO REVIVE JEWISH NATIONAL AUTONOMY IN

LITHUANIA IS DRAFTED Majority in Lithuanian Parliament

Likely to Support Measure (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Kovno, Oct. 5 .- A bill providing for Jewish national autonomy in Lithuania, drawn up by the Jewish Club of Deputies here, will be submitted for consideration at a meeting of representatives of all the Tewish parties in the country and then to the Advisory Council to the Jewish Club of Deputies for further

consideration. The bill is in two sections; the first relates to the organization of Jewish autonomy, and the second to the administration of the Jewish school system and of Jewish cultural affairs. It

in each town, and the communities will have the right to enforce compulsory taxation. The Boards of the communities and the National Council are to be

elected by democratic vote. The section relating to the school system provides for cooperation between the Ministry of Education and Jewish National Council. schools will remain under the control of the Ministry of Education, but the

establishment of schools and the ap-pointment of teachers will be the task of the Icwish National Council. Originally it was intended to draft

one autonomy law for all the minority nationalities in the country. sponsible for his constant incitement for the disturbances continually being carried out by the students of the Roumanion universities with the intention of forcing the Government to adopt the of forcing the Government to adopt the numbers of Jewish students at the universities. The decision to prosecute Cuza followed the verdict of guilty pronounced against him by the Disciplinary Court of Jassy University, which conducted an investigation of the anti-Jewish disturbances at the Univer-

sity.

The report of the University Disciplinary Commission stated that it was due to Professor Cuza's incitement of the students that the Jassy Chief of Police, Monciu, was murdered by one of the students because he took steps to suppress the disturbances.
