

VILNA JEWS TO FURNISH CORPSES FOR UNIVERSITY CLINIC ON POLES' DEMAND

Decision of Jewish Physicians Follows Anti-Jewish Excesses
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vilna, Oct. 21.—Anti-Semitic excesses over the Jewish corpse question in the Medical College of the Vilna University continued yesterday.

Anti-Semitic students surrounded the clinics, refusing to permit Jewish students to enter. Many skirmishes occurred, following which the dean of the medical college ordered the clinics closed temporarily.

Vilna, Oct. 22.—A conference of Jewish physicians in the city of Vilna and representatives of the rabbinate took place yesterday to consider ways and means of solving the question of furnishing Jewish corpses for the clinic of the medical college of the Vilna University.

Several days ago Polish students at the University of Vilna demanded the exclusion of Jewish students from the clinics, giving as a condition for the admission of Jewish students that eight

JEWS NOT IN TERRITORIAL MINORITIES CONFERENCE

Warsaw, Oct. 22.—Another congress of national minorities in East European countries will be held shortly. The conference is to embrace those minorities in Europe which demand changes in the present frontiers. The initiative for the calling of the conference was taken by the Ukrainian and White Russian minorities. The Jewish minorities having no territorial claims will not participate in this conference.

JERUSALEM WILL HAVE CLUB HOUSE FOR EX-SERVICE MEN

Jerusalem, Oct. 22.—A club house for the Jewish ex-service men will be erected in Jerusalem by the Menorah Club.

The club, which was founded by Jewish ex-service men, plans the building as a memorial to the Jewish soldiers who fought in the war, particularly to the Jews who served in the three Jewish battalions in Palestine.

ZIONIST CONFERENCE IN JUGOSLAVIA IS OPENED

Zagreb, Yugoslavia, Oct. 22.—The annual conference of the Zionist Organization of Yugoslavia was opened here yesterday. One hundred delegates are attending the conference, which was opened under the chairmanship of Dr. Alkali.

A Zionist Women's Federation of Yugoslavia was formed in connection with the conference.

ROUMANIAN GOVERNMENT RESTORES CUZA, NOTORIOUS JEW-BAITER, TO POWER

Anti-Semitic Leader, Dismissed from Jassy University, Given Professorship

Bucharest, Oct. 22.—Alexander Cuza, leader of the Roumanian anti-Semitic forces and responsible for many acts of violence against Jewish students, was reinstated as Professor of Economics at the University of Jassy.

This was learned following a long audience given by the Roumanian Minister of Education, Petrovici, to Professor Cuza. Following the audience, the Minister signed an ordinance reinstating the professor.

Professor Cuza's resignation in March, 1925, came as a gesture on his part, calculated to strengthen his position on account of the prosecution against him in connection with the murder of the Jassy Chief of Police, Menciuc. Professor Cuza was to be brought up for trial on the charge of being re-

BAPTIST CONVENTION IN BALTIMORE PRESENTS PLEA TO Q'JEEN MARIE

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 22.—Urging religious freedom for Baptists and Jews in Roumania, a set of appeals was drawn up in the form of a resolution by the Rev. Kingman A. Handy, of Baltimore, and the Rev. Jacob Gartenhaus, of Atlanta, at the ninety-first annual convention of the Maryland Baptist Union Association being held here.

The appeals, which were drawn up on Wednesday, the same day Queen Marie of Roumania was entertained here, were passed on by the resolutions committee the following day and then forwarded to the Queen. Mr. Handy also intimated that representatives of the Southern Baptist Convention would seek an audience with Queen Marie in reference to the alleged persecution of Baptists in her country.

JEWISH EX-SERVICE MEN RECOGNIZED AS EQUALS BY HUNGARIAN FRONT FIGHTERS

Budapest, Oct. 22.—Jewish soldiers who fought in the Hungarian army during the war will be treated on an equal level with non-Jews in the new ex-service men's organization which was formed here.

The organization is to be known as the Club of Front Fighters and was formed under the leadership of Col. Bela Horthy and Col. Stefan Sziros. In a statement published in the press today the leaders of the club declare that the aim of the front fighters club will be to further among civilians the unforgettable comradeship of soldiers. The Jewish ex-service men will be given full rights in the club, the statement declares.

PALESTINE NATIONAL COUNCIL ADOPTS ONE POINT IN ZIONIST-REVISIONIST PROGRAM

Adopts Resolution Urging Jewish Unity in Frontier Force
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 22.—One feature of the program of the League of Zionist Revisionists was endorsed by the Vaad Leumi, the National Council of Palestine Jewry, at a meeting held here last night, at which Vladimir Jabotinsky was present.

Following an address delivered by Mr. Jabotinsky, who was supported by Mr. Ben Zwi, labor leader, the National Council adopted a resolution demanding the establishment of a Jewish unit in the Palestine Transjordanian frontier force. Only two members of the Council voted against the resolution.

At the same meeting, the National Council adopted a resolution urging that the Palestine government make amendments to the municipal elections law which was recently promulgated. The national Council demanded that women be granted franchise in the elections, that the tax rate entitling citizens to vote be diminished and that

JEWISH STUDENTS LEAVE HUNGARY BECAUSE OF NUMERUS CLAUSUS

Vienna, Oct. 22.—The strict enforcement of the numerus clausus law in the Hungarian universities and colleges made itself felt in Vienna.

During the last few days a great number of Jewish students have arrived here from Hungary. They are mostly without means. The Jewish students in Vienna constitute nearly sixty per cent of all the foreign students in the city.

PLUMER URGES PALESTINE OBSERVE ARMISTICE DAY

Jerusalem, Oct. 22.—Armistice Day will be observed in Palestine this year in accordance with a proclamation issued by the High Commissioner, Lord Plumer.

The proclamation urges the population to suspend business at eleven o'clock on Armistice Day and to observe a two minutes silence. The government offices will be closed and a parade of ex-service men will be held.

AUSTRIAN PRESIDENT HONORS VIENNESE JEWS

BILL TO REVOKE JEWISH NATIONAL AUTONOMY IN LITHUANIA IS DRAFTED

Majority in Lithuanian Parliament
Likely to Support Measure

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Kovno, Oct. 5.—A bill providing for Jewish national autonomy in Lithuania, drawn up by the Jewish Club of Deputies here, will be submitted for consideration at a meeting of representatives of all the Jewish parties in the country and then to the Advisory Council to the Jewish Club of Deputies for further consideration.

The bill is in two sections; the first relates to the organization of Jewish autonomy, and the second to the administration of the Jewish school system and of Jewish cultural affairs. It provides for the establishment of Jewish communal organizations and of a Jewish National Council. Every Jew who is described as such on his passport will be considered a member of the community.

Every member of the community will have the right to leave the community, but on penalty of forfeiture of the right of ever again becoming a member of a Jewish community. There is to be only one Jewish communal organization in each town, and the communities will have the right to enforce compulsory taxation. The Boards of the communities and the National Council are to be elected by democratic vote.

The section relating to the school system provides for cooperation between the Ministry of Education and the Jewish National Council. The schools will remain under the control of the Ministry of Education, but the establishment of schools and the appointment of teachers will be the task of the Jewish National Council.

Originally it was intended to draft one autonomy law for all the minority nationalities in the country. It was

JEWISH HISTORICAL SOCIETY HOLDS ITS 34TH ANNUAL CON- FERENCE IN PHILADELPHIA

Many Subjects in American Jewish
History Presented

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 22.—The American Jewish Historical Society will open its thirty-fourth annual sessions in this city tomorrow at Dropsie College. The sessions will continue until Sunday evening.

The program arranged for the occasion takes into cognizance the fact that America is celebrating its one hundred and fiftieth anniversary and that there is a Sesqui-Centennial Exposition in progress. An exhibition will be held of matters relating to the Jews of America, particularly at the time of the Revolution, and of early imprints relating to Jews, published in America up to 1850.

The Jewish contribution to America will be described in fourteen papers which will be read.

Members of the Society from all sections of the country are expected to attend the sessions.

Arrangements for the reception of the visitors are in the hands of a committee headed by Morris Wolf, and including Dr. Cyrus Adler, President of Dropsie College; Judge Horace Stern, President of the Federation of Jewish Charities; Lessing J. Rosenwald, Rabbi Leon H. Elmaleh and Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach, President of the Society.

Boris Brasol, of Infamous "Protocols", Revealed as Former Bolshevik

Who is Boris Brasol? This Jew-baiting crusader against Bolshevism who perpetrated on the world the infamous "Protocols of the Elders of Zion" and inspired Henry Ford's anti-Semitic propaganda, while mystifying the world regarding his own identity, is a former Bolshevik. This fact is revealed by Isaac Don Levine, well known Russian-American journalist, in an article appearing in the "Jewish Tribune" of Oct. 22.

"There seems to be no public record of his career. There is one place, however, where the full tale of Brasol's life is available," writes Mr. Levine. "It is the archive of the Bolshevik party in Moscow. But while the Bolsheviks have been notorious for exposing their enemies, they have, curiously enough, refrained from raising the curtain shrouding Brasol in mystery.

"For Brasol was one of the original members of the Bolshevik party! Long before Trotzky executed that diabolical conspiracy of the international Jewish bankers to seize control of the world, in fact, in the days when Trotzky was still a Menshevik, a 'pink' revolutionary pussyfoot, Boris Brasol was one of Lenin's most militant followers, a full-blooded 'Red,' the secretary of the Bolshevik organization at the Petrograd University in 1905. The man who spread so assiduously the myth of Karl Marx being the founder of an international Jewish conspiracy is now revealed as a rock-ribbed Marxist!

"That Boris Brasol was a combatant Bolshevik during the first Russian Revolution in 1905—is the testimony of Vl. Voitinsky, one of the finest revolutionary idealists of Russia, who, after serving a long sentence in Siberia under Czarism, now finds himself a refugee from Bolshevism in Western Europe. Voitinsky, in his memoirs published in Berlin, sheds a beam of light on but one period of Brasol's mystery-wrapped career, and does so inadvertently, without recrimination or any ulterior purpose."

Giving some excerpts from Voitinsky's account of Brasol as an active Bolshevik, Mr. Levine concludes:

"The first volume of Voitinsky's memoirs, from which the foregoing excerpts are taken, deals only with the period of 1905. Perhaps the remaining volumes will throw more light on Mr. Brasol's subsequent activities. Perhaps Moscow will find it expedient to publish a sketch of Brasol's colorful career."

WEIZMANN MESSAGE TO BOSTON CONFERENCE AWAITED WITH INTEREST

Expected to Bring About Harmonious Action for Palestine and Relief; Judge Mack Hails Combination of Forces in Joint Campaign

A Special Committee on Invitation, headed by Nathan Straus, is issuing the call for the Extraordinary Conference on Palestine which will take place on Sunday, November 21st in Boston, Mass. A preliminary session of the conference will be held on Saturday evening, November 20th.

Cooperating with Mr. Straus on the National Committee of Invitation are prominent Zionists, including Judge Julian W. Mack, Judge William M. Lewis, Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal; Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Louis Lipsky, President of the Zionist Organization of America; Rabbi B. L. Levinthal, Dr. A. H. Silver of Cleveland, Emanuel Neumann and Mrs. Irma Lindheim, President of Hadassah.

The leading feature on the program of the conference will be the address of Dr. Chaim Weizmann. The program also includes authoritative reports on the various aspects, agricultural, industrial and educational of the work in Palestine. Special interest attaches to the address of Dr. Weizmann in view of the expectations of many leaders in American Jewry that a way will be found by him for producing harmonious cooperation between the various groups working for Palestine and general Jewish relief. It is expected that the conference will be attended by many prominent men who are Zionist in their sympathies but who are not affiliated with the Zionist Organization.

Plans will be submitted for the launching and the conducting of the largest campaign for Palestine ever attempted in this country. With a national quota of \$7,500,000, it is understood that local leaders, representing every section of the land, will be called upon to assume their share of this sum and that concrete plans for reaching all sections of American Jewry will be presented by the new chairman, Judge William M. Lewis, Emanuel Neumann, chairman of the Executive Committee and others.

Judge William M. Lewis will be inducted into his new office as chairman of the United Palestine Appeal at a dinner which will be given in his honor on October 27th at the Hotel Astor, New York. A radio message to Judge Lewis from Dr. Chaim Weizmann, who is now on his way to America, will be read at the dinner.

A special delegation of United Palestine Appeal workers from Philadelphia will be present to see Judge Lewis, their leader for many years, take office as the national chairman of the Appeal.

In a message of greeting sent by Judge Julian W. Mack to the workers in Cincinnati's \$450,000 joint campaign for the United Palestine Appeal and Jewish Relief, Judge Mack declared:

"I am delighted that Cincinnati is leading the way for united action on behalf of European and Palestinian Jewry, and is showing other communi-

ties that through such united action greater results will come to each of the several causes that require millions from American Jewry this year and for some years to come.

"As an old Cincinnati I am proud of the fine things that are being done under your leadership, and especially of the part that non-Jews are taking in the cause. Their cooperation and example will certainly stimulate and arouse our Jews to the fullest appreciation of their own obligation, and I have no doubt that in this way Cincinnati is going to go over the top in record time."

The campaign workers at a luncheon rally were addressed by Dr. Boris Bogen, Executive Secretary of the B'nai Brith and Hortense Breckler, the Joint Distribution Committee representative to Poland.

Nearly \$400,000 has been subscribed during the first eleven days of the campaign.

COLUMBUS' JEWISH ORIGIN REGARDED AS CERTAIN BY AMERICANIST SCHOLARS

Rome, Oct. 15.—The conviction that Columbus was of Jewish origin received further support at the International Congress of Americanists which was held here recently.

In the course of an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Professor Cortecao of the Lisbon University and a leading authority on Columbus, said:

"It can now be asserted with a great deal of certainty that Columbus was descended from the New Christians, or Marranos, who were to be found in large numbers principally in the province of Galicia.

"The Jewish origin of Columbus," Professor Cortecao continued, "appears to me more certain when we take into account the important part played by the Jews in the exploration voyages of the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries. The Portuguese Jew, Professor Joaquim Zensale, published a book on 'Portugal in the Days of Her Great Discoveries' in which he demonstrates the part of Jewish scholars in Spain and Portugal in the success of the great exploration voyages. Jewish astronomy was the foundation of these voyages of discovery.

"The great Jewish astronomer, Abraham Zacuto, in particular, rendered a great service to the cause of exploration, and Jews helped in fitting out all the exploration voyages, especially that of Columbus.

"After the discovery of Brazil, King Manuel entrusted the country to a society of Marranos headed by the Jew, Fernando Loronta. The society was bound to explore each year an area of 200 miles of unexplored country. We shall not exaggerate if we claim," Professor Cortecao said, "that the Mar-

DRIVES FOR UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN ARE CONTINUED THROUGHOUT COUNTRY

Efforts Scheduled in 31 Communities Seek \$4,024,000; New York State Already Raised \$650,000 of \$1,000,000

The amount of \$650,000 of the quota of \$1,000,000 for the United Jewish Campaign in New York State outside of Greater New York has already been raised, Bernard B. Given, chairman for New York State United Jewish Campaign, reported to David A. Brown, national chairman of the campaign, it was announced.

Begun May 15, the campaign was halted July 15, and was resumed September 26 at Albany, where a drive to raise \$75,000 was launched. Buffalo with a quota of \$250,000, will start its drive during the middle of next month.

The report of Mr. Given for the first half of the drive shows that eleven upstate cities in which the campaign is ended, have gone over the top with a margin of from \$100 in Tupper Lake to \$50,000 in Rochester.

The communities that have finished their campaigns, and the amounts raised are: Rochester, \$224,326; Syracuse, \$92,000; Utica, \$55,000; Yonkers, \$45,000; Schenectady, \$30,500; Poughkeepsie, \$27,000; Watertown, \$10,330; Olean, \$7,352; Auburn, \$8,200; Dunkirk, \$4,200; Tupper Lake, \$1,100.

Other upstate communities in which the campaign is still in progress and the amounts raised follow: Ogdensburg, \$3,700; Gloversville, \$1,636; Amsterdam, \$3,769; Plattsburgh, \$2,000; Beacon, \$3,550; Saranac Lake, \$867; Peckskill, \$2,500; Glens Falls, \$1,050; Monticello, \$1,500; Geneva, \$1,170; Rome, \$2,417; Kingston, \$10,352; Ithaca, \$6,000; Jamestown, \$2,300; Tarrytown, \$3,345; Nyack, \$1,600.

Cities in which campaigns are scheduled this fall and their quotas include besides Buffalo and Albany, Elmira, \$25,000; Binghamton, \$25,000; Oswego, \$6,000.

A feature of the drive, according to Mr. Given, is the sympathy shown by non-Jews in this appeal.

Reports received by the headquarters of the United Jewish Campaign show that a large number of drives have been organized for the next six weeks.

The drives that were launched within a week of the Chicago conference were: St. Louis, with a quota of \$500,000; Cincinnati, \$300,000; San Francisco, which is conducting a drive for its second year's quota of \$110,000; Toronto, \$100,000; Asheville, N. C., \$25,000; Hudson, N. Y., \$10,000; Liberty, N. Y., \$5,000; Woodridge, N. Y., \$5,000.

The following are scheduled for next week: Boston, Mass., \$600,000; Pittsburgh, Pa., \$400,000; Omaha, Neb., \$100,000; Reading, Pa., \$50,000; Port

found, however, when negotiations were started that the Jews have entirely different requirements from those of the Germans and Poles and it was decided therefore that each minority should introduce a separate autonomy bill into the Sejm.

A member of the Jewish Club of Deputies stated to the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here, that he was convinced that the Jewish autonomy bill would receive the support of the majority of the members of the Sejm. The bill will be introduced into the Sejm very shortly.

the age of the voters be lowered. The resolution also urged that the right to vote be given not only to those who are already citizens, but to those who have already applied for citizenship.

According to the municipal elections ordinance, every male Palestinian aged twenty-five has the right to vote. The voting right is accorded to every citizen who pays a tax of at least 50 piastres annually on real estate which he owns or one pound as a make-up of property.

Jewish corpses be furnished, corresponding to the proportion of Jewish students in the medical college.

The conference adopted a resolution by which the chief physician of the Jewish hospital in Vilna is urged to deliver to the clinic the bodies of Jewish dead who are not claimed by relatives. The resolution at the same time emphasizes the fact that the provision of corpses to the clinic has no connection with the religious or national communities of the population.

A new Jewish a capella or unaccompanied male chorus, to be known as "Makhelel," which is to be a mutual, non-profit sharing alliance of professional musicians, is to be formed.

Besides the necessary vocal equipment, a general college education or an academic Hebrew and liturgical education will be required for admission to this chorus which has headquarters at the Continental Hotel, Broadway and Forty-first Street, New York City.

The temporary administrative board of the organization is composed of Rabbi Joseph Mason, general dir.; Rabbi Jacob Beurnel, conductor; Solomon Golub, librarian; Rabbi Jacob S. Mason, secretary; Rabbis A. B. Herzson, Kalman Spivach and Abraham Znaida, Cantors Louis Lipitz and Maxwell Zaltsberg and Messrs. Charles Kaiserman and Moses Weissman, directors.

sponsible for his constant incitement for the disturbances continually being carried out by the students of the Roumanian universities with the intention of forcing the Government to adopt the anti-Jewish policy of restricting the numbers of Jewish students at the universities. The decision to prosecute Cuza followed the verdict of guilty pronounced against him by the Disciplinary Court of Jassy University, which conducted an investigation of the anti-Jewish disturbances at the University.

The report of the University Disciplinary Commission stated that it was due to Professor Cuza's incitement of the students that the Jassy Chief of Police, Monciu, was murdered by one of the students because he took steps to suppress the disturbances.
