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BOSTON JEWS PRESENT PORTRAIT TO MUSEUM

Boston, Mass., Oct. 26.—A portrait by the Boston artist, Jacob Binder, will be presented by the Boston Jewish community to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts. The portrait which is entitled "The Talmudist," depicts an aged Jew absorbed in the study of the Talmud. Funds for the purchase of the portrait are being raised by popular subscription conducted by the Boston Jewish Advocate.

The profer of the portrait has been accepted by the authorities of the Museum. The date of presentation will be announced shortly.

FRITSCH APPEALS AGAINST HAMBURG COURT SENTENCE

Hamburg, Oct. 26.—A further appeal in the libel case of Max Warburg against Theodor Fritsch, leader of German anti-Semites, will be submitted, Fritsch's attorney announced. This will be the fifth trial in the suit.

Fritsch was sentenced last Friday to a term of four months' imprisonment for libelling Max Warburg. "This action of Theodor Fritsch in asserting that Warburg was guilty of treason to the country and that he gave preference to the interests of Jewry over the interests of Germany is condemnable," the court declared in pronouncing sentence.

15 FAMILIES, SURVIVORS OF PETLURA POGROM, EAGER TO TESTIFY FOR SCHWARTZBARD

Documents on War Period to Be Published in United States

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Oct. 26.—Fifteen Jewish families, survivors of the anti-Jewish pogrom made by the Petlura forces in Tanatchi, Ukraine, are eager to appear as witnesses in the Schwartzbard trial in Paris, declares Serafimov, Russian journalist, writing in the "Isvestya."

The majority of the Jewish inhabitants of the village Tanatchi were massacred and the Jewish houses were demolished and ploughed under so that no trace of the town was left. The survivors declare that Petlura himself entered the village and ordered the massacre.

The publication of interesting documents throwing light on Jewish moments in Russia and on the relations of several European states to the Jewish question in Russia during the war was announced by Professor Gollan, well known historian, here. The commission to study the history of Jewish movements in Russia, he stated, gathered valuable material on the history of the pogrom period, the ritual murder accusations including the Beilis trial, and on the relations of the powers to the Jewish question during the great war. Several foreign scholars, including Americans, are interested in the work of the commission. It is intended to publish the material in the United States. The edition is to be issued in Russian, Ukrainian and English.

SYRIAN REBELS ATTACK TRANSJORDANIAN FRONTIER

Forced to Return, Leaving 51 Killed

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 26.—A five hour battle between a band of Syrian rebels and the Tcherkess troop of the Transjordanian government was waged on the Transjordanian-Syrian frontier last Saturday.

The appearance of the rebel band created consternation. A previous attack of the rebels on Transjordanian territory the beginning of October was repulsed by British aeroplanes which forced them to return to Syria. The result of Saturday's battle was that 51 of the rebels were killed. The commander of the Tcherkess troop, Osman Bey, also fell in the battle.

LONDON-INDIA AIR ROUTE TO BE INAUGURATED DECEMBER

London, Oct. 26.—The first aeroplane in the London-India route via Palestine will leave London on December 15. The aeroplane is scheduled to stop at Gaza, Palestine, one of the landing stations on the route.

PHILADELPHIA JEWISH CON- GREGATION CONCLUDES 125TH ANNIVERSARY FESTIVITIES

Series of New Communal Buildings to Be Erected

Philadelphia, Oct. 25.—The three-day celebration of the 125th anniversary of the Rodeph Shalom congregation, the oldest reformed synagogue in America, came to a close last night with the announcement of plans for the erection of a new synagogue to cost \$750,000. It is hoped to start the new structure within the next few months.

Charles Edwin Fox, the President of the Congregation, was the principal speaker. Dr. Lee K. Frankel, Vice-President of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, who was to have been the guest of honor, was prevented by illness from attending. Other addresses were delivered by Rabbi Louis Wolsey, President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, who is the spiritual head of Rodeph Shalom, Rabbi Henry J. 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LITHUANIAN GOVERNMENT TO MEET JEWS' DEMANDS

It is expected that a special rapporteur for the affairs of the Jewish schools will be appointed in the Lithuanian Ministry of Education. It was also intimated that the government is willing to support an amendment to the Compulsory Sunday Rest Law. In this case the Club of Jewish Deputies would lend its support to the present government.

GERMAN NOBLEMAN FINED FOR INSULTING JEWISH JURIST

Berlin, Oct. 26.—A libel suit of a German Jewish jurist against a German nobleman was decided by the court in favor of the former.

The court fined Ritter Robert Voigtlaender 300 marks for insulting Dr. Rosenthal, former judge of the Berlin divorce court. Voigtlaender attacked Rosenthal in the nationalistic press, charging him with corruption.

100 POLISH JEWS LEAVE WARSAW FOR PALESTINE

Warsaw, Oct. 26.—Jewish emigration to Palestine from Poland continues. One hundred Jewish emigrants left Warsaw today for Palestine.

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COMMUNIST, CHARGED WITH LAND SPECULATION, SLAPS EDITOR OF ODESSA PAPER

**Is Arrested on Charge of Insulting
Soviet Press Representative**

Odessa, Oct. 26.—The charge of land speculation made by a section of the Communist press against some of the Jewish settlers in the Odessa district led to an incident which is much discussed here.

Mr. Vatman, a Communist and the manager of the Jewish colony, Kotovsky, entered the editorial rooms of the "Odeskaya Isvestia" and slapped the face of the feature writer, Svietlov, who had criticized the management of the colony, accusing it of land speculation. Vatman was arrested and will be arraigned on the charge of hooliganism and insulting a representative of the Soviet press.

JEWISH WOMAN, CHAMPION IN CAUSE OF LIBERTY, DIES

Kovno, Oct. 26.—Olga Shereshevska, Lithuanian Jewess and one of the leaders of the Russian revolutionary movement, died here yesterday at the age of 93.

Madam Shereshevska was a doctor of medicine and an educator. She was exiled to Siberia by the Czarist government for her revolutionary activities. She spent twenty years in exile.

JERUSALEM MADE SEPARATE ADMINISTRATIVE UNIT

Jerusalem, Oct. 26.—Jerusalem will be eliminated from the Southern Palestine District and will be considered a separate administrative unit, according to reports circulated here.

The reorganization of the Palestine Southern District will be put into effect shortly, with the result that the headquarters of the district will be transferred from Jerusalem to Jaffa. According to the new plan Jerusalem will have its own administrator who will be under the direct supervision of the chief secretary of the Palestine government.

PENNSYLVANIA "Y" FEDERATION HOLDS CONVENTION

Scranton, Pa., Oct. 26.—Three hundred and fifty delegates attended the seventeenth annual convention of the Pennsylvania Federation of Y. M. and Y. W. H. A.'s which opened here. Harry Michlosky of Wilkes Barre, Pa., President of the Federation, presided at the sessions.

The aggregate membership in the Y. M. and Y. W. H. A.'s in Pennsylvania is thirty thousand. I. Abeinen, field secretary of the Jewish Welfare Board, reported. Buildings totalling in value \$3,800,000 are owned by the affiliated organizations. Dr. Mordecai Soltes, Director of the Extension Department of the Jewish Welfare Board, delivered an address on "What Makes a Center Jewish."

Comments on 'Jewish Daily Bulletin' Inquiry Regarding Alleged Discrimination in American Universities

The results of the inquiry conducted by the "Jewish Daily Bulletin," regarding alleged discrimination against Jews in American universities, showing that the charges are not substantiated by the facts, are widely commented on in the Jewish press.

The "Day" of October 25th writes: "The 'Jewish Daily Bulletin' has performed a worthy and a useful service through its inquiry to Jewish students in the American universities to ascertain whether anti-Semitism prevails and to what extent, in our institutions of higher learning. The replies show that there is no official anti-Semitism. The Jewish students do not feel that there is any discrimination against them on the part of the university administrations, nor on the part of professors. If there is any anti-Semitism in the universities, it is not strong enough to make itself felt."

"This is a comforting and cheering report. Of course, no one deserves any credit for the absence of anti-Semitism. It should be so. It would be indeed a sad condition were it otherwise."

"On the other hand, it is also clear from the replies that there is no particular affection between Jewish and non-Jewish students. The academic Jewish youth is compelled to organize in separate fraternities. This shows that the attitude toward the Jewish student body is essentially one of correctness, but not a really friendly one. It also indicates that a certain form of social anti-Semitism does exist in the universities and colleges."

A similar opinion is voiced by the "Jewish World" of Philadelphia. Writing in its October 24th issue, the paper remarks: "The inquiry of the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin' is encouraging because it shows that there is no ground for the Jewish students to complain against discrimination. The attitude of the administrators and professors is generally a correct one to all students, whether Jews or non-Jews. The number of Jewish students is not decreasing. On the contrary, their number has increased proportionately in the course of the last three years. The report does not reveal the exact number but it does indicate that there is no basis to assume that universities are refusing to accept Jews."

"The publication of this report by the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin' will bring good results. In the first place, it will influence Jews not to draw conclusions from any individual cases which may occur where a Jewish student is discriminated against, or where the attitude of a professor is unfriendly. CHEREP-SPIRIDOVITCH DIED PENNILESS BECAUSE HIS ANTI-SEMITIC CAMPAIGN COLLAPSED

Withdrawal of Wealthy American's Support Said to Be Cause

The circumstance that Count Arthur Cherep-Spiridovich, who was found dead in his room at Barrett Manor, Staten Island on Saturday, was penniless and that an appeal for funds for the burial expenses was made by his foster son was ascribed in well-informed circles to the withdrawal of a certain wealthy American from the anti-Semitic campaign conducted by Spiridovich.

It was learned that at one time considerable financial assistance was promised Count Cherep-Spiridovich by a very wealthy American and that the failure of that assistance to come forward caused the collapse of Count Spiridovich's plans.

Additional information regarding Spiridovich's activities shows that for a time he operated from Chicago, using one of the large hotels as his headquarters, then he travelled to Detroit, Denver, Colorado and other cities. More recently, various attacks upon Jews were sent out in the name of a printing establishment which called itself the Anti-Bolshevist Association and which operated from 15 East 128th Street. Throughout, this literature was permeated with the most slanderous charges against the Jews, and "The Gentle Review," a magazine, published for a while, reached perhaps, the height of the grotesque in this direction. One leaflet called "Excerpts from the Talmud," insisted that the sole ambition of the Jew was to kill all Gentiles.

An advertisement, which was published in various literary publications was stopped when the publications learned, through the efforts of the

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them see what the conditions are in a country where all men are equal, regardless of what their racial or national origin may be."

The "Jewish Daily News," of same date, declares:

"We have always held to the opinion that there is no general discrimination against Jewish students in American universities. Those who seek anti-Semitism everywhere or who favor the establishment of a Jewish college or a Jewish university in this country took us severely to task. That our view is correct is now borne out by the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin,' which conducted an inquiry into the matter and found that 'the charge that discrimination is practiced against Jewish students in American universities is not based on facts.' The inquiry extended to all the universities and colleges and up to the present replies have been received from 45 colleges in 17 states.

"There was never any doubt in our mind as to the falsity of the cry that there is anti-Semitism in the universities. It was about time that Jews here and elsewhere ceased looking for anti-Jewish bias. Very often the prejudice is created because it is imagined and sought."

Philadelphia, Oct. 26.—A series of buildings to be used as community centers and Talmud Torahs will be erected in Philadelphia by the Federation of Jewish Charities, it has been announced by Albert M. Greenfield, chairman of the Building Committee of the Federation.

The first one will be erected at 508-14 Moore Street, at a cost of \$100,000. This structure will replace the present Bessarabie and Dickinson Talmud Torahs, located respectively on South 6th Street and on Dickinson Street. It will serve the needs of the Associated Talmud Torahs and the Hebrew Sunday School Society, as well as other religious, educational and recreational purposes.

The new building will have an auditorium with a seating capacity of 500 persons. There will also be a gymnasium, library, kindergarten, teachers' rest room, and an office. The building will consist of a ground floor and two upper floors.

The Building Committee of the Associated Talmud Torahs consists of Jacob Edelstein, chairman; Leon Braker, Morris Brooks, Harry Burnstein, Harry Fels, A. Galonsky, M. Reisman and S. C. Schein.

PLAN \$600,000 BUILDING FOR ZIONIST HEADQUARTERS IN GREATER NEW YORK

Beth Zion to House All Zionist Activities in City

Plans for the construction in New York City of a Beth Zion, a Zionist Center to house the activities of the various Zionist districts and the national headquarters, were presented at a conference of the Zionist Council of Greater New York held Sunday under the chairmanship of the Hon. Carl Sherman, former Attorney General.

Philip Wattenberg, chairman of the Beth Zion Committee and Dr. A. J. Rongy, treasurer, reporter for the Committee. They presented a plan for the erection of a six floor building which should house the Zionist offices, contain a large lecture hall, library, exhibit rooms and a restaurant. One floor should be devoted to a Zionist Club. The building would cost, it was estimated, approximately \$600,000. Dr. Rongy reported that there is a division of opinion as regards the locality. Some members of the Committee favor Union Square, others advocate that this building should be located in the vicinity of Times Square. He suggested a referendum vote through the Zionist periodicals to decide the location.

There are at present thirty-two Zionist districts and five young people's Zionist clubs, two Hadassah chapters, besides a Junior Hadassah and Avukah, the Students Zionist Organization, Isaac Carmel, Executive Director of the Council reported.

During the past six weeks, Mr. Carmel reported, two new Zionist Districts were formed in University Heights and East Flatbush and one Young People's League in Brownsville.

Mrs. Irma Lindheim, President of Hadassah, in her address expressed her satisfaction with the project to erect a Beth Zion in New York.

Dr. A. Coralik reported on his impressions in Palestine. Louis Lipsky addressed the conference on the political situation in the Zionist movement.

The conference adopted a number of resolutions including one welcoming Dr. Weizmann on his visit to the United States.

Dr. S. M. Melamed proposed the establishment of a school for Zionist speakers and workers.

The conference decided to take steps to organize a Young People's Zionist League throughout greater New York.

JEWISH COMMUNAL ACTIVITIES

Plans to increase the attendance of children in religious schools are being considered by the United Synagogue of America, following a survey of thirty-two synagogue schools in this city with a registration of 5,000 pupils just completed by the Education Committee of the New York branch.

The survey, which was made public by Rabbi Elias Margolis, was conducted by Rabbi Alter F. Landesman, Rabbi Max Kadushin and Jacob Grossman, educational director of the United Synagogue.

It points out that in the thirty-two schools only four have a registration of 300, and that for the rest the registration trails down to 100. Only 42 per cent are children of members of the congregation, and of the 5,000 children covered by the survey, 1,000 attend only on Sundays and the remainder two or three days of the week.

"The fact that almost all our religious schools are small, having on the average about 125 children, is a matter of grave concern," the survey states. "We must realize, that almost all of these congregational schools are located in Jewish neighborhoods where there are no other institutions for the purpose of providing Jewish instruction. We are struck by the fact that there are certain sections in this city, as for example Washington Heights and the west side, where there are no Talmud Torahs."
