JEWS CENTER OF BATTLE BETWEEN WARRING PARTIES IN AUSTRIAN PARLIAMENT

Conflict of Two Parties Has Anti-Semitic Background (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Oct. 28.-The fight between the Austrian Social Democrats and the Christlich Soziale, which has an anti-Semitic background, was transferred yesterday to parliament.

An anti-Semitic debate developed in parliament when the Social Democrats charged the Christlich Soziale with sell-ing Austrian land to Czech Jews who, they asserted, are instrumental in imposing a Czech character on the border

territory of lower Austria.

The speaker of the house, who belongs to the Christlich Soziale party, protested against the use by the Social Democrats of the derogatory term, "gesindel" in relation to Jewish land owners in Austria.

AGUDAH CLAIMS 7,000 FOR SEPARATE ORTHODOX COM-MUNITIES IN PALESTINE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Oct. 28. - A numerical strength of 7,000 votes for the demand of the Agudath Israel, the Orthodox lewish world organization, for the creation of separate Orthodox communities in Palestine was claimed by the executive committee of the organization in a statement issued here.

The executive claims that up to the present 7,000 votes, representing 35,000 persons, were registered in Palestine under a petition urging the full recognition of independent Orthodox communities.

This demand is opposed by the Vaad Leumi, the national council of Palestine Jews, and the Zionist Organization

THOUSANDS AT FUNERAL OF DR. SALOMON EHRMANN (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Oct. 28.-The funeral of Dr. Salomon Ehrmann, famous dermatolo-gist, was attended by many thousands. Representatives of the Austrian government, university authorities, student hodies, fraternal organizations and scientific organizations abroad were present. Eulogies on the late scientist were delivered by Dr. Zevi Chajes, Pro-lessor Pick and Dean Maresch of the medical college.

REFUSE TO PERMIT SUNDAY BURIAL IN BRITISH TOWN (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 28.—The request to permit the burial of Jewish dead on Sunday was refused by the town council of Southend, England.

Sunday internments were never permitted by the municipality. The Hebrew Congregation applied to the town council for permission to hold burials before. 10 o'clock in the morning on Sunday.

PALESTINE LAND SURVEY WILL BE COMPLETED IN 10 YEARS, SECRETARY SAYS

Allocation of State Lands for Jewish Colonization Depends on Survey (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 28.-The completion the Palestine land survey, upon which, according to the explanation of the mandatory power, the allotment of state and waste land for Jewish colonization depends, will take ten years, ac-cording to Col. Symes, Chief Secretary of the Palestine Government.

Col. Symes in an interview with the representative of the Arab paper, "Merat Ul Sherk," stated that the Palestine government has allocated the amount of £E50,000 annually for the next ten years for the purpose of completing the government land survey Once this survey will be completed, all confusion in the court cases concerning the ownership of land will be eliminated, he said.

It is impossible to complete the survey sooner, the Chief Secretary explained, because it entails considerable work and also because of the fact that many owners of Palestine land who live abroad must be given an opportunity to settle their affairs.

C., October 28.—An unusual scene took place at noon today unusual scene took place at noon today at the White House, when Cantor Seidel Royner of New York, 71 years old, white bearded patriarch, "dean of all the lewish Cantors," was received by President Coolidge on the eve of bis departure for Palestine, where he will complete his work of composing music for the Psalms.

JUDGE MACK LAUNCHES FIRST DRIVE OF THE 1927 UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL \$35,000 Raised in Cleveland at Dinner Opening Campaign (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cleveland, O., Oct. 28.-Cleveland was the first city to launch its drive in the \$7,500,000 United Palestine Appeal for this year. The sum of \$35,000 was subscribed at the dinner on Sunday at the Statler Hotel, which marked the offi-Appeal Campaign in Cleveland for \$150,000. Judge Julian W. Mack was the principal speaker and made the initial contribution of \$1,000.

In his address Judge Mack declared: "Palestine is not only a country in which our persecuted brethren from East European countries can find a sanctuary and can peacefully settle on the land, but it is also the land which inspires and creates the lewish will to national rejuvenation and gives courage to our despairing people to reconstruct the land of their ancient glory. "Because Cleveland is the first city

in the country to float its campaign for the United Palestine Appeal which this year has for its objective the raising of \$7.500,000 for the reconstruction of Palestine, the eyes of American Jewry are turned on it. The results of the Cleveland campaign will be closely watched by every other Jewish community in the country and it is inevitable that it will serve as a model to be followed by all other cities.

MAKE EXCEPTION FOR EXPORTING KOSHER MEAT

kosher food by the Jewish community in Switzerland were given consideration by the French government in the promulgation of export restrictions. Among the products exempted from

the export restrictions are 800 quintals of kosher meat, which are permitted to be exported from France monthly for use by the Jewish community of Switzerland, where the schechita is prohibited.

JUDGE LEWIS INSTALLED AS NATIONAL CHAIRMAN OF UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL

Judge William M. Lewis of Philadelphia was installed as National Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal Wednesday night at a dinner given in his honor at the Hotel Astor. The dinner was attended by the leaders of the Zionist movement in this country.

A radio message from Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the World Weizmann, President of the World Zionist Organization, from aboard the Berengaria, was read by Louis Lipsky, President of the Zionist Organization of America, who was toastmaster. Dr. Weizmann's cable read:

"Heartiest good wishes to my friend

Judge Lewis on assuming the leadership of the greatest effort American Jewry has made for the National Home. Our responsibilities in Pales-Home. tine are great and serious but are equaled by opportunities for develop-ment in every direction. I have confidence in the devotion and wisdom of Judge Lewis who will be supported by

Judge Lewis who will be supported by a faithful army of workers including Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Judge Julian W. Mack, Louis Lipsky and the other offi-ers. Am coming. Place my services at his disposal."

A message was also read by the toastmaster from Dr. Stephen S. Wise who was Chairman of the Appeal last year and is now Honorary Chairman. In his message Dr. Wise regretted his inability to attend the installation of the new National Chairman due to an engagement made for him sometime previous. Dr. Wise pledged himself in his message to be one of Judge Lewis' "earnest and helpful comrades in the work of the United Palestine Appeal for the ensuing year."

Judge Lewis declared the rebuilding

of Palestine the greatest constructive statesmanship for the Jews of the world, in addition to being a great spiritual movement.

Addresses were delivered by Judge Executive Committee of the Appeal Julian W. Mack, Honorary Vice and Mrs. Archibald Silverman of Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal; Morris Rothenberg, Chairman of the Board of the Keren Hayesod; Rev. Z. H. Masliansky and Abraham Emanuel Neumann, Chairman of the Goldberg.

IN RUSSIAN CENTRAL ASIA (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) Moscow, Oct. 17 .- A trial which took

place in the Tashkent Court for Labor Affairs has led to the closing down of an agricultural Chaluzim collectivist colony near Tashkent in Russian Central Asia

The colony was organized in the autumn of 1924 by a group of Jewish small traders and employees in Tash-The Commissariat of Agriculture granted the colony on lease an area of 60 desiatin of land including orchards and vineyards. The colonists were also given a certain amount of live and dead stock. But the colony needed more money to carry on its work. A member of the Chalutz Organization named Maso, proposed at this point that a loan of 3,000 roubles should be raised from the Joint Distribution Committee on condition that 30 Chaluzim should be admitted as members of the colony. As according to the statutes of the colony each memthe statutes of the colony each mem-ber had to contribute 300 roubles it was therefore possible to admit only 10 Chaluzim and the remaining 20 were registered as their children.

Not long after the deal had been concluded, there was friction between the Chaluzim and the members of the Left "Bolshevist" group of the colony who demanded the exclusion of the 20 "children." The Chaluzim, however, prevailed upon the other colonists to exclude the Left disturbers. A few of the Chaluzim also left the colony for various reasons. As a consequence a complaint was

lodged with the Labor Court at Tashkent, that the statutes of the colony (Continued on Page 4)

Says Religious Discrimination Still Exists in Statutes of Maryland

That religious discrimination against the Iews and members of other non-Christian faiths still exists in the statutes of the state of Maryland, is the fact brought out by B. H. Hartogensis in a recent issue of the "Evening Sun" of Baltimore, wherein we read in part:

"Office-holding is still 'on the faith of a Christian' (Code, Article 70, Section 9). The oath need not be administered, but still is in the counties, where a Bradlaugh (a non-believer) could not be sworn in, as he was in the British House of Commons. Jews are expected to announce their religious belief here in Maryland, just as they were com-pelled to do in 'Darkest Russia,' in Czarist days. But if they proudly do so, they must express belief in a future state of rewards and punishments. However, like many other first-class citizens of many creeds and without creed in the State, many cannot qualify hereunder

"It is merely rubbing it in, to seek refuge in the last sentence of the law, and it shall be presumed that an officer who has taken and subscribed the oath did make at the same time such declaration, i.e., either in his belief in the Christian religion, or that he professes himself to be a Jew believing in Heaven and hell. This law in practice excludes expressly Christians not believing in the Christian religion, including the Trinity and the physical resurrection of Jesus Christ on Sunday; also Moslems, Buddhists. Confucianists and non believers. Finally, there is no authority vested

by the State of Maryland to any other person or religious minister (Quakers excepted) to perform marriage ceremonies, thus making for illicit marriages and children. Moreover, by Code 27, Section 361, it is illegal for Marylanders to go out of the State to marry without having such a marriage license addressed to a minister of the Gospel (of Jesus Christ); penalty for each Marylander, \$100."

Key to Situation Lies in Attitude of Leading Anglo-Jewish Families, Declares Mr. Nasatissen; Analyzes Palestine Situation from Businessman's Viewpoint; Urges Large Industrial Bank for Palestine as Aid in Reconstruction Process

Mr. Nasatissen, who contributed the amount of £50,000 to the Ruttenberg works and £10,000 to the Keren Hayesod in recent years, was the largest individual contributor to the Keren Havesod before the recent large contributions of Bernard Baron. When asked for the reasons of the small participation of British Jews in the Palestine upbuilding work, Mr. Nasatissen observed that the key to the situation lies in the attitude of the leading Anglo-Jewish families. With the interest now taken in the Palestine projet by leading men like the Marquis of Reading, Sir Alfred Mond and Sir Herbert Samuel, with the decision of the General Electric Company to par-ticipate on a sound business basis in the Ruttenberg works, a greater re-sponsiveness on the part of British Jewry to the economic needs of Pales-tine is imminent. The fact of the mat-ter is that British Jews are in a particular situation which dictates a greater interest on their part in the development of Palestine, which is viewed by many leading British statesman as destined to become an important and extensive branch of the British Empire.

few early investors in Palestine enterprises, holds a large interest in the Ructenberg works, in the Nesher Cement Company and in other important enterprises there. That was the case in the building industry in Tel Aviv, this was also the case in other industrial branches. Add to that the fact that when the individual colonists who operate on the private property principle gather in the crops and get some funds, they do not deposit these funds in the banks but buy new land or erect new buildings. Again, the accumulated capital of labor produced does not serve to increase the fluid capital and to increase the labor opportunities.

The solution is the opening of a large industrial bank which would serve this type of settler. The situation can be easily remedied and progress furthered by placing at the disposal of the operating agencies large funds for the further purchase of land and continua-tion of the building activities. The fact of the matter is that Palestine is being built despite symptoms of the temporary crisis here and there. One instance I can cite as a striking illustration. How the "Baccalaureate," Roumania's Own Brand of Numerus Clausus, Works

(By Our Bucharest Correspondent)

Bucharest, Oct. 12.—That the numerus clausus against Jewish students can be applied just as effectively through indirect methods under another name, has been demonstrated again by Roumania through the aplication of the so-called "baccalaureate" system of tests for admission to universities. These tests are so arranged that the fate of the applicants is placed entirely in the hands of the professors in such a way that they can easily discriminate against students of the national minorities, the Jews, Germans and Ukrainians. The principal aim of course is to weed out the Jews.

The deliberate injustice of this system which has been put into practice in a number of cities, as Clausenburg, Timisoara, etc., was glaringly demonstrated the other day in Czernowitz. The man who was placed in charge of the admissions at the Czernowitz university was brought over from Jassy because it was he who was responsible for the rejection of 70% of the students there who had taken the "baccadents there who had taken the bacca-laureate" test, these 70% being of course composed of Jews, Germans and Ukrainians. Of the 68 Jewish students of the Jewish government High School who took the test in Czernowitz but 16 were admitted to-the university. The German and Ukrainian applicants fared no better.

The incident in Czernowitz has caused a great deal of excitement among the population of the national minorities. The feeling ran so high, following the report of the results of the "baccalaureate" test that a demonstration by the students of the national minorities was staged in protest against the university administration. demonstration was a peaceful one, expressing itself merely through shouting and whistling, until groups of anti-Semitic students appeared on the scene and assaulted the participants in the demonstration. The anti-Semites are now making much capital out of this incident, although the professor received but a mild thrashing which did not incapacitate him for work.

It is not known whether it was Jews, Germans or Ukrainians that beat him. but the anti-Semites are making an awful row against the Jews. They have telegraphed to Bucharest informing the Cabinet of a "revolution." In the meantime, the local police has arrested some of the minority students who took part in the demonstration. The arrested, some of whom, are but fifteen years of age, are kept in prison, until an investigation will be made.

The effort on the part of the police and the university administration to confuse the main issue by exploiting an unimportant incident, is obvious. administration of a mild beating to a professor is considered more important than the practice of a most cruel injustice against the minorities. Here are hundreds of students who have spent years at school in preparation for the university, in many cases the education requiring tremendous sacrifices on the part of the parents. Now these young men find the doors of the university barred to them. The labor and hopes of years are thus shattered at one blow by a "baccalaureate" test invented by an evil spirit which blinds Roumania's vision not only to justice but to its own interests as well.

had been violated and that a number of the workers of the colony had been exploited by the members. The trial lasted seven days. The prosecutor was a member of the Tashkent Jewish Communist Section named Bogar, who accused the Chaluzim of counter-revolutionary activities. The Court decided that the colony had fallen into the anti-Soviet hands of the Hecholuz and that it should therefore be dissolved and the colonists purged of the harmful elements of Chaluzim and Zionists.

The former President of the Colony, Simenovsky, was sentenced to be pub-licly reprimanded for having concluded the agreement with the Chaluzim and Rubinstein was sentenced to a year and a half conditional imprisonment, Brisk-man to a year and Pereptchoi, a former Chaluz, to six months.
