(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Bucharest, Nov. 1 .- An admission

In the future, however, to avoid repetitions of such incidents, the government will prepare a syllabus converning the examiners' questions, he stated.

10,000 ATTEND FUNERAL OF RABBI ROKEACH, HEAD OF CHASSIDIC "COURT" AT BELZ

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Lemberg, Nov. 1.-Ten thousand

Jews, followers of the Chassidic move-ment, and 200 rabbis were present at the funeral of Rabbi Issachar Dov Rokeach, Chassidic Rabbi of Belz, who died here last Friday at the age of 75. Immediately after the burial of the late rabbi, his son Aaron, 42 years of age, was elected to succeed him as head of the Chassidic dynasty of Belz.

The late Rabbi Rokeach was the scion of a family which counts ten or twelve generations of rabbis and communal leaders in the Jewish community of Galicia. The late rabbi was an influential figure in Jewish religious life, exercising an influence not only in Galicia but among the followers of the Chassidic movement in many other European countries. During the Austrian regime and in the new Poland, the influence of Rabbi Rokeach constituted a political factor of which the governments took cognizance.

ENGLISH SYNAGOGUES REFUSE TO GIVE WOMEN FRANCHISE (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Nov. 1 .- The question of woman's suffrage in the synagogue in England was brought up and defeated at a joint meeting of the council and delegates of the United Synagogue of England.

Sir Robert Waley Cohen, who was in the chair, rejected the motion of the council to grant women the vote in administrative affairs of the synagogues. Following a stormy discussion, the mo-tion was defeated by a vote of 211 against 158.

MAX REINHARDT HONORED BY EUROPEAN DRAMATIC AND STAGE CELEBRITIES (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Nov. 1 .- Two thousand representatives of European dramatic art assembled to honor Max Reinhardt on the occasion of his twenty-fifth anniversary as a dramatic producer.

A committee representing eight nations had invited 800 guests to Reinhardt's Deutsches Theatre. On the committee were David Belasco, George Bernard Shaw, Maxim Gorky, Constantine Stanislavski, Gerhart Hauptmann, Georg Brandes, Firmin Germier, Tris-tan Bernard, Richard Strauss and

Franz Molnar. Herr Beker, Prussian Minister of Culture, hailed his achievements on behalf of the Reich and Prussian Governments, and Mayor Boess for the City of Berlin. Tristan Bernard, foremost French dramatist, came specially from Paris to salute Reinhardt as author of the pact between the French and Ger-man stages. Gerhart Hauptmann voiced the praise of the German dramatic school.
