HARMONY MOVEMENT Three Hundred Jewish and Non-Jewish Leaders Discuss Problem

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 11.-A step toward the promotion of good will between the Jewish and non-Jewish resi-dents of Philadelphia was taken when a group of prominent Jewish and nonlewish residents of this city met at a good will banquet in the Jay Cook Junior High School.

Three hundred representatives of both faiths attended and heard a group of speakers urge the importance of stressing in their daily lives the common bonds which exist between both Although good will dinners have been

taking place throughout the country. the dinner was the first of its kind in the local community and inaugurated a series to be held in various sections in the course of the next few months. The speakers at the dinner were Dr.

Floyd Tomkins, President of the Philadelphia Federation of Churches, Dr. E. A. Palmquist, Rabbi Max D. Klein, President of the Philadelphia Board of Jewish Ministers, Rabbi Mortimer J. Cohen, of the Congregation Beth Sholom, Rev. Carl Agee, of the Good Will Committee of the Federated Council of Churches.

The keynote of the evening was sounded by Rabbi Cohen who declared: "What should most be stressed here (Continued on Page 4)

PALESTINE OBSERVES
.. ARMISTICE DAY WITH
SOLEMN CEREMONIES

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, Nov. 11.-Armistice Day was celebrated throughout Palestine

At eleven o'clock a gun salute ansounced the observance of a two-minates silence. A large parade, in which Jewish ex-soldiers participated, took place at Russian Square. At noon, High Commissioner Plumer

reviewed the parade. In an address he delivered, Lord Plumer stated that Armistice Day should remind the population of the heroes who fell during the war. The best way to commemorate their sacrifice is to work everywhere for "our land and our people." The speech of the High Commissioner was

translated into Hebrew.

A procession went to the military temetery where wreaths were laid on the graves in behalf of the Zionist Executive, the Tel Aviv municipality, the lewish communities of Palestine, the League of Zionist Revisionists and others. Solemn mourning services were held in the Anglican Church and in the synagogues. The government of-fices were closed all day. The Union Jack decorated the buildings.

London, Nov. 11.-The exclusion of a Jewish woman applicant for membership in the Royal Mid Surrey Golf Club, of which the Prince of Wales is this year's captain, continues to hold the

attention of the British public. The incident is widely discussed in the press. Mrs. Truscott, the women's captain of the club, has come out openly defending the action of the committee. "We do not want these Jewesses as members of the club. Therefore, the

Committee decided to exclude them," she stated. The secretary of the Moorpark Club stated that a distinct preju-dice against Jews is prevalent, but it was musual to take such a step. TRANSJORDANIAN TRIBE RISES AGAINST ABDULLAH Emir Reported to Have Fled to Cyprus (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Nov. 11.-An uprising directed against Emir Abdullah, ruler of Transjordania is taking place in Trans-jordania, the eastern part of Palestine, reports from Jerusalem to the "Daily

News" here state. The uprising conducted by the rebel tribe Beni Sakhar has compelled Abdullah to flee from Amman, the capital, to

Emir Ali, Abdullah's brother, is said to be hastening from Bagdad to take over the Transjordanian government. The possibility of Abdullah's return to Transjordania is dependent upon the issue of the negotiations between the British and Ibn Saud, leader of the Wahabis, who has conducted a crusade against the Hashimite family, of which Abdullah is a member.

been unable to identify. Another man appeared at the pastor's home and terrorized Mrs. Bready. Policemen stationed in the church several nights ago failed to arrest four men seen prowling about the grounds. The chief objection seems to be

against Msgr. Dunnigan. The Rev. Bready said that Msgr. Dunnigan would make the dedicatory address despite the threats. Tear gas will be ready for any emergency and American Legion officers have been ordered to wear loaded sidearms.

OF WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE IN BRITISH SYNAGOGUES (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) London, Nov. 1 .- By 211 votes against

158 the motion of the Council of the United Synagogue to concede equal voting rights to women was rejected by a meeting of the Council and dele-gates of the United Synagogue held here with Sir Robert Waley-Cohen, the Vice-President of the United Synagogue, in the chair. In opening the meeting, Sir Robert said that they had no power to intro-

duce any new alterations in the Con-

stitution of the United Synagogue. The United Synagogue had established a tradition in Anglo-Jewry of which all of them could be very proud as it spread a great and beneficent influence throughout the Jewish communities of the United Kingdom. The question of granting equal voting rights to women, Sir Robert went on, was not a religious question except in so far as it was of the utmost importance that the women should have easy encouragement to take an active part in the work of the synagogues. Many of the women had more leisure than men and were in a better position to judge who was likely to serve the synagogue well. To give them this opportunity of serving the synagogue would be of great benefit to their community. Had he thought, Sir Robert said, that his proposal was a revolutionary one, he would have been the first to oppose it, as the future of the Jewish community depended entirely on adhering to their traditions, but even as far back as 1870, there were women in three London synagogues who had the right to vote. Those were the widows of privileged members of the synagogues. That was surely not a revolutionary proposal which simply reverted to a usage customary in three synagogues fifty years ago. It was only a natural evolution in the stone of It was the pedestal on which they had been

Mr. Moses, Vice-President of the United Synagogue, in seconding the motion submitted by Sir Robert Waley-Conen, said that the fact that in the old days widows of privileged members had the right to vote seemed to him a sufficient precedent for passing the motion.

Lionel Cohen, in speaking against the motion, said that there were 80 rabbis from all over the world, great authorities on the Talmud and Jewish Law, who had most emphatically expressed themselves against the granting of equality of rights to women. Among them was the Chief Rabbi of Palestine, Rabbi Kook, who when asked whether women should be allowed to participate in communal elections, said that he regarded the par-ticipation of Jewish women in the ex-ecution of the duties of communal work as against the Din. There was also the statement of six of the most famous Rabbis of Europe who had declared publicly that on the basis of Jewish Law, women could claim no right to participate in the elections of

Jerusalem 3,277 workingmen and 1,711 workingwomen; in Afuleh 357 workingmen and 188 workingwomen; in Tiberias 649 men and 164 women. Safad has 90 men and 87 women, Acre 127 men and 87 women, the Jaffa-Ludd Jewish railway workers number 71 men and 40 women; at Sarafand there are 35 men and 18 women; at Nazareth 17 men and 28 women; at Nablus 8 men and 3 women and at Gaza 5 men and 4 women. The total of Jewish workingmen is 14,884 and the total of women 8,563. These figures refer to the towns only. 65.3 per cent of all these workers

are members of the General Jewish Labor Federation. The Jewish workers in the colonies of southern and northern Judea, Samaria and Galilee number 3,745 men and 1,568 women, making a total of

5.313 workingmen and women, of whom 80 per cent are registered with the Genestine.

acter. Among those Rabbis there was the Chofetz Chaim, one of the greatest authorities on Jewish Law. He also had the authoritative declaration of the London Beth Din, Mr. Cohen said, to the effect that although granting the right to vote to lady seatholders for charitable and admissrative purposes relating to the synagogues could not be categorically ruled out as contrary to Jewish Law, such a proposal had many elements of great danger likely to lead to the disintegration of the United

Ernest Lesser said the rejection of the motion would be an act of suicidal folly. Being more in touch with certain sections of the community, Mr. Lesser said, he could assure them that educated Jewish women of orthodox opinion, resented as a great humiliation their inability to take an active part in the synagogue administration. If women were good enough to sit on the Board of Guardians, they would not be satisfied by the statement that the Din was against them. It made the women leave the United Synagogue and induced them to go over to the Liberal Jews. There was for instance a few years ago, an orthodox woman who was elected deputy-chairman of the London County Council. Would they refuse such a woman the right to vote in matters relating to the synagogue? If they did that, they would gogue? It they did that, they would deal a great blow to the United Syna-gogue. The Sephardic community, also an Orthodox Jewish community, had many years ago granted the vote to some women.

Mr. Barnett said that they were either English Jews or Zionists, that was to say, they either considered the Jews as a race or a nation. If they considered themselves English Jews, then they had to submit to English laws which allowed women the franchise. If, however, they were of the contrary opinion, they might, if they liked, build up Palestine on the principles prevalent thousands of years ago when women were treated as chattel, but in England they should recognize the important part played by women in the life of the country. They ought to remember that it was the woman who educated her child. How could they deny woman the rights which her child possesses?

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BESSARABIA APPLY FOR ROUMANIAN CITIZENSHIP (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Kishinev, Oct. 23.-Twenty thousand Iewish young men of the province of Bessarabia who had availed themselves of the provisions of the Paris Agreement have decided to apply for the rescinding of their former decision According to the Paris Agreement the inhabitants of Bessarabia who refused to become Roumanian citizens had the right to abide by their decision, but had to leave the country a year from the date when they officially notified their refusal. Several thousand of these young men held a meeting here under the chairmanship of the former Kishinev Prefect, Advocate Oprea. The meeting elected a special committee for the purpose of approaching the Roumanian Government with the request to grant a three-months' period during which all the young men who had refused to become citizens should be allowed to apply for Roumanian citizenship.
