## BRITAIN NOTIFIES U.S. COMMERCE DEPARTMENT OF LOAN FOR PALESTINE (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Wash., Dec. 3.—A loan, sought by the Palestine Government for the purchase and construction of communica-Treasury, according to details just re-ceived at the United States Depart-ment of Commerce.

The full text of the announcement reads as follows:

"A memorandum has been issued by the British Government giving par-ticulars of a loan to be raised by the Palestine Government, which is to be guaranteed by the British Treasury, according to advices from the American Consulate General in London. can Consulate General in London This loan will total 45,500,000 (about \$21,825,000), divided as follows: rail-way construction, £1,640,000 (about \$7,950,000); harbor works, £1,115,000 (about \$5,407,750); other development works, £745,000 (about \$3,383,250); and purchase of existing railway and other capital assets from the British Govern-

ment, £1,000,000 (about \$4,850,000).

"It is explained that when Palestine was occupied by the Allied Forces during the war the country was in a neglected condition. Roads other than those constructed by the military, were practically non-existent; the telegraph (Continued on Page 4)

At vesterday's meeting of the commission, representatives of the Lithu-anian Peoples' Party introduced a motion that the present Sunday closing law remain in operation in Kovno. The motion was carried by a vote of 7 to 2.

Leaders of the Jewish population and of various Jewish organizations have unanimously urged the Club of Jewish Deputies to fight in the general Sejm session against this decision.

Anti-Semitic agitators in three Lithuanian towns, Vilki, Salant and Plite, were on trial for inciting propaganda. Ten of the agitators were sentenced to prison.

The amount of £1,000 was given by Mr. Baron to the Jewish Board of Guardians of the city of London. Mr. Baron also purchased a large

house at Brighton which will be equipped as a convalescent home for his employees.

## NATIONAL FARM SCHOOL AWARDED GOLD MEDAL

(Tewish Daily Bulletin) Ph. adelphia, Pa., Dec. 3.—The gold medal for leadership in encouraging agricultural education in the United States has been awarded by the International Awards Committee of the Sesquicentennial Exposition to the Na-

tional Farm School, the non-sectarian institution near Doylestown, which provides free agricultural education for city boys between the ages of 16 and 21 years. The school was also awarded the bronze medal for agricultural displays at the exposition which has just closed.

## GERMAN COURT REJECTS

APPEAL OF SCHROEDER (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Berlin, Dec. 3.—The appeal of Schroeder, sentenced to death for the murder of the bookkeeper Helling, was

rejected by the Federal Court. The Jewish merchant of Magdeburg, Rudolph Haas, was accused of the murder of Helling who was his bookkeeper. The case created a considerable stir, being termed the German Dreyfus affair. Haas was vindicated when it was proved that the charges

against him were false.

Budapest, Nov. 17 .- "I am deeply moved by the differences between Christians and the adherents of the Jewish faith," declared Premier Count Stefan Bethlen, speaking today to an audience of 1,500 members of the Budapest Citizen Party at which he announced his program for the Parliamentary elections. The Premier was supported by the President of the Citizen Party, Ex-Minister of Finance, Tibor von Kallay.

"The Jewish community," the Pre-mier continued, "has gained its rights under the law, and this legally acquired right must not be diminished. Government feels that it is its duty to suppress every attempt at incitement which appears to be directed towards arousing enmity against Jews and Judaism and to take all possible measures to punish those engaged in such

incitement.

"Here," the Premier went on, "we come to the problem of the Numerus Clausus. I want to speak frankly and openly on this matter. The only way in which it is possible to bring about a reconciliation in matters where differences have become acute is to tell the truth. The Minister of Education made it clear a year ago in Geneva that the Numerus Clausus is only a transitional institution which has been made necessary by the existing eco-nomic and social conditions of the time, which, however, cannot remain reckon, whether his name be Bethlen permanently. He added that immedi-| or something else. ately the situation changed the Numerus Clausus would automatically lapse. It was objected at the time that the Minister said one thing in Geneva and another thing in Budapest. I see that I must therefore assume the responsibility for it that the matter will proceed in the way he indicated. The Numerus Clausus is, indeed, only a transitional institution. But on the other hand no one ought to run away with the idea that it has been brought about only by a senseless and purpose-problem and the Government takes less anti-Semitism. Hooliganism, drunkenness, profligacy and anti-Semitism are on the increase.
