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PALESTINE GOVERNMENT HAD SURPLUS IN LAST SIX MONTHS, REPORT SHOWS

Grants 1,500 Immigration Certificates,
Notwithstanding Partial
Unemployment

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 6.—A surplus of the revenues over the expenditures of the Palestine government is shown during the last six months, notwithstanding the partial unemployment prevailing in the country, according to figures made known today.

The figures show that during the six months from April to September, 1926, the government revenues amounted to £1,038,856, while the expenditures amounted to £947,629.

The belief of the Palestine government in the successful overcoming of the unemployment was demonstrated by its action in granting to the Zionist Executive 1,500 certificates for the admission of Jewish labor immigrants, including 500 women.

Figures on the Palestine immigration and emigration for the month of October were also made public today. According to these figures 641 immigrants entered the country during the month of whom 598 were Jews. One thousand three hundred and two emigrants left the country, of whom 1,061 were Jews.

LORD ALLENBY DEFENDS PALESTINE ADMINISTRATION Sees Bright and Happy Future for Country

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Dec. 6.—A defense of the British administration of Palestine and his firm belief in the bright future of the country was expressed by Lord Allenby, conqueror of Jerusalem, in an address he delivered at the Synagogue in Hull during a civic reception in his honor.

Much criticism of the Palestine administration has been uttered recently. Actually, however, the administration has been conducted on the basis of justice and equality to every nationality and creed, Lord Allenby declared. He added that he believes that the future of Palestine will be a very bright one. "No favoritism exists in the country and I have seen enormous progress there, making one believe that Palestine will shortly settle down to a long and happy future," he declared.

OZET MOSCOW CONFERENCE DELEGATES STUDY COLONIES

PRESIDENT RECOMMENDS MODIFYING IMMIGRATION LAW IN CONGRESS MESSAGE

Dickstein Introduces Three Bills to
This Effect; Labor Department
Will Also Propose Amendments

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Dec. 7.—President Coolidge in his message to Congress today again recommended legislation for modification of the immigration law to enable the uniting of separated families. However, he did not specify the exact character of the legislation favored by him. The President made reference to this subject under the topic of his message entitled "The Wage Earner."

"While restrictive immigration has been adopted in part for the benefit of the wage earner and in its entirety for the benefit of the country," the President declared, "it ought not to cause a needless separation of families and dependents from their natural source of support contrary to the dictates of humanity."

It was learned that the Labor Department is expected to make specific recommendations shortly for limited modification of the present law in regard to the admission of certain relatives to citizens.

Washington, Dec. 7.—Congressman Samuel Dickstein of New York introduced three immigration bills at the opening session of Congress. One of the bills provides for the admission of parents, husbands and children up to twenty-one of American citizens; a second to admit the wives and minor children up to eighteen of declarants

ORTHODOX JEWS IN WARSAW FORM SEPARATE KEHILLAH

Warsaw, Dec. 7.—The Jewish community in Warsaw, the largest Jewish community in Europe, will be split, according to a decision of Orthodox leaders affiliated with the Agudath Israel.

Following the decision of the Kehillah to assume the supervision of the Schechita, to which Agudath leaders were opposed, the Agudath Israel decided to take steps toward the establishment of a separate Orthodox Kehillah which will introduce an independent schechita system.

COURT REFUSES TO RELEASE JEWISH LABOR HEAD, ON BAIL

Warsaw, Dec. 6.—The Court of Appeals rejected the request of the counsel of Dr. Joseph Kruk, Jewish labor leader sentenced to eighteen months imprisonment, that Kruk be released on bail.

It is stated that a second trial will take place the end of January.

ROUMANIAN POLICE RAID OFFICES OF JEWISH ORGA- NIZATIONS IN BUCHAREST

Polish Sejm Speaker Reprimands
Jewish Deputy for Letter to
King Ferdinand

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Dec. 6.—The offices of the Union of Roumanian Jews, of which Dr. William Filderman is the president, as well as the offices of the Federation of Jewish Communities in Roumania were searched by the police at an order issued by the military attorney general, a report received from Bucharest today states.

According to the report, the police confiscated a number of documents. The anti-Semitic newspapers report that an information bureau intended for the foreign press and calculated to harm the interests of Roumania was discovered by the police.

Warsaw, Dec. 7.—The Jewish deputy Wacław Wiclicki, who rejected the order conferred upon him by the Roumanian government, as a protest against the anti-Jewish excesses there was reprimanded by the speaker of the Polish parliament, Rataj.

The speaker reproached Deputy Wiclicki for applying in this case the form of writing a letter to the King, pointing out that this incident may lead to diplomatic complications between the Polish and Roumanian governments.

PLAN TO REVIVE JEWISH AUTONOMY IN LITHUANIA Bill Drafted by Club of Jewish Deputies

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Dec. 7.—A bill to re-establish Jewish cultural autonomy in the Republic of Lithuania was prepared by the Club of Jewish Deputies in the Lithuanian parliament.

The bill was submitted to all Jewish parties for the purpose of receiving their observations before it will be introduced in the Sejm.

The bill consists of two alternative texts, one containing provisions for including the religious activities and the other providing for a merely secular character for the activities. According to the bill, a Jew ceases to be a member of the Kehillah only when he leaves the Jewish faith. The provision is also made that a member of the Kehillah may give notice that he is leaving the Kehillah, whereupon it will be impossible for him to re-enter it for three years.

JEWISH SECTIONS OF COM- MUNIST PARTY TO MEET

Moscow, Dec. 7.—A conference of the Yevsektsia, the Jewish sections of the Communist party throughout Russia, will be held here. The conference was convoked for December 27.

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2,000 ATTEND FIRST PUBLIC DEBATE ON ANTI-SEMITISM IN UNION OF SOVIET RUSSIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Dec. 6.—The first public debate on the question of anti-Semitism in Soviet Russia was held here yesterday under the chairmanship of Smidovitch, vice-president of the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics.

Two thousand persons were present at the debate in which Semashko, J. Larin, Dr. A. Bragin, Kozloff, Professor Sakulin, Reinsner and Klutchnikoff participated.

All the speakers admitted the existence of anti-Semitism in Soviet Russia. Anti-Semitism is stronger among the governmental employees and the middle classes and weaker among the workingmen and peasantry. The reason for the existing anti-Semitism and prejudice is the fear of Jewish competition. With the industrial and cultural development of the country, which will provide employment for millions, anti-Semitism will vanish, together with its cause, the speakers declared.

The address of Klutchnikoff, which was a poorly disguised anti-Semitic speech, constituted an exception. He was constantly interrupted by the audience. The unfriendly feeling toward the Jews, Klutchnikoff stated, is a natural result of the hurt inflicted upon the Russian national feeling when it is observed that the Jews are overpowering Russians in all fields, he stated.

J. Larin, replying to Klutchnikoff, reminded him of his past affiliation with the army of the contrarevolutionary General Koltchak. He charged him also with contrarevolutionary tendencies. He warned that such things would not be tolerated.

23,963 MAKE DONATIONS UNDER \$100 TO NEW YORK FEDERATION'S DRIVE

Subscriptions of less than \$100 each have thus far been made by 23,963 persons in the tenth anniversary campaign of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, it was announced by Frederick Brown, General Chairman.

In addition to those who gave less than \$100 each, 7,099 persons subscribed between \$100 and \$1,000 each. Of those who gave less than \$100, 4,329 gave less than \$10 each, 11,657 between \$10 and \$25, 4,887 between \$25 and \$50, and 3,180 between \$50 and \$99.

"Analysis of the contributions to date has been gratifying to the leaders and workers in the campaign," said Mr. Brown. "The records of the present campaign prove that the average citizen of the community is responding to the Federation appeal. These figures show that Federation is approaching its ideal of making its funds completely democratic, to so perfect its methods that it can handle the smallest donation as economically as the largest, and to run the threads of getting and giving throughout the lives of the entire Jewish population."

CHICAGO COVENANT CLUB DROPS NEW YEAR PARTY BECAUSE OF SABBATH

Chicago, Dec. 7.—Much favorable comment by Chicago Jewry has been made as a result of the stand taken by David Labowitch, president of the Covenant club, against the organization's holding its annual New Year's Eve celebration on Friday night, December 31.

The house committee of the club has voted unanimously to support the president's action. Mr. Labowitch, who is also president of Mizpah Temple, declares that he doesn't feel that a Jewish club should hold any such celebration on the Sabbath. Therefore, the Covenant club of Chicago will have no New Year's Eve party.

PLUMER APPROVES TEL AVIV SABBATH REST ORDINANCE

Jerusalem, Dec. 6.—"Queen Sabbath", for centuries the subject of glorification, was reinstated in its full significance in the city of Tel Aviv, the first Jewish city in Palestine, by an order of Lord Plumer.

The High Commissioner approved the Tel Aviv city ordinance making Saturday the legal day of rest in the confines of the city. All stores, factories and offices are to be closed in the city from sunset Friday to sunset Saturday.

JASCHA HEIFETZ ENGAGED TO HUNGARIAN ACTRESS

Budapest, Dec. 7.—Jascha Heifetz, world famous violinist, is engaged to be married, according to reports published today in the Budapest press.

Heifetz is engaged to the well known Hungarian actress, Juci Labasz. The civil marriage will take place in Paris in the Spring.

The Kishineff Pogrom—1926

The pogrom of the Jews in Kishineff, carried out by Roumanian students, was made possible because of the anti-Semitic policy of the ruling powers in Roumania, declares the Jewish press, commenting on this tragic incident.

Recalling the Kishineff pogrom of 1903, when Bessarabia was part of the Czars' territory, the "Jewish Daily News" writes:

"That is how the Jews of Kishineff and Kolaras have exchanged the Russian pogroms for Roumanian. Russia of the Czars and Roumania always competed in regard to persecution of Jews. Roumania has now perpetrated a Roumanian Kishineff in order to match the Russian Kishineff.

"While the pogroms in Russia were carried out by a department of the government, the Roumanian pogroms are conducted by students under the leadership of Prof. Cuza and with the consent of the government. The government, the king and the queen, who has just returned from her American visit, hide comfortably behind the students who perform the dirty work."

"The 'Day' urges that the Powers of Europe and America take steps to curb Roumanian anti-Semitism. 'The great civilized world' the paper says, 'which in 1903 found itself shocked by the Russian barbarism in Kishineff, cannot remain deaf and dumb today, when the same barbarism is perpetrated by Roumanian instead of Russian moujiks.

"And let it be remembered: it was as a result of what the great Powers did that Roumania has the opportunity to perpetrate pogroms in Kishineff. Were Bessarabia today outside of the Roumanian boundaries, things would surely have had a different face there, but certainly no pogroms would have occurred. The world is responsible for the new boundaries in Roumania and the nations cannot escape the responsibility which this fact places upon them. It was the great Powers that turned the Bessarabian Jews over to the mercy of Roumania and they must not and cannot remain silent now when this mercy finds expression through pogroms."

What becomes of Queen Marie's statement that the Jews in Roumania are treated like all other subjects, asks the "Jewish Morning Journal," continuing:

"It is a bitter joke to see the Queen returning home to find the Jews in mortal fear, to see the Parliament in the ugly pose of open hatred to the Jews and to hear the courageous protest of a fearless rabbi (Zirelsohn). What remains of her assurances in America that the Jews are treated well in Roumania? What of the Jews who fawned upon her? And what will hap-

JEWISH QUESTION IN POLAND IS PROBLEM OF PSYCHOLOGY, POLISH MINISTER TELLS JEWS

Assurances that equal citizenship rights are granted to Jews in Poland were made by Jan Ciechanowski, Polish Minister to the United States, speaking at the Brooklyn Jewish Centre on "The Present Situation in Poland."

The Jews were invited to Poland in the fourteenth century after their expulsion from Spain and Portugal, he said. They lived peacefully with the other people of the country until its partition by Germany and Russia whereupon the governments discriminated against them. Since the creation of the new Poland, Jews have had equal rights with other citizens, he said.

The minister declared that while there were isolated cases of persecution of Jews, the Government was not responsible for them and tried to stop them. He said the Jewish problem in Poland is now one of psychology, in which figures the difference in the manner of the way the Jews live, their difference in dress and their aloofness from other Poles. He said these things cause resentment in the rest of the Polish population.

He stated that he hopes with "time and great tact on both sides, with the spreading of education, enlightenment among the masses, and by introducing a gradual process of sincere cooperation on the part of the Jewish section of the population with the rest of the nation," the Jewish problem will be solved satisfactorily. He said Poland wanted the Jews to remain there.

DMOWSKI PARTY KEEPS "ANTI" PROGRAM SECRET (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Dec. 7.—The "antis" of the program of the new Polish nationalistic party, modelled after the Ku Klux Klan and formed under the leadership of Roman Dmowski, chief of the national democrats and initiator of the anti-Jewish boycott policy in Poland, will not be made public, the council of the party decided.

It is stated that the withholding of this part of the program from the public is intended to neutralize the influence of the new Polish conservative party under the leadership of Prince Janusz Radziwill, with which it is known certain Jewish bourgeois elements are in sympathy. It is stated on good authority that Dmowski is making all preparations to get into power when the first opportunity presents itself.

Members of the North Shore Jewish congregation of Chicago, Ill., will begin the erection of a \$275,000 synagogue shortly after Jan. 1, it was announced. The edifice will have a large auditorium and recreation rooms. The congregation is headed by Rabbi Harvey Wessell and has a membership of about 300.

The dinner will also commemorate Mr. Lampor's twenty-five anniversary as President of the Yeshiva.

The dinner has been planned by the trustees of the Yeshiva College, as a fitting expression of appreciation for the unceasing devotion and faithful service rendered by Mr. Lampor on behalf of Judaism and Jewish education.

Besides serving as President of the Yeshiva for twenty-five years, Mr. Lampor is credited with being instrumental in starting the movement for the new Yeshiva of America.

It was Mr. Lampor who heralded the building campaign for the new Yeshiva two years ago by announcing that his initial contribution to the project would be \$100,000.

It is announced by Dr. B. Revel, President of the Faculty of the Yeshiva, that David Elimelech Ellis of Philadelphia has presented to the Yeshiva the library of the late Dr. Philip Klein of New York, which, in memory of the wife of Mr. Ellis, is to be known as the Adelle Ellis Memorial Library. The Klein Collection is one of the best known rabbinical collections in the country. It is especially rich in the field of Halacha, with many rare volumes in Responsa, Codes and other divisions. The collection will be housed in a separate room of the Yeshiva library.

RAISE \$28,000 AT OPENING OF I. O. B. B. CAMPAIGN (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Peoria, Ill., Dec. 7.—The \$2,000,000 campaign of the B'nai B'rith Wider Scope Committee was launched in the Middle West at a banquet held Sunday night at the Jefferson Hotel.

Despite miserable weather conditions and impossible roads over 200 attended the banquet. Subscriptions of \$21,000 and pledges of \$7,000 were announced.

Rabbi Louis L. Mann, State Chairman for Illinois, delivered the principal address. Rabbi Benjamin Frankel, executive director of the Hillel Foundation, presided.

A Hebrew school for the accommodation of 1,500 boys and girls, to be erected on Crown Street, between New York and Nostrand Avenues in Brooklyn, N. Y., at a cost approximately \$250,000, is planned by members of the Talmud Torah of Crown Heights.

A campaign to raise the funds required was officially opened with a banquet at the Brooklyn Jewish Center. Judge Algernon L. Novin, Dr. Israel H. Levinthal, Rabbi Aaron D. Bursack, Rabbi Daniel Shapiro, and Samuel Rottenberg were the speakers.

On January 9th the United Jewish Aid Societies of Brooklyn will dedicate its building which it has acquired for the work of the organization. A special fund of \$40,000 was raised under the directorship of Ralph Jonas and David M. Kahn and the Laura Basterman Memorial Building.

Congressman Emanuel Celler, president of the Aid Society, yesterday announced that the building is now being completely renovated and remodelled to suit the requirements of the Aid Society.

IVRIAH TO ENLIST JEWISH WOMEN IN U. S. FOR JEWISH EDUCATION WORK

Plans for the formation of a national women's organization to be devoted to the stimulation of Jewish education throughout the United States will be discussed at the second annual conference of Ivriah, the women's organization of the Jewish Education Association. The meeting will be held at the Forty-eighth Street Theatre on December 13. Mrs. Joseph Leblang, president of the organization will present requests that she has received from many cities expressing a desire for the establishment of local organizations to interest women in Jewish education.

Ivriah which was organized in February 1925, has two thousand members in New York City alone. Through mass meetings which have been held throughout the city, they have succeeded in enrolling thousands of Jewish children in religious schools who never before received Jewish religious training.

The purpose of the organization will be explained at the meeting by Mrs. Leblang, Florence Reed, Sophie Irene Loch, Mrs. Gabriel Hamburger, and by Bernard Semel. Mrs. Samuel Goldstein will preside at the meeting. Mrs. Alexander Kohut, Mrs. Sydney Borg, Mrs. Felix Warburg, Mrs. David Goldfarb, and Mrs. Irma Lindheim will be among the guests.

The officers of Ivriah are Mrs. Joseph Leblang, president; Mrs. Samuel H. Golding and Mrs. Gabriel Hamburger, associate chairmen; Mrs. David N. Mossessohn, secretary, and Mrs. Max Schwartz, treasurer. Mrs. Israel Unterberg, Mrs. Arthur Lehman, and Mrs. Rebecca Kohut are the honorary presidents of Ivriah.

A Jewish commission to confer with Protestants and Roman Catholics concerning the possibilities of a joint effort to secure the cooperation of the public schools to provide religious education for children of school age was appointed, states a report issued by the Federal Council of Churches.

"This is a matter in which Jews and Catholics as well as Protestants are all interested, inasmuch as the release of children is a community affair and can usually be secured only at the united request of all the religious bodies. The Jews have appointed a Commission to confer with Protestants and Catholics regarding this whole problem," the statement of the Federal Council declared.

"It is hoped that out of such conference there may come a settled policy satisfactory to all and enabling the churches to secure a larger proportion of pupils' time for this important aspect of education. Steps have been taken to arrange a conference between the religious bodies and the National Education Association, not only with regard to the release of children but also looking toward the development within the school curriculum itself of potential values significant for religious education."

HONOR, MEMORY OF JEWISH WAR HEROES IN ENGLAND

London, Dec. 6.—Tribute to the memory of Jewish men in the British army and navy who were killed during the World War, was paid yesterday in connection with the Feast of Lights.

A wreath, in the shape of a Magen David, was laid on the cenotaph in Whitehall by Lt. Com. Duven of the Royal Naval Vigilance Reserve. He was accompanied by representatives of the naval and army air force ex-service men. The wreath bore the inscription: "In memory of our Jewish comrades who paid the supreme sacrifice in the war, a tribute offered on the occasion of the Chanukah naval, military and air force service held at Bayswater Synagogue."

BREVITIES

The International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union, through Morris Sigman, its president, issued an ultimatum to Communist leaders of the New York Cloakmakers' Union, which has been conducting the strike of 35,000 garment workers, "to get out and stay out," as a condition of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union taking charge of the chaotic strike situation and "salvaging the wreck created by the Communists."

The ultimatum, which also refers to pending negotiations for agreements with the jobbers and contractors in the garment industry. Not until these agreements are signed will a normal situation be restored, as the agreement concluded by the International Industrial Council of Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturers takes care of only one-third of the workers concerned in the struggle.

The revolt against the Communist dictatorship in the New York Cloakmakers' Union was launched at a Cooper Union meeting on Thursday night, in which 3,000 workers participated.

The Executive Council of the American Cloak and Suit Manufacturers' Association early yesterday morning issued an order to its members canceling a previous order which had called for the closing of about 800 shops, employing approximately 20,000 garment workers.

The last order was issued following a meeting of the Council that came after the Executive Board of the Board of the Cloakmakers' Association sent a message to the Manufacturers' Association, urging further negotiations.

The merging of the interests of the Schulte Retail Stores Corporation and the United Cigar Stores Corporation was completed yesterday. The two companies will coordinate their operations through a third organization known as the Union and United Tobacco Corporation, which was chartered in Maryland last year. This new company is to purchase half the stock of the Schulte Corporation and a substantial part of the United Cigar Stores Company stock.

JEWISH COMMUNAL ACTIVITIES

The Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn will extend its plant by the construction of two ten-story buildings at an estimated cost of between \$2,250,000 and \$2,500,000. One will be used as a home and training school for nurses. This will be more than double the hospital's capacity.

The silver jubilee of the Women's Auxiliary, celebrated at a meeting Monday afternoon, was the occasion at which the announcement of the building program was made for Joseph J. Baker, president of the hospital, by Mrs. Nathan Straus, First Vice President of the auxiliary.

Nathan S. Jonas, President of the Manufacturers' Trust Company, former president of the hospital and a leader in the organization of the hospital, addressed the gathering.

It would be necessary, he declared, to mortgage the property for \$1,000,000 or \$1,250,000.

Plans have already been made for a new building, to be known as the Louria Memorial, in honor of the memory of the late Dr. Leon Louria, who was chief of the hospital staff of the hospital. The hospital, by Mrs. Nathan Straus, was made by Dr. Louria and his wife before their deaths.

who arrived in America prior to July 1, 1924, and the other bill to admit all the refugee immigrants who secured visas prior to the adoption of the present law but whose admission was made impossible thereby.

Congressman Dickstein estimated that the number of these refugees is about five thousand.

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
