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### NEW ANTI-JEWISH EXCESSES IN BUCHAREST AS STUDENTS DEMAND NUMERUS NULLUS AGAINST JEWS

Jews Beaten. Stores and Shops Plundered: Roumanian Minister in Washington Denies Reports of Anti-Jewish Excesses

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Dec. 14.—An alarming report with the progress of the country was of new anti-Semitic excesses in the city of Bucharest arranged by anti- of the Jassy Chamber of Commerce. Semitic students was just received here

from Bucharest. The excesses developed as the result of a students' street demonstration expressing the demand to introduce a numerus nullus, i.e., to bar all Jewish students from Roumanian colleges and

universities The crowd broke through the line of gendarmerie which had been placed on the streets to maintain order and attacked the newspaper offices of the "Rampa" and "Adeverul," breaking the windows in the offices. Jewish passersby were attacked; stores and shops on Belvedere and Bacanstrasse were raided and demolished. The workshop of a Jewish tailor, Aaron Blumenfeld, or a Jewish tailor, Aaron Blumenteld, on Spinzisstrasse, as well as several other Jewish stores, jewellers' shops, and private Jewish homes were in-vaded. The two children of Leon Moritzen, who were ill in bed were attacked and seriously injured. All windows of Jew-ish homes were broken on Moschilor and Vacartes Streets.

Thirty students who were arrested by the police were later released.

Kishineff, Bessarabia, Dec. 14.-Archbishop Guri, who was reported to have been the host of the students who arranged the anti-Jewish excesses in this city, has denied this report.

In a communication to Rabbi Zirel-sohn, the aged leader of Bessarabian Jewry, who recently resigned from the Roumanian Senate as a protest against the anti-Semitic excesses, the Arch-bishop states that he did not invite the students to Kishineff and will issue an official denial to that effect. The Archbishop also promised to intervene with the authorities in order to prevent the circulation of anti-Iewish leaflets in the city.

The director of the Jassy railway declared that steps have been taken to remove from the trains those who instigate the disorders.

Professor Bagdan, Dean of the Jassy University, expressed the opinion that as long as the students will be allowed to interfere with politics, excesses will continue. It is necessary, he stated, to prohibit politics in the university.

Washington, Dec. 14.—The demand that the U. S. Congress appoint a committee of seven to investigate the sources of information on which Henry Ford based his renewed charges several days ago that "the international Jew is in direct control of all financial Jew is in direct control of an mancian centers of government, including the United States Federal Reserve Sys-tem," is made in a resolution framed by Congressman Sol Bloom of New York.

In a statement issued here, the Con-

gressman declared: "There is a good old saying that 'money talks' I believe that up to money talks. I believe that up to now Mr. Ford's money has been talk-ing and that something else besides money will be heard from in the future.

"Mr. Ford has stated that the only competent judges were the American people and that it is now proper for the Jewish spokesmen to meet the issue by addressing their defense to the American people. My resolution carries out his suggestion.

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#### LATE JULES E. MASTBAUM BEQUEATHED FUNDS FOR VARIOUS CHARITIES IN WILL (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 14.—Jules E. Mastbaum, distinguished Jewish philanthropist, who died last Tucsday, left an estate valued from \$5,000,000 to \$20,-000,000, according to his will probated vesferday.

After generous bequests to charity, Mr. Mastbaum leaves the remainder of his estate to his wife and three daugh-

The will makes it possible for Mr. Mastbaum's business associates to acquire his holdings in the various enterprises.

It also makes provision for the completion of the Rodin Museum which he presented as a gift to the city to house his collection of the famous sculptor.

"During my life," said Mr. Mastbaum in his will, "I have provided for the re-ceipt upon my death of the sum of \$100,000 by the Federated Loan Society of Philadelphia and of \$100,000 by the Federation of Jewish Charities of Philadelphia, for which reason I make to charitable provisions, herein, asiming that those who come after me will perform their duty in this regard."

The provision for the Federated founded, and the Federation of Jewish Charities, come out of Mr. Mastbaum's \$2,000,000 Tusurance policy.

Of this insurance, \$1,000,000 goes to the Stanley Company of America, \$500,000 to the real estate firm of Mast-baum Brothers and Fleisher. The residue of the insurance goes to the estate.

The will bequeaths \$100,000 to his mother, Mrs. Fannie Mastbaum.

The Jewish community of Winthrop, Mass, dedicated its new \$125,000 Community Building and Hebrew School by a parade and banquet. Many out-of-town guests were present.

Buffalo Jewry opened its drive for \$171,303, of which \$33,002 goes for Foreign Relief, and the yemander for the needs of the local jewish Federation of Charities. The sum of \$2,200 was subscribed at the first dinner of the drive, held in Hotel Statler. More than 300 attended.

#### The Habima Impresses New York

The first appearance Monday night in New York of the Moscow Theatre Habima in the well known Ansky play "The Dybbuk," has created a strong impression on the theatre critics of the metropolitan press.

This troupe, composed entirely of Jewish artists and employing Hebrew exclusively as their vehicle, is spoken of thus by J. Brooks Atkinson in the Times":

"In spite of an eager audience, to many of whom Hebrew was not an unfamiliar tongue, the spoken words obviously did not matter particularly last evening. For the attention was naturally focussed upon a highly styled type of acting developed to a state of perfection. We have all caught hints of it in other performances directed by the innumerable Moscovians now rummaging around this country. The di-rection of the Moscow Art Theatre Musical Studio had been tarred a little with the same brush. But no other performance in this city has been so bold in its stylization, so daring in its treatment of details and so skillful in evoking the latest moods of a produc-

"Acted in this vein, the performance describes what we may vaguely term the 'soul' of 'The Dybbuk.' It is a method extraordinarily beautiful when it is perfectly welded and polished; it would be disastrous in less talented hands."

This time, declares Alexander Wool-cott in the "World," the public saw the "Dybbuk", played "by a company of superb actors, playing in a manner of their own, with every throb of the yoice, every flight of the hands, every fantastic turn of the body serving to intensify the tragedy much as the wild, free, paint-soaked brush of a painter is realeased when it turns to posters."

IN JERUSALEM IS ACQUIRED BY THE UNITED SYNAGOGUE

Announcement was made yesterday by Dr. Herman Abramowitz, president of the United Synagogue of America, that it has acquired from the Orthodox Patriarchate of Jerusalem, representing the Greek Catholic Church, a site on which will shortly be erected the first modern synagogue and community center in the Holy City.

The deed for the property is signed by His Beautitude, Damianos, Orthodox Patriarch of Jerusalem, as vendor, "in virtue of the legal authority vested in him and which he exercises over the property of the Orthodox Patriarchate." and by Dr. Judah L. Magnes, former Rabbi of Temple Emanu-El, New York, and now dean of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, who, with Chief Justice Frumkin of the Supreme Court of Palestine, acted as representatives of the United Synagogue of America in negotiating for the purchase of the property. This is said to be the first transfer of Jerusalem property for synagogue purposes since the British Occupation of Palestine in 1918, and also the first time that the Greek Patriarchate has sold land in the Holy City for Jewish purposes. The signa-ture of His Beautitude is witnessed by the Bishop of Madaba.

bordering on the symbolic, the Habima performance often plunges into at-tempts at sharp realism. For instance, while the beggars' dance impresses one with its striking realistic features on the mystic background, the scene in the Tzadik's room brings one into an atmosphere which is almost entirely at variance with the realistic forms of Chassidic mannerism.

Perhaps this conflict is due to the circumstance that it has its origin in the drama itself. The Dybbuk text, as worded by Ansky is, in truth, an un-balanced collection of all the elements of East European Jewish life. It has mysticism, it has realism, it has a great deal of living folk-lore.

One is bound to observe the strong influence of the Russian environment influence of the Russian environment on the Habima. One cannot forget the tone of Gnesia, the weeping woman (Ch. Grober). One is thrilled with the artistry of the Ballanim reciting psalms. One is brought to tear listening to the argument of Hennoch (Benj. Zemach) with his emotional accentuation of traditional tones and apprehensive fright. One cannot help admiring Leah (Anna Rovina) under the spell of the Dybbuk and when dying. But one cannot also help wondering at the strange concep-tion by Nahum Zemach of Arriel, the Zadik of Miropol, who in his (Zeomach's) personification, is more likely to be a Russian saint than a Chassidic

Regarding the site Judge Frumkin wrote to the officers of the United Synagogue recently: "It is very magnificent, visible from and commanding a view of all parts of Jerusalem, and lends itself to the erection of an imposing building. It is practically in the center of the city, overlooking the City Wall, the Old City, Mt. Scopus and the Mount of Olives,

Together with the site on which the Synagogue Center will be erected, the United Synagogue of America has also secured possession of sufficient land across the way from it in order to prevent the erection of undesirable types of buildings or the establishment of undesirable institutions or commercial enterprises in close proximity to the house of worship.

Funds for the Jerusalem Synagogue Center, which together with the site will, it is estimated, cost approximately \$500,000, are being raised in this country in a campaign conducted by the United Synagogue of America last year, under the leadership of Dr. Herbert I Levinthal. The Synagogue will be under the direct supervision of the Jerusalem Jewish population. Dr. Abramowitz added that pending

the erection of the permanent structures, several portable buildings will be put up on the acquired site so that activities may begin as speedily as possible. He said that although tentative plans for the Synagogue Center had been submitted by a firm of Jerusalem architects, he would propose to the executive committee of the United Synagogue that architects in every part of the world be invited to submit plans for appropriate buildings. One hundred thousand dollars has already been Synacontributed for the Jerusalem gogue Center, and the Jews of America will be asked to furnish the balance needed for the completion of the proiect.

the following incident occurred: Jewish high school pupils, dissatisfied with the eventual results of the so-called baccalaureat examination (college enexamination (college entrance) attacked one of the teachers in the street and beat him. Without doubt, this is one of the gravest cases in high school life. A few days later, one of the students, provoked by this incident, committed the unpremeditated and regrettable act of shocting at one of the aggressors of the teachers, killing him.
"Justice takes its course in both

"A part of the Jewish population in Cernauti, at the funeral, tried to make the victim a martyr to the cause. This resulted in interpellations in Parlia-ment. The Government, conscious of its duty to maintain order, acted rightly, showing that it would not tolerate trouble from either side but would guarantee to all the free exercise of their rights within the law.

"Later in Chisinau (Kishineff), in connection with this incident, there was a little friction between the students and a few Jews, which, however, was of no importance.

"There is no trouble anywhere, everything being completely quiet. All rumors to the contrary, which have been spread in foreign countries, are, like the rest, 'tendencious' and malici-
