#### FAVORABLE ATTITUDE TO WADSWORTH AMENDMENT SEEN IN HOUSE COMMITTEE Republican Majority Leader Will Urge Support for Measure

(Jewish Daily Bulletin) Washington, Dec. 17.—The House Immigration Committee met in executive session yesterday morning and it is understood from reliable sources discussed both the Wadsworth amendment and Congressman Sabath's bill to admit additional relatives of both citizens and declarants and to repeal the national origins plan. No decision was reached. the committee adjourning until Monday when another meeting will be held.

It is understood that while none of the members definitely committed themselves not only was a more or less sympathetic attitude displayed by those who hitherto have opposed amending the law but there was even some discussion of adding the parents and children between eighteen and twenty-one of citi-

In the town of Starodub, the court, consisting of Jewish Judges, sentenced the Jewish religious teacher, Abraham Kireshbin to two months at hard labor on the charge of having illegally con-ducted a chedar where eight children between the ages of six and ten were instructed by him in Hebrew.

#### LEAGUE CANNOT CONSIDER POLISH JEWISH PROTEST AT ROUMANIAN EXCESSES Protest Is Couched Too Strongly. Minority Department Head Says (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Dec. 17.-The telegram of protest against the anti-Jewish excesses in Roumania directed to the League of Nations by the Club of Jewish Deputies was acknowledged by Eric Colban, di-rector of the National Minorities Department of the League of Nations.

Mr. Colban pointed out, however, that in view of the fact that the telegram of the Club was couched too sharply, the League of Nations finds it impossible to consider the petition of the Club of Jewish Deputies.

The praesidium of the Club of Jewish Deputies replied that the telegram is not a petition of the Club, but a call of protest and that the sharp tone of the telegram corresponds with the indignation of the lewish population in Poland over the suffering of Roumanian Jews. The Club hopes that the League of Nations will not remain indifferent to the suffering of Roumanian Jews. the praesidium declared.

The telegram of the Club of Jewish Deputies protesting to the League of Nations read, as reported by cable: "We protest strongly against the persecutions directed against the Jewish minority in Roumania. The Roumanian government should know that a people whose professors and students are pogromists cannot find a place

Warsaw, Dec. 17.-Deputy Waclaw Wiclicki, who rejected the order con-ferred upon him by the Roumanian government as a protest against the anti-Jewish excesses in Roumania, was invited by the Roumanian Minister here to a conference at which the Minister purposed to prove to him that the despatches concerning anti-Jewish pogroms in Roumania were untrue. Deputy Wielicki refused the invitation.

## STIRS LITHUANIAN STUDENTS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Kovno, Dec. 17.-Lithuanian students are beginning to follow in the foot-steps of Polish and Roumanian anti-Semitic students in raising agitation that they be provided with Jewish corpses for dissection in the clinics of the mediçal college.

A meeting of Jewish students was called for the purpose of protesting against this movement.

The director of the clinics issued a statement to the press in which he declared that there prevails a shortage of corpses and that the Jews must deliver their share. This is not a national question, he stated.

**EXCAVATIONS OF JERUSALEM** THIRD WALL COMPLETED FACTS AROUSE INTEREST Discovery of Exact Wall Line May Solve Question of Holy Sites (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 17.—The excavations of the Agrippa Wall, commonly known as the Third Wall, around Jerusalem, being carried on by the Jewish Archaeological Society under the aus-pices of the Jebrew University, are nearly completed.

During the excavations a continuation of the Wall to the south was uncovered and a gateway between two towers opposite the Tomb of Queen Helena of Adiabena, along the side of the valley as far as the Temple area. The towers are mentioned in Josephus Flavius' "History of the Jewish Wars Against the Romans."

The exact line of the Third Wall now seems to be fixed. It went from opposite the Tomb of Helene along the Vadi extending to the Temple area. The corner tower, which is mentioned by Josephus, is probably the Herodian tower, the foundations of which are visible to the northeast corner of the Temple area.

The discovery of the line of the Third Jerusalem Wall is of great historic value and has caused considerable interest among Jewish and non-tamich scholars. Particular signifi-Jewish scholars. Particular signifi-cance is attached to this discovery in view of the fact that it might offer a solution to the debated question as to the exactness of the location of what are traditionally known as the Christian Holy Sites in Jerusalem.

#### HEJJAS, HUNGARIAN ANTI-SEMITIC LEADER, IS RE-ELECTED TO PARLIAMENT

Budapest, Dec. 17.—Hejjas, one of the leaders of the Hungarian Race Purifiers was returned to parliament in a closely contested election. Hejjas received a majority of 56 votes. It was said that his campaign directors com-pelled many Jews to cast their votes for him.

## COM. KENWORTHY INDICTS PALESTINE GOVERNMENT BEFORE SAILING FOR U. S.

## Noted Britisher Calls It "Conservative

and Parsimonious (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 17.-An indictment against the policy of the Palestine government was made by Lt. Commander J. M. Kenworthy before his departure

for the United States via England.

Commander Kenworthy stated that
he was deeply impressed by the progress in Palestine, but he said it was his duty to criticize the "conservative and parsimonious Palestine government for its failure to extend the British trade in-fluence to Palestine. There is no representative board of trade in the country; there is not a single English com-mercial traveller visible. All the motor cars operated in the country are Ameri-can. The ports are disgraceful, the treatment of visitors is shameful. The government quarantine at Haifa is located at the edge of malarious swamps and make Ellis Island by comparison a hotel de luxe. The government treats the Palestine immigrants worse than animals," he stated. Commander Kenworthy further de-

clared that it was the duty of every British imperialist to support the Zionist policy in Palestine, which is the only insurance policy for the defense of the Suez canal, he stated.

## BIBLE CRITIC, DIES AT 68; WROTE 600 WORKS ON BIBLE Important Contributions

Ancient History of Jews (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Baltimore, Md., Dec. 17.—Dr. Paul Haupt, W. W. Spence professor of the Semitic languages, director of the Oriental Seminary at the Johns Hopkins University and one of the foremost Bible critics, died Wednesday, Dec. 15, at the Johns Hopkins Hospital after an illness of ten days. Dr. Haupt was not a Iew.

Recognized as one of the leading philologists of the world and noted as a Semitic scholar, Dr. Haupt had been connected with the Hopkins faculty for 43 years. Among his students were many who later attained prominence in many walks of life. He was born at Gorlitz, Germany, November 25, 1858.

Until very recently Dr. Haupt returned to Europe every summer to continue his studies of Biblical events. In his more than 600 works he is considered to have made many important contributions to the ancient history of the Jewish people. He did extensive research work in the district where the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah are supposed to have stood and was among the first to voice the opinion that the ancient cities had been destroyed by earthquakes and not by miracles. also stated the belief that the Christian tradition of Calvary was wrong. In a commemoration of his fortieth

anniversary as a teacher at Johns Hop-kins there was dedicated to him a book of Oriental studies to which more than forty celebrated scholars contributed. The book was edited by the late Dr. Aaron Ember, then associate professor of Semitic languages at Hopkins, and Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of Dropsie College, Philadelphia. In 1898 Dr. Haupt edited the poly-

chrome Bible. His works brought him honors from many universities and scientific societies and orders.

#### TEL AVIV RESIDENTS WANT TO VOTE IN JAFFA ELECTIONS (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 14 .- The residents of Tel Aviv and the Palestine Government are in disagreement over the right of the former to participate in the Jaffa municipal elections. The Palestine Government issued an

announcement according to which the Tel Aviv residents have no right to participate in the Jaffa elections. At a meeting held in Tel Aviv last night at which representatives of the township. of the industrial group and of the Na-tional Council of Palestine Jewry participated, a resolution protesting against the government announcement was adopted.

The Tel Aviv leaders pointed to the fact that under Article 11 of the Tel Aviv Constitution, the Tel Aviv residents are granted the right to participate in Jaffa elections.

Press Commends Senate For Adopting Wadsworth Amendment

The passing by the U. S. Senate of the Wadsworth amendment to permit the entry of 35,000 wives and minor children of declarants, is greeted by New York newspapers as a step commendable for its himanity in that it aims to reunite families separated by the guota laws. The "Times," in an editorial en-

titled "A Speech That Changed Votes", lauds Senator Wadsworth for carrying through the amendment against what seemed certain defeat. The paper writes:"The story is hackneved of the United States Senator who said that during the thirty years of his service at Washington he had heard many speeches that changed his convictions. but thanked Heaven that he had never heard one that changed his vote. Last Tuesday, however, a speech was made in the Senate which did change votes. It was delivered by Senator Wads-worth of New York in support of his worth of New York in support of his amendment to the Immigration act. At least two Senators who had expected to vote against the amendment, Senator Bingham of Connecticut and Senator Bruce of Maryland, rose to announce that they had been convinced and converted. There must have been several others of the same mind, for when the vote was taken the amendment was agreed to by 39 yeas against 37 nays. . . . The decision of the Senate was noteworthy as showing that, at least in non-partisan matters, reason and humane considerations may transform an expected minority into a majority. As amended, the bill should pass and

be signed by the President, urges the be signed by the Fresham, urges in "World", pointing out that "neither the original bill nor the amendment is inconsistent with the new immigration policy of the Nation. #### PRESIDENT MAY DRÓP NATIONAL ORIGINS PLAN CONGRESSMAN PREDICTS

The opinion that President Coolidge may avail himself of the "loophole" in the Immigration Act of 1924 and pre-vent the introduction of the National Origins Plan, under Section 11 of the Act, is expressed by Congressman Emanuel Celler in a statement he issued to the press.

The introduction of the National Origins Plan would reduce, almost to a negligible amount, the German, Irish and Scandinavian quotas and unduly enhance the English quota. So many protests have been received at the White House against this plan that Congressman Celler predicts that the President will not issue the proclamation necessary to introduce the Plan.

"The determination of quotas is an administrative or executive function, and it is the duty of the Secretaries of State, Commerce and Labor to ascertain the quotas. The President can only proclaim the quotas after he re-ceives from these Secretaries their report, as to what the quotas should be.

"The law also states, that in the event that the Proclamation of the President is not made, the present condition of quotas obtains. rub of the situation. The President can say, 'I have not received the report of the Secretaries of Labor, Commerce and State, and hence cannot act.' No one can or will compel these Secretaries to ascertain the quotas. there will be no action whatever. other words, there seems to be in the minds of the authors of the Statute, the giving to the President of a way of escape," Congressman Celler declared.

The "Day" declares that "by its action the Senate has in part rectified its error in rejecting Senator Wadsworth's bill at the previous session. Senator Wadsworth's amendment had to be accepted not, as Senator Reed would have it, because of political pressure by immigrant groups, but because the measure, as adopted by the Senate, is even more in the interests of America itself than in the interests of the immigrant families.

Exception to the general approval of the Senate act is taken by the "Herald-Tribune," which fears that "if this attempt, moderate and definite, to widen the non-quota privilege should succeed there is every likelihood that Congress will be bombarded with appeals for further extensions, which, if granted, will fritter away the benefits of numerical limitation." As a justification of its attitude the paper adds:

"To select a favored 35,000 for nonquota entrance would but make more bitter the disappointment of the thou-sands left out. It is better for Congress to adhere to the line which it drew deliberately in 1924."

#### UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO INTRODUCES COURSES IN JEWISH STUDIES

(Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 17.—The university college of the University of Chicago will institute a series of courses in Jewish education, beginning with the winter quarter, it was announced today. This is being done at the request of the College of Jewish Studies which will cooperate in conducting the courses.

"This new undertaking," Dr. Alexander M. Dushkin, director of the College of Jewish Studies said, "is indi-cative of the policy of the University of Chicago to be of practical service to the whole community by extending its educational program and influence so as to be of greatest possible usefulness."

The courses will be opened to all qualified students, but they are designed, it was announced, primarily for those who are to teach in Jewish religious schools and who engage in social service. Most of the courses will be conducted in the evening on the university campus and at the downtown quarters of the university college. The faculty appointed for these courses is from the teaching staff of the College of Jewish Studies.

Philadelphia, Dec. 16.—The largest single bequest ever made to the Fed-eration of Jewish Charities in this city was received yesterday in the form of a check for \$166,000 from the executors of the will of Harry A. Jeitles.

Mr. Jeitles was a cigar manufacturer. He died in Atlantic City.

Payment of the check to the Federation was accompanied by the announcement from the executors that another check for approximately \$50,000 would come later. It was known that Mr. Jeitles had

named the Federation of Jewish Char-ities sole beneficiary of his residuary estate, but it was not known how much the residue would be. It now is believed that the testator left an estate of close to \$400,000.

By the terms of the will, the Jewish Hospital Association and the Jewish Foster Home and Orphan Asylum will receive \$1,000 each. A codicil gives \$5,000 to the Atlantic City Hospital and \$5,000 to the Atlantic City Lodge No. 275, B. P. O. E. Other beneficiaries include Samuel C. Jeitles, a brother and former partner of the testator, who receive \$20,000 and three nephews, who receive \$20,000 each.

Baltimore, Dec. 16.—Charity and pub-lic bequests for \$160,000 are listed in the will of Julius Levy, filed for probate in the Orphans Court yesterday.

Mr. Levy died on Nov. 22. The largest is \$50,000 for Johns Hop-kins University. The income from one

half is to be used for general purposes and from the other half for the Medical School. The sum of \$25,000 was left to the

## DOUBTED BY AUTHORITIES (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

London, Dec. 1.-In connection with the reports which have been published in the lewish and general press concerning a plan by a French engineer, M. Imbeaux, the essential feature of which is the bringing of water from the Mediterranean Sea to the Jordan Valley utilizing the difference of levels, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency is au-thoritatively informed that a number of similar projects were made many years ago by a Norwegian and an English engineer and so far not one of them has materialized. All these projects remain on paper as their practical value is very much doubted when the scheme is discussed from a business point of view

It is stated that if this scheme is carried out, the initial cost per H.P. will be extremely high and that the expenditure of £15,000,000 which such a scheme requires would be entirely out of proportion to the possibilities of revenue in Palestine and Transjordania, even in the remote future

Besides, the question arises whether such a scheme would not conflict with the concession held now by the Pales-tine Electric Corporation. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency understands that any project of this nature intended for the generation and sale of energy from water power in Palestine or any other means, would infringe the rights under the existing Jordan concession, and could not, therefore, be carried out.
