ELECTORS CHOSEN FOR JEWISH SENATE REPRE-SENTATIVES IN HUNGARY Chief Rabbi Simon Hevesi, Endorsed by Bishop Czernoch, Is Defeated in Electoral Vote

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Jan. 6 .- Four Jewish electors to select the two Jewish repre-sentatives in the upper chamber of the Hungarian parliament, were chosen. They are Rabbi Immanuel Loew of Szegedin, Bernstein of Nyireghaza, the Orthodox Rabbi Strasser of Debreczyn, and Rosenbaum of Kisvarda. Chief Rabbi Simon Hevesi, who was endorsed for election to the senate by Bishop Czernoch, was defeated in the electoral vote. Reich and Fischer of Budanest were also defeated.

#### POLISH FOREIGN OFFICE URGED TO INTERVENE WITH ROUMANIAN GOVERNMENT (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Jan. 6.—The demand that the Polish Foreign Office intervene with the Roumanian government concerning the anti-Iewish excesses was made by Deputy Leon Reich in the Foreign Relations Committee of the Polish Diet.

The committee debated yesterday on the statements made by Foreign Min-ister Saleski on the foreign policy of the government. Deputy Reich urged that the internal policy with regard to the national minorities in Poland be regulated. He argued that the situation of the minorities reflects unfavorably on Poland's prestige abroad.

### SAXON GOVERNMENT INVITES JEW TO LEIPSIG UNIVERSITY

Berlin, Jan. 6 .- The government of Saxony is negotiating with Professor Willstaetter, winner of the Nobel prize in chemistry, to accept the chair of chemistry at the University of Leipsig. it was learned today.

#### CHICAGO PRESS COMMENTS ON WILLS OF TWO RICH MEN

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 5 .- Much comment has been aroused in the Chicago press by the fact that the late Thomas Cusack, an Irishman, left \$50,000 to Chicago Jewish Charities, while William N. Eisendrath, who left an estate valued at \$1,000,000, \$35,000 of which was left to charity, among the institutions being the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the Art Institute, made no bequests to lewish charities.

## LITHUANIAN PREMIER NEGOTIATES FOR SUPPORT OF NATIONAL MINORITIES Minority Rights Will Be Safeguarded, He Promises; Jews Seek More Definite Assurances

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Jan. 6 .- An attempt to win the support of the deputies representing the national minorities in the Lithuanian parliament was made by Premier Valdemaras prior to the third reading of the government budget.

In negotiations with the leaders of the clubs of the Jewish, German and Polish deputies, the Premier declared that he always defended the rights of the national minorities in Lithuania and that it was he who signed the Paris declaration to the League of Na-tions on behalf of Lithuania, guaranteeing the protection of the national minorities. The Premier declared solminorities. The Premier declared sol-emily that he has not changed his opinion. The rights of the national minorities in Lithuania will be safeguarded by special laws independent of the attitude of the minorities toward the government, he said.

The national minorities deputies refrained from voting on the budget. Deputy Robinson, leader of the Jewish Club, stated that the Jewish deputies refrained from voting because of lack of information as to the future course of the government policy.

#### TWO CLASSES OF CITIZENS IN POLAND, SOVEREIGN POLES AND OTHERS, GRABSKI SAYS (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Lemberg, Jan. 6 .- Stanislaw Grabski, one of the leaders of the national democrats, former Minister of Educa-tion and one of the principals in the Polish Jewish agreement negotiations, charged the Galician Zionist leaders with the failure of the agreement, in an interview with the representative of

## AMERICAN REFORM RABBI STIRS LONDON JEWS WITH CHARGES AGAINST ORTHODOX Board of Deputies Censures Action, But Liberal Synagogue Expresses Confidence in Rabbi Mattuck

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) London, Jan. 6 .- The Liberal Jewish

Synagogue of London and the Board of Jewish Deputies are engaged in a controversy over the opinions of Rabbi Israel I. Mattuck, an American, graduate of the Hebrew Union College of Cincinnati, who is rabbi of the syna-

Rabbi Mattuck created a stir in Anglo-Jewish public opinion by an ar-Adjo-Jewish puone opinion by an ar-ticle published in "The Spectator" en-titled, "Liberal Judaism and the Mod-ern State." In that article, Rabbi Mattuck conveyed the impression that it was only with the advent of Liberal Judaism in England that the English lews have been made fit to discharge their duties as citizens of England. The Orthodox English Jews who have re-tained the old prayers for return to Palestine, he argued, are "inconsistent."

The article was discussed at a meeting of the Press Committee of the Board of Jewish Deputies and the Committee decided to send a letter to Dr. Mattuck pointing out that his article in "The Spectator" could be made use of as a weapon in the hands of anti-Semites, throwing doubt on the complete loyalty of the greater number of the Jews in England. Rabbi Mattuck replied to the Press Committee in the following terms:
"I have before me your letter of the

Stamford, Conn., Jan. 6.-At a meeting held on Monday evening, the Common Council of the City of Stamford which consists of a Mayor and nine Councilmen, none of whom are Jews, adopted a resolution of protest against the persecution of the Jews in Roumania. The resolution read:

"Whereas, the Roumanian Government has been instigating and permitting outrages upon the Jewish people of her land, denying to them justice and their due rights under her fundamental law and in violation of the obligations which she assumed under the Treaty which she assumed thater the freezy of 1919, guaranteeing the full enjoyment of civil, political, linguistic and religious liberty to all her inhabitants:

"Be It Hereby Resolved: "That we utter a solemn protest against the persecution of the Jewish people and other religious minorities in Roumania, and we call upon the Roumanian Government to live up to the obligations which she assumed under

the Treaty of 1919, guaranteeing the full enjoyment of civil, political, linguistic and religious liberty to all of her inhabitants." The action of the City Council followed a protest meeting held in Stam-ford on Sunday at the Hebrew Insti-

The representative of the Polish Government to the Jewish Colonization Conference held in Moscow last month, M. It was his opinion that it was the intention of the Soviet Government to enable Jews not only in Soviet Russia but from other countries also to settle on the land in South Russia Former Minister of Education, Prof.

Takes Issues with Kiwanis Club Figures on Religious Education

The report of the Kiwanis Club. claiming that only four out of twentyfour Jewish children in Manhattan get religious education, through Sunday School or equivalent registration, as against four out of five Catholic and against four out of five Catholic and four out of seven Protestant children, is challenged by the "Jewish Morning Journal." In its Jan. 6 issue the paper contends the Kiwanis figures are misleading, saying:

"We frequently hear the complaint that the Jews neglect the religious education of their children and various figures are brought forward to prove the assertion. But the difference be-tween Catholics and Jews cannot be so big. Every Jew who observes conditions about him knows that more than one out of six Jewish children receives some kind of religious training,

"If the investigators of the Kiwanis Club took into consideration only Sunday School registration, forgetting or ignoring the fact that Tews do not regard Sunday in the same way as Christians, then they are simply not justified in expressing an opinion on the subject. Jews have private religious education and schools which can hility of a systematic Jewish agricultural not be classified as Sunday Schools. A different criterion must be applied to the question of religious education among Jews, even if one knows the inner Jewish situation so little as not to realize that the training given in Jewish Sunday Schools is the least valuable of all. We confess that religious education is being greatly neglected among us, but such exaggera-tions as those of the Kiwanis Club report bring no good, and it is surely an injustice to put a large part of the population of New York in a bad light, even if the intentions are the best.

## New York Papers Urge Repeal of "National Origins" Clause The passage of Senator Shipstead's

The passage of Senator Shipsteau Shill for the repeal of the "hational origins" quotas is urged by the N. Y. "World" (Jan. 6). Enumerating the objections to the "national origins" clause, the paper concludes:

"This clause of the 1924 act was passed with hasty and inadequate debate, at a time when attention was centered upon Japanese exclusion. The happiest way of disposing of it till such time as we can undertake a gen-eral re-examination of the immigration question would be to pass Mr. Ship-stead's repeal bill."

The belief that the national origins quotas should not be enacted is voiced by the N. Y. "Herald-Tribune," in commenting on the report that the President is not expected to issue the proclamation which is requisite to the enforcement of the new quota system.
