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BESSARABIA-BUKOWINA JEWS HOPEFUL WHEN NEW HIGH COMMISSIONER IS APPOINTED

Anti-Semitic Excesses Cause Slump in Business; Christian Merchants Appeal for Pacifying Measures

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Jan. 7.—Hope for the cessation of the anti-Jewish excesses in Roumanian towns was felt by the Jewish population of Bessarabia and Bukovina, when it became known that a new high commissioner for these provinces was appointed, a despatch from Bucharest received here states.

At the recommendation of Prime Minister Averescu, the King appointed General Rischanu as the high commissioner of Bessarabia and Bukovina. Rischanu is known to be a friend of the Jews. In a communication addressed last year to the Union of Roumanian Jews in Bucharest, he expressed his condemnation of the student excesses.

The anti-Jewish excesses have had a bad effect on business conditions in Roumania. Minister Petrovici, during a visit in Jassy, received a delegation of Roumanian merchants, headed by the Christian Senator, Czerkes. The delegation complained to the Minister that due to the anti-Jewish excesses, business has suffered, because of the inability of the Jewish merchants to travel in the railway trains. The Minister promised to issue an ordinance providing that all trains be accompanied by special gendarmes to protect the passengers.

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT REFUSES TO RENEW CONCESSION TO JEWISH IMMIGRANTS

Willing to Admit Unmarried Brothers and Sisters of Residents

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Toronto, Can., Jan. 7.—The Canadian government has refused the request of the Jewish Immigrant Aid Society of Canada to renew the grant of a concession for a specified number of Jewish immigrants to the Dominion. The department declared that while it is unwilling to renew the concession it is ready to grant the privilege of Order in Council P. C. 534 to unmarried brothers and sisters of Canadian residents, and to children of residents. P. C. 534 allows admission provided the Minister of Immigration is satisfied that the labor of the prospective immigrant is required in Canada and that the relative resident in Canada has expressed willingness and shown ability to serve and care for such immigrants.

The Society had hoped to obtain this privilege also for married brothers and sisters. As to refugees, they will have to come in under the same provision. The department is ready only to waive the passport regulations with regard to refugees.

JEWISH RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS PROTEST TO ROUMANIAN FOREIGN MINISTER

American Jewish Congress Delegation Will Go to Washington This Week to Urge State Department Action on Anti-Jewish Excesses in Roumania

Washington, D. C., Jan. 7.—Rabbi Abram Simon made public today the text of the protest sent by Jewish religious organizations to the Roumanian Minister of Foreign Affairs.

The protest was sent on behalf of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, the Rabbinical Assembly of the United Synagogue of America, the Rabbinical Council of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, and the United Synagogue of America and the Synagogue Council of America.

The communication to the Roumanian Minister read:

"The Synagogue Council of America, representing six national organizations of Jewish Congregations and Rabbis in the United States, and speaking in the name of a million American Jewish citizens, solemnly protests against the excesses perpetrated in Kishineff and other Roumanian cities against the inoffensive Jewish population.

"In the name of humanity and justice it calls upon the Roumanian authorities to make impossible a repetition of similar outrages and to take determined action against all inciters to violence against the Jews of Roumania."

A delegation representing the American Jewish Congress and the organizations which cooperated in arranging last Sunday's protest meeting against Roumania, will go to Washington this week to present the resolutions adopted by that meeting to the Secretary of State, it was announced following a meeting of the Administrative Committee of the American Jewish Congress held Thursday evening.

CZAR NICHOLAS DELIGHTED IN ANTI-JEWISH POGROMS, LETTER TO MOTHER SHOWS

Moscow, Jan. 7.—New evidence that Nicholas II approved of the anti-Jewish pogroms committed during his reign was published today by the "Isvestia", the official organ of the Soviet government.

The newspaper publishes a series of newly found letters of Nicholas II to his mother. In one of the letters dated 1905, the Czar expresses his great satisfaction with and justification of the wave of anti-Jewish pogroms that took place in Russia in that year.

Dr. A. J. Rongy, Judge Gustave Hartman, Grandmaster of the Independent Order B'nai Abraham; Martin O. Levy, Grand Secretary of the Independent Order B'nai Shalom; Leo Wolfson, President of the United Roumanian Jews of America; Elihu D. Stone of Boston; Benjamin Timan, Bernard G. Richards and a representative to be designated by the Independent Order B'nai B'rith.

The resolution to be presented by the delegation declares that "we urge our State Department to take such action compatible with diplomatic dignity as will impress upon the Roumanian Government the desires of the American people for the just and humane treatment of all minority groups in Roumania, whether of Jewish or of Christian faith, and for the preservation of such a spirit of tolerance and conciliation as will promote friendly relations between Roumania and all enlightened peoples."

It is understood that the delegation will, during its stay in Washington, confer with influential political leaders with a view to deciding upon the necessary steps to be taken further to relieve the Jews in Roumania from persecution.

HOUSE COMMITTEE DELAYS ACTION ON WADSWORTH'S IMMIGRATION AMENDMENT

Further Hearings to Be Held; New Possibilities of Delay Seen

Washington, Jan. 7.—The House Immigration Committee, instead of taking action upon the Wadsworth amendment for admission of 35,000 wives and children of declarants, unexpectedly gave a hearing to three persons who appeared before the Committee. This hearing occupied the entire session and the committee adjourned without considering the relief legislation.

The next meeting of the committee will probably be held next week, but Chairman Johnson intimated that an opportunity will be given for further hearings on the bill. This develops a new possibility of delay hitherto unexpected as previously there had been no talk of holding any hearings. Another possibility of obstruction is seen in the disposition of Chairman Johnson to raise the point that the Wadsworth amendment alone will not grant sufficient relief and that a more comprehensive bill will have to be considered. A large proportion of the student body at Temple University are Jews.

The pledge of cooperation was given yesterday at a luncheon conference held at the Locust Club. The invitations to the luncheon had been prepared by Mr. Mastbaum. The work was taken up by Albert M. Greenfield who presided at the luncheon.

The \$5,000,000 sum is part of a \$20,000,000 endowment fund to be raised nationally.

Associated with Mr. Greenfield in arranging the luncheon conference were Dr. Cyrus Adler, President of Dropsie College and the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, Judge Horace Stern, President of the Federation of Jewish Charities, Samuel S. Fels and Jacob D. Lit.

Jewish "Men of Vision"

The assertion that the Jews outdo all other groups in New York in respect to the volume of publicity matter submitted to newspapers is made in the "American Mercury" of January by Stanley Walker, in an article entitled: "Men of Vision," which discusses the rapidly developing activities of the press agent in the social and political life of America and especially of New York.

"Of all the sects," we read, "which lattle and sweat for publicity in New York, the Jews are the most insatiable. There are 2,000,000 of them in the city, and their endless enterprises pour out a vast and terrifying flood of press matter, much of which gets into print. The bulk of it, however, merely adds to the work of the Irish charwomen who have dedicated their lives to keep the newspaper offices free from litter. It is probable that more press material comes from the Jewish organizations in New York than from all other sources combined. The job never has been turned over to a competent statistician, but it seems reasonable to estimate that if all the paper consumed by their press agents could be sold for its junk value alone, enough money would be raised to rebuild the Temple of Solomon, with modern plumbing throughout, and furnish every house in the Holy Land with a new wine-press and a carload of matzoths."

"The Jew is both ambitious and sentimental, and upon these two traits the press agent plays for his own profit."

FELIX M. WARBURG SAILS ON WORLD CRUISE Will Visit Palestine and Russia En Route

Mr. and Mrs. Felix M. Warburg, James H. Becker of Chicago, and Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lehman, left on the steamer "Resolute" for a world cruise. In the course of their journey they will visit Palestine and Russia. Dr. Chaim Weizmann was among the many friends who were at the pier to bid bon voyage to Mr. Warburg.

A new form of bon voyage was extended to Percy S. Straus when he sailed on the steamer "Bianca Mone". Mrs. Isaac Kubie, associate chairman of the Women's Division of the New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, conceived the idea of sending a contribution to the Federation, instead of the usual farewell token of flowers. Mr. Straus is chairman of the Business Men's Council of the Federation.

Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Board of the Federation and Arthur Lehman, associate chairman of the board, were also honored by contributions to the newly-created "bon voyage fund" when they sailed.

Raise the cry, 'Fifteen Million Jews Are Starving in Poland!' and the Chosen People begin shelling out instantly, coaxed on by professional campaign managers. The vanity of individuals is also a source of profit to press agents. All manner of Jewish "success" blubs comes to the newspapers. There is a Jewish real estate dealer who, every time he buys a new building, announces that he once sold newspapers on that very corner. If his press agent is to be believed, he has sold papers on every street corner from Grand Street to Columbus Circle.

"Some Jews are hot for the back-to-Palestine movement; others have no more desire to go back to Palestine than they have to work as teamsters in Death Valley. Such differences of opinion create many jobs for press agents. Meanwhile, despite their diversity of views, the New York Jews build hospitals, support a multitude of philanthropies, and aid their unfortunate brethren throughout the world. Thus a large part of Jewish publicity matter is in support of eminently worthy enterprises. But, in general, its bulk and persistence make it a nuisance to editors."

The Decision of the Appellate Court on Religious Instruction

The decision of the Appellate Court, Third Department, upholding the constitutionality of the law permitting religious instruction of public school pupils one hour each week within school time but outside of school buildings, is deplored by the "Day," which feels that the law constitutes a violation of the principle of separation between church and state. The paper sees the situation thus:

"The teacher will now have to record the religious affiliations of his pupils. This will be included on the regular school records or in a separate card system. Thus religion will become a topic at school to be discussed and recorded, and a new relationship will be established between pupil and teacher. No matter how objective a teacher may be toward his pupils in other respects he will be bound to have a different attitude to the pupil of certain religions or of no religion. Religion will, in this way, be forced upon the consciousness of the children at the time and in the place where the subject of religion should not be touched. Moreover, the priest, the minister and the rabbi will come to the school in order to pick out the pupils of his flock. This in itself will give the church an entering wedge into the school. The clergyman will become the chaplain of the school."

"An appeal from the decision of the Appellate Court will be made. Whether the law is constitutional or not—it is a bad law and constitutes the first wedge of the church into the American school."

CZECHO-SLOVAKIAN PUBLIC ORPHAN WORK JOINED WITH J. D. C. CHILD CARE

President Masaryk's Daughter Promotes Union in Which American Jewish Welfare Service Sets National Standard, James N. Rosenberg Reports

A tribute to American methods in child care is reflected in the recent joining of the public nonsectarian work for orphans in Czecho-Slovakia with the Joint Distribution Committee child care work in that country. The step was taken at the request of the daughter of President Masaryk, who is the head of the organization under whose auspices the national work for orphans is conducted, and which is known as the Masaryk League.

This development is reported by James N. Rosenberg of New York, vice-chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, in an account of his observations of the results accomplished by the Joint Distribution Committee activities in the various countries which he visited while on a recent tour abroad. The statement as transmitted to the officers of the Joint Distribution Committee has just been made public by the United Jewish Campaign.

The work in Czecho-Slovakia is instanced as showing how America is setting an example in child welfare service in all the countries of Eastern Europe. The uniting of the national non-sectarian work, which is subventioned by the government, with that of the Joint Distribution Committee, makes for the greater effectiveness of both, by giving the benefit of American training and organization standards to the native workers on the one hand, and bringing the Committee's work into direct alliance with the government on the other.

In the various districts of Czecho-Slovakia at present close to 1,000 children are being maintained in homes and under institutional care with Joint Distribution Committee funds. The cost to the committee for supporting these children is \$3 per month per child.

SENATE ASKS FOR DATA ON NATIONAL ORIGINS QUOTA

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Jan. 7.—President Coolidge was requested in a resolution adopted yesterday by the Senate to transmit the report of the Secretaries of State, Commerce and Labor on the new immigrant quotas based on national origins.

In the House, Representative Douglas, Democrat, of Massachusetts, who holds that the new quota arrangement would discriminate particularly against Ireland and Germany, introduced a resolution calling for similar data.

This low cost is made possible by the fact that the balance of the needs for the work are provided by the Jews of Czecho-Slovakia themselves and by the government.

The administrative expenses of the J. D. C. child care work in Czecho-Slovakia, Mr. Rosenberg reports, are "just exactly zero." The organization does not have a single paid inspector, because the work is managed by local committees whose personnel is made up of the leaders of the Jewish communities in all the cities and towns, who give their services without expense of any kind.

FORD EVADES REPLY TO BLOOM'S CHALLENGE

The evasive methods employed by Henry Ford with regard to his anti-Jewish charges were further illustrated when Congressman Sol Bloom made public the reply he received to his first letter to Henry Ford, urging the Detroit manufacturer to produce proof of his charge that the United States Federal Reserve System is under international control.

Congressman Bloom did not receive a reply directly from Henry Ford, but is in receipt of a letter from W. J. Cameron of the editorial department of the "Dearborn Independent." Mr. Cameron's letter read in full:

"This is to say that your letter of December 23rd has been received and its contents noted. We thoroughly agree with you that 'our government's finances should be entirely free from any vestige of alien domination, regardless of individualities, of race, country, creed, group or any other affiliations.'"

On receipt of this letter, Congressman Bloom directed another letter to Ford, quoting therein the communication from Mr. Cameron.

"This is not an answer to my letter," Mr. Bloom wrote, "still less an answer from you. While appreciating Mr. Cameron's courtesy, what I asked is your proof that the Federal Reserve system is internationally controlled, as you charge.

"I am aware that the 'Dearborn Independent' is published under your auspices but it is quite without standing except as your mouthpiece. I am unable to secure copies of it in Washington from any source other than a few beneficiaries of its free list, and from the Congressional Library. I am aware also that much of the printed matter which appears with your ostensible indorsement is quite new to you when officially called to your attention.

"For example, you will recall your testimony at the trial of your suit against the 'Chicago Tribune' for referring to you as an anarchist, because of the pamphlet, 'Peace versus War,' alleged to have been written for you by your publicity agent, Theodore Delavigne. When questioned concerning one of the pamphlet's assertions, did you not answer, 'Delavigne didn't show it to me?' As to another, did you not re-

AGRICULTURAL SCHOOLS TO BE ESTABLISHED IN PALESTINE BY KADOORIE FUND

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Jerusalem, Dec. 15.—The government has now definitely approved the scheme for establishing two agricultural schools, one Jewish and one Arabic, out of the funds bequeathed by the late Sir Ellis Kadoorie for the advancement of education in Palestine. Negotiations are now in progress between the Zionist Executive and the Government regarding the site of the Jewish School.

The late Sir Ellis Kadoorie bequeathed one-third of his estate to the British government to be spent by it on the provision of schools in Palestine or Mesopotamia. Although several of the bequests of the will were for institutions for the benefit of Jews, an official Government statement has explained, no such provision was made with respect to this particular gift. The British Government has accepted the bequest and has decided that the funds which are likely to amount to a sum in the neighborhood of £100,000 are to be spent in Palestine. In view of the terms of the will the Government has not felt itself justified in limiting the expenditure to schools for the Jewish population.

The Palestine Jews protested against this decision of the Government, contending that the legacy was left by a Jew for the purpose of assisting the development of Jewish national culture in Palestine. After Colonel Kisch, the head of the Palestine Zionist Executive and Dr. Lurie, the head of the Education Department of the Zionist Organization, had interviewed the Government, it was decided that instead of establishing, as had been intended, a mixed school available for the whole of the population of Palestine, two separate schools should be founded—one for Jews and the other for Arabs.

The Colonial Office later decided that the schools should be agricultural schools, not High Schools. The Arab School will be at Tulkeram.

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BREVITIES

The Society for Jewish Culture, 1 Union Square, New York, has called a conference of leading Jewish artists for Saturday evening, January 8th, at the Hotel Pennsylvania. The purpose of the conference is to arrange for an exhibition of the works of the artists, under the auspices of the Society. It is planned to make this a travelling exhibition to be displayed in a number of cities throughout the country.

The International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union and the Merchant Ladies' Garment Association, representing the jobbers controlling 75 per cent of the industry, agreed yesterday on the draft of a contract to replace the one which expired previous to the recent strike. The draft was drawn up at a conference at the office of Samuel Blumberg, counsel for the jobbers. Representing the jobbers were Joseph Engel, president of the jobbers' association, and Mr. Blumberg. Representatives of the union were Morris Sigman, president of the I. L. G. W. U.; Salvatore Nimo, vice-president, and Miris Hilkuit, attorney.

The contract provides for renewal of the old agreement obligating the jobbers to have their work done in union shops only and includes a provision intended to strengthen the responsibility of the jobbers for union standards. The new agreement the garment industry will be more 100 per cent unionized. Charles Zimmerman, Communist member of the deposed joint board, issued a statement that his organization would not recognize any agreement between the International and the dress jobbers and manufacturers.

A step toward replacing the tenements of New York's congested area with modern apartment dwellings has been taken, according to an announcement by Alexander M. Bing, President of the City Housing Corporation. Mr. Bing said the corporation had asked brokers to find and purchase a suitable block, either on the lower west side or, preferably, on the lower east side.

The plan is to replace the present dingy structures with buildings of five or six stories, the approximate cost to be \$2,500,000. The corporation's plans are in response to the program of the State Housing Board.

Valued at more than \$200,000, a painting by Antonio Vandy Dook, purchased recently by Jacob Epstein, Baltimore philanthropist, has been placed on view in the Baltimore Museum of Art. The picture was brought from the art collection of the Duke of Newcastle, of Clumber Park, Nottinghamshire, England. The canvas is entitled "Rinaldo and Armida."

Miss Florence N. Levy has resigned as director of the Baltimore Museum of Art after four years of service.

During the directorship of Miss Levy, approximately 131,000 persons visited the galleries and 423 pieces of art have been acquired by purchase or gift. Miss Levy was the first director of the museum, which began to function in February, 1923.

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ACHAD HA'AM'S DEATH IS MOURNED BY JEWS IN WARSAW AND PARIS

Warsaw, Jan. 7.—The memory of Achad Ha'am, the late Hebrew philosopher who died in Tel Aviv on Sunday, was honored at a meeting of the Executive of the Warsaw Kehillah. The Orthodox member of the Kehillah Council refrained from attending the memorial meeting.

Memorial meetings were arranged by the Association of Jewish Writers and Journalists and by the Hitachduth. Memorial services were also held in the Great Synagogue on Tlomackie Street and in other synagogues.

Paris, Jan. 7.—A message of condolence to the family of Achad Ha'am was despatched by the Russian Jewish community here. The message, which was signed by Baron de Gunzbourg, M. Douby and Heinrich Sliosberg, stated the loss of the star on the Jewish spiritual horizon is deplored and the survivors are left in profound mourning.

Forty-five thousand dollars to cover the mortgage on the synagogue of the Holy Blossom Congregation of Toronto, Canada, was raised on the occasion of the seventieth anniversary of the congregation celebrated last week.

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SCHWARTZBARD KIN SHOW DOCUMENTS OF FAMILY'S SUFFERINGS UNDER PETLURA

Moscow, Jan. 7.—New documents for the Paris court which will try Sholom Schwartzbard, slayer of Petlura, were forwarded by the Schwartzbard family living in Odessa.

The thirty-five documents forwarded through official channels reveal the fact that more than ten households of the Schwartzbard family perished or otherwise suffered from the pogroms during the Petlura regime. Many of the Schwartzbard family were killed, wounded and robbed, and the women violated.

The documents concern only six branches of the Schwartzbard family who suffered most, living in Balta, Goloskov, Krivoye-Oziro, Tchwdnik and Savron.

House Committee Delays Action on Wadsworth's Amendment

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Wadsworth amendment. He protested against the admission of additional aliens to America on the ground that they do not become sufficiently Americanized. He described conditions in the large areas of alien population of Philadelphia. Two representatives of the Canadian Club of Boston requested the Committee to adopt legislation to enable the naturalization of aliens admitted from Canada where immigration officials often fail to keep official records of entry and render it impossible for applicants for citizenship to obtain certificates of arrival.

Only one class of entering students will be admitted to the Hebrew Union College School for Teachers in New York City for the coming Spring Semester of 1927, owing to the overcrowded condition of the School caused by the exceptionally large registration in the Fall.

The class will be limited to fifty students and will meet on Tuesday and Thursday nights. Registration will begin on January 13th.

Registration will be at the Administrative office of the School, 140 West 42nd Street, and Temple Emanu-El, 5th Avenue and 43rd Street, New York.

The School offers a two years course of study leading to a certificate of qualification to teach in the Reform Religious Schools of New York City and its vicinity.

The School also announced that the popular "Jewish Educational Forums," which was begun last year will be continued this year, commencing February 3th.

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
