## LEAGUE ACKNOWLEDGES WARSAW KEHILLAH PROTEST AT ROUMANIAN EXCESSES

Colban, Head of League Minorities Department, Expected in Warsaw  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Jan. 10.—The protest against the anti-Jewish excesses in Roumania, addressed by the Kehillah Counsel of Warsaw, to the League of Nations was acknowledged by Eric Colban, head of the National Minorities Department of the League.

Mr. Colban is expected to arrive in Warsaw shortly for the purpose of studying the situation of the national minorities.

It was stated today that the Club of Jewish Deputies intends to ask Mr. Colban for an explanation of his recent reply to the protest of the Club of Jewish Deputies concerning the anti-Jewish excesses in Roumania. In the reply to the Club, the department declared that it was unable to accept the protest because of the sharp tone in which it was couched.

## JEWS ARE STATE BUILDING ELEMENT, FRENCH HIGH COMMISSIONER ASSERTS

Jerusalem, Jan. 10.—That the Jews in Syria are a state building element was the opinion expressed by M. Ponsot, French High Commissioner of Syria.

During his farewell visit to Damascus, M. Ponsot received a delegation of Jews which complained to him that Syrian Jews are not admitted to government positions. The High Commissioner promised the delegation to consider the question favorably as he did concerning the same question in Tunis and Morocco.

## HUNGARIAN ACADEMY OF SCIENCE MAKES GIFT TO HEBREW UNIVERSITY

Budapest, Jan. 10.—A gift of 500 volumes to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem was made by the Academy of Science, it was learned here today.

The gift was made on the representation of Professor Heller and Bela Szekely, delegate of the Jewish National Fund in Hungary.

The gift includes many publications of the Academy on Oriental languages.

## DR. HEVESI NAMED CHIEF RABBI IN BUDAPEST

Budapest, Jan. 10.—The title of Chief Rabbi was conferred upon Rabbi Joseph Hevesi, by a decision of the Budapest Kehillah. Rabbi Hevesi recently was mentioned as candidate for the senate as one of the two Jewish representatives. He was defeated in the elections.

## HOUSTON CHAMBERLAIN, BITTER FOE OF JEWS AND BRITISH RENEGADE, DIES

Germanized Englishman Formulated  
Theory of Racial Anti-Semitism

Berlin, Jan. 10.—Houston Stewart Chamberlain, Germanized Englishman, theoretician and advocate of racial anti-Semitism, died in Bairuth, Bavaria, on Sunday at the age of 71.

Chamberlain, who was the scion of a distinguished English family, exercised a great influence in the German anti-Semitic movement. He was encouraged and often quoted by ex-kaiser Wilhelm, in his glorification of the German race and his putting forward the theory of the superiority of the Nordics and the inferiority of the Semites. The renegade Englishman inflamed Germans to anti-Semitism in his book, "Grundlagen des Neunzehnten Jahrhunderts" published in 1899. This book found wide circulation and his admirers declared him to be the greatest German figure since Kant and Schopenhauer.

On the outbreak of the war, Chamberlain espoused with enthusiasm the cause of his country's enemies, and in April 1915, it was announced that he had received the Iron Cross. He was the son-in-law of Richard Wagner.

## OPTIMISTIC VIEW OF JEWISH COMMUNIST LEADERS NOT SHARED BY LOCAL LEADERS

Moscow, Jan. 10.—The optimistic reports submitted to the conference of Jewish sections of the Communist party in session here were not corroborated by the detailed report of the provincial delegates. The secretaries of the local sections, who reported on the situation in the provincial towns were in direct contradiction to the report of Tchemerskiy.

The local authorities are often interfering with the educational activities of the Jewish sections, they stated. The number of Yeshivahs is growing, they reported.

The enactment of a new law depriving artisans who employ assistants of the right to participate in the elections, is reported to have made a bad impression upon the Jewish artisans. It is believed that this limitation may cause them economic hardships.

## ORTHODOX JEWESS IS FIRST WOMAN JUDGE IN GERMANY

Berlin, Jan. 10.—The first woman to hold the position of Judge in Germany is Dr. Hedwig Frank. Madam Frank, who is a judge in the Frankfurt Oberland Gericht, is highly praised by the German press. She is an Orthodox Jewess.

## SOLOMON BLOOMGARDEN (YEHOASH), NOTED JEWISH POET, DIES AT AGE OF 56

Was Among First to Introduce Modern  
Style into Yiddish Literature

Solomon Bloomgarten, famous Jewish poet, known under the nom de plume of Yehoash, died suddenly yesterday morning at his home in New York City, at the age of 56.

With the death of Yehoash, an outstanding figure of Yiddish literature has passed. He was the author of numerous poems, fables and dramatic sketches of present-day Jewish life and on historical subjects. He translated into Yiddish Longfellow's "Hiawatha" and was one of the few Jewish poets who introduced into Yiddish literature the modern style under the influence of the American and European modern school. His last work was the translation into Yiddish of the Pentateuch, the five books of Moses and the Prophets. The translation, which was rendered in a beautiful Yiddish, was a result of long years of research and literary efforts.

Yehoash was born in 1870 in Wierzbolow, government of Suwalki, Russian Poland. He received a thorough Jewish education, having studied Talmud until the age of 13, when he came under the influence of the Hebraic Haskalah literature. In 1885 he went to the Talmudic Academy of Wolojin. He soon left the academy to take up the study of foreign languages and started to publish Yiddish poems in the Yiddish Bibliotekue, which was published in Warsaw under the editorship

## POLISH FOREIGN MINISTER SEES DIFFICULTIES IN NATIONAL HOME IDEA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Jan. 10.—The rebuilding of Palestine as the Jewish National Home encounters not only financial and political difficulties but also philosophic obstacles.

This opinion was expressed by the Polish Foreign Minister, Zaleski, in a press interview given in connection with the arrival of Sir Wyndham Deedes, former civil secretary of the Palestine government, who is in this country in the interests of the Keren Hayesod. Sir Wyndham was honored by Polish government officials on his arrival here.

The Jewish people are faced with a difficult task which is not only of a practical, but also of a theoretical nature. Palestine does not give the Jews the opportunity to create a fatherland for the entire nation. The Jews must therefore find such a philosophic conception which would enable them to combine the idea of loyalty to their own country, Palestine, with the idea of the same loyalty to the country where they are domiciled, Minister Zaleski declared.

Sir Wyndham Deedes visited the farm in Warsaw where the chulutzim are being trained for agricultural work in Palestine. He also visited the Hebrew Tarbut schools and the Maccabee sport society, of which he was made an honorary member. Sir Wyndham was greeted on his arrival in Lemberg by the British consul and representatives of Jewish organizations. A mass meeting took place in the Palace theatre in the evening and a reception was given by Dr. Leon Reich, at which government representatives were present.

Adolph and Joseph Deutsch have announced that they have acquired an eight-year lease on ten square blocks of vacant land, owned by the New York Central, near Southern Boulevard at 142nd Street. The Deutschs would offer it to the government shortly for use as an airport for mail and possibly passenger service for New York City. The lease for the land will approximate \$33,000 a year and total \$240,000.

## DIGEST OF PUBLIC OPINION ON JEWISH MATTERS

### "Publicity — Modern Disease"

The unprecedented growth in recent years of publicity activities in Jewish organizations and by Jewish individuals is deplored in the "Day," in an article from the pen of Dr. K. Fornberg. Dr. Fornberg, writing under the caption, "Publicity—A Disease," comments on the assertion made in the "American Mercury," by Stanley Walker, night city editor of the "Herald-Tribune," that "of all the sects in New York that bat and sweat for publicity the Jews are the most insatiable," flooding the newspaper editors' desks with more publicity matter than any other group.

Referring to various religious, social and philanthropic Jewish organizations which maintain publicity agents and where, according to him, the work is frequently duplicated, Dr. Fornberg says:

"The harm which this publicity disease causes to our good name, and even the resulting dullening of interest in Jewish news among the editors of the general press, is small compared to the great moral and spiritual injury which this causes in the inner communal life of the Jews. Have you ever stopped to consider the remarkable phenomenon, that precisely in our day of the greatest publicity in Jewish social life, when all the horde of publicity agents are constantly trumpeting forth and exaggerating and coloring the deeds of every 'communal worker', that precisely in this day no great leaders are rising up?"

"Is this too free use of publicity a result of the cramping and ignoring of real leader-types among us, or is it one of the causes of this indubitable phenomenon? This we shall not undertake to answer. Most likely, it is a mutual process: the lighter the inner ballast the easier to rise into the air, to

the 'street.' And, moreover, the more popular the communal work is made through artificial publicity, the easier for elements of the second and third category to be attracted to it. But one thing is certain: it is a morbid and injurious phenomenon and it is certainly deplorable to see that things have reached a point where the non-Jews have begun to protest. Something must be done about it.

"There is much talk lately about centralization and coordination of our community efforts. Indeed the time has arrived for restricting and centralizing publicity too. A dam must be erected against the Jewish-communal publicity flood," Dr. Fornberg urges.

### Mistake of Publicity Agent of Institute of Jewish Religion Corrected

Dr. Z. Diesendruck, Professor of Hebrew Literature and Philosophy at the Institute of Jewish Religion, publishes a letter in the "Hadoar" in which he declares that the "Jewish Daily Bulletin" has misquoted him in a recent issue with regard to a statement he had given to a "certain newspaperman."

The "Jewish Daily Bulletin" has indeed received a letter from the Institute of Jewish Religion declaring that the statement of Dr. Diesendruck as given in the "Bulletin" was wrong in practically every detail. The editor of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin" informed the Institute that he would be willing to print this letter, provided the Institute made it clear that the mistake had been committed not by the "Bulletin," but by the Institute of Jewish Religion as the statement was not given to a representative of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin" or any other newspaperman, but to a publicity agent who is in the employ of the Institute. The "Jewish Daily Bulletin" on the authority of the Institute of Jewish Religion, published the original statement in full as submitted, in the belief that the facts were correct. The request of the "Bulletin" to the Institute for a correction in which the blame was placed on the person responsible and not on the "Bulletin" has not been complied with.

The "Jewish Daily Bulletin" is informed:

1. No report was submitted by Dr. Diesendruck to Dr. Lee K. Frankel, who is no longer active as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Institute of Religion;

2. This "report" was merely a statement made by Dr. Diesendruck to the publicity agent of the Institute of Jewish Religion;

3. The publicity agent totally misinterpreted Dr. Diesendruck in quoting him as saying: (a) Throughout the world, wherever there is a Hebrew philosopher or writer who reacts to modern life, one hears of Whitman. "Leaves of Grass" is particularly known and its style has affected the styles of dozens of the younger Hebrew writers, whether it be in Poland, Palestine or Germany. (b) that Dr. Diesendruck advocated a course on John Dewey at the

### VIENNA JEWISH EDITOR HONORED ON BIRTHDAY

Vienna, Jan. 10.—The sixtieth birthday of Jacob Krauss, well-known writer and linguist, was celebrated here today.

Mr. Krauss is editor-in-chief of the "Wiener Morgenzeitung." He is the author of "Martyrium," a book in which the anti-Jewish pogroms in Poland and Hungary at the close of the War, are described.

### MACK ESTABLISHES MARSHALL FUND AT JEWISH INSTITUTE

A fund in honor of the seventieth birthday of Louis Marshall has been established at the Jewish Institute of Religion by Judge Julian W. Mack and Mrs. Mack. It was announced yesterday.

A substantial prize will be awarded each year from the fund to the writer of the best essay on some phase of Jewish education.

## ALLIANCE ISRAELITE DESCRIBES EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES IN ORIENT

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)  
Paris, Dec. 28.—The educational activities of the Alliance Israelite Universelle in the Orient were described at the annual session of the Central Committee of the Alliance Israelite Universelle held here.

"Our school work continues to develop in Palestine, Syria and Mesopotamia," the report states. "Our resources are insufficient; increased, we certainly could double the number of students everywhere."

"In Persia, results gained in our schools in Teheran, Ispahan, Hamadan and Kirmancha are the same results as formerly produced in Constantinople, Smyrna and Andrinople. Jewish Persian communities plead to have us, endow Alliance schools. For this, both resources and personnel are lacking. We have encouraged spontaneous local efforts and allowed a limited credit in Yezd, Bourghuerd, Golpaygan, which are visited and controlled by our directors, until such time as we can send our professors. Persian communities, despite their poverty, are making important sacrifices so as to have schools. The Jewish population in Persia hardly totals more than 50,000 souls, scattered in about 30 localities, ten of which boast between 1,000 to 3,000 souls. Our efforts must henceforth be confined to these latter."

"Before the war, we subsidized a number of schools in Mesopotamia, in and about Bagdad: in Bassorah, Amara, Hanekin, Hille, Kerkouk, Suleimanie and Mossoul. Contacts were broken by the war which placed this region under English mandate or proterocare. The problem here is not so much economic as political."

"It is particularly in Morocco, the report continues, that our efforts have succeeded. Construction of new large school centers in Fez and Casablanca will double and even triple the number of students here; the intended building of schools in other localities will secure similar results. Additional teachers are necessary. All of the sixteen graduated teachers of our Normal Schools in Paris had to be sent to Morocco. Some of them function in the interior, amid

Hebrew University and that he planned to translate Professor Dewey's book into Hebrew, and (c) that a volume of Plato, which Dr. Diesendruck translated into Hebrew, has sold more than two thousand copies in one year in the United States, which is an unprecedented sales record for Hebrew books of that type.

These statements were incorrect. Dr. Diesendruck merely stated to the publicity agent of the Jewish Institute of Religion, we understand, that Walt Whitman's "Leaves of Grass" is known in Hebrew and has influenced some modern Hebrew poets, that he merely regretted that Dewey is not as widely known among Hebrew writers as he should be, and that his Hebrew translation of Plato has sold 2,000 copies altogether since its publication.

## "MEN ARE HONEST," NEW YORK JEWISH FREE LOAN SOCIETY'S EXPERIENCE

One-sixth of One Percent Losses During Year; Altruistic Loan Societies Spring Up Throughout Country

The sum of \$18,028.284 has been loaned by the Hebrew Free Loan Society to 465,000 persons since the inception of the Society, Julius J. Dukas, for twenty-two years president, announced at the thirty-fifth annual meeting of the Society, held Sunday at its main office, 108 Second Avenue, New York City.

These loans have been made within an average time of 48 hours after receipt of the applications and more than 96 per cent have been paid back by the borrowers themselves, rather than the endorsers, with losses during the past year of only one sixth of one per cent, Mr. Dukas reported. "Most men are honest and will pay their debts if afforded the opportunity to earn money with which to repay their obligations," he declared.

As a result of the success and example of the New York Society, Mr. Dukas pointed out that Jewish free loan societies have sprung up throughout the country until now there is scarcely a city without one. He further emphasized the fact that not a dollar of loanable capital has been lost to the society in its thirty-five years of existence and that this capital, now amounting to \$402,527.89 was loaned out approximately three times over within the past year, the total loans made to 11,769 persons, aggregating \$1,221,680 in 1926. The Society's capital was, however, insufficient to the demands upon it and in order not to turn away worthy applicants some \$55,000 on which the Society had to pay interest, was borrowed from the banks in order to re-loan it without interest to applicants.

Mr. Dukas made the statement that the size of the average loan is constantly mounting and now approximates \$100 whereas a few years ago loans of \$5 and \$10 constituted the majority of the applications. The maximum loan authorized by the Society's by-laws is now \$500.

## INTERNATIONAL UNION WILL ISSUE MINORITIES ORGAN

Prague, Jan. 10.—The International Union of League of Nations Societies has decided to publish a periodical to be the official organ of the national minorities. Sir W. Dickson will be editor of the publication, which has for its purpose the shedding of light on the problems of the national minorities and to give expression to their complaints.

## HOLD MEMORIAL MEETING TO ACHAD HA'AM IN BERLIN

Berlin, Jan. 10.—A large memorial meeting in honor of the late Hebrew writer, Achad Ha'am, took place here Saturday night. Martin Buber, Dr. Simon Dubnow, Dr. Guttman and Dr. Jacob Klatzkin eulogized the late philosopher, terming him "the Maimonides of our age."

## ZIONIST EXECUTIVE REPORTS ON MEASURES TO RELIEVE PALESTINE UNEMPLOYMENT

Jerusalem, Dec. 19.—The Labor Department of the Palestine Zionist Executive has issued a statement with regard to the activities of the Executive in the present labor and unemployment situation.

Mr. Sprinzak, head of the Labor Department, it is stated, urged upon the General Council which met in London last summer the necessity of allocating £76,000 over the regular labor budget in order that there might be available a surplus from which loans might be made for public works to municipalities, village councils and colonizing agencies.

The General Council voted a labor budget of £60,000 at the same time, instructing the Executive "to secure by means of a loan the necessary funds for the execution of public works by the Labor Department in order to enable it to carry through its program and to relieve unemployment."

Both while in London and previously Mr. Sprinzak endeavored to persuade various institutions to undertake works which would ease the economic situation in Palestine. A program accepted by the Executive included a grant of £50,000 in the form of loans, for public works in Tel-Aviv, Haifa, Jerusalem, Tiberias and some of the Jewish villages. An additional £30,000 was to be set aside for irrigation in the Valley of Jezreel, £25,000 for drainage and reclamation works, £100,000 as an advance to the Mortgage Bank on account of funds anticipated to be raised in America and £75,000 to enlarge the Industrial Bank. Aside from these proposed works, a grant was asked for the Agricultural Colonization Department of the Executive to extend the scope of the new colonization and to bring hundreds of additional Jewish laborers on the land.

Immediate steps were taken toward the realization of this program, insofar as available capital permitted, in an effort to alleviate unemployment and to check emigration. Parts of the program have actually been carried out. A loan of £15,000 was granted to the Municipality of Tel-Aviv for road building, etc. £1950 to Jewish suburbs in Jerusalem and Haifa, in addition to £10,000 to the Haifa Bay Development Company for drainage operation.

A special committee has been appointed by the Labor Department to inquire into the possibility of transferring laboring families from towns to the villages, as well as artisans from Tel-Aviv to various agricultural points.

The Palestine Zionist Executive also took steps which led to the Government decision to commence the building of the road between Tel-Aviv and Petach-Tikvah.

Small loans paid unemployed Jewish workers in various places were recently abolished and replaced by assignments of work, a step which obliged the Executive to double the amount previously designated for the unemployed but which gives unemployment relief a constructive character.

With regard to the proposals for unemployment relief put forward by the

a still ignorant population: Settat, Ouezzan Taourirt, Boujad. In such backward regions our work is specially needed.

"Our thirty-two schools in Morocco total around 7,500 students; those of Palestine, 2,400; of Syria, 2,300; of Mesopotamia, 3,800; of Tunis, 3,300; of Persia, 2,800; of Greece, 3,000. There are other groups in Egypt, Bulgaria, etc. The total is around 35,000 children. In many of these schools, we have established centers for relieving hunger among the poor, through the endowment of a budget of more than 100,000 francs.

"Extra-school activities, for boys and girls, embrace the teaching of manual trades.

"Our professional school in Jerusalem totals 70 apprentices, or whom 30 live there. Orders are being received despite the actual economic crisis. Vacancies here are ardently sought.

"Under the excellent direction of Mr. Graus, our farm school in Jaffa enters a period of prosperity. It has 180 resident students, more than half of them the children of colonists established in Palestine. An important addition of youths has recently been received; their parents are still in Poland, and pay something toward the cost of instruction. Expenses notwithstanding are high; each student costs £E32 annually, or nearly \$,000 francs.

"We must call attention to the increased costs of administration due to the exchange and the high cost of living. Adjustment has to be made to professors in Mesopotamia, Persia, Syria, Palestine, Egypt and Spanish Morocco. Increased expenses has failed to tally with any proportionate increase of revenue. In spite of this serious situation, many new projects have been undertaken.

"Expenses are reduced to a minimum and we must sensibly face the actual situation without understating present difficulties, but with the hope of economic readjustment which will permit us to extend our radius of activity without any preoccupations other than those of the good we have undertaken," the report states.

## ORTHODOX JEWS PLAN JEWISH HALL OF FAME

Plans for a Jewish Hall of Fame to be established in connection with the Rabbi Hillel (Philip) Klein Foundation were outlined at the first session of the memorial meeting held in honor of the late Dr. and Mrs. Klein at the synagogue of the First Hungarian Congregation Ohab Zedek, 18 West 116th Street, of which Dr. Klein was the rabbi for nearly thirty-six years.

Resolutions adopted at the meeting provide for a permanent committee to insure the fulfillment of the plans for the Rabbi Hillel Klein Foundation. The Hillel Klein Foundation is to sponsor the erection of a memorial wing to the building of the Yeshiva College in New York City.

of J. L. Peretz. He emigrated to the United States in 1890 where, for want of faith in his literary ability, he engaged at first in business. In 1900 he was taken sick with tuberculosis and went to Denver, Colorado, where he resumed his literary activities.

Among his poems the best known are the "Jewish Legends," with which he became one of the staunchest representatives of the romantic school in Yiddish literature. His ballads were written in a particularly fascinating traditional tone and are an outstanding contribution to Yiddish literature. His "Journey to Palestine" was translated into English and published by the Jewish Publication Society under the title "The Feet of the Messenger." He was a member of the editorial staff of the "Day" where his translation of the Bible is now being published.

The funeral will be held on Wednesday. Arrangements for the rites have not yet been completed.

Dedicatory ceremonies were held Sunday afternoon by the United Jewish Aid Societies in their new quarters, the former Laura Berman Memorial Building, at Lewis and Myrtle Avenues, Brooklyn, N. Y.

Representative Emanuel Celler, President of the organization, was Chairman. Among the speakers were Supreme Court Justice Mitchell W. Brandeis, the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities; City Court Judge Alexander H. Geismar; Aaron W. Levy, Bird S. Coler, Commissioner of Welfare; Rabbi Louis D. Gross and Rabbi Samuel Levinthal.

Samuel Rabinovitch, executive director of the societies, announced that in the next quarters will be four new departments, psychiatric department, diagnosis clinic, dental clinic and dietetic department.

## HERBERT H. LEHMAN TO HEAD NEW YORK STATE DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE
