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PERCENTAGE OF JEWISH LAND WORKERS IN WHITE RUSSIA DOUBLED SINCE WAR

Jewish Land Workers In White Russia Now 6 to 7% of Jewish Population (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Minsk, Feb. 5.-How the back-to-the-land movement in Soviet Russia is rapidly making progress and changing the structure of Jewish life, is demonstrated by the figures pertaining to this development in White Russia.

While in pre-war times only 3 per cent of the Jewish population in White Russia were settled on the land, occupying an area of 13,000 desiatin, at present the Jewish land workers number six or seven per cent of the Jewish population and occupy an area of 42,000 desiatin.

IN U. S. SHOWS PROGRESS The progress of the Jewish farm movement in the United States was

described in the twenty-second annual report of Gabriel Davidson, General Manager of the Tewish Agricultural Society.

The Society, through its Farm Loan Department, has granted 8,360 loans, aggregating \$5,310,215.00, since 1900. Last year loans were made to 454 individual farmers located in 18 states. The financial service extended by the Society is based on business principles, though loans are made on marginal securities, and their payment is spread over a long period of years.

The Society's Farm Labor Depart-ment placed 588 men as farm workers during last year. Farm employment was obtained by the Society for 15,510 Jewish young men since 1908.

During the past nine years 9,213
Jewish men and women desiring to buy farms, applied to the Society's Farm Settlement Department for advice and guidance. Farms were found for \$48 families of whom 398 received loans to help finance their purchase. It estab-lished the farm settlement at Toms River, N. J. Recently a new Jewish farming center was established at Farmingdale, N. J. Agricultural experts from the So-

ciety's Extension Department visited 1.718 Jewish farmers during 1926. During the period 1920-1926 these experts visited 10,801 farmers in 44 counties of 12 states. They held 962 meetings, demonstrations, field days and extension schools. In addition, advice and aid were given to 10,326 farmers who sought individual consultation at the Society's central office. This department also gave scholarships to the sons and daughters of Jewish farmers; 295 such scholarships were granted for courses held at the State Agricultural Colleges in 12 states. The department also maintains a Service Bureau for the purchase of supplies and materials. The department conducted an agricultural night school, gave a correspondence course and published the "Jewish Farmer", the only Yiddish agricultural magazine in the world. It also published agricultural text books.

In 1926 the Society's Sanitation Department inspected 789 farms in Jewish farming districts in New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts.

The Society also made loans for the erection of synagogues and community houses and has promoted and sup-ported rural religious education. The Society cooperates with the National Council of Jewish Women and with the United Synagogue of America in advancing the social and religious phases of rural life.

The Jewish farm population in the United States has grown from barely a thousand in 1900 to an estimated population of over 75,000 in 1927. One million acres are being farmed by Jews and the real estate and personal prop-erty value of their holdings are over \$100,000,000.

Organ of World Zionist Executive States Attitude on Weizmann-Marshall Agreement

The attitude of the "New Judaea. official organ in London of the World Zionist Executive, on the Weizmann-Marshall agreement, is stated in the January 21 issue of that paper.

"It is not, of course, suggested," we read, "that the extension of the Agency is already to be regarded as an established fact, but the agreement to send a Commission without delay will be wel-comed by Zionist public opinion as marking a positive step towards the early consummation of the extension scheme as approved of by the last Zionist Congress. There is still much ground to cover before the extended Agency will be finally completed. But an agreement having been arrived at with the most important branch of the projected extended Agency and its decision to take so forward and positive a step as the sending of a Commission to elaborate a comprehensive program for the development of Palestine, en-courages the hope that the question is at last reaching a head. The readiness on the part of the Marshall group to cooperate in the work and to share the financial responsibility involved in the establishment of the Jewish National Home, is at last assuming a very tangible form.'

Einstein's Resignation Arouses Fear of Jewish Fundamentalism

The fear that fundamentalism threatens to intrude into the field of Jewish scholarship and hamper its development is voiced in the "S. A. J. Review," publication of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism, of which Rabbi Mordecai M. Kaplan is president. Com-menting on Professor Einstein's resignation from the Board of Governors of the Hebrew University on account of the refusal by the Board to ratify the appointment of Prof. Chajes of Vienna to the faculty of the School of Jewish Studies, the "S. RESOLUTION OF HOUSE COMMITTEE TO AMEND IM-MIGRATION LAW GIVEN

Senate Opinion Opposed to National Origins Plan, Discussion Shows

Washington, D. C., Feb. 5.—The resolution which was recommended favorably to the House by the Immigration Committee, amending the Senate Resolution for changes in the Immigration law of 1924 provides that:

"Subdivision (a) of Section 4 of the Immigration Act of 1924 be amended so as to read as follows:

"(a) An immigrant who is the unmarried child under 21 years of age, the wife, or the husband, of a citizen of the United States who resides therein at the time of the filing of a petition under Section 9."

Section 2. (a) Subdivision (c) of Section 4 of the Immigration Act of 1924 is amended to read as follows:

"(c) An immigrant who was born in territory which at the time of the application for the issuance of the immigration via is under the jurisdiction of the United States, or in the Dominion of Canada, Newfoundland, the Republic of Mexico, the Republic of Loba, the Republic of Haiti, the Dominican Republic, or an independent country of Central or South America, and his wife, and his unmarried children under 21 years of age, if accompanying or following to join him":

"(b) So much subdivision (a) of section 12 of the Immigration Act of 1924 as reads as follows: "An immigration form in the United States who has lost his United States who has lost his United States citeraship shall be considered as having been born in the country of which he is a citizen or subject of any country, then in the country from which he comes; is repealed. Jerusalem, Jan. 15.—The conflict between Right and Left in the Jevish labor movement in Palestine has been outlined in the programmes prepared by the various labor parties which viil participate in the forthcoming conference of the Histadruth Ha'Avoda, the labor federation of Palestine. There are twelve separate parties which have stated their intention to be represented at the conference.

The Achduth Avodah, the Jewish Labor Party, stands for the middle road and will urge the conference to put an end to the efforts of the Left to introduce the principles of extreme radicalism and class war into the Histadruth. However, the Achduth Avodah likewise objects to the attempts of the Right to deprive the labor federation of its class characteristics chered to the control of the results of the result

rath Oydin, of a supreme economic

control committee, which shall endeavor to improve the working methods in the labor settlements, carry out systematic revisions and raise the economic strength of the settlements. 2. The drawing up of a collective agreement between the Workers' Organization and the employers, the basic conditions being the acceptance by the latter of men sent by the former, the fixing of an adequate minimum salary, the eight-hour working day, insurance against accidents, and contribution by the employers to the sickness benefit funds, dismissal of workers to take place only after consultation with the workers' committee, the recognition of

Anyone who will examine that report will understand that at best it furnishes only the loosest kind of a guess as to the origins of the present population of the United States. A moment's consideration will show how difficult the problem would be.

"A man whose ancestors or some of whose ancestors have been in this country four or five generations finds as many crosses of blood, and each of these crosses of blood finds as many crosses in its own instance; and the result is that it is very difficult to say, as to any man whose ancestors came here a century ago, that they are of English stock, or Irish stock, or Scotch stock, or German stock, because there may intermingle in his veins the blood of a half dozen different races.

"So that the proposition of selecting people by race-origin is impossible, for there are probably men in this Chamber who have four or five different national bloods in their veins; and this commission undertook to guess it off by the number of people of known national origin at some certain time in the country, and then presuming that their posterity continued in that ratio.

"It is the wildest kind of a guess. The national-origins law is the most impractical thing I ever saw written into a law, and it opens the door for all kinds of unfairness and injustice.

"According to this schedule which was prepared, we are nearly all English; the great percentage of our population is English. Everybody with a little bit common sense knows that is not The law ought to be changed.

"For instance, under the present law, as shown by this report, there can be admitted from Germany 51,227; under the proposed change only 23,428.

"From Great Britain and northern Ireland-they divide northern Ireland now from southern Ireland, I presume because it happens to be politically separated—under the present law there can be admitted 34,007, and under the new allotment 73,039,"

"The former Liberal Government, the Government, not its organs, approached, under similar circumstances, the Union of Roumanian Jews, which then issued a statement correcting the various reports current at that time in the foreign press. If the 'Indreptarea' makes this demand of the Union of Roumanian Jews and its leaders, it must be said that the Government itself has made it impossible for the Union to say anything, for the following reasons: 1. The authorities have carried out searches at the offices of the Union and in the private homes of its President. 2. When the arrest of the President of the Union was demanded in Parliament in connection with these police searches, the Government did not consider it necessary to make a proper reply although it was fully aware of the fact that the searches had revealed nothing incrimi-natory. 3. A month has gone by since the searches took place and the members of the Executive Committee of the Union of Roumanian Jews are still being constantly summoned to appear before the military prosecution in order to report themselves. In these circum-stances, it is obvious that any statement by the Union of Roumanian Jews with regard to the reports about the anti-Jewish disturbances in Roumania which are current in the foreign press, would be subject to suspicion of having been made as the result of pressure exer-cised by the military authorities, and under fear of a court-martial."
