ROUMANIAN GOVERNMENT SEEKS TO SILENCE PROTEST MOVEMENT AGAINST EXCESSES

Minister in Washington Exploits "Protest" of Roumanian Jews To Stifle Indignation of American Jewry; Cuza Comments on American Protests Against Anti-Jewish Excesses

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 7.—The argument that the Roumanian Jews disapprove the protests of the Jewish communities abroad against the happenings in Roumania, was made by George Creteano, Roumanian Minister in Washington, in a letter to Oscar Leonard of this city.

In an open letter addressed to the Minister, Mr. Leonard, who is a native of Roumania, objected to the implication in Mr. Creteano's recent statement that the anti-Jewish disturbances in Roumania were an attempt to quell Bolshevism.

Replying to this open letter, the Roumanian Minister declared that "as I cannot discuss with you the Jewish question in Roumania and the Jewish

campaign against Roumania in the United States, I have the honor of enclosing copy of a telegram that I received recently from the Roumanian Press Agency, proving that even Roumanian Jews disapprove of foreign citizens' intruding upon the domestic affairs of Roumania, which is the worst way to come to an understanding which every high-minded man must desire."

In support of this opinion the Roumanian Minister quotes "Unser Wort," a Yiddish daily which recently started publication in Roumania.

Jerusalem, Feb. 7.—Pressure was exerted upon Palestine Jewry to discontinue the movement of protest against the Roumanian Government for the wave of anti-Jewish excesses, it was learned here today.

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RABINOVICIUS TO REMAIN LITHUANIAN CONSUL IN N. Y.

Kovno, Feb. 7.—Enricus Rabinovicus will remain Lithuanian Consul General in the City of New York by a decision of the Lithuanian Foreign Office, the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns.

It was previously stated that the new Lithuanian Prime Minister Walde-maras had announced that Mr. Rabinovicus would be removed from his position because the government does not desire a Jew to be its representative in New York.

JEWISH EXCESSES IN VIENNA PERPETRATED BY HITLERITES

Vienna, Feb. 7.—Anti-Jewish excesses took place here Saturday night. A band of 1,000 Hakenkreuzler, affiliated with the organization of Adolf Hitler, attacked Jewish passersby in the vicinity of the Opera House. Restaurants, hotels and meeting halls were raided by the Hakenkreuzler, who were searching for Jews.

The police finally dispersed the raiders and arrested six of them.

"JEWISH REGION" IN CHERSON DISTRICT WILL BE CREATED

Berlin, Feb. 7.—All preparations for the creation of a Jewish region in the District of Cherson where Jewish land settlement work is being carried on, have been completed, despatches received here from Russia state.

The Jewish region will consist of five Jewish villages with a population of 14,500. The villages will be governed by Jewish Soviets.

VIENNA NON-ZIONISTS IN- VITED BY BRITISH AMBASSA- DOR TO DISCUSS PALESTINE

Vienna, Feb. 7.—Forty leading Jewish bankers and prominent personages in Austria were the guests of the British Embassy here at a dinner, at which the upbuilding of Palestine was discussed. Among those specially invited by the Embassy were Louis Rothschild, Alphons Gutmann and Herr Efrussi.

The Ambassador, Viscount Chilton, Colonel Wedgwood and Chief Rabbi Dr. Chajes appealed for the participation of the group in the upbuilding of Palestine.

The ambassadors of France and Italy were also present. Following the meeting in the Embassy, Viscount Chilton was presented with a diploma of the inscription of his name in the Golden Book of the Jewish National Fund.

CHRISTIAN LEADERS IN PHILADELPHIA URGE SUPPORT FOR JEWISH RELIEF FUND

Call of European Jews Unites Americans as Call of Allies During World War, Dr. Cadman States

Phila., Pa., Feb. 7.—Representatives of the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish faiths participated Sunday afternoon in a mass meeting called by the American Christian Fund for Jewish Relief, and pledged their unqualified support to the fund.

The American Christian Fund for Jewish Relief was hailed by speakers of prominence as one of remarkable importance, the bridge which united men and women of all faiths on a common platform of humanity toward one's fellowmen.

The meeting which took place in the Academy of Music was addressed by Mayor W. Freeland Kendrick, Cardinal Dougherty, head of the Roman Catholic Church in this city, Mr. Ernest Trigg, former President of the Chamber of Commerce; Miss Irma May, social worker, and Rabbi Wm. H. Fitzschreiber.

A sum of money, the total of which was not announced, was raised at the meeting.

A message was read from Dr. S. Parks Cadman of New York, Co-Chairman with Justice Victor Dowling of the National Drive of the American

Christian Fund for Jewish Relief, and the President of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America.

The movement was hailed by Cardinal Dougherty as a duty which the Christians owe to the Jews for unjust persecution as well as a testimonial of thanks for the Jewish contributions to modern life.

"No man who has red blood in him will hesitate to stretch out a helping hand to the starving and suffering Jews. I am a man and everything that appertains to man is not alien to me' should be the spirit behind this Christian movement," Cardinal Dougherty declared. "We all have the same human nature, origin, and we hope we are all destined to the same end."

"Just before the World War, during and after it the Jews were the victims of pogroms, despoiled of their goods and sent wandering. Throughout the ages, the Jews have ever been the victims and borne the brunt of every disaster affecting humanity. The marvel is, not that they have survived, but that centuries of suffering and ostracism have never been able to

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FORD'S CLOSEST ADVISORS ARE JEWS, CONGRESSMAN SOL BLOOM ASSERTS
 (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Syracuse, N. Y., Feb. 7.—Henry Ford's closest collaborators are all Jews, was the assertion of Representative Sol Bloom of New York City in an address delivered Sunday before the Young Men's Club of Temple Adath Yeshurun. Mr. Ford's doctor, his legal adviser, his architect and his spiritual adviser are all Jews, he stated.

Henry Ford's anti-Jewish "complex" was traced by Representative Bloom to the failure of the famous peace ship expedition in 1915.

Mr. Bloom said that before this ill-attested venture Mr. Ford never had shown any ill-feeling toward the Jewish people, but after he had become the "laughing stock of the world," the manufacturer recalled that the expedition had been suggested by a Jewish woman and he began his anti-Semitic campaign.

DEATH SENTENCE IMPOSED ON 2 JEWISH WORKERS IN KOVNO CAUSES INDIGNATION

Kovno, Feb. 7.—Great excitement prevailed in the Lithuanian capital today over the execution of the death sentence imposed by the Court Martial on two Jewish and two non-Jewish workers, on the charge of "Communism."

The two Jewish workers sentenced to death by the Court Martial were Chaim Wiz and Salman Schwarzberg, typesetters of the Yiddish daily newspaper in Kovno, the "Yiddische Stimme."

In Rokiskis, the Court Martial sentenced to death three workers, two of which are Christians and one Jew.

Y. M. H. A. OF MANHATTAN TO ASK FOR \$1,500,000 FOR ERECTING NEW BUILDING

A fund of \$1,500,000 will be sought by the Young Men's Hebrew Association of Manhattan for the erection of a new building, according to an announcement made Sunday night at the annual meeting of the Association, by Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, its president. The building will be erected on a site directly adjoining the present building at 92nd Street and Lexington Avenue, on land recently purchased by Dr. Felix M. Warburg, a former president of the institution.

The building will occupy a plot 118x100, and will be eleven stories in height. The new building will add to the present facilities of the organization, dormitory space, swimming pool, gymnasium, club rooms, and space for general social and educational activities.

In his report Judge Proskauer pointed out that the most important need for the institution was increased facilities for its large program of activity. The present structure, he said, has scant space for dormitory room. Thousands of Jewish young men are turned away, because of this lack, and many of them have applied to the Y. M. C. A. for sleeping accommodations. His report reviewed the growth of the institution which was founded 53 years ago.

A feature of the annual meeting was the presentation of engrossed resolutions to Mr. Simon Gottschall, first vice-president of the Association who has just completed thirty years of service as a member of the Board of Trustees.

Others who spoke were Louis Marshall, I. Edwin Goldwasser, Walter T. Diack, the General Secretary of Y. M. C. A.'s in New York City, Ernest Katz, representing the "Old Timers" and Max Rubin, representing the active members of the "Y."

Abraham Cahan, Symbol of the East Side

An appreciation of the work and personality of Abraham Cahan, veteran leader of the Jewish Socialists in America and editor of the "Jewish Daily Forward," is contained in the "New York Times Magazine" of Sunday, from the pen of Mildred Adams, who terms Mr. Cahan "the symbol of the vivid East Side" and points out that his greatest achievement has been his successful interpretative service between America and the immigrant. She writes:

"If such a man can be said to have one outstanding characteristic, his is an unusual ability to interpret one type of life into the terms of another. He has adjusted himself to the demands of an American existence; but he has never forgotten how bewildering this country is to an immigrant. He can put its stridencies and its reticence, its concern with material things and its strange ideals into words that a Russian Jewish immigrant will comprehend and value, and he can translate the immigrant into terms that awaken the interest and respect of careless Americans. . . . A man of tremendous energy and un-failing enthusiasm, he had found time to play with the color—the words and the art and the music—that makes life a richer thing."

Towns and Counties in the U. S. Named After Jewish Citizens

There have been fifteen towns and counties in the United States known to have been named for eleven Jews prominent in American life, we are told in the "Day" of Sunday. Bertram Jonas, the writer of the article, tells us further that there are many towns that have Jewish names but the men for whom they were named have been obscured in the limbo of history. Other cities and towns, while not handing down Jewish names to posterity, were laid out or given their present names by Jewish citizens.

"Texas has been particularly lavish in commemorating its Jewish citizens," we read. "Castro county bears the name of Henry Castro, a naturalized French Jew, who was largely responsible for the settlement of much of southwestern Texas. Castro came to Texas in 1842 where he met Sam Houston, President of the Texan Republic. The leader of the young Lone Star State was greatly impressed with Castro and realizing his value appointed him consul to France.

"Kauffman county in the same state is named for David Kauffman, a prominent politician and statesman in the early days of Texas. He was the first Congressman to represent Texas in the United States House of Representatives. There is also a town in Texas named for Kauffman. What is now the city of Waco was laid out and planned by

JUDGE MACK ELECTED TO HEAD BOARD OF JEWISH INSTITUTE OF RELIGION

Hon. Julian W. Mack, Judge of the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals, was unanimously elected last Tuesday night at a dinner meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Institute of Religion as Chairman of the Board, to succeed the retiring chairman, Dr. Lee K. Frankel.

Judge Mack has been an outstanding figure in American life for many years through his championing of just causes at the bar, and his service in the American courts. One of the many notable services he rendered was his participation in the creation of the Children's Court.

Many important Jewish causes have enlisted Mr. Mack's active cooperation. He was one of the leaders of the Zionist movement for a number of years, and is now very active in its service. He is a member of the Board of Governors of the Hebrew University. He has been associated with the Jewish Institute of Religion since its founding, and, together with Dr. Lee K. Frankel, represented the Institute in the Spring of 1922 in the Conference which looked to the inclusion of the Institute within the activities of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. Judge Mack is the first Jew ever to have served as a member of the Board of Overseers of Harvard University.

Jacob Cordova, who was a prominent mining engineer and real estate expert during the Mexican war of 1845.

"One of the larger counties in Florida, Levy county, keeps fresh the memory of David Levy Yulee, the man who more than any other was responsible for the admission of Florida to the Union in 1845. His real name was Levy but when he married a Gentile woman he assumed the name of Yulee which is a corruption of Levy turned backward. Yulee in Nassau county is also named for him. Yulee was Florida's first Congressman and in 1851 sat in the United States Senate for Florida, thus making him the first Jew to be elected to the Senate.

"The name of David Emanuel, the sixth governor of Georgia, and the first Jew elected to the governorship of any state, is signalized by Emanuel county, Georgia, the largest in the state. Such is its size that for many years it was called the State of Emanuel. Throughout the Revolution Emanuel was a leading figure in his state.

"Aaronsburg in Centre County (Pennsylvania) is the first town in the United States named for a Jew. It was founded by Aaron Levy in 1786.

"All of the patriotic and pioneer members of the famous Pennsylvania Franks family are remembered in the town of Frankstown.

"Here in New York there are two towns named for Jews. Belmont Park on Long Island is named for August Belmont. Before the Civil War he was a prominent member of the diplomatic staff, being consul to Austria and to The Hague. Another active Democratic politician and charity worker,

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NEW YORK U.P.A. IN FULL SWING; \$175,000 RAISED AT THREE DINNERS SUNDAY

Weizmann-Marshall Agreement Lauded by Wise; Society for Advancement of Judaism Raises \$40,000 for U.P.A.

More than \$175,000 was raised towards the United Palestine Appeal New York goal of \$2,500,000 at dinners Sunday evening of the Borough Park, Washington Heights, Williamsburg, and Sea Gate divisions of the fund. The combined attendance of the four meetings was nearly 2,000.

At the dinner of the Borough Park division, which was held at the Hotel Astor, \$65,000 was raised. Dr. Stephen S. Wise, who was the principal speaker welcomed the new forces which have come to the aid of the Palestine movement through the accession of the Louis Marshall group to participation in the Jewish Agency.

"The Zionist organization," he declared, "has never dreamed of erecting a monopoly even of service to Palestine. This movement represents the supreme task of the Jewry of our generation. If American Jewry will not fail, Palestine will be built in our day. Dr. Weizmann has invoked the cooperation of new forces. God give it that the new unity of forces in Jewish life will be even greater and of more value than Dr. Weizmann dreams.

"I wonder if you realize the significance of this compact of peace," Dr. Wise said. "Dr. Weizmann did a big thing in arranging this peace and it was possible because of the fine cooperation of Louis Marshall and Felix Warburg. At last we shall see the end of this overwhelming burden of Zion laid on a few shoulders. I say God bless Marshall and Warburg."

Others who spoke at the Borough Park dinner were Rabbi Aaron Teitelbaum, Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan of Congregation Sons of Judah, and Isaac Ipp, President of the Borough Park Division of the United Appeal. Joseph Baroness was toastmaster.

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the World Zionist Organization, was the principal speaker at the Williamsburg dinner, which was held at Knapp Mansion, Brooklyn, at which contributions of \$60,000 were announced.

"Palestine has come to stay," Dr. Weizmann declared in his address. "This fact has penetrated the mind of non-Jews as well as Jews. The Jew of America must do his duty while the pioneer in Palestine is undergoing such great hardships. Some of us expect a new country to be built up in too short a time. The whole development for the reconstruction of the Jewish national home has been going on for only eight years. We have seen 100,000 of our people settled on this country which is being built up under very trying circumstances. I will not prophesy as to the future of Judaism in America. But in Palestine we can control the destiny. We are creating something useful for you and your children. Palestine must be rebuilt. You must help, and you might as well rebuild the Jewish national homeland with a smile."

Members of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism, at a meeting called by Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan, subscribed the sum of \$40,000 for the United Palestine Appeal.

Dr. Kaplan, Samuel Lammont, Abe Liebowitz, Albert Rosenblatt, and others addressed the meeting, urging members of the society to take the lead in New York's West Side campaign for the United Palestine Appeal.

A. T. Thomson was chosen chairman of a group to follow up the membership of the society to raise among them a quota of \$75,000 adopted at the meeting.

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break their will. Wherever they have gone, they have contributed to the well being of the countries in which they lived.

"To their credit be it said they have never forgotten their glorious past.

"Their contribution to modern civilization is their indomitable will, their unflinching perseverance and their boundless charity. The charity of the Jews is at once a reproach and an inspiration to us. We owe them sympathy and cooperation because our forefathers unjustly persecuted them and because of their contribution to modern life. I trust that this meeting will bring them financial aid, and above all that it will unite us with the bonds of charity."

The fund was lauded by the Chief executive of the city in his address introducing Cardinal Dougherty. "As Mayor of Philadelphia I am honored and pleased, both officially and personally to come here and support this worthy movement for God and humanity," Mayor Kendrick said.

The purpose of the meeting and the aims of the Christian Fund for Jewish Relief were explained by Mr. Ernest T. Trigg, Chairman of the Committee in Philadelphia, who was the presiding officer of the afternoon.

"This is a call to all of us to aid a great work in the interest of humanity. We are not asked by the Jews to do this. The movement is sponsored by the Christians of America, Catholics and Protestants alike. Our own conscience calls on us to give. The Jews of America can not discharge this tremendous task alone; it is too big.

"The Jews of Europe are suffering intensely through no fault of their own. Changing philosophies of government, economic collapses and race animosities are responsible for their condition. \$62,000,000 has been expended for their relief by American Jewry while they have at the same time contributed to non-Jewish causes. Our Jews do their share and more than their share in all causes.

"The money which we contribute, great as the need is, is perhaps secondary to the new hope and faith incident to the knowledge that the Christians of America are behind them."

Rabbi William H. Fineschreiber hailed the meeting as the beginning of a federation against the bigotry, suspicion and prejudice that throttle civilization. "I see in this meeting, an indication of the profound changes in the hearts of men. For over 2,000 years we Jews have borne the brunt of every calamity. For all these years we had to fight for our rights, our children and our King. Through all these years the hearts of our people yearned for the words from our Christian brethren saying: 'I sympathize with you.' And now it has happened. The Christian churches have united in taking the hand of their Jewish brethren. It doesn't matter how much money is raised so long as the princes of the Catholic and Protestant Churches have come together to say the kind word.

"Seligman in Arizona recalls Joseph Seligman, one of the famous Seligman brothers who were prominent merchants and bankers and the forerunners of the present Seligman family. Solomonville in the same state is named for Edward Solomon, an early Texan resident who was a gold prospector in the Arizona territory. Ehrenburg, also in Arizona, was laid out in 1873 by Michael Goldwater, one of the first residents of the state. The town was named for Herman Ehrenburg of whose Jewishness there is some doubt.

"Alexander in Idaho, is named after Moses Alexander, the Jewish governor of Idaho. The present name of San Francisco was given it by Washington Bartlett, who was the son of a Charleston Jew by the name of Rodriguez. Bartlett was alcalde of San Francisco in 1849 and forty years later was elected governor of California. Henry Castro of Texas has a town in California that bears his name, Castroville.

"Mississippi has honored Leopold Marks, one of the state's philanthropists, in naming the town of Marks for him. Saddler, Illinois, is named for Morris B. Saddler, who was mayor of the town in 1890. The most prominent Southern Jew before the 19th century was Judah Touro. On his death the people of New Orleans, in appreciation of his generous charity, were anxious to honor him with a monument or other form of permanent distinction. The Jews of Louisiana protested that it was heterodoxical to erect a monument to an orthodox Jew and that it was equally wrong to name a town or county for him. But there is a town in the state called Toro. The explanation has been offered that some of his more ardent admirers not knowing the meaning of the word Toro and in an attempt to circumvent the objections of orthodox Jewry named a town Toro by twisting the spelling of Touro's name. There are other towns such as Emanuel in Kentucky, Kaplan in Louisiana, Levy in New Mexico, Feldman in Arizona, Levys in South Carolina, Edelstein in Illinois, and Goldman in Arkansas, all which have names that sound Jewish in origin."

Jacob Neinkin was elected President of the United Israel Zion Hospital at the annual meeting of the institution. Other officers elected are Abraham J. ROUMANIAN GOVERNMENT SEEKS TO SILENCE PROTEST AT ANTI-JEWISH EXCESSES

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the Zionist Organization in Roumania to influence Palestine Jewry to discontinue anti-Roumanian protests. Should the protests in Palestine not be discontinued, the Roumanian Government may prohibit Zionist work in Roumania, the letter declared.

Bucharest, Feb. 7.—Alexander Cuza, leader of the Roumanian anti-Semites, who is principally responsible for the anti-Jewish disturbances, discussed the wave of Jewish protest abroad against these disturbances, in the Roumanian Parliament.

Speaking in the Parliament on the protest meetings held in the United States, Deputy Cuza asked the Roumanian Government what it "intends to do to the Roumanian Jews." Cuza, in the course of his address, declared that "no excesses ever occurred in Roumania." "The Christian League is a party of law and order," he stated.
