

## JUGOSLAVIAN GOVERNMENT ISSUES LAW PROHIBITING PROSELYTIZING ACTIVITIES

**Jewish Leaders Welcome Ordinance  
Against Missionaries**  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Belgrade, Feb. 10.—Leaders of the Jewish community in Yugoslavia welcomed with satisfaction an ordinance issued by the Minister of Education prohibiting proselytizing in the country.

The ordinance declares that all attempts to win converts from one religion to another must be prevented in accordance with the law which protects every recognized faith and provides severe penalties for all attacks, blasphemies and insults to the institutions of the respective religions.

"The maintenance of religious peace in our religiously heterogeneous state is eminently a matter of public interest. In order to protect this state interest the government must prevent all proselytizing activities," the ordinance declares.

## ASK CANADA TO INTERVENE WITH LEAGUE IN BEHALF OF JEWS OF ROUMANIA

Toronto, Can., Feb. 10.—A protest meeting against the anti-Jewish excesses in Roumania was held on Sunday at the Standard Theatre.

The theatre was filled to capacity and two overflow meetings were held. Rabbi Ferdinand M. Isserman presided at the meeting. Father Minehan, Reverend Dr. Bland of the United Church, and A. Rhinewine, editor of the "Toronto Hebrew Journal", delivered addresses.

A resolution of protest against the anti-Jewish atrocities was moved by Dr. Bland and amended by Rabbi Isserman to include other religious minorities. The resolution will be forwarded to Premier King, with a request to submit the matter to the League of Nations.

## JEWISH STUDENTS AGAIN ATTACKED IN BUCHAREST

Bucharest, Feb. 10.—Two Jewish students, Silber and Eisikowicz, were seriously injured in new attacks of Cuzist students at the School of Commerce here, the "Adeverul", Roumanian newspaper, reports.

The newspaper states that when a delegation of Jewish students appeared before the dean of the school several days ago and complained that they found it impossible to attend the lectures, he assured them that measures have been taken to insure the safety of the Jewish students. Notwithstanding this promise, no arrests were made.

## "NEAR EAST," CLOSE TO BRITISH FOREIGN OFFICE, LAUDS WEIZMANN-MARSHALL ACCORD ON JEWISH AGENCY

**Urges Caution on Jewish Agency Commission; Jerusalem Zionist  
Executive Greet's Agency Agreement**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 10.—The Weizmann-Marshall agreement concerning the extension of the Jewish Agency is the most important step for the Zionists since the Balfour Declaration, is the opinion of the "Near East," London magazine considered to be in close touch with the British Foreign Office.

An article in the magazine on the Jewish Agency declares that the Weiz-

mann-Marshall agreement is a tribute to both the strength and weakness of the Zionist movement. "It is true that there still exists in America some hostility to the idea of nationalizing all Jews, but in general there is more active interest taken in the future of Palestine than at any previous period," the "Near East" states.

"The fact that the non-partisan commission which is to submit its report to the Jewish Agency will also study the possibilities in the neighboring territory demonstrates how carefully the recommendations of the Commission will have to be laid down. The foreign relations of Palestine are entirely within the discretion of the British government."

"The report of the non-partisan commission next autumn will be a most eagerly expected document," the "Near East" declares.

## MARSHALL ISSUES STATE- MENT ON JEWISH AGENCY

A statement by Louis Marshall on the Jewish Agency, in connection with the recently concluded agreement between him and Dr. Weizmann, is published by the London "Jewish Chronicle". The New York correspondent of the London weekly quotes Mr. Marshall.

"Palestine," Mr. Marshall wrote, "is not a Zionist question, but a general Jewish problem. We propose to co-operate with the Zionists in so far as this does not hamper the cardinal principles of our general work. I am not a Zionist, and I am of the opinion that Palestine cannot claim priority over any countries where the Jews require American help. Many Jews will remain in the countries where they at present reside. They have to live there, and it will be a great injustice if, for the sake of Palestine, we shall have to curtail this necessary help in other countries. We shall, however, assist in making Palestine a secure home for the Jews who want to settle there, and we shall try to create there on a sound and healthy basis a cultural centre for entire Jewry."

Jerusalem, Feb. 10.—A message of congratulations to Dr. Chaim Weizmann because of his agreement with Louis Marshall on the extension of the Jewish Agency, was despatched by the Zionist Executive here.

The Executive declares in the message that "the experts' commission will find a cordial reception in Palestine and will be given all facilities for a full investigation."

## ADVANCE \$100,000 TO WORKERS' COOPERATIVE IN PALESTINE

Jerusalem, Feb. 10.—A further step toward ameliorating the unemployment in Palestine was taken here. The Zionist Executive, with the Central Cooperative Bank and the Workers Bank, advanced a loan of £20,000 to the Solel Boneh, the Jewish workers' cooperative building society.

The Executive also covered the deficit of £20,000 of the Solel Boneh, it was stated.

## HEINRICH BRAUN, GERMAN SOCIALIST LEADER, DIES

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## PERCENTAGE OF JEWISH WORKERS IN RUSSIAN INDUSTRIES GROWS

**Emigration of Jews from Russia De-  
creasing, Figures Show**  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Feb. 10.—A considerable in-  
crease in the number of Jews engaged in  
the country's industries is reported on  
the basis of figures received here from  
various parts of the Union of Soviet  
Soviet Republics.

The district of Kiev is taken as a  
typical example of this development.  
The figures, which pertain to the period  
1924-1926 show the growth in the num-  
ber of Jewish workmen in the Russian  
trade unions. The number of Jewish  
workers in the metal industry in 1924  
amounted to 67 per cent of the total  
employed. In 1926 the percentage of  
Jewish workers in this industry was  
19.4 per cent.

In the chemical industry, the percent-  
age of Jewish workers grew from 28.9  
per cent in 1924 to 46.8 per cent in 1926;  
the increase in the leather industry was  
from 18.4 per cent to 40 per cent in the  
same period. The increase in the build-  
ing industry was from 25.6 per cent to  
28.5 per cent. The percentage of Jewish  
workers on the railways increased from  
1 per cent of the total to 1.4 per cent;  
in the postal telegraph service the per-  
centage increased from 2.7 to 5.4. A  
similar development is recorded from all  
other districts.

The Communist Yiddish daily,  
"Emes," also publishes a report of a de-  
crease in the emigration of Jews from  
Soviet Russia. Again the district of  
Kiev is taken as more or less typical  
of the entire country. In 1925 800  
Jews in this district received per-  
mission from the Soviet authorities to  
emigrate. Most of them proceeded to  
Cuba, North America and Palestine.

In 1926, the number of emigrants fell  
considerably, due to the improved con-  
dition of the artisans and also to the  
colonization work. In the first quarter  
of 1926, 392 Jews emigrated from the  
district. Ninety-nine of this number

## JUDGE ROSALSKY TO HEAD JEWISH ORTHODOX CONGRE- GATIONS CONFERENCE IN MAY

**To Celebrate Cornerstone Laying;  
Rabbi M. S. Margolies Honored,  
Teachers' Institute Named for Him**

Preparations to celebrate the cor-  
nerstone laying of the Yeshiva Col-  
lege of America at Amsterdam Avenue  
between 186th and 187th Streets on  
May 1st, 1927, are being completed,  
according to announcement made by  
Samuel Levy, Chairman of the Execu-  
tive Committee of the Yeshiva College  
Building Fund.

One of the decisions taken by the  
Executive Committee of the Building  
Fund was made public by Mr. Levy in  
announcing the text of a resolution  
adopted by the Executive Committee  
to honor Rabbi M. S. Margolies, Hon-  
orary President of the Union of Or-  
thodox Rabbis and dean of the Ameri-  
can Rabbinate, on the occasion of his  
seventy-fifth birthday and his fiftieth  
anniversary of service in the Rabbinate.  
The Executive Committee has decided  
to name the teachers' institute of the  
Yeshiva, the "Rabbi M. S. Margolies  
Teachers' Institute". A special fund  
will be set aside for the purpose of  
erecting a building to house the  
Teachers' Institute. The institute,  
which prepares teachers for Jewish  
religious and Hebrew Schools, is in  
existence since 1918 and is part of the  
Yeshiva.

A special committee which consists  
of representatives of the Yeshiva and  
of various organizations and congrega-  
tions with which Rabbi M. S. Marg-  
olies has been connected, is being  
formed to celebrate this event. A Tes-  
timonial Dinner will be tendered him  
on the evening of May 1st in connection  
with the cornerstone laying festi-  
vities. Rabbi M. S. Margolies is  
honorary chairman of the Yeshiva  
College Building Fund and has been  
active in promoting the interests of the  
institutions devoted to Jewish learn-  
ing both in the United States and  
abroad.

A conference of Orthodox Jewish  
Congregations to celebrate the corner-  
stone laying of the Yeshiva College of  
America, is now being prepared. Judge

## On the Fortieth Anniversary of the I. O. B. A.

The celebration of the fortieth anni-  
versary of the founding of the Inde-  
pendent Order Brith Abraham is com-  
mented on in the "Jewish Daily News"  
of yesterday.

This event, the paper declares, "takes  
us back to the beginnings of mass Jew-  
ish immigration into this country. The  
I. O. B. A. in course of time became  
the largest of the Jewish fraternal  
organizations. Jewish orders have  
played an important part in the devel-  
opment of American Jewry. They  
were powerful Americanizing factors as  
well. They, too, in a measure, safe-  
guarded Jewish interests generally.  
With the growth of the well-being of  
Jews, with the social changes that have  
taken place and with the general  
spread of life insurance, the orders  
have somewhat receded in popular  
favor. However, it should by no  
means be imagined that they can no  
longer be of service. These orders  
have to march with the time. They  
must adapt their policies to new con-  
ditions. The I. O. B. A. has now ap-  
proximately one hundred and fifty  
thousand members, an aggregation of  
men and women that can be utilized  
for the general welfare of American  
Jewry."

## French Statesman Rebukes French Jewry for Indifference to Palestine

A rebuke to the Jews of France for  
doing less than the Jews of other coun-  
tries for the rebuilding of Palestine  
was made by Mr. Justine Godard, for-  
mer French cabinet Minister and presi-  
dent of the France-Palestine Associa-  
tion. In an article published in "Le  
Monde Nouveau," M. Godard writes:

"The position of the French Jews is  
quite different from that of the English  
or American Jews or the Jews in the  
countries of Eastern Europe, such as  
Russia, Poland or Roumania. Living in  
the midst of a Catholic society they en-  
joy the same rights and prerogatives as  
their fellow citizens and are as free and  
happy as the English or American Jews  
are in Protestant countries. In spite of  
that the French Jews have to live con-  
tinually in an atmosphere of latent and  
menacing anti-Semitism. Undoubtedly  
this hostility against them, which dogs  
all their activities, makes them more  
cautious, even to the extent of carrying  
their caution to excess, because of their  
anxiety to safeguard their position.  
Whatever the cause, they are less prone  
to profess their Judaism than are the  
English or American Jews, who en-  
counter no anti-Semitism and even less  
so than the Russian, Polish and Rou-  
manian Jews, to whom anti-Semitism  
has become an every day experience and  
a stimulating factor in their Jewishness."

# **PRESBYTERIAN MINISTERS URGE MEASURE TO UNITE DECLARANTS' FAMILIES**

Washington, Feb. 9.—A delegation of Presbyterian Ministers from various parts of the country, headed by Reverend Frank B. Gigliotti, representative of the American Legion in Italy, called on President Coolidge yesterday and appealed for the amendment of the Immigration Law so as to exempt from the quota the wives and children of alien declarants.

The delegation also conferred with Chairman Johnson and Congressmen Box and Bacon of the House Immigration Committee.

It is understood that the delegation will be given a formal hearing by the Committee this week, when they will endeavor to persuade the Committee to take a more liberal attitude toward the proposed amendment.

Congressman Perlman declared today that despite the fact that the Committee has already voted down the Wadsworth amendment, it was not technically barred from still approving it as the vote taken was only indirectly in connection with the bill. Perlman's companion measure, introduced in the House at the same time as the Wadsworth amendment in the Senate, has never been finally voted upon by the Committee.

# **PRESIDENT APPOINTS CAYTON AS DISTRICT JUDGE OF COLUMBIA**

Washington, Feb. 10.—Nathan Cayton, of this city, was appointed Judge of the Municipal Court of the District of Columbia by President Coolidge. The Senate yesterday confirmed this appointment.

Judge Cayton is 28 years old. He is a graduate of the National University Law School and for several years has been associated in law practice with Alexander Wolf of this city.

It is not only from the Jewish and Zionist point of view that it seems strange and revolting that the French Jews, who were the first to be officially emancipated in Europe, should be doing less than the others for the emancipation in Palestine of the Jews who are still deprived of all civil rights; even from the French point of view this indifference runs counter to the liberal and republican spirit of France, which was the originator of great acts of justice."

# **SOVIET GOVERNMENT MAKES SURVEY OF ORPHANS**

Hias Seeks American Relatives of Jewish Orphans

The Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society has received a message from its Far-Eastern Bureau at Harbin, that the Child-Care Department of the Russian Government is forwarding to this country a record which it has compiled of 47,000 orphans, whose parents died or disappeared during the various reigns of terror which swept over that country since the outbreak of the World War. The purpose of this survey is to seek relatives of the orphans in the United States and elsewhere.

The 47,000 names represent the first results of an orphan-survey of the entire country which is being made by the Russian government, and covers only the Ukraine and White Russia, but it already fills twenty large sized volumes containing, besides the names, the age, sex and birthplace of the children, also the names of their parents or nearest relatives, and the institutions or private homes in which the children are sheltered.

Additional volumes will be forwarded to the New York offices of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society by the Russian Child Welfare Department which asks the Society to endeavor to locate persons in this country who either themselves or whose parents lost children during the War, the pogroms, the revolution and the counter-revolutionary invasions.

# **JEWISH JOURNALIST BARRED FROM LITHUANIAN SEJM**

Kovno, Jan. 31.—M. Szafer, the Parliamentary correspondent of the "Yiddische Stimme" here, has been prohibited from attending at the sittings of the Sejm in his capacity of journalist, according to a decision adopted by the Presidium of the Sejm.

M. Szafer has been the Parliamentary correspondent of the "Yiddische Stimme" from the very first day of the proclamation of Lithuanian Independence. He has also been the President of the Lithuanian Sejm correspondents.

# **MACCABEES AND BOY SCOUTS IN SALONICA SETTLE DIFFERENCES**

Salonica, Jan. 20.—A conflict between the Greek boy scouts' organization and the Jewish Maccabees here which has arisen owing to the Maccabees refusal to recognize the authority of the Boy Scouts Headquarters is on the point of being settled due to the intervention of M. Iliacon, ex-Governor of Thrace and Commander of the Boy Scouts of Greece.

"Our Council is inspired with feelings of goodwill towards the Jewish people," M. Iliacon writes to the Maccabee Executive Committee, "for no other people is so closely connected with the Greek people by bonds of common suffering. These two peoples have with the same heroism fought for the preservation of their freedom and have always sought to reestablish their independence. The Greeks as well as the Jews, driven from their homes and dispersed all over the world, contributed greatly to the development of our modern civilization. And if, as we hope, the Jewish people will again be reestablished in its ancient home, the Jewish state will be of great assistance to the Greek State with which," M. Iliacon concludes, "it will collaborate for the cause of the civilization of the East."

Salonica, Jan. 20.—A campaign against the numerous clausus in the countries of Eastern Europe has been initiated by the committee of Jewish organizations here. Large public meetings of protest will be held at which the Jewish students of the higher schools of Salonica will be present. The French newspapers here contain long articles protesting against the existence of the numerous clausus in the so-called democratic countries in Central Europe. The papers demand that the League of Nations should act in order to bring about the repeal of the numerous clausus.

The Board of Trustees, the Sisterhood and the Mothers' Association of the West End Synagogue, New York City, will give a reception Sunday afternoon in the vestry rooms of the synagogue for Dr. and Mrs. Frederic de Sola Mendes in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of their marriage.

Dr. Mendes has been rabbi of Shaaray Tefila for more than fifty years. This congregation was organized in 1845, with the Rev. Samuel M. Isaacs acting as its first minister. Dr. Mendes succeeded him, delivering his first sermon before this congregation in 1873. He officiated as its rabbi until 1920, when he was made rabbi emeritus, and was succeeded by Dr. Nathan Stern, the present rabbi.

Dr. Mendes founded "The American Hebrew," and was its editor during its first six years (1879-1885). He was an editor of The Jewish Encyclopedia and chief of its translation bureau. He was also an editor of the New Bible Translation and of The Jewish Classics.

A bill aimed at abolishing the teaching of the theory of evolution in the public schools of New Hampshire was killed in the Committee on Education of the State House of Representatives.

## INSTIGATOR OF ANTI-SEMITIC DEMONSTRATION ACQUITTED

Bucharest, Jan. 21.—The trial of the anti-Semitic priest Gregorescu, the director of the Teachers' Seminary, has just been concluded in Edinetz. After the murder of the Jewish student, David Falik, Gregorescu organized an anti-Jewish demonstration of his pupils in sympathy with Falik's murderer. The Jewish Deputy, Gendrick, of Bessarabia, drew the Government's attention to this anti-Semitic demonstration after which the Seminary was closed and Gregorescu put on trial.

The investigation commission which conducted the trial against Gregorescu, after several days of deliberation, declared Gregorescu innocent. Gregorescu has already been reinstated and the Seminary reopened.

The anti-Semitic paper "Cuvintul" in commenting on this trial writes: "The Roumanian patriots Bodruca (the anti-Semitic headmaster of a Secondary school in Kishineff who was dismissed because he forced Jewish pupils to go to church instead of the synagogue on the anniversary of the declaration of Roumanian Independence) and Gregorescu are the martyrs of the Roumanian nation in Bessarabia Czarist Russia under pressure from abroad has given to the Jews the Moldavian land of Bessarabia. As a result of that, a class of Jewish farmers has been established in Bessarabia who are so insolent and strong that they do not hesitate to use revolvers and knives—all the robbers and murderers in Bessarabia are Jews—in order to terrorize the Roumanian population. What does General Rishanau, the new Governor of Bessarabia, intend to do against this murderous Jewish element?"

The Jewish Division of the New York Public Library announces that the number of readers who visited its reading room during the year 1926 was 41,329, an increase of 4,683 over the preceding year. They consulted 125,946 volumes, in addition to numerous magazines and newspapers which are currently received in the Division.

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## BREVITIES

Construction of a new Metropolitan Opera House in New York City is a certainty, according to a statement made by Otto H. Kahn, Chairman of the directors of the Metropolitan Opera Company, that directors of the Metropolitan Opera and Real Estate Company, owners of the existing Metropolitan Opera House, had voted unanimously for the project.

Max L. Pinansky is the first Jew to be elevated to the bench in Maine. He will become the judge of the Municipal Court in Portland the end of this month. Gov. Ralph O. Brewster has extended the nomination, and the Council will confirm this appointment next Friday in Augusta.

Mr. Pinansky organized the Maine B'nai B'rith in several different sections and is president of the Maine Zionist Association.

Four men suspected of having shot into a crowd of cloak makers, injuring Samuel Cohen, were arrested on Wednesday. Magistrate Renaud in Jefferson Market Court held the men without bail for examination on Friday, charged with assault and violating the Sullivan law.

The men described themselves as Max Nichter, 28, loan broker, 120 Ridge Street; Samuel Oser, 36, chauffeur, 184 South Second Street, Brooklyn; Michael Friedman, 28, garment worker, 173 Monroe Street, and Harry Goldman, 38, salesman, 22 Clinton Street.

Judge Rosalsky in General Sessions reduced the terms of front two and a half to five years in prison imposed last week on Samuel Cohen, 1380 Washington Av., and Nathan Lenz, 1765 Plaza Avenue, Bronx, to a maximum of one year in the penitentiary after the men promised to pay medical bills incurred by Irving Vlock, a garment manufacturer, whom they assaulted, and also to make restitution for the goods they destroyed.

Sentence was modified after former Assistant District Attorney Samuel Markewich said "the two men heeded the advice of Left Wing and Communist leaders who conducted the recent cloak strike and who," he said, "drilled their followers in the slogan that 'might makes right.'"

Morris Sigman, President of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union, said that the deposed Left Wing and Communist leaders were provoking disorders in the strike zone and giving the impression that a strike was still being waged. He declared that the garment strike ended in December when the international took charge of the situation, and that the employers' associations had recognized the international as the head of the garment makers' affairs.

Solomon Shapiro, sixty, founder of the dry goods firm Levinson & Shapiro, New York City, who began his career in New York at the age of fourteen as a peddler, died suddenly on Tuesday.

He was born in Russia and came to this country when a boy. After working as a peddler he worked as a furrier until 1890, when he and Morris Levinson started their dry goods firm. He was connected with numerous charitable institutions, including the Deborah Jewish Consumptive Relief Society, of which his wife was the founder and president and he a director. He was one of the founders of the Zoster Relief Society and a director of Daughters of Jacob, Daughters of Israel, Montefiore Home, and was a member of Institutional Synagogue, Harlem Day and Night Nursery, and the Grand Street Boys' Association.

chairmanship of the Committee which has called the conference, Mr. Levy announced.

It is expected that representatives of several thousand Orthodox Jewish Congregations in the United States and Canada will be assembled at the cornerstone laying and at the conference at which the problem of Jewish education in America will be considered. Over nine hundred congregations in greater New York and other cities have responded to the call of Judge Rosalsky, declaring their readiness to send delegations to the conference. Harris L. Selig, Executive Director of the Yeshiva, announced.

The Agudas Achim North Shore Congregation of Chicago will dedicate its new temple on February 25, 26 and 27.

The temple has just been completed at an expense of more than \$350,000. It is said to be one of the most beautiful in the United States.

The altar is the only one of its kind in the West. It is composed of mosaics of various kinds blended to give beautiful color effects. The decorations are in the Byzantine style. The pews are arranged in a semi-circle. A hanging gallery extends along the sides and rear of the auditorium. An indirect lighting system was installed so that there are no lighting fixtures except a few for decorative effect. The congregation consists of 150 members.

The Agudas Achim North Shore Congregation is the successor to the old First Hungarian Congregation of Chicago, which was established by pioneer Jews in the city, and the North Shore Congregation which was the first to be established in Edgewater.

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
