LEVITAN CONTROVERSY REFERRED TO GOVERNOR BY WISCONSIN ASSEMBLY (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Madison, Wis., Feb. 11.-The state assembly has put up to Gov. Zimmer-man the onus of deciding the controversy between State Treasurer Sol Levitan and C. B. Ballard, state superintendent of public buildings.

The assembly passed a resolution condemning a letter sent by Ballard to Levitan as "highly improper and a reflection on the honesty and integrity of the Jewish race."

The assembly referred the matter to Gov. Zimmerman, asking him to take any action he sees fit.

DICKSTEIN CHARGES WARSAW U. S. CONSUL DISCRIMINATES AGAINST RABBIS' FAMILIES Causes Delay in Granting Visas Under Bill Expiring July I (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Feb. 11.-Congressman Dickstein, in conference with C. Du Bois, Chief of the Visa Office of the State Department, protested against alleged improper action by the American Consul at Warsaw in unduly de-laying the granting of visas to the wives and children of rabbis who entered the United States prior to July 1, 1924. The exemption from the quota of the wives and children of these rabbis was provided for by the Dickstein Bill passed by Congress last summer. This bill requires that the privilege extended thereby expires within

one year from the date of adoption, namely the first of July next.

Congressman Dickstein charged that the Consul in Warsaw has been insisting upon excessive proof and unnecessary details regarding the status of the rabbis. Should this delay continue, a number of wives and chadren may be barred by the expiration of the year's limitation. One of the problems that has arisen in these cases involves rabbis who were admitted as quota immigrants, but who later obtained positions as rabbis in the United States. The Consul ruled that the rabbis must have been admitted as such on a nonquota basis in order to entitle their

wives and children to admission as non-quota immigrants. Congressman Dickstein insists, however, that all that is necessary is to prove that the rabbi pursued his vocation at least two years before going to America to continue in the rabbinate, the fact that he entered as a quota immigrant being immaterial.

JERICHO CONFERENCE MAY SETTLE ARAB TRIBAL FEUDS

WILKES-BARRE AND VICINITY COMBINED U.J.C.-U.P.A. DRIVE OVERSUBSCRIBED BY \$70,000 Reports of Campaigns Come in from

Various States and Cities

The sum of \$180,000 was reported raised at the conclusion of the combined drive in Wilkes-Barre and adjacent localities for the United Jewish Campaign and the United Palestine Appeal, the New York headquarters of the United Jewish Campaign announced. This figure represents a \$70,000 oversubscription of the original \$110,000 quota, of which \$60,000 was designated for the United Jewish Campaign and \$50,000 for the United Palestine Appeal, on the basis of a three-year campaign for both. At the dinner on the conclusion of the drive, it was announced that \$15,000 had in addition been subscribed by non-lews in Wilkes-Barre to the American Christian Fund for Jewish Relief, which had joined in the cam-Subscriptions of \$5,000 from F. paign. M. Kirby, vice-president of the Woolworth Company, and \$5,000 from J. N. and W. H. Conygham, are the third largest Christian contributions to the fund to date, the United Jewish Campaign statement declares.

The remaining campaigns to be conducted in Pennsylvania are those of Easton, Chester and Pottsville, and a few smaller communities. Bethlehem launched its drive for \$10,000 yesterday. The drive of the United Jewish (Continued on Page 3)

OBJECT TO JEWISH COLONI-ZATION IN GERMANY

Berlin, Feb. 11 .- A step to frustrate the plan of the Federation of Jewish Ex-Servicemen in Germany to launch an agricultural campaign among its members has been taken by the anti-Semitic Deputies of the Oldenburg State Parliament in Luebeck. The Nationalist Deputies have given notice of the following motion:

"Whereas the Jews are planning the ruin of German agriculture, we urge that ways and means be found to prohibit the access of Jews to the Oldenburg agricultural schools and that generally necessary legislative steps be taken to prevent the Jews from engaging in agriculture within the boundary of the Oldenburg State."

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M. RAKOVSKI EXPLAINS WHY ZIONISTS ARE PERSE. CUTED IN SOVIET RUSSIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) Paris, Feb. 5.-An explanation of why Zionists are being arrested in Soviet Russia was given by M. Ra-Soviet Russia was given by al. Ra-kovski, the Soviet Ambassador to France, in an interview with a repre-sentative of the Yiddish daily here "Pariser Haint".

"Strong measures are being taken against the Zionists," he said, "because the Zionists are making use in their propaganda of the arguments of the enemics of the Soviet Government. In order to persuade Jews to go to Palestine, the Zionists are compelled by the logic of their arguments to place the Soviet Government in a light which we cannot allow. We prevent no one from going to Palestine. Emigration from Russia is free. But we cannot permit the emigration movement to be fostered by means of a propaganda against the Soviet regime.

"The recent report in a Jewish emigration publication to the effect that the new Jewish colonists in Russia are subjected to anti-Semitic excesses," M. Rakovski said, "was a pure invention. The Soviet Government is guarding against any such eventuality and the attitude of the Russian peasants towards the Jews has undergone a complete change.

Chief Rabbi Charges Liberal Jews Seek Estrangement from Judaism

The charge that Liberal Judaism in England pursues a policy of definite estrangement from the collective conestrangement from the collective con-sciousness of the Jewish people and the Jewish past was made by Chief Rabbi J. H. Hertz in his eighth sermon in London on "Affirmations of Judaism."

Dr. Hertz said in part:
"They (the Reform leaders) never fail to emphasize that their form of Judaism cuts straight at the root of customs and laws more than 2,000 years old; that they permit work on the Sabbath and do not deem fasting essential on the Day of Atonement; and that rather than recede from the position they have taken up they would separate themselves from Jewry altogether. Again, in their Conference held in July last, the Minister of the local Synagogue did not hesitate to declare that the God of the Bible was not his God. and the leader of the whole movement repeated his usual plea for what he repeated ms usual piea for what he calls adequate Jewish recognition of the Founder of Christianity. Owing to a confusion of terms, a number of men who strictly adhere to the traditional service, the dietary and Sabbath laws, attended that Conference and these expressed their amazement at some of the utterances to which they listened.

"I have been asked why," Dr. Hertz continued, "in the circumstances, Orthodox lewry does not officially recognize that men who proclaim such views have ruled themselves out of the ranks of Israel. Let history supply the answer. It is over 150 years ago that the later followers of Sabbathai Zevi, under the leadership of the notorious Jacob Frank, attacked Jews and Judaism far more bitterly than ever did Liberals in Berlin. "Too Sweet"

The attitude of Sol Levitan, State Treasurer of Wisconsin, against whom an anti-Semitic slur was directed by Ballard, State Superintendent of Public Property, in connection with a sign of welcome on Levitan's door, is viewed as tactless by the "Daily Jewish Courier" of Chicago. Relating the incident, the paper, in its Feb. 8 issue, feels that the sign Mr. Levitan posted on his office door, saying "Uncle Sol, Your State Treasurer, Welcomes You", was "too sweet" and in bad taste.

"To call ones self 'Uncle Sol', in the language of endearment, and to tell the public 'Your State Treasurer', that is, your darling boy, your favorite, and is, your daring boy, your ravorite, and to extend a welcome to everybody in an outflow of brotherly love, is very poor taste. It is altogether 'too sweet'. It smacks of currying favor and is undignified for a Jew who has been chosen State Treasurer for the third term," the paper writes, continuing:

"What would a sensible person in Levitan's place have done? He would have quietly removed the sign against which the State Superintendent of Public Property objected and would have written a letter to Ballard, in the following vein: You have a right to demand that the sign which was put up without your permission be removed. But the gratuitous insult you wrote me indicates that you are an insolent ignoramus who is unfit to hold a public office."

This would have been the most appropriate answer. But being tactless Sol Levitan showed Ballard's letter to the members of the Legislature, who took up the cudgels for him and de-mand that Ballard apologize. But Ballard refuses to apologize-and the people of the state have something to

talk about and something to laugh at. "First Sol Levitan gave an anti-Semite an opportunity to make his venomous remark, and later he made it possible to spread the story and turn it into a public joke."

Institution Is Non-Sectarian The new Sydenham Hospital which has just been completed on Manhattan

Avenue at Hancock Square, New York-City, was dedicated on Sunday afternoon. More than \$2,000,000 went into the construction of the new building. Fireproof and modern in every detail, it has ten floors, with basement and cellar.

The site upon which the building is erected was the gift of Leon Schinasi.

crected was the gilt of Leon Schinasi. The building was designed by Charles B. Meyers, with whom were associated in planning the interior arrangements, Dr. S. Goldwater, well-known hospital consultant, and Dr. Siegfried Wachsmann, medical director of the hospital. The building was erected by G. Richard Davis and Company, with the cooperation of David Tishman, chairman of the Building Committee.

An outstanding feature of the hos-

pital is the use of the color gray on the floors, walls and steel cabinet work. This color usage marks one of the most modern innovations in hospital decoration, which medical authorities now believe exert decided influence on a patent's mental and physical condition. An unusual addition to the hospital is the elevated platform in the operat-

ing room, where members of a family, or family doctors, may observe operations without being in the way. This platform is reached by a special staircase from the haliway, and is separated from the main operating room by a glass partition, which prevents possible infection.

The Sydenham Hospital first came into existence thirty years ago when it started as a medical clinic in a small private house on East 116th Street. After growing until it occupied a row of nine houses, its facilities were delared inadequate, and for four years

following the war, it became dormant.

Five hundred thousand patients received medical care during the thirty years of the hospital's existence.

Construction of the present building was started in 1924, which marked the three-hundredth anniversary of the birth of Dr. Thomas Sydenham, the great English physician whose name this hospital bears. The institution is

non-sectarian.

The capacity of the new hospital is given as eighty-six ward beds, forty-four semi-private beds, and twenty-six private rooms, making a total capacity of 156 beds. None of the public wards has more than six beds in it, with the

average containing four.

tration of the Rosenthal Foundation for the Combatting of Cancer has been elected. The members of the Committee include Mme. Curie, the co-dis-coverer of radium, and Professors Ri-gaud, Roux, Calmette, Hartmann, Fabre and Dumas. The first expenditure of the fund will

be devoted to cancer research at the Institut Pasteur and the Institute of Radium.

A supplementary campaign to raise the sum of \$100,000 for the Newark, N. J. Community Chest will start on February 18. The Community Chest is conducted under the auspices of the Welfare Federation from which the Conference of Jewish Charities is scheduled to receive \$27,000 for the current year.

Opposition to any legislation that would interfere with the proper teaching of evolution or scientific knowledge generally in schools and colleges was expressed in a resolution adopted by the Educational Association of the Nethodist Episcopal Church, South, in Memphis, Tenn.

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
