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SEARCH FOR COVENANT ARK WILL BE STARTED, AMERICAN BIBLE SCHOLAR ANNOUNCES

Work on Mount Nebo To Begin Soon,
Futterer States

Jerusalem, Feb. 25.—Confidence that the Ark of the Covenant will be found in our generation was expressed by A. J. Futterer, president of the American-Jerusalem Bible Institute of Los Angeles, in an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here.

Futterer, who came to Palestine to conduct investigations on Mount Nebo where, history records, the ark was hidden in the sixth century before the Christian era by the Prophet Jeremiah, has made a survey of the caves on Mount Nebo preparatory to beginning the search. He has applied to the Transjordanian Department of Antiquities for a lease on Mount Nebo. When he receives this, Futterer said, he will begin the search.

KLAN MUST HAVE STATE PERMISSION TO OPERATE

Washington, D. C., Feb. 25.—The claim of the Ku Klux Klan to the right to carry on activities in any state without obtaining permission from the state was denied by the Supreme Court yesterday.

The question came from Kansas in an appeal by the Georgia Klan Corporation, which sought to conduct its activities there without obtaining permission, as required by the Kansas law relating to corporations organized in other States.

Questioning of John S. Dean, counsel for the Klan, by the members of the court during his argument was followed by Chief Justice Taft's announcement.

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PLUMER IS OPTIMISTIC OF PALESTINE DEVELOPMENT

Jerusalem, Feb. 25.—Optimistic views with regard to the future development of Palestine, notwithstanding the present economic conditions, were expressed by High Commissioner Lord Plumer in an interview with Herman Bernstein, editor of the New York "Jewish Tribune."

Mr. Bernstein was also received by Col. Symes and Mr. Keith-Roach.

"ARYAN" THEATRE IN VIENNA IS CLOSED

Vienna, Feb. 25.—The Aryan Theatre recently established by Vienna anti-Semites for the purpose of presenting only Aryan plays to Aryan audiences was closed down. Financial difficulties caused the cessation of the theatre's activities.

MANDATE IS NOT TRANS- FERABLE, AMERY TELLS HOUSE OF COMMONS

Mandates Do Not Form Tenure Held
From League, He Explains

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 25.—A definition of the legal character of a mandate over a territory, allotted to the allied governments following the World War, was given in the House of Commons by Col. Leopold H. Amery, Secretary for the Colonies.

In commenting upon this definition, the "Near East", a magazine close to the British Foreign Office, praises Col. Amery's statement in Commons for his declaration that the mandates allotted to one of the governments by the allied and associated powers did not in any sense form a tenure held from the League. The League is not in a position to take the mandate away nor transfer it.

The "Near East" further states that the decision with regard to the mandated territories has not been generally understood. It is well that this should have been so clearly explained by a spokesman of the British government, the paper states.

LORD ALLENBY PAYS TRIBUTE TO SOKOLOV

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 24.—Lord Allenby paid a tribute to Nahum Sokolov, chairman of the Executive of the World Zionist Organization, at a reception given in his honor by a committee of the Federation of English Zionists.

Sir Herbert Samuel, who presided, stated in his address that the world will be grateful to Sokolov who has devoted his life to the propagation of sound ideas. His wise counsel has always been available to steer the Zionist movement in times of crisis.

Lord Allenby declared that he only turned the first sod in Palestine and that the rest was done by people like Samuel and Sokolov, the great patriots of Jewry and of the British Empire.

Nahum Sokolov, in reply stated that the English Jews are doing the least for upbuilding Palestine and urged them to greater participation in the work. He outlined the position of the Zionist movement and added that during his last interview with Doumergue, the president of France was chiefly interested in the revival of the Hebrew language in Palestine.

EPSTEIN STATUE PRESENTED TO BRITISH NATION

London, Feb. 25.—Jacob Epstein's bronze, "A Study" will be presented to the British nation by a group of private citizens who have purchased the statue. It will be placed in the Tate Gallery.

GERMAN PRO-PALESTINE COMMITTEE ANSWERS ITS NON-ZIONIST OPPONENTS

Non-Zionists Meet But Take No
Action

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Berlin, Feb. 12.—The Presidium of the German Pro-Palestine Committee held its first meeting here. Count Bernstorff, former German Ambassador to the United States, presided. Rabbi Leo Baek, Professor Brecht, Dr. R. Breitscheid, Herr Kurt Blumenfeld, Professor Gressmann, Professor Hotetz, Professor Dr. Kaas, Dr. von Kardoff, Freiherr von Richthofen, Professor M. Sobernheim, Dr. W. Sobernheim, Madame Katherina von Oheimb and Herr Karl Glaser attended the meeting.

The Presidium dealt with the attacks on the Committee made by a Jewish group in Germany and decided to issue the following statement in reply:

"The German Pro-Palestine Committee is convinced that the upbuilding of the Homeland for the Jewish people provided for in the Palestine Mandate under the League of Nations is on political and economic grounds and as a work of human welfare entitled to German sympathy and the active participation of the German Jews. The German Pro-Palestine Committee is supporting a Jewish work and the activity which is bound up with it. It declines, however, to take up any stand in an internal Jewish conflict. It cannot understand the purpose of a Jewish group in calling upon the members of the German Pro-Palestine Committee to take a stand in internal Jewish affairs. There is no ground for the assumption that the members of the German Pro-Palestine

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MONOTYPE MACHINE NOW HAS HEBREW TYPE WITH "NEKUDOTH"

London, Feb. 15.—It will now be possible to print Hebrew with the vowel marks on the monotype machine, Lord Askwith announced at the annual meeting of the Lanston Monotype Corporation here.

Lord Askwith stated that an invention had been perfected for this type. The machine has been enlarged in order to print 48-point instead of 36-point type. It is expected that 72-point will soon be available, making the machine the largest in the world.

W. J. Burch said that with the development in Palestine and the opening of the Hebrew University, there would be an ever-growing demand for the new machine.

SAMUEL LAMPORT NAMED TO NEW YORK UNIVERSITY CENTENNIAL FUND COMMITTEE

Samuel C. Lamport has been appointed a member of the Centennial Fund Committee of New York University.

The University, which in 1931 will celebrate the 100th anniversary of its founding, has created in the Centennial Fund Office a permanent organization having as its purpose to keep in the mind of the public this institution's scientific work, public service and financial needs.

In the working out of its plans the Centennial Fund Committee will endeavor to raise \$73,000,000 as necessary new capital for progressive activity during the century.

Percy S. Straus is chairman of the Executive Committee of the Centennial Fund.

The cornerstone of the new synagogue and Talmud Torah of the Congregation Ahavath Achim, Bridgeport, Conn., was laid on Sunday. The Congregation Ahavath Achim was established 21 years ago.

Poland's Minister to U. S. States His Government's Attitude on Jewish Problem

An expression of the Polish government's attitude on the Jewish situation in Poland, emphasizing that, "viewed in the light of our State policy—there certainly is no Jewish problem in Poland" and that it aside from this official aspect a Jewish problem does exist, "then it is a purely psychological one," is contained in an article by Jan Ciechanowski, Minister of Poland to the United States, appearing in the Feb. 25 issue of the "American Hebrew." The article is the context of an address delivered recently by the Polish Minister before the Education Forum of the Brooklyn Jewish Center.

Reviewing the history of the Jews in Poland and citing proofs that they received fair treatment in that country, Mr. Ciechanowski asks:

"What then are the reasons for the alleged racial feeling of which we have heard so much? Does that feeling exist? What is its extent? How far is it a menace to the future internal peace of Poland's Jewish population?" Mr. Ciechanowski then proceeds to answer these questions as follows, in the course of which he seeks to justify the anti-Jewish boycott movement in Poland:

"If a hostile feeling against the Jewish population became evident in Poland during the first months or years after the World War, it is only fair to state that evidence of such a feeling was confined to specific cases, that it was of short duration, and that the Polish Government and authorities of the Polish State have worked to eliminate it and to meet the just demands of the Jewish population in accordance with the spirit and wording of the Constitution. I think I may definitely say that no collective racial feeling exists in Poland.

JEWISH WOMEN RAISE \$100,000 IN NEW YORK U.P.A.

A sum exceeding \$100,000 has already been raised towards the women's quota of \$250,000 in the 1927 United Palestine Appeal, Mrs. Anna Moscovitz Kross, Chairman of the Women's Division, announced at a rally held Thursday afternoon at Town Hall.

Mrs. David E. Goldfarb, president of the New York Federation of Sisterhoods and Chairman of the Jewish Women's Organizations of Greater New York, and Mrs. Louis Petchesky, Chairman of the Brooklyn Division of the United Palestine Appeal, were other speakers at the rally.

The rally was preceded by a luncheon at the Town Club, which was attended by district chairmen of the Women's Division, members of the Executive Committee of the Women's Division and heads of Hadassah chapters.

the Christian population of Poland to take up commerce, and a desire on the part of producers of goods to avoid the middleman. Hence a tendency towards cooperative selling and buying, which results in loss to Jewish middlemen.

"The cooperative movement in Poland has been growing steadily, and in order to gain customers, some of its groups have resorted to the slogan of boycotting Jewish shops. This may have reduced business conducted by the Jewish population, but the effect has been on the whole local in extent.

"This discriminating slogan should not be interpreted as a proof of hostility on the part of Christians against Jewish citizens as such. It was rather a somewhat primitive catchword calculated to impress the uneducated sections of the population to sell and purchase goods on a cooperative system. It should be borne in mind that the Jewish population has virtually held a monopoly of retail trade and limits its activities almost entirely to commerce.

The minister goes on to relate the steps taken by the present Polish government to settle "some of the outstanding questions relating to the Jewish population," and adds:

"I can assure you most emphatically that—viewed in the light of our State policy—there certainly is no Jewish problem in Poland.

"The Polish State regards the three million people who constitute our Jewish population as Poles of Jewish faith. From a state point of view, this is the only sound definition.

"If apart from the official aspect of the matter there exists a Jewish problem in Poland, then it is a purely psychological one."

Mr. Ciechanowski thinks the "psychological problem" is due to the fact that "where a ghetto exists, the demarcation of their group from other groups is made clear, and this tends to isolate them from the rest of the population." As for the solution of the problem, the Polish Minister declares: "The solution of a psychological problem requires time and great tact on both sides. Such a problem can best be solved by the spreading of education, by the enlightenment of the masses, and by introducing a gradual process of sincere cooperation on the part of the Jewish section of the population with the rest of the nation.

"The Polish nation should have constant evidence that the Polish citizen of Jewish faith is as loyal a citizen as any other Pole, ready to collaborate in every way for the benefit of the state.

"The final solution of the problem rests as much with the Jewish population as with the Poles."

CHALLENGE ROUMANIA'S OFFICIAL ORGAN TO PROVE ITS ANTI-JEWISH CHARGES

Bucharest, Feb. 6.—The Government organ "Indreptarea" is accusing Jewish organizations, journalists, political leaders and Jewish students of being engaged in conducting a campaign in the foreign press against Roumania, writes the "Vitorul," the organ of the Liberal Party.

"All these people," it continues, "are in the country and are Roumanian citizens. The Government must know who they are, since the 'Indreptarea' is bringing these charges against them. Why then are their names not made public? We think it is in the public interest that the names of these libelers of our country should be known, even if the Government does not intend to take proceedings against them. If the Government does not know who they are or has not sufficient evidence against them, it should stop pouring oil on the fire which Cuza is trying to light."

"The Lupta," organ of the Peasants' Party reprints the challenge from the "Vitorul" and comments: "We associate ourselves fully with these remarks. We are waiting for the Government organ to make public the names."

CAMPAIGN TO BE LAUNCHED IN MARCH BY AMERICAN HE- BREW CONGREGATIONS UNION

A meeting of the Board of Governors of the Hebrew Union College will be held on March 1st, at the Harmonic Club, New York City.

Alfred M. Cohen, president of the Board, will preside at the session. In the evening a dinner will be held at which Ludwig Vogelstein, chairman of the Executive Board of the Union, will preside, and Adolph S. Ochs will be the principal speaker.

Daily News" (Feb. 24) by Dr. Mordecai Katz. Discussing the various possible causes of the numerous suicides, Dr. Katz observes:

"One of the sicknesses of our generation is the weakening of the family ties, which has of late made its appearance among Jews too. For thousands of years Jewish family life was looked upon as the purest and most exemplary in the world. But the process of weakening in this respect which has been going on throughout the world has finally begun to have its effects among the Jews. This leads to the estrangement of parents and children and frequently the children become somewhat spoiled morally. It makes the children indifferent to their parents, for there can be no doubt that if they were deeply attached to the family they would strive to spare their folks the suffering and pain resulting from a child's suicide."

N. Y. SCHOOL FOR SOCIAL WORK HOLDS ELECTIONS

Louis E. Kirstein of Boston, was re-elected president of the Training School for Jewish Social Work, at the annual meeting of the board of trustees of the school at the Hotel Astor. Dr. Lee K. Frankel of New York, vice-president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, was re-elected first vice-president and A. Richard Frank of Chicago, was elected second vice-president. Other officers named were I. Edwin Goldwasser of New York, as treasurer and Solomon Lowenstein, executive director of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of New York, as secretary. Maurice J. Karpf is the director of the school.

The following trustees were re-elected for three year terms: Mrs. Sidney C. Borg, Judge Irving Lehman, Julius Rosenwald, Fred M. Stein, I. Edwin Goldwasser and David M. Heyman. Mr. Karpf, in his report as director of the school, announced that the student body of the first class has been placed in positions in New York and other cities. The school has received support from ten federations of philanthropies in various parts of the country. Maintenance fellowships of \$1,500 each were received from the Jewish Charities of Cleveland, the Jewish Charities of St. Louis and the United Jewish Charities of Detroit.

Among other agencies throughout the country which have contributed toward the support of the school are the New York Foundation, the Nathan Hofheimer Foundation, the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of New York, the Jewish Charities of Chicago, the Federation of Jewish Charities of Philadelphia, the Federation of Jewish Charities of Cleveland, the United Jewish Charities of Detroit, the Federated Jewish Charities of Boston, the Jewish National Welfare Fund of San Francisco, the Associated Jewish Charities of Baltimore, the United Jewish Social Agencies of Cincinnati, the Federated Jewish Charities of Milwaukee, the Jewish Federation of Indianapolis and the Charity Chest of the Fur Industry of New York.

It was announced that the board of trustees of the school has set aside a special fund to be known as the Charles Hirshon Student Aid Fund in memory of Charles Hirshon. This fund is available to students who are not holders of a fellowship and who need financial assistance to enable them to continue their studies in the school.

A new enlarged edition of the Jewish Year Book, now in its thirty-first year, has just been published by the London "Jewish Chronicle." The volume is edited by the Rev. S. Levy. There are two new sections—Mandated Territories and Representative Institutions in the United States.

The first volume of the new edition of the lexicon of Yiddish literature, press and philology, compiled by Saiman Reizen, has been published in Vilna. The first edition was issued in 1914 in one volume. The second volume of the new edition is already in the press.

The lexicon gives short biographies of hundreds of Yiddish writers, journalists and philologists and details regarding their work.

Committee are not sufficiently informed of the tasks of this committee. Cooperation in the Jewish Palestine work is in no way designed to affect the position of the Jews in German State or public life. The work which has been undertaken in Palestine contributes to the improvement of the position of Jewry throughout the world."

Berlin, Feb. 13.—A meeting of opponents of the German Pro-Palestine Committee was held here, the invitation to the meeting being headed: "Germanism and the dangers of the Palestine work." Dr. Simon was in the chair.

Dr. Rosenthal, the preacher of the Jewish Reform community in Berlin, said that the Palestine question was one of the most important in Jewish life. He admitted that Zionism had achieved a great deal in the upbuilding of Palestine. "The Zionist movement contains people who have given their whole lives to their ideals," he said. "But Palestine is the Holy Land to non-Zionists too. It is a land of great memories and it is loved by all peoples. Before there was any Zionism upbuilding work had been carried on in Palestine. It is necessary to provide an existence for our unfortunate co-religionists in Eastern Europe. Apart from that, however, Judaism is solely adherence to the Jewish religion. The essential task of Judaism is to uphold the Jewish faith and to uphold it worthily among the peoples. A Jewish nationalism must in effect become anti-religious. It is impossible for us to recognize a Jewish nation. We agree with the work in Palestine so far as it does not presume a Jewish nationalism. We are not in Germany as guests, we are at home among the German people. Germany is our homeland, we are bound with our hearts' blood to the German State and people. Zionism has rent German Jewry."

Pastor Haack of Breslau said that Christianity and Judaism are two instruments which unite to give forth a harmonious praise to the Creator. There is nothing to divide Christian and Jew. He felt himself closer to his Jewish brother than to one who is only a nominal Christian. "The German Jews are part of the German people. In the War the Jews were the bravest of Germany's soldiers. The anti-Semites brought up the question of race, contending that the Jews belonged to another race. If they were to divide the German people according to its various component races, they would split up the whole people into innumerable fractions," he said. "Palestine is in any case not a Jewish State. It is under British administration, under the control of the League of Nations. It is tragic to see Jewry split into two parties. The Jewish religion alone can unite all Jewry. The Jewish people should go on in the straight way, not letting themselves be divided either by the anti-Semites or by the Zionists," he said.

DR. EHRENPREIS REFUSES SALONICA CHIEF RABBINATE

Salonica, Feb. 2.—Dr. Ehrenpreis, Chief Rabbi of Stockholm, has declined to accept the call to the Chief Rabbinate of Greece.

The Council of the Jewish Community of Salonica has approached several other rabbis, offering them the post.

Salonica, Feb. 2.—A conference of the trade unions of Greece was held at Athens. The trade unions of Salonica were represented by two Greeks and three Jews, including the Jewish Deputy Siksky.

The Jewish delegates submitted a motion demanding the modification of the Sunday Closing Law. The delegates representing the Greek refugees from Asia Minor objected to the motion, demanding the strict application of the Sunday Closing Law.

It was decided to take steps to enable the small shopkeepers of Salonica resident in the quarters of the refugees from Asia Minor to be permitted to keep their shops open on Sundays.

As a result of the recent controversy between the Humane Society of New York and the Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn over the alleged mistreatment of dogs kept at the hospital, the Humane Society, David Rubin, President of the Society, has instructed its attorney to change his will so as to withdraw a bequest he had intended to leave that society according to an announcement by his secretary, M. M. Gohers. The amount of the intended bequest was not made known, but it was said that it was to have been "substantial."

Dr. M. M. Shear, administrative officer of the Harry Gwyn Pediatric Research at the Jewish Hospital, issued a statement denying that he had been any mistreatment of the dogs. He declared that every care was taken to provide for the comfort of the animals.

Leaders of the Joint Board of the Furriers' Union, at a mass meeting Thursday night at Cooper Union, arranged as a counter-demonstration to the gathering on the previous night of the International Fur Workers' Union, challenged the American Federation of Labor and the officers of the International Fur Workers' Union to oust them and reorganize the fur union of fur workers in New York.

Before nearly 2,500 men and women, speakers urged the necessity of a united front of all Left Wing workers to combat the A. F. of L. policy of sweeping Communists from the unions.

A resolution was adopted calling for the formation of a joint committee of representatives of the deposed Joint Board of Furriers, "for the purpose of defending our unions and maintaining decent standards of work in the shops."

Other resolutions denounced the officers of the International Fur Workers' Union and the American Federation of Labor for "carrying on a campaign of slander and malicious provocation," and charged that "the same bureaucratic officials have attempted to frame up the joint board, and its members with charges of bribing New York police."

Another resolution protested against the expulsion last week by the Central Trades and Labor Council of the delegates of the deposed Left Wing and Communist Joint Board of Cloakmakers from the Joint Board of Furriers and demanded that the delegates be reinstated.

Ben Gold, manager of the Joint Board of Furriers, and Louis Hyman, leader of the deposed Cloakmakers' Joint Board, Samuel Liebowitz, Fannie Warshtafsky and Isaac Shapiro were the speakers. Five thousand dollars was pledged by the union members to fight the court cases pending against Levy members accused of assault during the recent furriers' strike.

JEWISH COMMUNAL ACTIVITIES

The Sephardic Jewish Community of New York, Inc., has purchased the building located at 20-45 West 115th Street for use as a community center. The cost of the building was \$50,000. It contains a gymnasium, an auditorium, executive offices, meeting rooms and a playground. Alterations are being made and possession of the property is expected to be taken on or about April 1st.

Plans for erection of an addition to the present Jewish Community building in Troy, N. Y., at a cost of approximately \$100,000, were announced by Joseph Goodman, chairman of the Jewish Community Association. Construction of the structure is to be started within a short time.

Henry Morgenthau, former United States Ambassador to Turkey, will be the speaker at the first spring luncheon of the Women's Division of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies at the Hotel Astor on March 1. Mrs. Sidney C. Borg, vice-president of the Federation and chairman of the Women's Division, will preside. Mr. Morgenthau will speak on "Vocations and Avocations." The purpose of the luncheon is to announce plans for the division's participation in the 1927 program of the Federation. In the 1926 program, the division raised about \$50,000.

The United Palestine Appeal in Atlanta, Ga. for \$25,000, will be launched on March 20, it was announced. I. J. Paradise is chairman of the campaign; Mrs. S. E. Levy, J. Saul, George Gershon, Julian W. Boehm, Leopold H. S. Jacobs, vice-chairman, and H. S. Jacobs is treasurer. Sam E. Levy is secretary. It is expected that Sir Windham Davies will address the opening meeting.

The campaign for funds to erect the B'nai Jacob Community Center in Norfolk, Va., is now being conducted.

The center will contain a swimming pool, gymnasium, meeting rooms, and an auditorium. It is estimated the cost will be about \$20,000. The structure will be built on a site which has already been donated.

The sum of \$12,000 in contributions has been raised thus far.

Jewish charities are bequeathed \$26,000 by the terms of the will of Helen K. Fridenberg, of Philadelphia, probated this week.

The testatrix died February 6, leaving two estates, her own private one, valued at about \$12,000, and one willed to her in trust by her late husband, Solomon S. Fridenberg, who died January 27, 1921.

Mrs. Fridenberg bequeathed \$5,000 each to the Sinai Hospital, Eagleville Sanitarium, Marxer's Hospital of Philadelphia, and United Hebrew Charities of Philadelphia, and the Jewish Foster Home of Philadelphia, aggregating bequests of \$25,000. In addition to these, she left \$1,000 to the Jewish Seaside Home, Atlantic City, as a memorial to her niece, Florence Berlinger Kessler.

ment that the counsel for the State would not have to be heard, as the court was without jurisdiction in the case. An order giving effect to the court's decision to dismiss the appeal will shortly be announced.

Members of the court read from the records that the Klan has contested the Kansas law on the ground that it was not "doing business" in the State and could not therefore be required to comply with the corporation law, calling for it to obtain permission.

Dr. Hugo Gressmann, Dean at the University of Berlin, who has just concluded a series of lectures at Oxford and Cambridge arrived in New York Saturday on the S. S. "Munich."

Dr. Gressmann comes to the United States as the first lecturer of the Hilda Stich Stroock Foundation at the Jewish Institute of Religion. The Foundation provides that non-Jewish scholars be invited from European countries and America. The Lectureship is designed by its founder, Joseph Stroock, to bring to the students of the Institute non-Jewish scholars.

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
