

VIENNA KEHILLAH REQUEST ON ELECTION DATE REFUSED BY AUSTRIAN GOVERNMENT

State Elections Will Take Place on
Last Day of Passover
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Mar. 8.—The Austrian government has notified the Vienna Jewish Communal board that it finds it impossible to postpone the date of the state elections from April 24.

The board requested the government to postpone the elections because the date coincides with the last day of Passover, when the Jewish voters will be unable to go to the polls because of the memorial services which are held on that day.

The authorities stated that the holding of the elections on April 24 is a state necessity and expressed the hope that Jewish voters will not be prevented from exercising their franchise as the casting of the vote will not require writing or travelling.

HAKENKREUZLER POGROM AGITATION INTENSIFIED AS PASSOVER APPROACHES

Vienna, Mar. 8.—The Jewish communal board of Vienna has directed the attention of the Austrian government to the increasing anti-Semitic propaganda of the Volkskampf, the organ of the Austrian Hakenkreuzler, in connection with the approaching Passover season.

The publication is printing numerous articles, accusing the Jews of ritual murder and tarning the importation of

GERMAN GOVERNMENT TO AID JEWISH UNEMPLOYED

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Mar. 8.—An important decision of the German government with regard to aiding Jewish unemployed workers resident in Germany, though not citizens of the country, was made public by the Minister of Labor.

The Minister notified the Jewish employment bureau that in future the government will extend unemployment aid to the Statelosen (men without a country) on an equal basis with German citizens.

GERMAN ANTI-SEMITE IS ARRESTED IN HUNGARY

Berlin, Mar. 8.—Rolstadt, one of the dangerous German anti-Semitic terrorists, was arrested by the police in the Hungarian town, Psenec, despatches received here state.

Rolstadt, who is a carpenter by trade, is accused of having planned some time ago to place a bomb under the synagogue of Frankfurt during the hour of services.

PALESTINE IS NOT IN FULL SENSE PART OF BRITISH EMPIRE, AMERY DECLARES

Britishers' Rights and Women's Suffrage in Palestine Discussed
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Mar. 8.—Palestine of the mandate is not in the full sense a part of the British Empire and for this reason the rights and prerogatives of British subjects are not fully applicable to Palestine, is the view of the British Colonial Office, according to a statement made in the House of Commons yesterday by Leopold H. Amery.

The statement was made in reply to a question asked by Col. Josiah Wedgwood, who inquired why British subjects resident in Palestine are not allowed to participate in the elections and to sit in the municipal councils in the country.

Col. Wedgwood also asked why women are not allowed to vote and to be elected to the councils.

Col. Amery replied that the High Commissioner was advised that it would be contrary to the sentiment of the great majority of the population to give women the franchise. In those areas where there is no objection, women have a right to vote in the local elections. The High Commissioner is considering a proposal to embody new clauses in the municipal elections law for adoption by those local municipalities which wish women to participate in the elections.

CAN'T CLAIM DOWRY WITH- OUT RELIGIOUS MARRIAGE, LEEDS COURT RULES

London, Mar. 8.—An interesting decision with regard to the dower rights of Jewish husbands was handed down by the County Court of Leeds recently.

A Jewish woman, Anna Sutton, brought suit to recover the amount of £400 deposited in a joint account with her husband.

The account consisted of £200 which had been her own property and £200 given to her by her parents as a dowry. In accordance with the Jewish dower custom, the £200 furnished by the parents would become the property of the husband after marriage.

The couple were married in May 1925, at the Registry Office, but no religious ceremony was held as Sutton declared himself an atheist and refused to be married according to Jewish rites. The couple never lived together.

The judge ordered that the entire amount be paid by the bank to Mrs. Sutton, declaring that Sutton was not entitled to the dowry as there had been no religious consummation of the marriage.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE SIGNS RESOLUTION POSTPONING NATIONAL ORIGINS PLAN

Commissioner Hull Issues Statistics on
Recent Immigration
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D. C., Mar. 8.—President Coolidge signed Senate Joint Resolution No. 152, on Friday, postponing for one year the application of the national origins provision of the Immigration Act. The national origins clause, designed to readjust the quotas of immigrants on the basis of the countries of their origins, would have gone into effect on July 1, without the legislation suspending the section. The resolution was accepted by the House on March 3 by a record vote of 232 to 111.

Under the method now employed the annual quota of immigrants of any nationality is 2 per cent of the number of foreign-born individuals of such nationality resident in the United States as determined by the census of 1890. The Immigration Act of 1924 provided that after July 1, 1927, the national origins method of fixing immigration quotas should be used, provided the President should issue a proclamation announcing the quotas of different nations. The question arose as to whether the law

HAAS CASE INSTIGATORS ARE BROUGHT TO TRIAL

Berlin, Mar. 8.—Echoes of the Rudolph Haas affair, the so-called German Dreyfus case, were sounded in the supreme court of Naumburg yesterday when the trial of two German jurists involved in the Haas case began.

The court started disciplinary proceedings against Hofmann, director of the Landesgericht, and Koelling, counsel of the court. The two were responsible for instigating the accusation against Rudolph Haas, the Jewish merchant of Magdeburg, in the murder of Heler, Haas's bookkeeper. Schroeder later confessed to the crime.

JEWISH STUDENTS IN KOVNO WANT CORPSES FOR CLINICS

Kovno, Mar. 8.—The demand that corpses of the Jewish dead which are not claimed by relatives be submitted to the clinics for dissection was presented by a delegation of Jewish students appearing before the Club of Jewish Deputies in the Lithuanian parliament.

The delegation represented the Federation of Jewish Medical Students at the University of Kovno. They argued that among the Christians it is compulsory to deliver unclaimed bodies to the clinics.

SENATOR REED'S PRESENCE ON FORD DEFENSE SEEN AS MOVE IN PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN

**Role as Ford's Chief Counsel in Sapiro
Libel Suit Linked with Political
Ambitions**

Interesting sidelights on the forthcoming Ford-Sapiro trial which will begin in Detroit on Monday, March 15, were shed by a prominent western visitor in New York City.

The information concerned the role of Senator James A. Reed of Missouri, who will act as Henry Ford's chief counsel in the \$1,000,000 libel suit of Aaron Sapiro.

It develops that in addition to the \$100,000 retainer given by Mr. Ford to Senator Reed for his services during the trial, the Senator is to receive \$2,500 per day. The well-informed visitor stated that the acceptance by Senator Reed of the Ford retainer in the Sapiro libel trial has something to do with the political combinations of the forthcoming presidential campaign in 1928. It is pointed out that Senator Reed's consent to serve as Ford's counsel is a move to win the sympathy of the Klan and the dry elements for him in the Presidential campaign. Both these elements find in Henry Ford a spokesman and a protagonist.

This move, Senator Reed hopes, will win the dries, who are supporting McAdoo, as well as reconcile the Klan which he has in the past attacked. On the other hand, by espousing the cause of the liberals, he will be in a position to find the support of the liberal elements, including Jews. In this way Senator Reed would be in a strategic position in the pre-convention months as the foremost opponent of Governor Smith, it was stated.

The state conference of the Jewish National Fund in Texas was held on Sunday. Delegates representing twelve communities were present.

A resolution was adopted to issue a call to the Texas communities to organize local J. N. F. branches. A state quota of \$5,000 for inscriptions in the Golden Book was adopted.

It was decided to hold the convention of the Texas Zionist Organization in Waco on May 1.

See Anti-Jewish Move in Demand for Higher Requirements for Bar

The charge that the demand for higher requirements for admission to the bar in New York is in reality a movement to limit the number of Jewish lawyers is made by the Jewish press. This charge, hinted at by the "Jewish Morning Journal", which was quoted here yesterday, is expressed emphatically by the "Day" and the "Jewish Daily News."

Both papers state they have no objection to the raising of the requirements for bar admission but criticize the injection of a Jewish issue into the question, as was done by Herbert Fordham in his Albany address. Says the "Day" (Mar. 8): "This movement does not represent a desire to elevate and dignify the profession but a maneuver against a certain element in the profession, or, to put it plainly and brutally—against the growing number of Jewish lawyers in New York. It is desired to raise the standards in the belief that by making the requirements more difficult the Jewish law students will be frightened away. And Mr. Fordham, who, spoke for higher requirements, formulated this very definitely. He predicted his thesis on the ground that there are too many Jews in the profession anyway and that most of them 'come from ignorant families, who lack American traditions and an American background.' In this way the cat has been let out of the bag and the effort in the direction of higher standards supposedly for the whole legal profession assumes a totally different aspect; it appears as the old, ugly and un-American effort to restrict the Jews."

The paper urges that the entire project of higher requirements be carefully scrutinized to make sure that, if applied, it should be effective for everybody, not only for the Jews.

"The 'Jewish Daily News' observes: 'The complaint against the Jewish lawyers is not because they lack an American background nor because they come from ignorant families, but

The movement to prevent the public schools from dismissing pupils one hour earlier provided they spend the time in religious instruction is not aimed to ban religious education from religious instruction. Joseph Lewis, President of the Free Thinkers Society.

"The meeting of the Catholic teachers' organization at the Waldorf on Sunday," said Mr. Lewis, "created the false impression that we are trying to prevent children from getting religious instruction. We maintain that parents have a perfect right to give their children religious instruction after school hours. All we are trying to do is to have the public schools obey the State law regarding the separation of Church and State and to keep religion out of the schools."

Mr. Lewis said that the appeal in the case now being tested as to whether schools have a right to dismiss children for religious instruction would be tried in the April term of the Court of Appeals.

on the contrary, precisely because the Jewish lawyers understand law and devote themselves to it with all their sincerity. The cause of the trouble is not Jewish inability, but rather Jewish ability. They cannot bear to think of our Marshalls, our Brandeises and our Cardozas.

"This is not a question, it seems, of raising the requirements for law students. Jews are not afraid of higher requirements. It is a question of an agitation against Jewish lawyers."

The Proposal to Remove the "Cherem" Against Spinoza

The report that the radical members of the Warsaw Kehillah are planning to propose that that body remove the "cherem" or act of excommunication issued against Baruch Spinoza in the 17th century by the Kehillah of Amsterdam, is viewed as absurd by the orthodox papers, the "Jewish Morning Journal" and the "Jewish Daily News."

There is an impression prevalent among Jews as well as non-Jews, the "Morning Journal" says, that the "cherem" placed on Spinoza was a result of the fanaticism of the leaders of the Amsterdam Jewish community who took vengeance on one who dared to doubt the principles of the Jewish religion.

"This," the paper declares, "is far from the truth. Those who do not trust the Jewish historians on this point can find the explanation in the popular book of Prof. Will Durant, 'The History of Philosophy.' Prof. Durant relates in his chapter on Spinoza, what is well known to those who are familiar with the situation in Holland at that time. The Jews had arrived there only recently, they were not sure of their position and atheism at that time, even in the liberal Holland, was regarded as dangerous. The state persecuted outspoken atheists, and the Jews feared lest they lose in the eyes of the Dutch population if a second attack on religion were to be recorded on their account shortly after the trouble they had with Uriel Acosta. They felt, therefore, that, as a matter of self-protection, they were compelled to repudiate the man whom the people of Holland had begun to regard as dangerous."

The "Jewish Daily News" thinks that if the proposal to remove the "cherem" against Spinoza will actually be made it will merely offer "an opportunity to laugh at the stupidity of the radical members of the Warsaw Kehillah." The question is "out of order," the paper argues, because (1) the Warsaw Kehillah is not a body intended to deal with the philosophical opinions of private individuals, (2) the Warsaw Kehillah is not a higher court than the court of the Amsterdam community which excommunicated Spinoza and (3) the Warsaw Kehillah has

SIR WYNDHAM DEEDES DISCUSSES PALESTINE ON ARRIVAL IN U. S.

Sir Wyndham Deedes, former Civil Secretary of the Palestine government, upon his arrival in New York on the steamer Deutschland, stated in an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that steps now taken by the Palestine government will in a measure relieve the unemployment situation in Palestine. The steps referred to are the planned construction of the Haifa harbor and the construction of the government building in Mizpah.

Sir Wyndham, who has come to this country to aid in the United Palestine Appeal, stated that the relations between the Arabs and the Jews in Palestine are improving. The time is not distant when complete harmony will prevail between the two parts of the Palestine population, he said.

Replying to a question as to the Crown lands for Jewish colonization, Sir Wyndham stated that what the Jews need at the present time is money rather than land.

Sir Wyndham visited the United States 26 years ago. He is stopping at the Chatham Hotel.

PROMINENT VISITORS COME TO PALESTINE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 8.—Leonard Montefiore, president of the Anglo-Jewish Association and representative of the Jewish Colonization Association, is expected to arrive here next week.

Sixty Bulgarian scholars, members of a delegation which is making a tour of the Middle East to study the economic and political conditions, is expected to arrive here shortly.

Leaders of the anti-Zionist Palestine Arab Executive will attempt to see Sir John E. Shuckburgh, assistant under-state secretary of the Colonial Office, who is touring the country. It was also stated that the Executive is preparing a memorandum to be submitted at the forthcoming session of the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations.

Samuel Untermyer, who is on a tour around the world, is expected to arrive here in April.

New Rochelle (N. Y.) officials and prominent Jewish leaders attended the dedication services for the new Hebrew Institute Building in that city.

Among the speakers were Mayor Benjamin B. Badeau, of New Rochelle; former Mayor Harry Scott, Abraham Shinn, president of the institute; Maurice Levine, Louis Marshall and Rabbi Margolis, of Mount Vernon.

The drive to raise New Bedford's quota of \$10,000 for the United Palestine Appeal was launched last Sunday at a meeting held in the Tifereth Israel Synagogue. Samuel Barnett heads the campaign.

REPRESENTATIVES OF GOVERNMENT TO ATTEND HIAS ANNUAL MEETING

Theodore G. Risley, Solicitor of the Federal Department of Labor and U. S. Senator Royal S. Copeland, will address the annual meeting of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America, at the Hotel Astor, next Sunday.

They are scheduled to speak at the afternoon session, at which time Mr. Abraham Herman, president of the organization, will present, for ratification, a plan for a chain of immigrant-aid centers which it plans to establish in Europe, South Africa, Australia, and a number of South American Republics, to prepare Jewish settlers for life in those countries.

These centers which will be established under the joint auspices of the Hias, the Jewish Colonization Association, of Paris, and the United Emigrant Aid Societies of Europe, will, at the points of departure, give advice as to the countries offering immigrants the best opportunities, and teach the prospective immigrant, the language of the country for which he is bound, and a trade or vocation suited to that country.

Representatives of several South American Republics are expected to be present at the meeting to present the attitude of their governments toward the Hias project.

HEBREW UNIVERSITY TO OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY OF NEWTON'S DEATH

Jerusalem, Mar. 8.—The two hundredth anniversary of the death of Sir Isaac Newton will be commemorated by the Institute of Mathematics and Physics of the Hebrew University here.

Exercises will be held at the Institute on March 31. Four lectures will be delivered on Newton at the Institute.

The new Synagogue of the Beth Tfiloh Congregation, Forest Park, Baltimore, Md., was dedicated on Sunday, March 6.

Samuel J. Kessler, chairman of the Board of Governors, was chairman at the exercises. Israel S. Gomborov, ex-president of the Congregation, Rabbi Joseph Marcus, and Harry T. Kellman, president of the synagogue, and other officers addressed the large gathering.

The principal address was delivered by Rabbi Davidowitz, of Atlantic City, N. J. The new structure consists of a Community Center and a synagogue. The two buildings of the Beth Tfiloh are so erected that they are joined together by means of sliding doors and openings at each floor level in a manner that they can be opened or closed upon the authority of the Board of Governors. By means of these sliding doors, the Synagogue auditorium, with a regular seating capacity of 350, can be increased during the High Holy Days to a seating capacity of 1,200, on the same floor level, and the gallery by a similar arrangement increased from 200 to 500. In the Community Center Building there is a large gymnasium. There are six class rooms for the Hebrew School.

The auditorium of the Synagogue is on a high level, while on the first floor, on a level with the street, is the Beth Hamedresh, which accommodates 150 people. There is also a study for the rabbi, as well as a meeting room for the Board, a large room for the library and a place of study for the congregation.

PALESTINE Z. O. EXECUTIVE DRAFTS MEMORANDUM TO MANDATES COMMISSION

Jerusalem, Feb. 11.—The Palestine Zionist Executive has already drafted the memorandum which it intends to submit to the Permanent Mandates Commission at its next session in Geneva.

The memorandum contains answers to that part of the Commission's questionnaire which refers to the activity of the Jewish Agency. The data collected by the Palestine Zionist Executive have been despatched to London where the memorandum will be completed by the World Zionist Executive.

ONE KILLED, TWO INJURED WHEN HITLERITE ROWDIES ATTACK JEWISH MEETING

Berlin, Mar. 8.—One person was killed and two were seriously injured in an attack made by a band of Hooligans, members of the Adolph Hitler organization, in Rastaalten, near Coblenz.

The band invaded a hall where the local branch of the Central Verein der Deutschen Juden was in session.

The police intervened, arresting many of the Hitlerites.

ASK EXTENSION OF J.D.C. RELIEF IN TEL AVIV

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Jerusalem, Feb. 13.—A conference of representatives of various charitable societies was held in Tel Aviv to discuss the combination of all relief activities in that town. The number of people in Tel-Aviv who are in need of temporary relief is estimated at 20,000, including the unemployed. The Joint Distribution Committee of America has assigned £E1,000 per month for constructive loans, but a far greater grant-in-aid is needed, it was declared. The residents of Tel-Aviv contribute £1,000 to charitable institutions monthly.

The Conference decided to establish a united organization for relief and also to ask the Joint Distribution Committee for an increase in its monthly contribution.

Jerusalem, Feb. 11.—During 1926, 1,061 houses, comprising 1,384 rooms and shops, were built in Tel-Aviv. The value of the newly-created houses is estimated at £235,873. The total area covered by the houses is 54,000 square metres. The area covered by the houses which were built in 1925 totaled 239,405 square metres, in 1924 83,511 square metres and in 1923 33,106 square metres.

The International Fur Workers' Union opened headquarters at No. 3 East 27th St., New York, and issued a call to all members of the fur unions recently suspended to assist the newly-created union in the setting up of new locals.

In the call, which is signed by Oisid Schachman, as President of the International, and by Mathew Wolf, Hugh Frayne and Edward McGrady, the American Federation of Labor Committee in charge of reorganizing the furriers, the Communist heads of the old locals are accused of favoritism in the distribution of work and of general misconduct.

Ben Gold, the Communist leader who the International expelled last week, replied to the Schachman call with an appeal for support and asked members of the old locals to pay promptly the \$25 assessment recently levied.

SPIEGLER TO COME TO AMERICA WITH HAKOAH

Director Spiegler, president of the Macabean World Organization, will arrive in the United States with the Hakoah Football Club of Vienna on April 9. The Macabean World Organization has branches in many countries.

The Hakoah team, consisting of eighteen players, will be accompanied by Dr. Ignatz Koerner, president of the Hakoah, and Otto Barr, trainer.

A schedule starting in April and extending through June has been arranged for the team, the Hakoah headquarters at 31 Union Square announce. They will play in most of the larger cities in the country.

In the last fourteen games played by the Hakoah team in the Austrian Football League, the Vienna team lost but three matches and now stand second in the ranking, a much better place than that held by the team of 1926, when they had seventh place, prior to their first tour in America.

A cable despatch received from Vienna states that the newspapers there published a lengthy interview with Dr. Koerner upon his arrival from the United States this week. Dr. Koerner, who was in the United States to arrange for the second tour of the Hakoah, stated that the Hakoah on its first tour contributed largely toward stimulating greater interest in soccer in the United States.

makes it mandatory on the President to issue such a proclamation.

Washington, D. C., Mar. 8.—More than twice as many immigrants were admitted to the United States during the month of January than departed from the country. The immigration statistics for the month of January, just made public by Harry E. Hull, Commissioner of Immigration, show that 28,023 aliens entered and 13,981 departed during that month.

Nearly two-thirds of these immigrants were home-makers. Of the 1,499 aliens who were turned back because of faulty visas or for other reasons, 1,171 were barred at the Canadian border, 128 on the Mexican border and 132 on the Atlantic seaboard.
