Ford Never Saw Articles Attacking Jews Published in His "Dearborn Independent" His Chief Counsel Tells Jury in Detroit Court; Asserts Sapiro Described Himself as Moses Leading the Farmers Out of the Wilderness of Bankruptcy

COMPULSORY SUNDAY REST DESTROYS JEWISH TRADE IN LITHUANIA, FACTS SHOW

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Kovno, Mar. 18 .- The effects of the compulsory Sunday rest law on business conditions in Lithuania were depicted in a statement issued here by the Chamber of Commerce.

The number of business houses which applied for government licenses for 1927 was 3,000 less than the number of applications received in 1926. The houses which applied this year have smaller capital than those of 1926. This shows the breakdown in Jewish business life in Lithuania.

The Chamber asks the government to abolish the Sunday rest law, the observance of which compels the Jewish business men to keep their stores closed two days a week, resulting in the destruction of Jewish trade.

BOSTON HEBREW TEACHERS COLLEGE TO CONFER DEGREES (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Boston, Mass., Mar. 18.—Governor Fuller of Massachusetts has signed a bill authorizing the Hebrew Teachers College of Boston to grant the degrees of Bachelor, Master and Doctor of Hebrew Literature, Hebrew Laws and Jewish Education. The petition for the bill was signed by Louis Hurwich, superintendent of the Bureau of Jewish Education of Boston. The Hebrew College was opened in

1921 with thirteen students. The present attendance is 157. Dr. Samuel Perlman of Palestine is the present Dean of the College, having succeeded Dr. Nisson Touroff. The budget of 230,000 a year is supplied through the Bureau of Jewish Education with funds obtained from the Federated Jewish Charities.

Admission is open to graduates of the four-year Hebrew High School course. All subjects are taught in Hebrew. To receive a degree students must also complete at least two years

at a secular college.

HIAS LAUNCHES \$500,000 CAMPAIGN TO SETTLE JEWISH EMIGRANTS IN COUNTRIES OTHER THAN U. S.

South Africa, Australia and South American Countries Open to Immigrants Provided They Are Prepared; John L. Bernstein, Campaign Chairman, Appeals to National Bodies to Raise Fund

The campaign of the Hebrew Shel-1 tering and Immigrant Aid Society of America to raise \$500,000 was launched yesterday. The fund sought is to help Jewish refugees from Eastern and Central Europe to settle in countries other than the United States.

The fund is to finance a series of immigrant-aid activities of the Hias in conjunction with the Jewish Coloniza-tion Association, of Paris, and the United Jewish Emigration Societies of

Europe, known as Emigdirekt. The work is to be done in Europe and in the lands of immigration, according to a program agreed upon by the three organizations which have united for the purpose under the name of "Hias-Ica-Emigdirekt" with headquarters in Paris and Berlin. In various parts of Europe, and especially ous parts of Europe, and especially in the countries from which Jewish emigration is largest, such as Poland, Lithuania, Roumania, Bessarabia, Latvia, Constantinople and Harbin, emigrant-aid offices will be established at which advice will be given as to the countries where Jewish emigration is acceptable, and under what conditions;

training in the language of those countries and in some trade or vocation adapted to its economic needs. the lands of immigration, and particu-larly in the Republic of South America, including Brazil, Argentine, Paraguay Uruguay and Peru, shelter-houses will be established to receive the Jewish newcomers on their arrival. Employment bureaus, work-shops and trade ment bureaus, work-snops and trade schools, as well as language and citi-zenship courses will be given and loans to advance credits to the immigrants in all forms.

All of the facilities of the Emigdirekt in Europe, and all of the facili-ties of Ica in South America will be available for the Jews who otherwise would find their way into these countries without knowledge of the conditions confronting them, and with no preparation for successful establish-

ment there.

RUSSIAN PRINCE TRIES TO INCITE RIOTS AGAINST JEWS ON EAST SIDE

Prince Michael Obolensky, a Russian nobleman, attempted to celebrate St. Patrick's Day by causing a riot against Jews on the East Side. The prince appeared on 14th Street

and Avenue A and, before a Russian crowd in the street, he delivered a pogrom-inciting speech. This caused the protest of Jewish passersby who heard him. Obolensky was arrested.

He was brought before Magistrate Tolleris of Essex Market Court where he was ordered to repeat his address. In it he declared, "If I could, I would kill all the Jews." Obolensky was held without bail pending an investigation by the immi-

gration authorities. He stated that he came to the United States in August, 1926 and was married to Katherine Trask of East Orange, N. J., from whom he is now separated. He is employed in a powder puff factory at \$20 a week.

JEWISH STUDENT IS TRIED FOR SHOT IN SELF-DEFENSE (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Bucharest, Mar. 1.—The trial of a Jewish student, Isaac Lespesiantu, took place before the Correctional Tribunal here. Lespesiantu was tried for having fired a revolver into the air to frighten off Cuzist students who attacked him.

Lespesiantu told the court that the students followed him out of a theatre he had attended and threatened to give him a beating. For some years past, he said, anti-Semitic students had been persecuting him and had threatened several times to kill him. On one occasion he had saved himself by taking refuge in the house of Col. He Bolintinanu, who defended him. bought the revolver because he felt that he was in constant danger. The counsel for the defense, Advocate Balacianu, complained that he had

REED SAYS FORD NEVER SAW ANTI-JEWISH ARTICLES IN 'DEARBORN INDEPENDENT'

The circulation of the "Dearborn Independent" was put at 600,000 by Senator Reed, who added that the circulation is very extensive among the farming population of the country. farming population of the country.

"The paper is partially a magazine in character," he said, "carrying articles on various subjects including agricultural problems and it is taken largely by farmers and the people in the small towns of the country. The evidence will show that these articles concern-ing Sapiro", Senator Reed said, "were printed in good faith, not printed in printed in good faith, not printed malice, and after every reasonable preexpect to show, in substance and effect, all of them were true.

Senator Reed then launched into a detailed explanation of Sapiro's farming activities, from the time he became Secretary of the California State Industrial Board to the period of the "Dearborn Independent" attack. His description of Sapiro's activities, differdescription of Sapiros activities, differ-ing greatly from that given by Mr. Gallagher, chief counsel for Sapiro, contained frequent inuendos as to alleged irregularities in the Sapiro farming organizations. Frequently there were statements about these irregularities, to which Gallagher vigorously obiected. It is expected that the first witness,

W. J. Cameron, editor of the "Dearborn Independent", will be called on Friday to the stand to establish the fact that the alleged libelous articles were printed.

"Sapiro," prompted Mr. Gallagher, pronouncing it as though spelled "Sapeero.

"He went to the farmers if not as the Moses who was to lead them out of the wilderness and into the Promised Land of Prosperity, then at least he went to them as Aaron the Talker.

"We will show you that the scope of his scheme was almost unlimited," said Mr. Reed, "and that he proposed to advocate the organization and control of every staple farm product, wheat, corn, rye, barley, potatoes, cot-ton, tobacco and dairy products; that he had, or at least there was printed in the papers, his picture over the title of 'The Wheat King,' although he had never raised a bushel of wheat in his life.

"We will show that he was put forward as the friend of the farmer, and now I want to challenge your atten-

tion to this: In substantially all of his discourses, and I think that he made hundreds of them, he specifically repeated that he was not working for money, and that his sole interest was the welfare of the American farmer. He stated in express terms that his heart bled for the farmer, and that he had no sordid influences. His heart was not tainted with cupidity."

Senator Reed, who is reported as re-ceiving \$100,000 from Henry Ford as his counsel in this trial, put forward the charge that Sapiro received \$92,000 for organizing the cotton growers.

"We think the Court will tell you that Mr. Sapiro cannot capitalize and recover here on any sympathy that may be felt for the people of his race. "He stands here as an individual ask-

ing for a million dollars of money what we are going to try in this case.'

The site of the mansion of the late W. K. Vanderbilt at the northwest corner of Fifth Avenue and Fifty-second Street, New York, purchased for \$4,000,000 in the Spring of 1925 by Benjamin Winter, was sold by him on Thursday at \$5,000,000 to the Schulte Real Estate Co.
