STRESEMANN, FOREIGN MINISTER, STARTS LIBEL SUIT AGAINST ANTI-SEMITES (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 1.—A libel suit with an anti-Semitic background was opened today in Plauen.

The suit was brought by German Foreign Minister Stresemann against Herr Mueller, editor of an anti-Semitic newspaper. Mueller published an article in which he stated that Stresemann was a business partner of Litwan, a Russian Jew who is now a German citizen. Mueller also charged that Litwan was a large contributor to the political funds of the Stresemann party and due to Stresemann's favor he was able to dispose of supplies of the German army abroad to his advantage.

Litwan, who appeared on the witness stand today, testified that he has never entered into any business transaction outside of the control of the German authorities. A large part of his income, he stated, was given for charitable purposes. Herr Schacht, president of the Reichsbank stated in court that although Litwan has East European manners, he is a very honorable man. Stresemann declared on the witness stand that he knew that Litwan was a Jew but he saw no reason why he should not enter into a business partnership with him.

FRAU LUDENDORFF MAKES ABSURD CHARGE AGAINST JEWS IN BERLIN LECTURE (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 1.—Mathilda Kemnitz, formerly the wife of a Jewish banker and now the second Frau Ludendorff, has made her second appearance this week as an "authority" on the racial theory, the hobby of the rabid German anti-Semites.

In a "lecture" before the Tannenberg Bund, at which General Ludendorff occupied a seat in the front row, Frau Ludendorff let loose a series of anti-Semitic ravings. With an air of authority, the lady repeated the ridiculous charge of European anti-Semites, which was given circulation in America through Henry Ford's "Dearborn Independent," that "All Juda has brought about the World War in 1914 for the purpose of effecting a Jewish domination of the world." Frau Ludendorff backed up this assertion with the absurd statement that the German word "Weltkrieg," when written in Hebrew characters contains the figure 1914. The total of these digits amount to 15, signifying, she claims, Jehovah. "Jews, Free Masons and Jesuits are exploiting the League of Nations and other channels to secure world domination. Americans have renamed the German boat 'Vaterland,' the 'Leviathan.' This was done to indicate that American Jews will swallow the whole world," she said.

FORD REMOVED HOME FROM HOSPITAL, AS LIBEL SUIT CONTINUES

Head of Ford's Secret Service Repeats There Was No Plot to Kill Ford; Says Accident Will Never Be Solved; Reports Emanating from Anonymous Sources Declare Ford Insists He Is Plot Victim; Sapiro and Reed Clash at Libel Suit; Judge Raymond Upholds Sapiro

Detroit, Apr. 1.—While Harry H. Bennett, head of the Ford Organization's secret service, today emphatically repeated his previous statement that Ford was not a victim of a plot to kill him and that the auto manufacturer shared this conviction, a person regarded as close to Mr. Ford insisted just as emphatically that the accident was a result of a deliberate attempt.

Conflicting reports regarding the cause and nature of the accident are broadcast on all sides.

Bennett said that he at first accepted the theory of a plot to assassinate the world's richest man, but that he and his investigators had gone thoroughly over the ground and had analyzed the report of the Dearborn police department without finding anything to substantiate it.

"Our connections are such that with-

in twenty-four hours after a plot is hatched we know of it," Mr. Bennett said. "Mr. Ford himself does not think there was any plot. Neither has he said so. In his mind, as in my mind, it was an unavoidable accident. Some one hurrying by inadvertently struck his front wheel with enough force to throw the steering wheel out of Mr. Ford's hands for an instant and to cause the accident.

"I believe this is one of those accidents that will never be solved. Our only hope is that that people who were driving in the vicinity of it Sunday night will come forward voluntarily."

The proceedings today in Federal Court, where the Sapiro-Ford libel suit is going on, were overshadowed by the announcement that Henry Ford had been removed from the Henry Ford Hospital at his own request to his mansion at Dearborn, and that he had given orders for the institution of a search for the driver of the car which forced him to drive his own car into a ditch last Sunday night, resulting in injuries to his back and chest.

Physicians attending Ford said they were afraid that his lungs had been injured by his impact with the steering wheel of the car and that this might develop into pneumonia.

The fact that the physicians permitted Ford to return home was regarded as an indication that his injuries are not serious and that his recovery will be speedy.

Detroit, Apr. 1.—The battle clouds that have been gathering between Aaron Sapiro and Senator James A. Reed, in the million-dollar Ford-Sapiro libel suit here, broke in full force today and precipitated an open quarrel between the Chicago attorney and his questioner, a quarrel that was stopped

ROUMANIA CIRCULATES AMENT'S STATEMENTS THAT JEWS ARE HAPPY

New Anti-Jewish Riots Break Out
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Apr. 1.—The statement of Col. Lytton G. Ament, denying the existence of anti-Jewish persecutions in Roumania, was circulated here through the official channels of the Roumanian government.

In this statement Col. Ament is alleged to have declared that upon his return to the United States he will publicly state that Roumanian Jews are satisfied with the present regime.

Vienna, Apr. 1.—A new cycle of anti-Jewish excesses in Roumanian towns is reported in despatches from Bucharest to the Vienna evening newspapers today. New riots broke out in Clausenburg, Czernowitz and Jassy.

GOEMBOES, ANTI-SEMITIC LEADER, OFFERED MINIS- TERIAL POST IN HUNGARY

Budapest, Apr. 1.—Deputy Julius Goemboes, one of the notorious anti-Semitic leaders in Hungary, was offered the post of Minister of the Interior, according to rumors circulating in parliament yesterday. The present incumbent of the Ministry Szitovsky is ill.

When asked by newspaper representatives, Deputy Goemboes confirmed the rumors but stated that he has not yet decided whether he will accept the offer.

PALESTINE TO PARTICIPATE IN BRITISH CONFERENCE

Jerusalem, April 1.—The Palestine government will be represented at the conference of the colonies, protectorates and mandated territories which will meet in London during the month of May.

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT**\$22,500,000 LOAN DELAYED**

**British Exchequer Desires Guarantee
of Interest from Palestine Treasury**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 1.—A delay in the realization of the \$22,500,000 loan to the Palestine government, which was endorsed by the House of Commons and the House of Lords, has come about, according to information published today in the Hebrew daily, "Ha-Aretz" of Tel Aviv.

The newspaper learns that the realization of the loan is hindered due to the attitude of the British government which insists that the payment of the interest on the loan, amounting to £200,000 annually, be secured through the inclusion of this item in the annual budget of the Palestine government. The treasury of the Palestine government, however, thought this impossible due to the marked decrease in the revenue and therefore suggested the postponement of the loan.

It was stated that Sir John Shuckburgh, Assistant Secretary of the Colonial Office, who was on a visit here recently negotiated with the Palestine government concerning this matter and that the decision was reserved until his return to London.

**YAKNAHAZ, HEBREW WRITER,
PASSES AWAY IN RUSSIA AT 69**

Moscow, Apr. 1.—Isaiah Nissan Goldberg, Hebrew writer who was known under the nom de plume of Yaknahaz, died yesterday in Minsk at the age of 69.

The late Yaknahaz started his literary career as a feature and short story writer in the Hebrew press in Russia. Due to his advanced age he received a pension from the White Russian government for the last three years.

**ORTHODOX CONGREGATIONS
TO MEET IN PRELIMINARY
CONFERENCE THIS SUNDAY**
**Plan Country-wide Federation of Ortho-
dox Congregations and National
Board of Education**

Representatives of over 200 Orthodox Jewish congregations in Greater New York are expected to attend a preliminary conference called by Judge Otto A. Rosalsky and Gedaliah Bulbick, editor of the "Jewish Daily News," which will be held Sunday at the West Side Jewish Center.

The conference was called to consider the program of the forthcoming national Conference of Orthodox Jewish Congregations which will take place in New York on May 2 in connection with the laying of the cornerstone for the first group of buildings of the Yeshiva College of America. Arrangements for the reception of the many delegates expected from out of town will be completed at the conference. It was stated that a plan to organize a federation of Orthodox Jewish Congregations throughout the country will be submitted.

The conference was called on the initiative of the Yeshiva College Building Fund. Harris L. Selig, director of the fund, stated that the National Conference will also hear a proposal to create an Orthodox Jewish National Board of Education, which will be charged with the task of establishing a uniform curriculum in the various existing types of Hebrew schools and Talmud Torahs throughout the country. Questions of securing a financial basis for Jewish educational institutions of a national character will also be within the scope of the Board.

**VIENNA PAPER'S POGROM
AGITATION REACHES PEAK**
**Publishes 87-Year-Old Libel Tale as
Fresh News**

Vienna, Apr. 1.—The unpardonable pogrom agitation of the anti-Semitic newspaper, "Volkskampf," the organ of the Hakenkreuzler, reached its peak yesterday.

The newspaper, which has been conducting ritual murder agitation for the past few weeks, published yesterday as fresh news the 87-year-old story of the ritual murder accusation in Damascus, the falsity of which was proven. The newspaper appeared with screaming headlines: "Jews Murder Pater in Damascus." Newsboys were selling the paper in the main streets of Vienna. The police took no action, notwithstanding the fact that the Kehillah has officially protested to the authorities against the pogrom agitation of the "Volkskampf."

The newspaper also demands in its editorials that the majority of the Jews in Austria be expelled from the country and that the rest be enclosed within the walls of a ghetto.

The will of Peter F. Meyer, who died on March 9, bequeaths his estate of approximately \$2,000,000 to charitable institutions, including a bequest of \$10,000 to Mount Sinai Hospital.

The Jewish Press on the Ford Accident

The hope that the mystery surrounding the Ford accident may be cleared up without delay and that Ford may be able soon to appear on the witness stand is voiced by the Jewish press.

No one will regret Mr. Ford's accident more than the Jews, avers the "Day," explaining:

"The Jews of America were eager to see Ford on the witness stand. Nothing in connection with the libel suit in Detroit interested them so much as the prospect that Ford himself would appear in court to tell what he knows and what he does not know about the Jewish conspiracy to enslave the whole world.

"It was fated that Ford should now be in a hospital instead of on the witness stand. It is hard to say whether there is an element that regrets this accident as keenly as the Jews. From our viewpoint Ford's health was very important, particularly at this time when we were expecting to hear 'golden' words from Ford's own lips.

"It remains to be hoped that Ford will quickly recover and come to court where he will give us the opportunity of listening to his utterances of 'wisdom.'"

The same attitude is voiced in the "Jewish Daily News" and in the "Forward."

The "Forward" has this to say, in part:

"It was hoped at first when the trial began that Ford and his million dollar counsel would appear in court with their documents and proof on which Ford's morbid anti-Semitism is based. So far this expectation has not been fulfilled. Ford has refused to avail himself of this rare opportunity. Nevertheless, even in its present limited form the Sapiro-Ford suit offers an excellent opportunity to air the anti-Semitic charges made by Ford. An attempt on his life would only make him a hero in the public eye.

"It is our sincere hope that the mystery surrounding the Ford accident may be cleared up at once and that Ford may recover speedily and live long enough to become convinced of the falsehood of his present opinion of the Jews."

FREE SYNAGOGUE WILL CELEBRATE ITS 20TH ANNIVERSARY ON APRIL 10TH

The Free Synagogue, founded in April, 1907 by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, will celebrate its twentieth anniversary with a dinner on Sunday, April 10, at the Hotel Commodore.

The Free Synagogue was the first institution of its kind in the country, which abolished dues and pews.

The first president of the Synagogue was Henry Morgenthau. The present today is Abram I. Elkus.

Gov. Alfred E. Smith is expected to address the gathering. Addresses will also be delivered by Judge Julian W. Mack, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Institute of Religion; Solomon M. Stroock, president of the New York Federation of Jewish Philanthropic Societies; the Rev. John Haynes Holmes, of the Community Church of New York; Rabbi Nathan Krass, Dr. Hugo Gressman of the University of Berlin; and Sir Wyndham Deedes, former Civil Secretary for Palestine.

SOCIAL WORKERS CONFERENCE WILL MEET IN DES MOINES

The National Conference of Jewish Social Service will hold its annual sessions at Des Moines, Iowa, May 8-11, according to an announcement from the national offices in New York City, by Samuel A. Goldsmith, Secretary of the organization.

Representatives from 220 social service organizations in 95 cities in 38 states and 4 organizations in Canada are expected to attend.

A review of the year's work will be presented by William J. Shroder, President of the Conference, in his annual report at the opening session, Sunday night, May 8th.

Among the subjects to be discussed are: "Field of Sectarian Social Work", by Mrs. John M. Glenn, American Association for Organization Family Work, N. Y.; "Character of Relationships of Jewish Agencies with Public or Non-Sectarian Agencies in the Field of Family Welfare", by Harry L. Lurie, Superintendent, Jewish Social Service Bureau, Chicago, Ill.

"What Forces in the Jewish Community Govern the Number of Jewish Dependent Children Admitted to Placement?" will be the subject of a paper by Zena Blanc, Executive Secretary, Bureau for Jewish Children, Philadelphia.

Raymond Clapp, Director, Welfare Federation of Cleveland, will read a paper on "What Have Been the Effects in Jewish Social Agencies of Membership in Community Chests and Councils of Social Agencies?"

"Extra Curricular Training of Jewish Social Workers" will be the theme of a paper by Maurice J. Karpf, Director, Training School for Jewish Social Work, New York.

Solomon J. Cutler, Director of the Budget Department of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of New York City will present a paper on "Preparation of Budgets for Federations."

MASS MOVEMENT TO SETTLE ON LAND SETS IN AMONG CAUCASIAN JEWS

Migration Stemmed Pending Allocation of Land
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Apr. 1.—A wave of migration has set in among the mountain Jews of Azerbaidjan, according to messages arriving here from Baku.

The decision of the All-Union Conference of the Jewish Colonization Society, Ozet, last December to assist the mountain Jews to take up agriculture, the discussions which are going on regarding the work of land settlement, and the declaration recently made in Baku by M. Dimantstein, the chairman of the Ozet, to the effect that the Soviet Government would look after the Jewish population, have caused great excitement among the Jewish population of Azerbaidjan, who have interpreted the declarations as referring to something already accomplished and not merely a project, and they have begun to leave their homes in masses in the expectation that they would be immediately settled on the land. From the most remote parts of Azerbaidjan, groups of mountain Jews are arriving in Baku and asking to be registered for settlement on the land. One whole Jewish settlement, that of Shemabin, is now in Baku.

The local Ozet is taking measures with a view to stemming this tide of migration. The demand is so great for settlement that there is no possibility of being able to find the funds or the land for settling all the applicants. It is hoped that the decision of the Azerbaidjan Commissariat of Agriculture to allocate an area of 400 desiatin of land for Jewish land settlement may do something to calm the population.

Meanwhile, speakers are being sent out to explain to the Jewish mountain population that the question of their settlement on the land is not one to be dealt with in one day, and that until everything is ready they must stay where they are and go on with their ordinary occupations.

Immigration to Canada for the month of February amounted to 5,521, compared with 4,396 for February a year ago, according to a statement issued by the Department of Immigration and Colonization. Of February's immigrants 1,180 were from Great Britain, 938 from United States, and 3,403 from other countries.

The total immigration for eleven months of the fiscal year amounted to 123,720, compared with 80,835 a year ago, an increase of 53 per cent. Of this number 66,351 belonged to the foreign class, 8,229 to the laboring class, and 12,517 were houseworkers.

During eleven months of the fiscal year 53,295 Canadians who had gone to the United States to live, returned to Canada declaring their intention of now remaining permanently in this country. In February the number of such returned Canadians was 2,397.

Rome, Apr. 1.—The royal family was represented at the solemn funeral services for Luigi Luzzatti which took place here yesterday. Delegations of many government institutions and Italian societies attended the funeral. M. Volpi spoke on behalf of the government.

It was learned today that the last wish of Luzzatti was that he be buried beside his parents in the Jewish cemetery in Venice.

Rome, Apr. 1.—Condolence on behalf of the French government at the death of Luigi Luzzatti was expressed by M. R. Bessard, French Ambassador here. M. Bessard called on the family of Luzzatti to express sympathy on behalf of his government.

Warsaw, Apr. 1.—A message of condolence was despatched to the family of Luigi Luzzatti by the Association of Jewish Merchants. Expressions of sympathy were also sent by the B'nai Brith lodge in Lodz, to the Luzzatti family and to the Italian branch of the B'nai Brith.

Miss Ruth Richards, daughter of Bernard G. Richards, writer and social worker, was chosen President of the Undergraduate Association of Barnard College at the annual election just held.

Miss Richards is a junior. Other Barnard honors won by her include the Presidency of the freshman class, the Undergraduate Secretaryship and the editorship of the Mortarboard.

Mortimer L. Schiff contributed \$50,000 to the Boy Scout Foundation of Greater New York in its campaign to raise \$1,000,000 for a permanent camp and for general expenses. Announcement of his gift and of the drive was made at a luncheon Thursday in the Manhattan Club, at which Victor F. Kidder presided. Mr. Schiff was unable to attend and Mr. Ridder made the announcement for him.

JEWISH STUDENT BODIES IN GERMANY HOLD CONFERENCE

Berlin, Mar. 5.—The Federation of Jewish Students' Organizations in Germany held its fifth conference in Leipzig this week. Thirty delegates were present from the various universities in the country.

Dr. Rabinovitch, member of the Executive of the Federation, in his opening address, explained the reasons which had brought the students from their native countries to Germany in order to obtain their education. The cultural anti-Semitism which broke out in the new States of Eastern Europe after the war had compelled hundreds of Jewish students to seek asylum in the neighboring countries of Central and Western Europe. Dr. Rabinovitch made a formal protest against the persecution of the Jewish students in many of the Eastern European States. "The brutal methods employed by our enemies," he said, "are not exhausted by the enforcement of an open or concealed numerus clausus. Jewish students are even being subjected to physical violence. The ring-leaders of this movement which runs counter to the most elementary principles of educational freedom are to be found not only among the students but also among the university professors.

"The East European Jewish students in Germany," he said, "are being treated with friendship and understanding by the State and especially by Jewish public opinion in Germany. We want to express our gratitude for the moral and financial assistance which the Federation has been given by the Jewish organizations such as the Joint Distribution Committee, the Ica and the Hilfsverein der Deutschen Juden. The Federation finds generous support not only from these organizations but from the whole of Jewish public opinion in Germany and the leaders of the Jewish community, like Professor Einstein, Dr. James Simon, Dr. Paul Nathan, Dr. Bernhard Kahn, Dr. Hildersheimer and others."

Rabbi Goldmann who delivered an address on the problems before the Jewish students, said that Jewish life stands and falls with the Jewish students. "They are the spiritual force which safeguards the continued existence of the Jews. That is why it is the duty of all Jewry to fight against the efforts of the anti-Semites to prevent the Jewish students from obtaining their education." Dr. Goldmann protested against the movement to identify the conception of "German" with race and origin rather than with culture and citizenship. He urged the students to endeavor always to uphold and develop the Jewish spirit. "Jewish students from Eastern Europe," he said, "have a broader outlook upon Jewish world interests than those in Western Europe." He urged them, after the completion of their studies and on their return to their native countries to remember the countries which, in time of need, had given them the opportunity to continue their education and had thereby become their spiritual homes. only by the cautioning words of Judge Fred M. Raymond.

The breach came when Senator Reed stopped his questioning with an impatient gesture and appealed to Judge Raymond, saying that Sapiro was making his answers too wordy and "was evading the questions put to him."

Sapiro, with flashing eyes, retorted that Senator Reed's questions were so worded as to carry false impressions to the jury and that he had to make long answers in order to counteract these false impressions.

Reed had questioned Sapiro as to speeches made in Texas in 1920 in behalf of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association.

"You were still there in 1921?" asked Reed.

Sapiro picked him up instantly.

"You mean I was there again?" he asked. "Your question indicates I was there the whole time."

"All right, all right, sir, have it your own way," the Senator replied, and turned to the Judge to protest.

William H. Gallagher, chief counsel for Sapiro, entered the verbal cross-fire and insisted to Judge Raymond that his client be given opportunity to make his answers clear.

Sapiro was upheld by the judge.

Reed's questions, during the morning session and most of the afternoon, were directed towards establishing Sapiro's connection with the cooperative marketing movement in Texas from 1922 to 1926.

The cross-examination tactics used by Senator Reed were evidently intended to discredit Sapiro's statement that his aim was always "to help the American farmer." To accomplish his purpose, Senator Reed first read to the court, in a sarcastic tone, the following statement, taken from Sapiro's organization speeches in Texas:

"I am not interested in money; I'm interested in raising the standard of living among farmers, in taking children out of the fields and putting them in schools; in taking women out of the fields and putting them in homes."

Immediately following the reading of this statement, Senator Reed attempted to show that Sapiro had been well paid for his work in organizing the cooperative associations and that he had always entered into an agreement regarding his fees before beginning his work. This was done with the obvious intention of discrediting Sapiro's statement that he was "not interested in money."

The United Palestine Appeal Campaign in Savannah, Ga., was launched Sunday night at a banquet. The principal speakers were Mrs. Archibald Silverman and Sir Wyndham Deedes. Morris H. Bernstein is Chairman of the campaign. One-third of Savanah's quota of \$15,000 was raised during the first three days. The drive will continue for ten days. Among the large donors were Weitz Brothers, Blumberg Brothers and Sam Blumenthal.

RAPPROCHEMENT BETWEEN MIZRACHI AND AGUDAH SEEN

Berlin, Mar. 18.—The Agudath Israel was represented at a gathering held in Breslau to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the formation of the Mizrahi World Organization, states the "Juedische Wochenblatt" of Breslau.

Dr. S. Ehrmann, one of the leaders of the Agudath Israel, delivered an address in which he expressed a hope for a cooperation between the Agudah and the Mizrahi. A resolution was adopted by the gathering urging on the leaders of both organizations to try to find a possibility for cooperation in educational work and in other directions in Palestine.

The Associated Fur Manufacturers and the right wing of the International Fur Workers' Union have concluded an agreement whereby the manufacturers recognize the special committee named by the American Federation of Labor to reorganize the union and agree to employ only furriers holding membership in the locals now being organized by the special committee to replace the Communist locals dissolved on March 3.
