## PHILANTHROPY ALONE CAN'T HELP EAST EUROPEAN JEWRY, EINSTEIN SAYS IN APPEAL

Calls on German Jewry to Aid in  
Constructive Relief

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 5.—An appeal urging German Jews to support the work of the Ort, the society for the promotion of trades and agriculture among the Jews of Eastern Europe, the Oze, the society for the protection of the health of the Jewish population, and the Emigdirekt, the United Jewish Emigration Committee, was issued by Albert Einstein.

Professor Einstein states in his appeal that the World War caused the greatest losses to the Jewish people in Eastern Europe. Words cannot express all that they have suffered. East European Jewry is faced with the question: to be or not to be. Philanthropy alone is insufficient to render them relief, he declares.

## AMERICAN RELIGIOUS HEADS PETITION QUEEN MARIE ON BEHALF OF MINORITIES

Washington, Apr. 5.—The influence of Queen Marie of Roumania on behalf of the religious minorities in her country was sought in a petition bearing the names of 30,000 Americans, including Cardinal O'Connell and Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, president of the American Jewish Congress, presented to the Roumanian Legation here.

The petition protests specifically against the Roumanian government's treatment of Hungarians, Saxons and Jews in its territory, declaring that members of the Baptist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic and Unitarian Churches and the Jews are particularly affected.

Among other names on the petition were those of the Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick, of New York; the Rev. Edgar V. Mullins, president of the Baptist World Alliance; Evangeline Booth, commander of the Salvation Army, and Louis C. Cornish, vice-president of the American Unitarian Association.

## CHIEF RABBI URGES USE OF PALESTINE MATZOS

Jerusalem, Apr. 5.—Rabbis throughout the world were asked to urge their communities to purchase Palestine baked matzos in an appeal issued by Rabbi A. J. Kook, Chief Rabbi of Palestine.

The appeal refers particularly to the matzos of the Grand Moulins, the Baron de Rothschild plant at Haifa.

Palestine baked matzos are strictly kosher and their manufacture provides for hundreds of workmen, Rabbi Kook declared in his appeal.

## JAPANESE GOVT. GRANTS FACILITIES FOR JEWISH EMIGRANTS AT HIAS' REQUEST

Spared Journey Through War-Ridden  
Chinese Region

Jewish emigrants stranded in the Orient, and whose ultimate destination is one of the South American Republics, will no longer have to make the hazardous trip through war-ridden China, for the purpose of securing proper visas. This announcement is made by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America. The Hias has been informed by cable that its bureau in Harbin has concluded negotiations with the Japanese Government which will greatly facilitate Jewish immigration from Siberia and the Far East to South America.

Owing to the fact that none of the South American Republics have consular representatives at Harbin, it has been necessary for prospective immigrants to proceed to Japan to secure the necessary visas. This has been practically impossible due to the refusal of the Japanese consul-general at Harbin to issue transit-visas unless they were in possession of visas for the country to which they contemplated immigrating. The immigrants were therefore compelled to go via Shanghai. The immigrants' only alternative was to procure special Japanese visas valid only if its holder could

## KOHN HEADS EXECUTIVE OF HIAS-ICA-EMIGDIREKT

Paris, Apr. 5.—Dr. Oscar Kohn, former member of the Prussian cabinet, was elected chairman of the Joint Executive Committee of the Hias-Ica and Emigdirekt in the organizations' new endeavor to aid Jewish emigrants.

The Executive consists of 15 members, five representatives of each of the three organizations.

The next meeting of the Executive will take place in Berlin in May.

## JEWISH WOMAN FURTHERS BIG BRITISH FILM COMBINE

London, Apr. 5.—Mrs. Davis, a Jewish woman and owner of the largest cinema in Europe, was one of the chief promoters of a large amalgamation in the British film industry just effected here.

The Gaumont British Film Corporation was formed here with a capital of two and a half million pounds. Among the directors are Captain Alfred Davis, son of Mrs. Davis, and Messrs. Woolf and Rowson.

Mrs. Davis owns several cinemas besides the Shepards Bush Pavilion, the largest in Europe.

## SAPIRO, STILL ON WITNESS STAND, AS REED PURSUES QUESTIONING ABOUT FEES

Judge Bars Sapiro Speech Despite  
Senator Reed's Efforts

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Detroit, Apr. 5.—Today's sessions of the Sapiro-Ford \$1,000,000 libel suit were marked by the monotonous questioning of Sapiro, still on the witness stand, by Senator Reed, Ford's counsel and the almost incessant arguments and bickerings between attorneys for both sides.

Reed, trying to prove that Aaron Sapiro sought control of the world's wheat crop, continued to inquire into Sapiro's connections with various farm cooperatives and went into minute details regarding fees paid the expert by the numerous organizations that asked for his counsel.

A clash arose over the question of admitting as evidence part of a speech made by Sapiro in Chicago, in July, 1920. Reed wanted to cite extracts from the speech. Gallagher insisted all or none of it be read. Whispered arguments to the judge, out of earshot of the jury, consumed twenty-five minutes. The judge ruled in favor of Sapiro. The letter was not read.

Another clash resulted on Reed's charge that Sapiro, disappointed in his ambition to become general counsel to the powerful American Farm Bureau Federation, went to a rival group and finally to a third.

The Senator made these charges in a court room cleared of the jury, after three hours of cross-examination of Sapiro had brought him, by slow and painful progress, to the point of asking Mr. Sapiro about his efforts to gain the counselship of the federation.

The court ruled out the question upon which the argument had risen and Senator Reed had to start, from another quarter, the tortuous journey back to this point where he had been resisted.

# **JEWISH CHILDREN 50 PERCENT OF TANGIERS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Tunis, Apr. 5.—Over fifty per cent of the students in the elementary schools of Tangiers are Jewish, according to statistics compiled by the French Government. Of the total of 2151 pupils in the elementary schools, 1110 are Jewish, 529 Spanish, 328 Moslem, 115 French, 21 Italians. The enrollment in the secondary schools totals 526, including 239 Jewish pupils, 146 French, 76 Spanish, 13 Moslem and 6 Italian.

# **FORD YIELDS TO RETAILERS UNDER BOYCOTT PRESSURE**

Detroit, Apr. 5.—David A. Brown was temporary chairman of the meeting of retail merchants called last night by the Michigan Retail Merchants' Association for the purpose of protesting against Henry Ford opening his commissaries to the general public. More than 1,000 merchants attended the meeting where Ford's policy was described as ruinous to the retail trade.

G. N. Staples, who stated he was in charge of Ford's commissaries, announced at the meeting that the commissaries would be closed to the general public following the boycott said to have been organized against Ford products by members of the Retail Merchants' Association.

# **COURT MARTIAL SENTENCES JEWISH WORKER TO DEATH**

Kovno, Apr. 5.—One Jew and one Lithuanian worker were sentenced to death by a court martial here yesterday.

The two, Melamid and Klapenas, were sentenced on the charge of Communism. The verdict caused great excitement in the city.

**\$5,000 SCHOLARSHIP FUND****FOR YESHIVA ESTABLISHED**

A scholarship fund of \$5,000 for the students of the Yeshiva College which will celebrate the cornerstone laying for the first group of buildings on May 1st, was established by Mrs. Mina Satinsky of Philadelphia, Dr. Bernard Revel, President of the Faculty of the Yeshiva, announced.

The scholarship was established in memory of the donor's late husband, B. Satinsky of 2217 N. 33rd Street, Philadelphia. According to the provisions laid down, a student of Philadelphia is to be given preference to the scholarship provided he meets all other requirements. Trustees of the fund appointed by Mrs. Satinsky, are: Dr. Bernard Revel, President of the Faculty of the Yeshiva, Rabbi B. L. Leventhal of Philadelphia, Honorary President of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis in the United States and Canada, Mrs. B. Satinsky and B. Satalow, President of the Yeshiva Mishkan Israel of Philadelphia.

The contribution of Mrs. Satinsky is the second scholarship that has been given to the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Yeshiva in the past few months. Recently Israel Roekach of Brooklyn, established a \$5,000 scholarship fund for the Yeshiva.

Among the students admitted to the Yeshiva recently are three who have come from Palestine. The three Palestinian students are A. Lerer, who comes from the Universal Yeshiva, headed by Rabbi Kook, Chief Rabbi of Palestine; Mr. Rosenfeld, student of the Eitz Chaim Yeshiva, Jerusalem; and Mr. Benchoron of the Mizrahi Teachers Institute, Jerusalem.

prove that he possessed at least 1,500 yen, approximately \$750.

The Japanese government has now authorized the issuance of transit visas to such Jewish emigrants who will be certified by the Harbin Bureau of Hias as being the holders of transportation to South America.

Prof. Simon Dubnow, noted Jewish historian, has written to John L. Bernstein, chairman of the Hias Campaign for \$500,000 strongly endorsing the effort of that organization in conjunction with the Ica and Emigdirekt to facilitate the emigration of East European Jews to South American countries.

The Progressive Order of the West, of which Samuel Epstein is Grand Master, and the Independent Order Free Sons of Israel have endorsed the Hias campaign.

# **DIGEST OF PUBLIC OPINION ON JEWISH MATTERS**

**American "Maranos"**

Those Jewish students in American universities who were denounced by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise for seeking to hide their racial origin are termed by the "Day" "American Maranos". The paper, in its issue of yesterday, observes:

"Rabbi Wise says that many Jewish students are members of college fraternities where Jews are not wanted and that their membership can only be explained by the fact that they conceal their Jewish origin. Rabbi Wise is right. The number of Jewish students who choose to play the role of voluntary 'maranos' in non-Jewish college organizations is very large today and it is time for someone to point out to them that their behavior is undignified and traitorous.

"These young men believe that by denying their Jewishness they will be enabled to improve their careers by entering high society and making important connections. But they are mistaken. In the end Christian society refuses to be fooled and discovers the hypocrisy of those who come in under false pretenses. The punishment is swift and dire, for the world despises traitors and is quick to express its condemnation. When that happens, these 'maranos' come back to us and complain of anti-Semitism and race hatred; they repent and beg forgiveness and sympathy. Some of them even write sensational books, in the expectation that the Jews will buy them and enjoy reading them as a contribution to our culture.

"We do not need 'maranos' in this country. They have no sufficient cause to separate themselves from us, nor have we any reason to take them to our bosom when they return. If there is any discrimination in America we can combat it in an open and dignified manner. Those who are eager to leave our fold rather than struggle and suffer along with the rest of us, had better go and remain away," the paper declares.

**Kentucky Paper Denounces Ford**

Comment on the Sapiro-Ford libel suit is contained in a lengthy editorial devoted to the subject by the Lexington (Ky.) "Herald" of March 27, wherein we read, in part:

"The case is highly important in view of the fact that it involves the libel law. While nothing is more precious in a land governed by democratic ideals than freedom of speech and the independence of the press, it is as important that this freedom be protected against the abuse of irresponsible and unjust attacks as that it be protected inviolate and unshackled.

## J. D. C. WAR ORPHANS' EXHIBITION OPENS

James N. Rosenberg Describes J.D.C. Child Care Work

The European War Orphans' Exhibit of the Joint Distribution Committee was opened Monday night at the Grand Central Palace.

Col. Herbert H. Lehman read a cable signed jointly by Felix M. Warburg, Arthur Lehman and James H. Becker, who are abroad. The cable read: "After seeing our splendid orphan work in Palestine and also extraordinary success in the Near East and Greece and seeing the lack of efforts in many countries just visited, we feel the foundation for better workmanship and citizenship can and must be laid in child care. Your exhibition shows how teachable youth of all nations is. We have right to be proud of work which we are exhibiting and hope the public will correctly evaluate work and philosophy behind it."

Col. Lehman paid a tribute to Mrs. Jonah J. Goldstein who was chairman of the committee which arranged the exhibit and to her associates Mrs. Carl M. Loeb and Mrs. Charles Cohen.

The exhibition consists of handwork by Jewish orphans who have been trained in arts and industry through the efforts of the Joint Distribution Committee. The exhibition will continue until April 11th.

James N. Rosenberg, who addressed the gathering, following the introduction by Col. Lehman, stated:

"A year ago, on my way to Russia, to investigate the agricultural work there, I spent several days in Berlin. Dr. Bernard Kahn had just arranged an exhibit of the work of the Jewish orphans educated for industrial life through the funds of the J. D. C. The opening of this Exhibit a year ago in Berlin was a distinguished occasion. Ambassadors from Poland, Lithuania, Latvia, Czechoslovakia and Roumania were present to testify to the excellence of the work in their countries. Dr. Jacob Gould Schurmann, American Ambassador to Germany, made the opening address, pointing out the constructive work that is done in these countries through the help of American Jews.

"When I saw this splendid Exhibit, I suggested to Dr. Kahn that a small portion, at least, of the work should be sent to America so that we might here

by Mr. Ford's attacks upon the Jews. Everywhere in America there is honor and respect for the race which is ornamented with its achievements the history of mankind since Abraham left Ur of the Chaldees following a vision of Canaan and cherishing the hope that in future days a tribe as numberless as the stars that shone above the plain of Mamre should inhabit the earth and call him father.

"The presence of Jim Reed, long one of the most vociferous advocates of tolerance and scourgers of bigotry, as chief counsel for Henry Ford is one of the strange features in this legal battle upon which the attention of America centers."

see a little of what the J. D. C. is endeavoring to do.

"Before the war most of the Jews in Central Europe and Russia were petty traders since all other occupations were denied them. With the change in economic conditions, opening vistas for industrial and agricultural work, it has been the constant endeavor of the J. D. C. to aid in such work when that work is sponsored and supervised by the leaders of European Jewry themselves. To them, these self-sacrificing leaders, I wish to pay an especial tribute," Mr. Rosenberg declared.

"The only American representatives of the J. D. C. in Europe and Russia are Dr. Rosen, at the head of the Agricultural work in Russia and David Schweitzer who is chief accountant of all the work both in Europe and Russia. For the conducting of the work itself throughout these lands, we depend upon Committees of the leading Jews in every town and city. In Poland, for example, the Jewish leaders themselves organized and supervise a Central Child Care Organization. This is typical of the methods adopted by the J. D. C. While in times of famine and plague the work of the J. D. C. is necessarily palliative our primary aim at all times is to help in reconstructive work. Thus the 19,000 children still in the care of the J. D. C. are, so far as possible, being trained for useful productive economic life. Over 4,000 of these orphans have already become self supporting young men and women. Over 5,000 are today receiving vocational instruction for trade and industry."

Mr. Rosenberg said there were eighty schools maintained in eight countries in which Jewish children are being trained for industrial life. "For the schools of this work the chief thanks are due to the able, splendid and self-sacrificing men and women in these countries who are devoting a large portion of their lives to this work. In all of these countries the Governments and municipalities have themselves recognized the worth of our work by aid in its support. There are 500 committees of European Jews who are co-operating with the J. D. C. in this work," he stated.

One out of every four immigrants coming to the United States goes to New York State to make his future home, the Bureau of Immigration announced. Of 216,454 immigrants admitted during the eight months from July 1, 1926, to the end of February, 1927, 56,231 went to New York. Out of 32,074 admitted in February 6,012 settled in that State.

The February admissions included 21,695 immigrants and 10,379 non-immigrants. In January, 20,821 aliens entered, of whom 18,804 were immigrants and 9,219 non-immigrants.

The departures of aliens totaled 16,634 in February and 13,581 in January.

More Mexicans than any other racial group entered the United States from July to February. Most of them went to Texas, which was second to New York State in the matter of permanent abode of immigrants. A total of 23,149 Mexicans were admitted during the eight-month period, while in February 4,229 arrived.

The principal other races admitted in February were Germans, 4,213; Irish, 2,720; English, 2,291; Scandinavian, 1,534; Scotch, 1,427; Italian, 1,076; French, 1,075, and Hebrew, 963. These nine races, counting the Mexicans, contributed more than 90 per cent of the total immigrants for the month.

## Z. O. DEPARTMENT ISSUES FIGURES ON UNEMPLOYMENT

Cites Facts Regarding Measures at Alleviation

Jerusalem, Mar. 11.—The number of Jewish working men and women in Palestine totals 32,000 (20,500 men and 11,500 women). Of this number 23,500 are affiliated with the General Federation of Jewish Labor, 700 with "Hapoel Hamizrachi", and 300 with the Yemenite Association. The workers are distributed as follows: 23,500 in the cities, 5,500 in the older Jewish villages (employed by farmers and planters) and 3,000 in the new co-operative settlements.

These figures were made known by Mr. Sprinzak, head of the Labor Department of the Palestine Zionist Executive, in a press conference here.

Much of the regular work of the Department has had to be curtailed in order to cope with the unemployment situation. Unemployed workers to the number of 8,150 were officially registered at the employment bureaus of the labor organizations on March 1st, the centres of unemployment being Tel Aviv, Haifa and Jerusalem. At the beginning of the present year, the Labor Department prepared a comprehensive program for combating unemployment by carrying out essential works in town and country, but the financial position of the Zionist Organization did not permit the Department to embark on such a program, Mr. Sprinzak stated.

The Labor Department was, therefore, obliged to alleviate unemployment and its effects by arranging emergency relief works, granting loans for the execution of public works, and by paying out unemployment doles. From October 1st, 1926, to the end of February, 1927, the Department spent \$9,995,580 on emergency relief works, and granted loans for regular public works in Tel Aviv, Haifa, Tiberias, Afukah and vicinity, and Jerusalem amounting to 443,000. Weekly doles have been distributed during the five-month period in question, unmarried workers receiving 25 piastres a week and married workers 30 to 50 piastres. On March 1st, 1927, 5,500 persons were receiving doles.

Discussing the causes of the crisis, Mr. Sprinzak said that various efforts were being made to enlist large investments of capital for productive enterprises in Palestine. A memorandum had been submitted to the Government in which it was suggested that certain essential public works should be initiated both for the relief of unemployment and for the permanent benefit of the country.

Reviewing the normal work of the Labor Department for which the sum of \$60,000 was allocated in the 1926-27 budget of the Keren Hayesod, Mr. Sprinzak stated, the Labor Department has done much to establish Jewish agricultural workers in the older villages. A sum of \$18,000 was allocated for this purpose in 1926-27, the number of such workers now totalling 5,300, of whom about 2,000 are em-

played in Petach Tikvah and 600 in Hederah. They were provided with small plots of land, houses, farm implements, etc., in an attempt to make them independent of unemployment or seasonal fluctuations in employment. The Agricultural Colonization Department of the Palestine Zionist Executive expended about \$6,000 for the same purpose during 1926-27. The Labor Department also allocated \$5,500 in 1926-27 to facilitate the establishment of girls' cooperative groups in town and country, thus dealing with the very pressing problem of the absorption of immigrant girls into the economic life of Palestine. There are 10 girls' groups of this type.

During the current year the Labor Department granted \$3,000 (part of the \$18,000 mentioned above) to the new agricultural cooperative workers' contracting bureau as investment capital; \$2,000 for the establishment of artisans, builders, carpenters, shoemakers, and is making efforts to transfer master workmen to the less congested towns; \$2,000 to the "Haselah", a Jewish stone-quarrying enterprise, in addition to sums granted previously by the Urban Colonization and Labor Departments and other smaller sums for various similar purposes, he declared.

### JEWISH COMMUNAL ACTIVITIES

Organization of a permanent Tri-State Regional United Palestine Appeal, including the States of North and South Dakota and Minnesota, was effected at the first regional conference of Northwest Jewry for Palestine held in Minneapolis. Over 300 delegates attended the session which was addressed by Judge William M. Lewis and Lieutenant Governor W. I. Nolan.

A quota of \$115,500 was accepted by the conference and allotted to the districts as follows: Minneapolis, \$50,000; St. Paul, \$30,000; Duluth, \$10,000; Range cities, \$5,000; other Minnesota communities, \$5,000; North Dakota, \$10,000 and South Dakota, \$5,000.

A public reception was tendered in the evening to Judge Lewis and the delegates by the Zionist Organizations of St. Paul. Over 500 attended the reception which was presided over by Sol. Fligelman.

Nearly 5,000 new members have joined Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization, this year, according to an announcement from Hadassah headquarters. Membership campaigns are being carried on by chapters throughout the country.

Four new chapters of Hadassah were organized during March, bringing the total to 262.

A drive for funds for the erection of a new synagogue was launched Sunday night by the Adath Jeshurun congregation of Collinwood, Ohio.

The new annex to the Orthodox Jewish Orphan Home of Cleveland, O., was opened last Monday.

The new building, a girls' dormitory, provides accommodations for more than 50 girls.

## HAIFA OIL PIPE LINE DISCUSSED IN COMMONS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

London, Mar. 21.—The question of an oil pipe line to Haifa was raised in the House of Commons today when Colonel Wedgwood asked the Secretary of State for the Colonies whether he was as yet taking any steps to get a pipe line constructed by the Anglo-Persian Oil Company from Kikanlik or by the International Oil Combine from Mosul to debouch on the Mediterranean at Haifa instead of Alexandretta. Has the Admiralty yet been consulted in the matter? he asked.

Col. Amery said in reply that the point was one to be considered if and when the Companies concerned were in a position to consider the construction of a pipe line to the Mediterranean, and he was keeping in touch with the Admiralty.
