BRITISH DIVINE PLEADS END OF ANTI-JEWISH PREJUDICE DUE TO CRUCIFIXION STORY

Makes Powerful Appeal in Easter
Article

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 14.—A plea for eradicating anti-Jewish prejudice from the minds of Christians was made by the Rt. Rev. Henry Russell Wakefield, former Bishop of Birmingham, in an article published in the "Daily Express" on the occasion of the approaching Easter.

"Now, 1,900 years after the crucifixion, is it compatible with the highest principles of Christianity that the Jewish people be held responsible for the greatest crime of history?" Dr. Wakefield asks in his article.

"Prejudices are long lived, but this prejudice is one of which Christians may well be ashamed. It generates a misconception of the character of the Jewish people. Even making every admission of guilt of the Jewish nation with regard to Christ, we ought not to condemn the Jews in this century for a sin of their distant forefathers," he says.

"Some people argue," he continues, "that the feeling against the Jews is not connected with the treatment of Christ in Jerusalem. On what then is this prejudice founded? Is it the power of the Jew in the realm of finance? If so, we must remember that we forced him to this kind of business. In the second place it is unquestionable that the Jew is the most capable financial citizen and we are often in great difficulty without him. Thirdly, we must remember that the Jew is equally interesting and powerful in many other directions," he writes.

INCITING APPEALS ARE CIRCULATED IN POSEN

Warsaw, Apr. 14.—Anti-Jewish appeals inciting the Christian population in connection with the approaching Easter were circulated in the province of Posen.

Deputy A. Hartglass, president of the Club of Jewish Deputies, intervened with the Minister of the Interior, asking him to stop the circulation of these appeals. The Minister declares that he has instructed the local government to confiscate any appeal which is of an inciting nature.

CRACOW COUNCIL VOTES TO SUBSIDIZE YIDDISH THEATRE

Cracow, Apr. 14.—A municipal subsidy for the Yiddish theatre in Cracow was voted unanimously by the city council yesterday.

The amount of 500,000 Zlotys annually will be given to the theatre out of the city budget in recognition of the artistic value of its productions.

THOUSANDS OF NEEDY JEWS IN WARSAW AND VILNA DE- MAND AID FOR PASSOVER

Police Disperse Demonstration Before
Warsaw Kehillah Building

Vilna, Apr. 14.—Sixteen thousand members of the Jewish community, constituting one-third of the Jewish population of this city, have applied for Passover aid.

These figures were announced by the Executive of the Vilna Kehillah which has registered all those who seek aid.

Warsaw, Apr. 14.—A demonstration of needy Jews took place Thursday in front of the Jewish community building in Poland's capital.

Several hundred Jews besieged the building, demanding aid for Passover, which the kehillah was unable to grant because of lack of funds. The police intervened and dispersed the crowd.

"KETUBBAH", HEBREW MAR- RIAGE CERTIFICATE, IS DE- CLARED INVALID IN QUEBEC

Montreal, Apr. 14.—A "Ketubbah", certificate of marriage, or other documents relating to civil status written in the Hebrew language, is not valid under the laws of the Province of Quebec, it was decided in a judgment of Justice Bruinart in Superior Court here.

In consequence the Judge refused to adjudicate either in dismissing or accepting a motion to annul the marriage of Paul Greenberg to Dame K. Peterson, the certificate of which was written in Hebrew. He declared that judgment would be suspended until such time as the Quebec Legislature, the only competent authority in the Province in matters of civil status under the British North American Act, should have settled the point raised by the case.

JEWISH STUDENTS SUGGEST CORPSE QUESTION SOLUTION

Warsaw, Apr. 14.—The Polish government will be petitioned to issue a decree regulating the supply of corpses for the anatomical departments of Polish colleges and universities in order to end the riots waged by anti-Semitic students against Jewish medical students under the pretext of the corpse question.

The decision to petition the government was taken at a specially called conference of representatives of Jewish student bodies in Poland held here.

The conference suggested that the government provide in the decree that unclaimed bodies be turned over to the clinics.

COL. AMENT, "INVESTIGATOR" IN ROMANIA, IS GUEST OF KING FERDINAND AND MARIE

Exonerates Roumanian Government
While on Honeymoon Trip

Further information concerning the status of the self-appointed investigator of the Jewish situation in Roumania is given in a statement by the American Jewish Congress. It appears that Colonel Lytton G. Ament, who permitted the impression to go forth that he is acting as an official of the United States Government, went to Roumania as the guest of King Ferdinand and Queen Marie.

Announcement to this effect appeared in Roumanian papers and in a number of American papers, including the New York "Sun" of March 11, the Fall River "Globe" of March 25 and the Duluth "Herald" of March 22.

Colonel Ament is a former relief worker in Roumania and official of the United States Veterans Bureau. He has lately been "investigating" conditions affecting the Jews in Bessarabia and giving out statements exonerating the Roumanian government from any blame in the persecution of the Jews in that country. The Washington representative of the American Jewish Congress having inquired into the matter, found that he was not representing any department of the United States Government and on the other hand acting purely in the interests of Roumania. The American Jewish Congress recently made public a statement to this effect.

Colonel Ament and his bride, the former Mrs. Edward Russel Thomas of New York, are spending their honeymoon as the guests of King Ferdinand and Queen Marie, the announcements in the papers stated.

JERUSALEM'S FIRST OPEN AIR CONCERT SINCE ROMAN TIMES

Jerusalem, Apr. 14.—An open air concert, said to be the first in 1900 years since the Roman times, was held last night in the stadium of the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus.

The concert was given by the Palestine Symphony Orchestra to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the death of Beethoven.

Lord Plumer, High Commissioner of Palestine, and Lady Plumer attended the concert.

MOSCOW YIDDISH STATE THEATRE TO COME TO U. S.

Riga, Apr. 14.—The Yiddish State Theatre of Moscow, a modernistic theatre, will follow in the footsteps of the Habima. It was learned here today that the State Theatre will tour in European countries in the fall and will afterwards proceed to the United States.

FELIX WARBURG AND DAVID BROWN TO VISIT RUSSIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 14.—Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, who is now on a world tour, and David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, are expected to arrive here soon.

The purpose of the visit of the J.D.C. leaders is to confer with Dr. Bernard Kahn, the European director of the organization, on the program of the work of the Agrojoint in Russia during 1927. After Passover, Dr. Kahn will proceed to Poland. From there he will go to Russia where it is expected Mr. Warburg will join him in the spring to inspect the Jewish land settlements in the country.

Detroit, Mich., Apr. 14.—When interviewed by the representatives of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Mr. Brown stated that he intends to be in Russia about the middle of June.

Washington, D. C., April 14.—A statement issued here by the Soviet Union Information Bureau declares: "The first Jewish administrative body ever assembled in Russian or Ukrainian territory was organized late in March as the first Congress of Soviets of the newly created Cherson Jewish Area in the Ukraine. The area includes six Jewish village soviets. The Jewish population of the area is 27,000.

"Most of the Jewish settlers have been established on the land during the past two years, with the help of American funds donated by the Joint Distribution Committee and allotments from the Soviet Government. They have 220,000 acres of land given by the Ukrainian Soviet Government.

"The new Jewish regional government has its headquarters in the Seyda Menukhe colony, famed for its fruit orchards, which has a population of

JEW OF HOLLAND REFUSED TO PARTICIPATE IN SPINOZA ANNIVERSARY COMMEMORATION

Leader Explains Their Reasons; Zionists Disagreed with Attitude

Amsterdam, Mar. 31.—The Jews of Holland did not participate in the meetings organized to commemorate the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the death of Baruch Spinoza.

The reason for this was given by Mr. Seeligmann, Chairman of the Society for Jewish Knowledge, at a meeting of the Society held here last night. Chief Rabbi Maaron of The Hague presided.

"We did not participate in the commemoration exercises," Mr. Seeligmann declared, "because Spinoza had cut himself adrift from Judaism. Spinoza was excommunicated because he refused to submit to the discipline of the Sephardic community of those days. We honor Spinoza as a philosopher and as a man and as one of the greatest thinkers of the world, but not as a Jew. Neither the Society for Jewish Knowledge nor the Amsterdam Rabbinical School has therefore participated in the commemoration celebrations."

As a Zionist, Mr. Seeligmann concluded, he deplores the action of the Dutch Zionists in sending a telegram to the commemoration meeting at The Hague.

AGREEMENT ON CONCESSIONS NOT KEPT BY GOVERNMENT, JEWS COMPLAIN

Warsaw, Apr. 14.—Notwithstanding the agreement concluded between the Club of Jewish Deputies and the Polish government concerning the concessions on monopolized articles, the withdrawal of concessions on tobacco is being carried on in Congress Poland.

A complaint to this effect was expressed by the Jewish National Council in a memorandum submitted to the Polish government yesterday. The memorandum points out that this continued practice takes away the livelihood of many Jewish concessionaries. The Council points out that if the government intends to aid Polish war veterans, it could give these veterans new concessions without harming the present holders, thus extending the consumption instead of limiting the number of vendors.

ARABS AND JEWS ELECTED TO SAFED MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

Jerusalem, Apr. 12.—Three Jewish and four Arab councillors were elected to the municipal government of Safed in the elections held yesterday.

The elections took place under an agreement between the Arab and Jewish parties whereby the Arab candidates received the support of the Jewish workers.

Detroit's Attitude on Ford

What is the opinion of people in Detroit, the home of Henry Ford, on the subject of his recent accident, the mystery of which has not yet been cleared up? According to Reuben Brainin, whose impressions of the Ford-Sapiro trial are published in the "Day" of yesterday, the general view in Detroit is that the Ford accident is "a mystifying legend." Mr. Brainin observes:

"Sensible people in Detroit doubt the whole story of the accident. No one is allowed to come near Ford and no one has seen him hurt.

"One thing is certain: Ford is hiding from the court. It is said that he becomes hysterical at the mention of the trial. He dreads the fate awaiting him there, for he has no proofs, nothing definite with which to substantiate his absurd libels, furnished him by his hirelings who knew that it was all a lie."

The assertion that Ford has hired "perverted mentalities" to conduct his paper, the "Independent", is contained in an editorial of the Council Bluffs (La.) "Nonpareil" of March 31.—The paper has the following to say, in part, on the subject of Ford's anti-Jewish campaign which gave rise to the Sapiro libel suit:

"The folly, the injustice, the absurdity of Henry Ford's obsession concerning the Jews of this country is manifest the moment the subject is investigated.

"The Jew today in civilized lands is a free citizen and because of this dark background wherever the Jew finds a government that gives him liberty and opportunity he returns loyalty and faithful support. The whole background of Jewish history moves these people resident in America toward a loyalty to the country of a character not surpassed even by those of revolutionary ancestry.

"Henry Ford is quoted as saying that 'history is bunk.' Henry's knowledge of history is limited. This is not unusual. He is like other people. He has his limitations. He has failed to inform himself on this subject. His mind is controlled, therefore, on this line, by his prejudices. He has made a mint of money in industry. He can afford to hire perverted mentalities to operate a magazine and stand heavy losses.

He is trying to make the American people believe that their liberties are endangered by 2 per cent of their number which for reasons noted heretofore probably would run a higher average of patriotic loyalty to the country than any other racial element in our population.

"Facts are that Henry Ford's theories are pure bunk for they are not supported by either history or reason. The

STABILIZED GIVING WILL REPLACE ANNUAL DRIVES

N. Y. Federation Adopts Plan of
Mortimer L. Schiff

Stabilized giving instead of annual drives will be the policy of the New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, according to plans announced by Mortimer L. Schiff, at a luncheon meeting at the Bankers' Club on Wednesday.

That this policy has the support of the Federation contributors is evidenced by the fact that \$201,500 has been converted into recurring subscriptions in response to an inquiry by mail.

Mr. Schiff, who is the father of the plan to make the Federation's income at the beginning of the calendar year equal to the sum allotted to its ninety-one constituent societies, announced that 951 letters were sent by him to special donors and that the \$201,500 in returns represented 243 responses. The total of special donations which Mr. Schiff is trying to convert is \$850,000.

Sol M. Strock, president of the Federation described the difficulty which the Federation experienced in approving the budgetary requests of the affiliated societies of the Jewish community chest at the present time, since only \$3,000,000 was the dependable recurrent income while the expenditures exceeded \$4,500,000. Every fall, he said, it is necessary for the Federation to conduct a campaign for the deficit, only to find itself in a similarly unsound position financially in the spring.

About 150 men from business and the professions attended the luncheon and decided to visit the special donors with a view to having them convert donations into subscriptions.

Attorney General Nathan L. Otinger, in the closing address of the meeting, endorsed the plan of stabilizing the Federation's income and assured Mr. Schiff that the community was in favor of the program.

ORGANIZE COMMITTEE TO CELEBRATE LIPSKY JUBILEE

Will Publish His Selected Writings

American Zionists will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of service to the Zionist movement by Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America.

A "Louis Lipsky Jubilee Committee" has been formed with Dr. Stephen S. Wise as chairman, Emanuel Neumann, honorary secretary, and Isidore D. Morrison, treasurer, it was announced.

A feature of the projected celebration planned by the Jubilee Committee is the publication in three volumes of the selected writings of Mr. Lipsky.

Mr. Lipsky is at present in London attending a meeting of the World Zionist Executive and is expected to return shortly.

ROUMANIAN STUDENT THREATENS TO MURDER AGED KISHINEFF RABBI Rabbi Zirelson Warned to Abandon Criticism of Government; Student Outbreak Averted

Kishineff, Mar. 27.—Chief Rabbi Zirelson received a letter threatening his life. It was addressed from the town of Bender. The Rabbi was warned that unless he ceases criticizing the Government and the nationalists, he would be murdered. The letter was signed "A Student of Timisvar."

Kishineff lived through a day of anxiety today. Several hundred Cuzist students arrived from Jassy, intending to celebrate the ninth anniversary of the unification of Bessarabia with Roumania. They wanted to demonstrate in front of the Italian Consulate and it was feared that attacks would be made on the Jews.

A delegation arrived from Jassy on Friday to ask the authorities for permission to hold the demonstration. The Governor-General refused to give his permission and warned the students that orders had been given not to allow them to enter the town.

On Sunday, before daybreak the Cuzist students arrived by train from Jassy and tried to break their way into town. They were held back, however, at the railway station by military patrols and were detained under guard till five o'clock in the afternoon. They were then put into the train and sent back to Jassy.

The Jewish population is relieved that the day passed quietly and they point to the result of the vigorous action of the authorities to show that if the authorities wished, they could prevent anti-Semitic disturbances.

YIDDISH SCHOOLS IN POLAND WILL BE REPRESENTED AT INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS

Warsaw, Apr. 14.—The Yiddish school system in the Republic of Poland maintained by the Yiddish school organization with the aid of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee found what might be termed international recognition.

The organization was invited to participate in the International Pedagogical Congress which is to meet in London during the month of April.

PALESTINE WRITERS VOICE PROTEST AGAINST PERSECUTION OF HEBREW IN RUSSIA

Tel Aviv, Apr. 14.—A resolution protesting against the persecution of the Hebrew language and literature in Soviet Russia was adopted at a conference of Hebrew writers held here. The conference extended the greetings of Palestine Hebrew writers to their colleagues in Russia and urged similar organizations abroad to join the protest.

FEAST OF PASSOVER BEGINS TOMORROW AT SUNDOWN

"Bulletin" Will Not Appear First and
Last Two Days

To-morrow at sundown the Feast of Passover will begin.

The "Jewish Daily Bulletin" in accordance with its tradition, will not appear on Sunday and Monday, the first two days of the holiday.

The editions for Sunday and Monday of next week, the last two days of the holiday, will not be published.

Arrangements have been made by the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, through several of its affiliated societies to provide the necessary food supplies to poor families.

Through the Widowed Mothers' Fund Association, 100 families dependent upon widowed mothers will receive supplies of matzo's, flour and other supplies to last the week. Cooperating with the Ladies' Fuel and Aid Society, the Jewish Social Service Association, formerly known as the United Hebrew Charities, has made provision for 800 families in Manhattan and over 200 families in the Bronx. A special Seder for soldiers and sailors and for other transient New Yorkers will be held at the 92nd Street Young Men's Hebrew Association, the program being under the joint auspices of the Young Men's Hebrew Association and the Jewish Welfare Board.

Services conducted by one of the old men residents will be held at the Home for Aged and Infirm Hebrews, West 105th Street, and at the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, Amsterdam Avenue and 138th Street, where one of the older orphan boys will officiate at the Children's Seder service in which more than 500 children at the orphanage will take part.

Seder services under the auspices of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society will be held on Ellis Island for about 150 temporarily detained immigrants and a number of deportees. A supply of matzo's and sacramental wine has been contributed by directors and friends of the organization for the observance of the Passover Festival on the Island.

Seder services will also be held in the building of the Hias, 425 Lafayette Street, New York, for 400 persons, including admitted immigrants, wayfarers and homeless men and women.

FIRE DESTROYS JEWISH HOMES IN POLISH TOWN

Warsaw, Apr. 14.—Several scores of Jewish houses were burned down in the town Chencin, district of Kielce in the fire which broke out last night.

A local committee headed by the rabbi issued an appeal for aid.

MASARYK PAYS TRIBUTE TO ACHAD HA'AM AND NORDAU

TEMPLE SINAI OF CHICAGO TO ERECT \$2,000,000 EDIFICE

Chicago, Apr. 14.—Sinai Congregation, for more than five decades one of the leading Reform congregations in Chicago, will build a \$2,000,000 temple at Fifty-sixth Street and the South Outer Drive.

The decision to take this step was made Wednesday night at a meeting at the Standard Club at which were present some of the outstanding leaders of Jewry in Chicago. M. E. Greenbaum, president of the congregation, presided at the meeting. Dr. Louis L. Mann, rabbi of the congregation, proposed the new site for the temple.

The meeting which was the sixty-sixth annual gathering of the congregation, decided upon three steps in the direction of building the new temple.

At the instance of Julius Rosenwald, vice-president of the congregation, it voted to sell the present temple and the Emil G. Hirsch Social Center at Forty-sixth Street and South Park Way. This structure was erected fifteen years ago.

It approved the purchase of the new site at Fifty-sixth Street and Leif Ericson drive for an estimated \$700,000. It also approved the erection of a new temple at the estimated cost of \$1,250,000.

The present building, housing the temple and social center, was built at a cost of \$650,000. It is understood that an offer of \$450,000 has been made for the structure.

YESHIVA WILL BE OPENED IN SWITZERLAND ON MAY 3

Geneva, Apr. 14.—A Yeshiva, to be known as the Ez Chaim Yeshiva, will be opened at Montreux on May 3rd. Instruction will be given in the Bible, Talmud with commentaries, Shulchan Aruch, Jewish Ethics. Pupils who have no means will be enrolled without payment of fees.

Mrs. Siegmund Herzog, who has been serving as Chairman of the Functioning Committee of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Cleveland, Ohio, has been asked to serve as Acting President of the Federation. Mrs. Herzog was the first president of the Conference of Jewish Women's Organizations of Cleveland and for several years, President of the Cleveland Council of Jewish Women. She is Chairman of the Department of Community Cooperation of the National Council of Jewish Women.

RAMSAY MACDONALD HERE AT INVITATION OF "JEWISH DAILY FORWARD"

To Participate in Thirtieth Anniversary of Jewish Labor Daily

The Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald, former Premier of Great Britain, accompanied by his daughter, Ishbel, will arrive in New York today on the Aquitania.

The "Jewish Daily Bulletin" learns that Mr. MacDonald decided to visit the United States at the invitation of the "Jewish Daily Forward," leading Jewish labor paper. He will participate in the celebration of the thirtieth anniversary of the founding of the "Forward." Morris Hillquit will preside at the celebration which will be held at the Century Theatre on April 24. Abe Cahan, editor of the "Forward" and B. C. Vladeck, manager, will address the gathering.

A dinner will be given in honor of Mr. MacDonald at the Concourse Plaza Hotel. B. C. Vladeck will preside.

While in New York, Mr. MacDonald and his daughter will be the guests of Miss Lilian D. Wald, prominent Jewish social worker, of "The House on Henry Street."

A dinner will be given in Washington by the American Federation of Labor in honor of Mr. MacDonald.

N. J. LEGISLATURE RECON- VENED TO CHANGE ELECTION DATE FROM ROSH HASHANAH

A special session of the New Jersey State Legislature called by Gov. Moore for the purpose of selecting another date for the special election on the proposed constitutional amendment convened on Thursday in Trenton. The date for the election was first set for Sept. 27, the first day of Rosh Hashanah. Upon the protest of Jewish organizations, Gov. Moore called the special session to set another date for the elections. It is believed that the date will be changed to Sept. 20.

A state organization for the United Palestine Appeal in South Carolina was effected at a meeting held in Charleston. Samuel Rittenberg was elected state chairman, Rabbi Jacob S. Raisin vice-chairman, and Sol Goldman, secretary. Mr. Rittenberg will also head the drive in Charleston which will be launched on May 15.

SENATOR REED SEKS TO PIN TOBACCO "PLOT" TO SAPIRO

Detroit, April 14.—Senator James A. Reed finally arrived today—the thirtieth day of his cross-examination of Aaron Sapiro—at the greatest of the "conspiracies" Henry Ford's "Dearborn Independent" and Ford's defenders in this libel suit charge to Mr. Sapiro.

This is his organization of the American Tobacco Growers, commencing with the Kentucky Growers of Burley tobacco.

Forty-two thousand pages of type-written words—a rough total of 10,500,000 words—confront the already weary jury in this trial.

This is the estimated volume of the 293 depositions which are to be read into the record. However, they will not be read until Ford has been called as a witness, until the long expected climax of the case has come and gone.

Mr. Sapiro, it appears, will be on the stand all next week and Mr. Ford will not appear until the next week. For it is ascertained now that Senator Reed does not expect to end the cross-examination this week, which is a day short because of the court's agreement to adjourn this afternoon.
