

FAMOUS ROUMANIAN PROFESSOR JOINS PROTEST AGAINST EXCESSES

Country Has Too Many Students, He Says; Cuza's Opponents Call Separate Anti-Semitic Congress

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Apr. 22.—The source of all the trouble with regard to the anti-Semitic student excesses in Roumania is to be found in the fact that Roumania has too many students.

This opinion was expressed by Dr. Radulescu Motru, famous Roumanian scientist and professor of psychology at the University of Bucharest, who joined the protest of the Professors of the University of Jassy against the anti-Semitic student excesses.

In approving the memorandum submitted by the Jassy professors to the government, Professor Motru pointed to the fact that Roumania has too many students. "For instance," he

said, "the Philosophical Department of the Bucharest University has 1,500 students. When the students conclude their studies and begin to seek positions which they are unable to obtain, they enter politics being immature and irresponsible. Roumania must establish more professional schools, where people should be taught to work," he stated.

Bucharest, Apr. 25.—The Jew of Roumania will have to stand the effects not only of one anti-Semitic Congress but of two, due to a split in the Christian League, the organization responsible for fostering racial hatred in the country.

Professor Alexander Cuza has called an anti-Semitic Congress for May 8 to be held in Jassy. A group within the League which is in opposition to Cuza, claiming that the call to the congress was unauthorized, decided to call another congress to be held on the same day in Bucharest.

The rift within the League was caused by a number of expulsions from the League, the opposition claiming that these expulsions were illegal and that the central organ of the league represents only the views of Professor Cuza.

SAPIRO WINS LIBEL SUIT AGAINST CANADIAN PAPER

Winnipeg, Man., Apr. 25.—Aaron Sapiro, plaintiff in the \$1,000,000 libel suit against Henry Ford, was the winner in a \$30,000 libel action against a Regina, Sask., publication.

When Sapiro was in Western Canada working on the formation of a Canadian wheat pool, the Regina newspaper attacked him.

Sapiro sued for \$30,000. When the case came up before the Court of Kings bench it was thrown out on technical terms. Sapiro carried the suit to the Court of Appeals, which ordered the case sent back to the lower court for trial on its merits.

Then a settlement was arranged out of court, the general terms of which were: The publication must withdraw all charges, must pay all costs, and must make the agreement a part of the court records of the case. The newspaper further agreed to select a homeless boy within ninety days "who would not otherwise stand a chance for education" and pay all his expenses in the public schools and on through until he graduates in the Saskatchewan Provincial University.

LIEBERMANN TO PAINT HINDENBURG'S PORTRAIT

Berlin, Apr. 25.—Professor Max Liebermann, famous German Jewish artist, was commissioned by the government of Mecklenburg, to paint the portrait of Von Hindenburg, President of the German Republic. Professor Liebermann is eighty years old.

The portrait is intended for the Schwerin Museum.

STATE DEPARTMENT CONFIRMS REPORT OF PALESTINE SURVEY FOR U. S.

Wash., D. C., Apr. 25.—The Department of Commerce today, in response to an inquiry by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent, confirmed the report that James Hodgson has been assigned to make a survey of the commercial possibilities of Palestine, and also indicated that he will remain in Palestine until the Fall to complete this survey.

Dr. Julius Klein, the Director of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce of the Commerce Department, will meet Mr. Hodgson in Europe in June, at which time he will confer with the latter regarding the scope and form of the survey. It is understood that the survey will be of a comprehensive character.

Mr. Hodgson became commercial attache at Cairo, from which he was assigned to his present special work, only last January. Prior to this he was stationed at Warsaw and Prague. He entered the foreign commerce service of the United States in 1923.

APPOINT WHITE RUSSIAN JEW TO NATIONALITIES COUNCIL

Moscow, Apr. 25.—A. Bielin, secretary of the Jewish Bureau of the Communist Party in White Russia, was appointed by the Congress of White Russian Soviets as a member of the Nationalities Council in the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics.

JUDEANS CELEBRATE 150TH ANNIVERSARY OF CONSTITUTIONAL RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

Judge Lehman and Max J. Kohler Present Papers Showing America Influenced World for Religious Freedom; Marshall's Achievement in Introducing Principle in International Law Praised

The 150th anniversary of the constitutional establishment of religious liberty in America was celebrated by the Judeans at the club's meeting held Sunday night at the Louis Marshall, the chairmanship of which was held by the chairman of the club, Louis Marshall.

The meeting was called to commemorate the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the adoption of the first constitution of the State of New York, in which the clause for religious liberty was incorporated, New York being one of the first states to include this principle in its constitution. Mr. Marshall gave an outline of the history of the New York State Constitution.

Judge Irving Lehman, Associate Judge of the Court of Appeals of New York State, read a paper on the 150th Anniversary of the Constitutional Establishment of Religious Liberty.

"It is a trite saying that government is not merely a matter of law but of

men. As the very foundation of our government, the organic law decrees freedom of thought and conscience, yet from time to time men try to destroy or abridge the freedom which the law decrees. It has been said that no man is worthy of freedom who cannot defend it. We celebrate this year the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the recognition of religious freedom as a legal right. We rejoice and are proud because we are citizens of the country which has recognized that right and

S. LAMPORT ADDS \$150,000 TO PALESTINE FREE LOAN FUND

Jerusalem, Apr. 22.—Samuel C. Lamport, noted American Jewish merchant and communal worker, has announced the increase of the fund to establish a Palestine Free Loan Society from \$100,000 to a quarter of a million dollars.

Mr. Lamport was authorized by his father, Nathan Lamport, donor of \$200,000 for the Yeshiva College of America, to establish the Nathan Lamport Free Loan Foundation in Palestine.

Upon his arrival here, Mr. Lamport formed a committee which will be in charge of the Foundation. The committee consists of Norman Bentwich, Chief Rabbi A. I. Kook, Siegfried Hooft, manager of the Anglo-Palestine Bank, Mr. Goldwater, Mr. Mohl and Harry Sacker.

HIGH COMMISSIONER PLUMER RECEIVES J. T. A. DIRECTOR

Jerusalem, Apr. 22.—Jacob Landau, managing director of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and the "Jewish Daily Bulletin", was received yesterday by Lord Plumer, High Commissioner of Palestine, and Col. Symes, Civil Secretary of the Palestine government.

It is understood that the British policy in Palestine was the subject of the interview.

JEWISH SCIENTIST LOSES LIFE IN SNOW BLIZZARD

Sagreb, Jugoslavia, Apr. 22.—Dr. Max Mandl, Professor of Natural Sciences at the college here, was killed in a snow storm in the Spalato Mountains.

Professor Mandl was on an excursion over the holidays. He was lost in a snowstorm in the mountains and was frozen to death. A rescue party found his body.

JEWISH LIST IN AUSTRIAN ELECTIONS FAILS; HAKEN-KREUZLER ALSO DEFEATED

Vienna, Apr. 25.—The national elections held here yesterday ended with a victory for the Social Democrats and failure for the Jewish list. None of the candidates of the Jewish Elections Committee was elected in any of the districts. The Hakenkreuzler party also failed. With the exception of one candidate for the Lower Austria Landtag, none of the Hakenkreuzler candidates was elected. Even Riehl, the most notorious of the rabid anti-Semites, failed.

The Social Democrats gained considerably, sharing the spoils with the United Austrian Bloc.

The failure of the Hakenkreuzler is considered here as a collapse of the party.

Leaders of the Jewish Election Committee explained the failure of their candidates by the circumstance that the elections took place on the last day of Passover, when many of the Jewish voters were unable to go to the polls. The representatives of the Jewish population asked the government to postpone the election date, but this request was refused.

HUNGARIAN GOVERNMENT WILL NOT ALLOW JEWS TO CHANGE THEIR NAMES

Budapest, Apr. 22.—The Magyarization of their non-Magyar names by Hungarian citizens has been prohibited by an order of the Ministry of the Interior.

The Ministry decreed that families bearing non-Magyar names will be permitted to change their names only in such cases where the applicant has performed a patriotic service to the country.

The press comments that this order has been issued mainly against Hungarian Jews.

HEADS FLOOD RELIEF COMMITTEE IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Apr. 25.—Harold E. Foreman, president of the Foreman banks of Chicago, was named chairman of a citizens' committee of two hundred prominent Chicagoans to formulate plans for the raising of Chicago's quota of \$750,000 for flood relief work. Acting Mayor Samuel A. Ettelson, the only Jew who has ever acted in this capacity, who is corporation counsel in Mayor Thompson's cabinet, named the committee. Other Jews named among the directors of the body are A. Balaban and John Hertz.

FIRE DESTROYS BISTRITZ CHURCH AND SYNAGOGUE

Bucharest, Apr. 25.—The synagogue and the church in the town of Bistriz, Transylvania, were destroyed in a fire which broke out last night.

One hundred and seventy houses were destroyed in the fire which started on Thursday and continued all day Friday. Many Jewish families remain roofless.

DIGEST OF PUBLIC OPINION ON JEWISH MATTERS

"Still a Chance for Mr. Ford"

Morally Sapiro emerged as victor and Ford as loser in the libel suit which has been terminated by a mistrial, declares the Jewish press.

The "Jewish Daily News" of yesterday expresses its conviction that the attitude of the jurors, at first perhaps unconsciously prejudiced against Sapiro became very favorable to him toward the end of the trial. The healthy sense of justice, says the paper, asserted itself and the jury realized that Sapiro did not deserve the abuse heaped on him by Ford.

"So far," the paper declares, "the Jewish side, so to say, had a sort of moral victory. What will happen at the next trial it is, of course, hard to say. But there can be no doubt that Sapiro will start the new trial in a more favorable atmosphere than that of the first trial. The suspicion of something hidden and conspirative about him has disappeared. The impression made on the whole country that Ford was obviously seeking to avoid appearing in court is also in Sapiro's favor."

The "Day" observes: "The small, cunning Shylock of the 'Dearborn Independent's' imagination, has emerged from the trial as a national figure in the field of American agriculture, who has brought about a great transformation in the farming industry and increased the income of the farmers by hundreds of millions.

"On the other hand, Ford the wizard, who took up the cudgels for the farmer, has emerged as a small fellow who hides behind the back of his hireling. The American farmer has lost more through the 'Independent' articles than Sapiro and the Jews. Ford stands condemned before the world as an irresponsible and cowardly person, who perpetrates a base deed and then scurries away and leaves his hireling, who assumes the responsibility for the sake of his bread and butter, to face the consequences."

An editorial in the New York "Times" of Sunday under the caption "Still a Chance for Mr. Ford", again urges Ford to waive aside legal technicalities and to come out with the truth. We read:

"The mistrial declared by the Judge in the libel suit against Henry Ford, after six weeks of speeches by counsel and testimony by witnesses, does not really destroy the opportunity which, before the case opened, we said ought to appear tempting to Mr. Ford. He is not bound by the technicalities of the law which broke off the trial. He is not even obliged to follow the advice of his lawyers. If his time had come to go on the witness stand before the mistrial, it is probable that he would have had some highly important statements to make. They could have been

"JEWISH DAILY FORWARD" CELEBRATES THIRTIETH AN- NIVERSARY SINCE FOUNDING

The thirtieth anniversary since the founding of the "Jewish Daily Forward", the leading Jewish paper in the United States, was celebrated Sunday by a mass meeting at the Century Theatre, followed by a banquet at the Concourse Plaza Hotel. The meeting which was attended by 4,000 people, was presided over by Morris Hilquit, well known Socialist leader.

The history of the paper as the organ of the Jewish labor movement in America was traced by the various speakers, chief among whom were Abraham Cahane, novelist and editor of the "Forward" almost from the day of its founding; B. C. Vladeck, business manager of the "Forward"; Victor Berger, noted Socialist leader. Meyer Gillis was chairman of the committee which arranged the celebration.

Ramsay MacDonald, British Labor leader and ex-Premier who is now in this country was scheduled to appear at the "Forward" meeting, but was prevented from coming owing to illness. His daughter, Ishbel, addressed the gathering in his stead.

brought from him in his direct testimony, or drawn out on cross-examination. But it is not necessary for him to wait until a new jury is chosen and a new trial begun. He can afford to snap his fingers at all the merely monetary consequences of the libel suit. If he chooses, he can, in a large way, deal with the larger question involved in those publications for which he was responsible, and which moved Mr. Sapiro to sue him for damages.

"Behind that individual grievance, behind the personal suit, lay the charges so widely distributed under Mr. Ford's authority of a great and unpatriotic 'Jewish conspiracy.' This was the thing that gave bitter offense to millions of Americans. It perhaps could not be technically brought into the libel suit. But Henry Ford need not concern himself with any merely legal and petty defense. He can, if he is magnanimous enough, deal with the whole matter afresh and in his own name. He can freely tell the public whether he has any substantial evidence to back up the accusations against a whole race which were made in his name; and if he has not, he can be man enough to withdraw what never should have been printed. Though the doors of the court room are temporarily closed to Mr. Ford, the door of public opportunity, with free access to every newspaper in the country, is still open to him."

Ben Gold and Isador Sapiro were acquitted by the Minnesota Court of the charge of having instigated a felonious assault upon two Rockville Centre furriers. The nine others tried were found guilty.

FREDERICK BROWN TO LAY YESHIVA CORNERSTONE AT EXERCISES ON MAY 1

N. Y. "Times" Editor, Mayor, Senators and Prominent Leaders to Speak

Frederick Brown, the well-known New York realtor and philanthropist, will head a group of prominent Jewish leaders who will lay the cornerstone for the first group of buildings of the five million dollar Yeshiva College on Amsterdam Avenue and 186th Street, New York, on May 1st.

This announcement was made by Samuel Levy, chairman of the Executive Committee.

Arrangements have been completed; Mr. Levy announced, for the holding of the exercises on the Yeshiva grounds on May 1st when representatives of the Jewish communities in 25 states and in Canada will come to New York to witness the ceremonies. Grandstands were erected on the grounds with a large seating capacity. It is expected that about 25,000 people will be gathered on the grounds.

Twenty American colleges and universities will bring greetings to the Yeshiva College of America at the cornerstone laying exercises, according to the announcement by Dr. Bernard Revel, Dean of the Faculty of the Yeshiva.

Among the universities to be represented at the Exercises are Columbia University by Prof. Frederick Egbert, director of Extension Work; University of Harvard and Princeton, represented by members of the faculty; the University of Boston, by President Marsh and New York City College by Dr. Frederick H. Robinson.

Among the speakers who will address the representatives of the Jewish communities from twenty-five states in the United and in Canada are: Mayor James J. Walker, United States Senator Royal S. Copeland, United States Senator Robert F. Wagner, Dr. John Finley, former president of the New York State University and editor-in-chief of the "New York Times," and President Marsh of Boston.

The Women's Branch of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, which initiated the campaign for the dormitory building in connection with the other new buildings of the Yeshiva, is planning to participate as a body in the cornerstone laying ceremonies.

Mrs. Harry Fischel, under whose chairmanship these arrangements are being made, announced that a special section of the grand stand is to be set aside for the members of the Women's Branch and their friends.

244 BRITISH PILGRIMS SAIL FOR PALESTINE

London, Apr. 25.—A large group of English pilgrims is sailing for Palestine tomorrow.

Two hundred and forty-four members of the Order of St. Barnabas have undertaken a pilgrimage to the graves of British soldiers. They will participate in the unveiling of the war memorial in Jerusalem by Lord Allenby on May 7.

CATHOLICS AND JEWS GIVE BROADCASTING FACILITIES TO FRANKLIN FORD OF WHAP

Station WHAP, widely rebuked for its attacks on Catholics and Jews, which closed down a week ago, with the withdrawal of its wave length by the Federal Radio Commission, will resume its broadcasting.

Unwilling that any station should be forced out in the attempt being made to clear up the chaos in the air, the Federal Radio Commission addressed seven major and three or four minor stations, asking if they would share their broadcasting hours with WHAP. All refused except one, WGL, which has a board of directors composed principally of Catholics and Jews.

Charles D. Isaacson, director of WGL, which is to operate on 32.2 mhz, when interviewed by the representative of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin," stated that the directors of his station complied with the request of the Radio Commission in an effort to cooperate although the methods and policy of Station WHAP were "abhorred and despised" by them.

"I am told that Mr. Franklin Ford has learned a lesson and claims he will not spread propaganda any further," Mr. Isaacson said. "I do not know whether he is sincere about this. Let us hope so."

Mr. Isaacson pointed out that the arrangement is only temporary and will last only three or four weeks.

Station WGL derives its last two initials from the names of Colonel Lewis Landes, owner, and Harry Goldman, member of the board of directors. The other members include James Pershing, brother of General Pershing; J. Lester Eisner, and four Catholics, Colonel Ernest K. Coulter, Private Dan Edwards, Colonel Charles R. Van Etten and Lawrence Cockaday.

POLISH MINISTRY SANCTIONS USE OF MINORITY LANGUAGES

Warsaw, Apr. 25.—What might be taken as an indication of a more liberal attitude toward the school needs of the national minorities in Poland was issued by the Polish Ministry of Education.

The Ministry despatched a circular to all schools informing the principals that henceforth the Jewish, Ukrainian and White Russian and German minorities' schools are entitled to use their own language not only as a medium of instruction but also in the administration of the schools. This ordinance does not apply to state schools.

TRANSFORMATION SHOWN IN ODESSA JEWISH POPULATION

Moscow, Apr. 22.—The latest statistics concerning the Jewish population in Soviet Russia show the beginnings of an economic transformation.

According to the statistics, the Jewish population of Odessa now numbers 200,000, of whom 25,000 are members of the trade unions, 15,000 are small traders and 5,000 are students. The Jews constitute 43 per cent of the general population.

guaranteed it in its constitution. We prove ourselves worthy of it when we are ready to defend it from direct or indirect attack, when we fight all forms of prejudice, whether directed against us or others, which threaten it," Judge Lehman declared.

Max J. Kohler, vice-president of the Judaeans, read a paper on "American Influences on the Development of Religious Liberty in Europe," in which he traced the way in which America contributed to the progress of mankind by establishing the principle of constitutional religious liberty. He cited a number of cases when the United States government acted on this principle in its international relations, including the protection of persecuted Jews. Mr. Kohler mentioned, among others, the case of the Jews of Damascus when Secretary of State Forsyth, at the direction of President Van Buren instructed the United States Minister at Constantinople to use his good offices on behalf of the Damascus Jews; the case of the United States Government's intervention with Switzerland against discriminations against Jews holding American passports; the action of the United States government in 1870 when President Grant appointed Benjamin F. Peixotto, United States Consul at Bucharest for the purpose of affection an amelioration in the civil, religious and political condition of the Jews in Roumania.

"The greatest progress in making the American principle of religious liberty a principal of international law was made at the Peace Conference in Versailles in 1919, under the leadership of Louis Marshall and his associates, Judge Julian W. Mack, Dr. Cyrus Adler and Dr. Stephen S. Wise," Mr. Kohler declared.

"Our cherished American religious liberty provisions have been made directly applicable to a large section of Europe, largely through American direct effort. We sought to make the chief draftsman of these clauses our guest of honor soon after he returned from the peace conference, and we sought again to induce him to be our guest of honor last fall on the alleged occasion of his seventieth birthday, but he modestly declined. I am now assuming new authority as a vice-president of this organization, in declining to let our chairman of the evening silence me, when I say that our hearts go out to him in gratitude for this most important and valuable incident in a long and most useful life, and we hope that this seventy year young champion of religious liberty will be spared for many years of unabated public usefulness. I will conclude my desultory remarks with a question: Is it not clear that this one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the constitutional establishment of religious liberty in America is of no less profound significance for Europe, too?" Mr. Kohler declared.

SENATOR STRAUS IS HOST TO HAKOAH AT LUNCHEON

Senator Nathan Straus, Jr., was host at a luncheon at the Aldine Club to a group of New York journalists and the Hakoah players, the all Jewish team of Vienna who arrived for their second annual tour of the U. S. Dr. Novack and Dr. Schmidt, Consul-General of Czechoslovakia and Vice-Consul of Austria, respectively, Dr. Henry Moskowitz and Congressman W. W. Cohen welcomed the Hakoah players. Senator Straus declared that the Hakoah program was bringing athletic training to thousands of Jewish boys and girls and was the greatest single factor in the physical development of the Jewish youth of East Europe, to which purpose the financial proceeds of the American matches will be devoted.

Senator Straus presented Dr. Spiegler, the President of the World Maccabees (the Jewish Youth organization), Dr. Otto Bauer, the trainer of Hakoah, Dr. Maurice Vanderwege, Abraham Tuvim and Mrs. Rosenberg. Dr. Henry Moskowitz praised Senator Nathan Straus and Nathan Straus, Sr., for the encouragement they are giving to the Hakoah movement. He declared that the Strauses in sponsoring the Hakoah team in the United States were making it possible for the development of a robust, athletic Jewish youth. Dr. Schmidt, the Austrian Vice-Consul, declared that the Austrian Government viewed with approval and admiration the accomplishments of the Hakoah in Austria and abroad.

Samuel J. Bloomingdale will serve as treasurer of the campaign for \$1,500,000 which is to be undertaken in behalf of the Young Men's Hebrew Association, it was announced by Judge Joseph M. Prosser, president of the association. The fund is to be raised for the erection of an eleven-story addition to the present Y.M.H.A. building at Fifty-second Street and Lexington Avenue, New York.

Nineteen hundred Jewish men in the army and navy service and disabled veterans, located at Army posts, naval stations, and government hospitals, unable to avail themselves of the furlough granted by the Army and Navy Departments of the United States, were provided for by the Jewish Welfare Board during the Passover week. Seder Service, wine, Passover supplies distributed, and prayer books sent out throughout the United States and outlying territories, including Ancon in the Panama Canal Zone, Honolulu, Manila, Port-au-Prince, Haiti, and Tientsin, China.

Bernard Miller has been elected chairman of the United Palestine Appeal campaign in Newark. N. J. MORE JEWISH CEMETERIES DESECRATED IN GERMANY

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 25.—Five Jewish cemeteries were desecrated in Germany within recent weeks, according to a report of the "C. V. Zeitung", the organ of the Central Verein Deutschen Buerger des Juedischen Glaubens.

Twenty-eight gravestones were overthrown and many damaged in Kroidorf and Richerlsdorf near Kassel. Gravestones were overthrown and hedges burned in Kerpin and nearby towns. Hardly a week passes without desecrations of Jewish cemeteries, the paper complains.
