JEWISH COMMUNITY FILES COMPLAINT AT CATHOLIC PRIEST'S PROPAGANDA

Anti-Jewish Outbreaks Feared as Result of Venomous Sermons (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Lemberg, May 3 .- A bitter complaint against a Catholic priest who is spreadagainst a Cattonic priest who is spread-ing racial and religious hatred in the town of Wolomichawa, Galicia, was submitted by the Jewish community of that town to the Club of Jewish Depu-The appeal was addressed to Deputy Frostig and declares that a young Ukrainian priest who has been in the town for two years has been acitating a boycott against the Jews since his arrival there.

He delivers sermons inciting the threatens reprisals to anyone buying from or selling to Jews. He opened a cooperative with himself as director, where all Christians are compelled to buy. He placed a blacklist outside the church, giving the names of all those who had dealt with Jews.

The Jewish population in Wolomichawa fears an outbreak unless the priest is removed, they state in their complaint to the Jewish Deputies.

ROTHSCHILD ESTABLISHES FRENCH RESEARCH INSTITUTE WITH 30.000.000 FRANC FUND Institute to Be Modelled After Rocke-

feller Foundation (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, May 3 .- A French Institute for the study of biology, chemistry and physics, modelled after the Rockefeller Foundation in America, will be estab-lished by a fund donated by Baron Edmond de Rothschild.

Baron Edmond donated the amount of 30,000,000 francs for the establishment of the Institute.

Four of the best known scientists in France will form the first Board of Directors. They are Jean Lerrin, win-ner of the Nobel Prize for Physics; Professor Job of the Sorbonne, Pro-fessor Mayer of the College of France and Pierre Girard, director of the School of Higher Studies at the Sorbonne.

WARSAW PREPARING FOR MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

JEWISH POPULATION IN

Agudath Israel Leaders Meet With Opposition on Bloc Issue (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 3.-The campaign for the forthcoming municipal elections is already in full swing here. In a state-ment issued yesterday, Z. Bychowski, one of the leaders of the bloc of national Jewish parties, declared that the bloc will strive to elect a large number of Jewish members to the Warsaw City Council, which will enable the election of a Jew as vice-president of the Coun-cil. This would greatly benefit the Jewish population in Poland's capital, he stated.

The leaders of the Agudath Israel. the Orthodox organization which has joined the bloc, have met with opposition within its own ranks on account of their joining the bloc. The Agudath Israel has issued an appeal to the Orthodox Youth Association, urging its members to campaign for the bloc. At a meeting of the Association held yesyesterday, it was decided, following a heated debate, to refrain from participating in the campaign.

DIRE NEED AFFLICTS MANY JEWISH FAMILIES IN POLAND Many Parents Give Starving Children to Missionary Homes

Warsaw, May 3 .- The economic distress of large parts of the Jewish population in the Republic of Poland is assuming acute form.

Great grief was caused by the news received here from Bialystok that groups of Jewish parents who are in dire need have advertised that they are prepared to sell some of their children in order to provide food for the others. Many Orthodox Jewish parents, faced with the alternative of seeing their children starve, are sending them to missionary homes where they will be baptized.

JUDGE ROSALSKY APPEALS FOR CASH ON NEW YORK PALESTINE APPEAL PLEDGES

Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, chairman for Greater New York in the 1927 United Palestine Appeal, in a statement to the Jews of New York, calls upon all contributors to Palestine to translate their pledges into cash in order that the work of reconstruction should not be

"No Jew or group of Jews can take it upon their responsibility that the work in Palestine be stopped because of their delay in honoring their pledges to the United Palestine Appeal," Judge Rosalsky declares.

"New York Jewry, in its response to the United Palestine Appeal for the upbuilding of Palestine, has demonstrated its sense of responsibility and its understanding of the problems involved in building the foundations of

the Jewish National Home. The sums pledged in all sections of the city during the campaign are a great contribution in the work of reconstruction, but pledges alone cannot build and the work in Palestine will suffer seriously if subscribers delay in redeeming

their pledges. "The pressure of events in Palestine demands an immediate response to this

"The New York 1927 campaign officially closes on May 10th. We want to be able to announce on the closing day that New York Jewry has fully redeemed its pledge. A special duty devolves upon the active workers in the campaign. We depend on their loyal aid and on the generous response of the entire Jewish community," Judge Ro-salsky declared in the appeal.

RELIGIOUS NATIONAL SENTI-MENT AMONG RUSSIAN JEWS (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Moscow, Apr. 15 .- The difficult economic position in the towns has led to a growth of nationalist and semi-Menshevist feeling among the Jewish pro-letariat, says the Bureau of the District Party Committee in Kiev in a resolution it has adopted on the work to be carried on among the Jewish masses.

"The result," the resolution proceeds, "is a revival of small bourgeoisie and clericalist influence among the Jewish population. An intensive campaign must, therefore, be carried on in order to enlighten the Jewisn masses concerning the anti-Soviet and counter-revolutionary character of Zionism in all its forms. All the Jewish nationalist philanthropic institutions must be suppressed and the Jewish poor in the towns provided for by the town administrations. At the same time, there must be a vigorous campaign to make clear to the non-lewish masses the counter-revolutionary character of anti-Semitism and repressive measures must be taken by the Soviet authorities against anti-Semitic hooliganism."

RABBI M. S. MARGOLIES FETED ON SEVENTY-FIFTH BIRTHDAY

A dinner in honor of Rabbi M. S Margolies, dean of the orthodox rabbinate in this country, on the occasion of his seventy-fifth birthday anniversary and his fiftieth year as a rabbi, was given Monday night by the Executive Committee of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Yeshiva at the 71st Regiment Armory. The dinner was attended by a large number of friends and followers of the Rabbi as well as numerous representatives of synagogues in New York and other cities. Samuel Levy acted as toastmaster

and among the speakers were Rabbi Israel Rosenberg, Dr. Bernard Revel, president of the faculty of the Yeshiva, Rabbi Lookstein, Harris L. Selig and others. The speakers reviewed the achievements of Rabbi Margolies and extolled his great learning.

Following the address of Harris I. Selig, the sum of \$30,000 was pledged by those present for the Yeshiva College of America and the Teachers' Institute of the Yeshiva, which has been named after Rabbi Margolies.

Irving Fisher Wants Only "Superior Aliens" Admitted to U. S.

A proposal to admit to the United States only "superior aliens," by lifting the immigration question from the plane of nationality and business economics to the plane of vital economics, or eugenics, is made by Irving Fisher, Professor of Economics at Yale University. Writing in the New York "World" of Monday Prof. Fisher points out that the immigration policy of the United States, from the very beginning of its history, has been "the narrowly economic one of admitting cheap labor." Moreover, none of the restrictive measures devised for the regulation of immigration "lifts us very far from the narrow economic plane from which we started." Professor Fisher declares, making his proposal as follows: "Exclusion and restriction have been

found in the main to meet our present business needs, that is all,

"From business economics the question needs lifting to the broader plane of vital economics, or eugenics. Let all incoming white immigrants be scrutinized, preferably in the countries of their birth, and only those admitted who prove superior to the average American in body, mind, and morals Then all other objections would dwin-dle; most of them would disappear.

"Nationality is a poor test. It seems to be true that the nations of Northern and Western Europe yield fewer idiots, imbeciles, feeble-minded persons, epileptics, insane and persons of constitutional psychopathic inferiority than the peoples of the Mediterranean countries and East Europe. But superior persons may come from any nation. Of course, the colored races should be excluded, because they do not mix well with the whites. But for all white aliens we should apply the army physical and mental tests. We can also require of each enough of his individual history, his education and the pedigree of his near kin to be certain whether he will bring to us traits that are not sound and better than the average of our American stock."

The measure, Professor Fisher believes, can be applied without the tragedy of separating families on arrival at our ports. He says:

"Secretary of Labor Davis has pro-posed that alien heads of families seeking visas for permanent residence here should be required to name the members of their families which they intend later to bring in. These should have a chance to pass, together with their family heads, the same tests and to receive visas for future admission. If any fail, the entire family would be these shores.'

National Congregation Conference Ends Sessions Following Heated Debate: Controversy with Union Adjusted; Permanent Committee of Rabbis and Laymen on Jewish Education Formed; Urge Creation of Parochial Schools

This can be accomplished only convention of Orthodox Jewish congrethrough an intensive Jewish education gations and organizations in the near future, with a view of creating a federation of Orthodox communities in the United States, were formulated yesterday at the National Conference of Orthodox Congregations which was continued at the Broadway Central Hotel. The decision was taken follow-ing a heated and turbulent debate under the chairmanship of Gedaliah Bublick, editor of the Orthodox "Jew-ish Daily News." Opposition to the proposal developed on the part of the Union of Orthodox Congregations of which Dr. Herbert S. Goldstein is The spokesmen for the President. Union contended that the creation of a new body was unnecessary as the Union of Orthodox Congregations performs this function, and urged that all other congregations be requested to join the Union. Other leaders of the Conference including representatives of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, Mr. Bublick and Harris L. Selig, director of the Yeshiva College Building Fund, insisted on the creation of a new body contending that the authority of the Union of Orthodox Congregations is not universally recognized and that the Union must submit to the will of the majority of the congregations which desire the creation of a new body.

Several motions were debated until yesterday when the motion of Rabbi Israel Rosenberg, President of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, prevailed. The decision was to the effect that the Conference elect a committee which is to consist of an equal number of representatives of the National Conference of Orthodox Congregations, Union of Orthodox Rabbis and of the Union of Orthodox Congregations. committee will be in charge of calling the forthcoming national convention.

A resolution as to the personnel and number of the committee was postponed for a later session.

A permanent committee for the consideration of the problems of Jewish education consisting of fifty members including ten representatives of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, ten of the Mizrachi, the Zionist Organization, ten representatives of the Yeshiva and ...twenty members at large recruited from among the delegates of the convention, was chosen at the Monday afternoon session which was held under the auspices of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis. Rabbi Israel Rosenberg presided.

Rabbi Rosenberg in his principal address urged the necessity of an intensive lewish education under the present day conditions in American Jewish life. In former times when there was no American Jews face the necessity of taking extraordinary steps to secure a school of the complex of the complex

and a return to the authentic sources of Judaism, he stated.

Harris L. Selig explained the purpose and program of the extended Yeshiva and College which is now being built by the Yeshiva College Building Fund. Other rabbis who participated in the discussion were Rabbis Scheinfeld and Silverman of Winnipeg, Hirmas of Atlanta, Georgia and Rabbi Silver of Springfield, Mass.

Among the resolutions adopted was one urging the creation of Yeshiva Parochial schools, one urging greater facilities for the Jewish education of girls and others urging the unification of the curriculum in the existing Talmud Torahs and Hebrew Schools with greater emphasis on the religious character of the instruction.

EXECUTIVE AND HADASSAH

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) Jerusalem, Apr. 13.-The agreement signed recently between the Executive of the World Zionist Organization and the Hadassah Medica Organization, provides that, "the whole budget of the Hadassah Medical Organization, except the income received from Palestine, shall be raised by Hadassah. Inasmuch as Hadassah has dedicated itself to medical and health activities in Palestine as its share in the execution of the will of the Jewish people to reconstruct Palestine, and in pursuance of this end has developed the Hadassah Medical Organization; and inasmuch as the Hadassah Medical Organization has carried on in the past medical and health work for the benefit of the population of Palestine, and is designed to carry it on in the future until such time when the desire and hope of the parties of this agreement, gradually to develop the responsibility of the people of Pal-estine, in particular of the organized Jewry of the country and the municipalities for the administration and support of this work, shall have been realized.

"A copy of the proposed budget is to be submitted, as heretofore, to the Palestine Zionist Executive, who are to present their observations to the Governing Board of Hadassah for consideration. This budget is to be submitted annually for separate ratification to the Zionist Congress or to the General Council of the World Zionist Organiza-

"The control of the Hadassah Medical Organization is to be vested in a governing board composed as heretofore of two representatives of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, the Keren Hayesod, and the American Jewish . nysicians' Committee and two members at large, plus one additional member to be appointed by the Palestine Zionist Executive in their discretion.

"The Director of the Hadassah Medical Organization, who shall administer the Hadassah Medical Organization in Palestine, is to be appointed by the governing board, responsibility for the administration of the Hadassah Medical Organization in Palestine being vested in the governing board and the director.

"A committee to be known as the Palestine Advisory Committee, consisting of persons resident in Palestine, shall be associated with the director of the Hadassah Medical Organization, who shall be a member of the Committee and act as its chairman. Four members of the Palestine Advisory Committee shall be appointed by the Governing Board, and the Palestine Zionist Executive in their discretion may appoint two additional members. No members of the committee shall be a member of the medical profession or connected with any medical organization or agency. The members of the committee shall act in a personal capacity only except the two members appointed

JEWISH OFFICIAL DISMISSED

FROM SOVIET INSTITUTE (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) Moscow, Apr. 14 .- A Jew named Le-

vin, who was an official under the Central Committee for Mutual Aid Among the Peasants, has been dis-missed from his post because he is a Iew, states the "Isvestia" in an article in its issue today by the well known journalist, Agronovsky.

The document, giving the reason for the dismissal, the article says, declares that he was dismissed because he is not a Russian. Levin appealed against the dismissal, but the court decided that the Institute in which Levin was employed had the right to dismiss him. because his post was one which required a man thoroughly acquainted with the life and needs of the peasantry, and Levin was not a peasant but the son of a merchant in Simferonul

The court in its decision declared that it may be that Levin deserved to be dismissed for the reasons given in the evidence, but that the document of dismissal and the reason given there for his dismissal showed an attitude which was a disgrace to a Soviet institution and to citizens of the Soviet.
