## UNION OF AMERICAN HEBREW CONGREGATIONS WILL ALLOT \$130,000 FOR EXTENSION WORK

### Takes Stand Against Religious Instruction in Public Schools

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, O., May 7.—The adoption of a budget calling for the expenditure of more than \$130,000 for religious extension activities in the United States, and a statement opposing religious instruction in the public schools, featured the meeting of the Board of Managers of Synagogue and School Extension of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations held here. The budget was adopted, following a report presented by Rabbi George Zepin, in which were detailed the activities of the Department in the field of religious education, and its efforts to extend opportunities for the worship of Judaism throughout the United States, by the visits of field rabbis, through publications and correspondence.

Plans for 1927-1928 call for an increase of more than \$30,000 over the budgeted requirements of the Department for 1926-1927. Action on this budget will be taken by the Executive Board of the Union at its forthcoming annual meeting. The largest single activity included in the budget is \$34,120 for the maintenance of eight religious schools in New York in cooperation

## LITHUANIAN CONSUL IN NEW YORK MADE TO RESIGN BECAUSE HE IS A JEW

Kovno, May 7.—Professor Walde-maras, Prime Minister of Lithuania, attempted to clear the government of the charges that Henrikas Rabinowitz, Lithuanian Consul General in New York, had been recalled from his post because he is a Jew. The premier stated in an interview with the press that Mr. Rabinowitz resigned of his own accord.

The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns from reliable sources that the statement of the Premier is at variance with the facts.

Following the recent coup d'etat when the present government came into power, the Prime Minister stated that Rabinowitz would be recalled "because we don't want a Jew to be our Consul." Although it is true that Mr. Rabinowitz submitted his resignation, it was done at the request of the government.

## LIPSKY TAKES STRONG STAND IN LONDON AGAINST PALESTINE GOVERNMENT'S ADMINISTRATION POLICY

### Good Will of American Jews Gradually Being Destroyed By this Method, President of American Zionist Organization Tells "Near East" Editor; Makes Reply in Interesting Controversy in London

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 7.—A strong stand against the administrative policy of the Palestine Government was taken by Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, in a controversy which developed between him and the "Near East," a magazine published here, said to be in close touch with the British Colonial Office.

Upon his arrival in London Mr. Lipsky gave an interview to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in which he uttered criticism of the Palestine Government, declaring that the stand of the government reacts unfavorably on the attitude of American Jews and affects the United Palestine Appeal. The "Near East" then published an article in which it accused American Zionists of "evading responsibility" and shifting the blame for prevailing conditions to the mandatory power.

In a letter to the editor of the "Near East" published yesterday, Mr. Lipsky

replies to the magazine and reiterates his stand.

"My recent interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency on American Zionist opinion of the policy of the Mandatory Power has elicited in your columns some editorial comment which is not an entirely fair contribution to the discussion. You seem to ascribe the American view to a desire to evade responsibility or to shift a possible blame for conditions prevailing in Palestine to the Mandatory Power. That, I submit, is begging the question," Mr. Lipsky declares in his letter.

"During the past six years American Jews have contributed about 65 per cent of the total Jewish capital put into Palestine. Their interest is not on the wane, but grows from year to year. This year we shall exceed our last year's collections by over 30 per cent. Recently a large and influential group hitherto not cooperating in Zionist work has entered into an agreement with the Zionist Organization to share in the responsibility of the Jewish Agency. More and more American Jews come to Palestine to invest their individual capital.

"The growth of this support depends, naturally, upon the creation of favorable conditions in Palestine; and an important factor is Government. It is not sufficient to say, The way is open; let the Jews build the Jewish National Home in Palestine if they can. They must be convinced that their effort encounters the willing and active support of the Mandatory Power. Many American Jews now visit Palestine and

## ROMANIAN GOVERNMENT URGED TO PREVENT EXCESSES AS ANTI-SEMITIC CONVENT

Bucharest, May 7.—The demand that the Rumanian government take measures to prevent the recurrence of anti-Jewish excesses was expressed by the "Adeverul," Rumanian organ of the Jewish population.

The demand is presented in connection with the opening in Jassy tomorrow of the Congress of the anti-Semitic Christian League. The government is urged particularly to place guards on the trains and in the streets.

The "Dimineatza" questions the government as to why it permitted the distribution of anti-Semitic pamphlets to railway guards on May Day.

## ARAB AGITATORS SAY THEY WON'T ACCEPT CURRENCY WITH HEBREW INSCRIPTION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 7.—Arab anti-Zionist agitators will refuse to accept Palestine currency and banknotes bearing Hebrew inscriptions, according to a report published by the Arab newspaper, "Assiassa". The newspaper reports that an Arab delegation told the government that the Arabs do not wish to accept banknotes with Hebrew inscriptions.

The government representative is said to have replied that the ordinance promulgated by the government, providing that the new Palestinian currency be inscribed in Hebrew, Arabic and English, includes a penalty for refusal to accept it.

## SOCIAL DEMOCRATS FOSTER SCHECHITA PROHIBITION IN SWEDEN

Stockholm, May 7.—Prohibition against the Schechita was enacted by a bill passed in Parliament.

The bill was sponsored by the Social Democratic group. It was stated that the slaughter house workers affiliated with the party threatened to boycott those slaughter houses where the schechita was practiced.

**JEWS GAVE AMERICA COMMUNITY CHEST IDEA, IOWA GOVERNOR STATES Social Service Conference Opens in Des Moines**  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Des Moines, Ia., May 8.—Governor John J. Hammill of Iowa, in an address at the opening session of the National Conference of Jewish Social Service here today gave credit to the Jews of America for the development of the Community Chest idea in financing and administering philanthropic work.

Jewish Federations, according to Governor Hammill, have been organized in the largest centers of Jewish population for the coordinated control of social service agencies and their experience has met with such success that general communities have followed their example and have thereby avoided much overlapping of activity while at the same time saving measurably in overhead costs.

"The Jews of America have combined efficiency and sentiment to the advantage of both," declared Governor Hammill. "Numbering some 4,000,000 souls in this country the Jews spend \$40,000,000 annually for organized philanthropic work of various kinds. Of this sum the Jewish Federations spend upwards of \$20,000,000 annually, \$12,000,000 of this sum being raised through direct appeals from the general Jewish public. An additional \$15,000,000 is raised for foreign relief work, Palestinian work and other service by unaffiliated agencies. Jewish social service has taken the lead in the United States in immigration work. From the very earliest immigration rush in the '80s to the present time, the Educational Alliance of New York and the Jewish Settlement of Cincinnati have been doing this type of work along with scores of similar agencies. **Joint Catholic-Protestant-Jewish Prayer Criticized in England**

The joint prayer intended for all Americans, which was composed recently by a Catholic priest, a Protestant minister and a rabbi, has been the subject of severe criticism in England.

The "Universe and Catholic Weekly" of London has voiced a protest against the joint prayer, terming it a "wrong idea of unity," and stating the Archbishop of Baltimore has issued a warning against it.

Commenting on the protest of the Catholic organ, the "Jewish World" of London, in an editorial of April 28th, remarks:

"The paper tells us that the Archbishop of Baltimore has issued a strong warning against this sort of thing, and I am sorry that no similar allocation has been sent out by any rabbi. I have called attention, I don't know how many times to the evil that must result from this 'harmonizing' between Jews and non-Jews, and I agree with my contemporary that it is a seeking of the 'wrong ideas of Unity.' But then, what is to be done seeing that in America they call jazz, harmony?"

**Brisbane Suggests Y. M. A. A.**

A suggestion for the creation of a Young Men's American Association, to serve members of all faiths instead of segregating them into Y. M. C. A.'s and Y. M. H. A.'s, is made by Arthur Brisbane in his daily column in the "N. Y. American" of May 7. Commenting on the present drives in New York of the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. M. H. A., Mr. Brisbane observes:

"How would it be to start a Young Men's American Association, which all could join, Jews, Protestants, Catholics, Mohammedans and Zoroastrians?"

"It seems too bad that in this country young men should be segregated in groups according to religion or race. What we need is a complete mixture."

**Criticizes Idea of Combined Yeshiva and College**

The idea of a Yeshiva College is criticized in the "Day" of May 7 by Dr. A. Coralnik, who, commenting on the Yeshiva College cornerstone laying a week ago, contends that college and yeshiva are incompatible.

"What is the connection between Torah and general science?" Dr. Coralnik asks. "Did Maimonides study medicine in a Yeshiva? Always in the past the Torah was studied in the Beth Hamedrash while science was studied where everybody studies it. And that is why both were attained. That is the law: you cannot mix fire with water, or water with oil. Either one of them must surrender or they separate again."

## LOUIS LIPSKY CRITICIZES PALESTINE GOVERNMENT'S ADMINISTRATION POLICY

see things for themselves. If the impression is made that the government is reluctant to aid in ways clearly prescribed by the terms of the Mandate, or meets suggestions for active cooperation with delays, the task of the Zionist Organization becomes almost impossible. In addition to its regular propaganda work, it is called upon to dissolve the growing distrust of the whole situation in Palestine, which begins to influence many Jews.

"It is needless to say that American Zionists have faith in the British Government. That was indicated when an overwhelming majority of American Jews assembled in 1918 at the American Jewish Congress expressed their hope that the Mandate would be offered to, and accepted by Great Britain. That faith was again revealed when both Houses of the American Congress unanimously adopted a joint resolution, which was signed by President Harding, favoring the Balfour Declaration. The confidence of American Zionists in the British Government's intentions has been expressed again and again in resolutions adopted by the American Zionist Organization. But all that good will is gradually being destroyed by methods of administration that seem to take undue advantage of the Jewish desire to make sacrifices for Palestine by resisting reasonable requests for effective cooperation, and leaving Jewish endeavor without the support of adequate Government action," Mr. Lipsky writes.

"We are aiming to establish the Jewish National Home upon a basis of self-supporting Jewish agriculture. The land, we know, has to be purchased, but as Jewish immigration increases, the price of land goes up. I disregard the argument that in the circumstances—the reclamation and settlement of waste land—facilities should have been provided at least for the purchase of land under reasonable conditions, or that the Government should have enacted effective laws to protect us against speculative increases in land prices. But in view of the fact that every inch of land intended for Jewish agricultural settlement has to be purchased, every tenant equitably compensated, and every dunam of land irrigated and improved, American Jewish public opinion asks: Is it fair for the Government notwithstanding all these handicaps, in addition to impose a tax upon such agricultural land which comes into effect the day the settler takes possession of it?"

"The Zionist Organization expends on education in Palestine £83,500 a year. Instruction is given to 18,590 children. The Budget of the Government provides £121,387 for education. Although the Jews number over 17 per cent of the population of Palestine, only after many memoranda had been submitted was an appropriation of £10,664 given this year to Jewish education—about 8 per cent of the total.

"During the last few years customs duties amounting to many millions of dollars have been collected on the importation of building materials, food-

## ZIONISTS TO FETE LIPSKY ON ARRIVAL FROM LONDON

### Testimonial to Twenty Years of Zionist Service

Louis Lipsky, President of the Zionist Organization of America, will be honored on his arrival from London at a testimonial dinner at the Hotel Astor on May 22nd, on the occasion of his fiftieth anniversary and to mark the completion of a quarter of a century of his Zionist service.

Announcement of the dinner was made by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, chairman of the Louis Lipsky Jubilee Committee. Dr. Wise will act as toastmaster at the dinner.

The dinner is planned as the first of a series of testimonials throughout the country in honor of Mr. Lipsky, the celebrations being sponsored by the committee headed by Dr. Wise, with Emanuel Neumann, chairman of the executive committee of the United Palestine Appeal, as honorary secretary and Isidore D. Morrison as treasurer.

In tribute of Mr. Lipsky's twenty-five years of service to Zionism, the Louis Lipsky Jubilee Committee announced the publication of his selected works in three volumes, containing essays on Zionism, plays and stories of Jewish life. The first volume is to contain a preface by Dr. Wise and an introduction by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization.

stuffs, clothing and other European necessities of life, in addition to the various other direct and indirect taxes collected on account of a multitude of Jewish agricultural, building, manufacturing and commercial enterprises. During the past few years the Jews have made numerous attempts to introduce various industries into Palestine. The experiments were costly. When it was found that the tax on raw materials made it difficult for promising industries to live, representations were made to the Government, and only after numerous protests had been lodged and the difficulties became quite apparent, did the Government agree, in detail, to remove the tax on such raw materials as those industries required.

"I give these few instances of the many that have combined to produce an unfavorable impression in American Jewish circles with regard to the Government's policy in Palestine. We seriously regret that this impression should have been created, but it does not help to retort that the feeling is animated by unfriendliness, or that it is not based on facts.

"We American Zionists are staunch supporters of the policy of the Zionist Executive, which is directed by its President, Dr. Weizmann, and of its endeavors through the regular official channels to ameliorate conditions without friction or controversy, but the statement is clearly in order that the task of holding our constituents in support of the Jewish National Home is made unnecessarily hard by the administrative conditions that still prevail in Palestine," Mr. Lipsky declares.

## UNITED SYNAGOGUE OPENS ITS FIFTEENTH CONVENTION IN ATLANTIC CITY

Atlantic City, N. J., May 8.—The fifteenth annual convention of the United Synagogue of America opened at the Breakers Hotel here to day in the presence of several hundred delegates. The sessions will last three days. It is expected that a number of changes will be introduced in the organization of the United Synagogue by the action of the convention.

Simultaneously with the convention of the United Synagogue of America the annual convention of the Women's League, which is the women's division of the United Synagogue of America, is being held.

Rabbi Herman Abramowitz, of Montreal, president of the United Synagogue of America, delivered his annual message at the opening session.

This evening will be given over to a consideration of the place of the mother in American Jewish life.

Palestine, Jewish education, the relationship of the community to the college student, religious observance, cooperation with non-Jewish organizations and with institutions of higher Jewish learning are the topics that will be discussed at the sessions on Monday and Tuesday.

## JEWISH RADIO HOUR TONIGHT

The Monday evening Jewish Hour over station WMCA, sponsored by "The Day", will commemorate Hebrew Week tonight with a program of Hebrew songs and instrumental numbers.

The program includes Cantor Jason, the Mandolin Orchestra of the Workers' Alliance, Florence Stern, violinist, accompanied by Abraham Ellstein. Bertha Letchuk will give a dramatic reading and the hour will be concluded with an address by H. Greenberg. Z. H. Rubinstein of "The Day", will preside before the microphone.

A Palestinian program will be broadcast from Station WEAF at 4:30 tomorrow afternoon, May 10, under the auspices of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America. Mrs. David de Sola Pool, chairman of the speakers' bureau of Hadassah, will talk on "The Women Builders of Palestine", and Moshe Nathanson will give a group of Palestinian songs, accompanied by Miss Judith Kaplan.

The first seminary for cantors in America will be established in the fall by the Modern Cantors' Association, an organization of fifty-five cantors. According to Isidore Weinstock, secretary, increase in the synagogues all over the country has necessitated the training of young men for the cantorship.

The seminary will instruct in both the Reform and Orthodox rituals. It will seek to standardize them.

A school was begun by the cantors in 1925, but had to suspend a year ago because of lack of funds.

James W. Wise, son of Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, will make a survey for the "Century Magazine" in Germany, France and England of the trends and tendencies manifested among the youth of those countries, as the basis for a series of articles. Mr. Wise will sail Saturday and will be engaged in this work for three months.

## Y'S ARE URGED TO GIVE AID TO MISSISSIPPI FLOOD SUFFERERS

Young Men's Hebrew Associations, Young Women's Hebrew Associations and Jewish Community Centers, numbering three hundred, which are affiliated with the Jewish Welfare Board, have been urged by the Board to respond to the appeal of President Coolidge to contribute to the fund for the relief of sufferers from the floods in the Mississippi Valley, devoting the proceeds of entertainments and activities as well as individual contributions to this purpose.

A series of 25 questions and answers on Lag Ba'Omer, which falls this year on May 20th, has been compiled by the Jewish Welfare Board.

These questions and answers form part of a Lag Ba'Omer bulletin. The bulletin consists of an outline of the main facts concerning the historical significance and observance of Lag Ba'Omer, and a digest of the stories of Bar Kochba and Rabbi Akiba.

The orthodox of a generation ago might even have admitted, let us say, that science is necessary, though he did not believe in it. But for him science was merely a profession or a trade. A doctor, a chemist, an engineer, he argued, is a matter of trade, not of wisdom. You learn the rules of these sciences, just as you learn tailoring or shoemaking. And where does a tailor learn to sew? From another tailor, not from a rabbi. It has nothing to do with Torah. On the contrary, one hinders the other; Torah demands of one that he submit himself completely—and to divide means to weaken."

Dr. Coralkin also charges that the orthodox Jews who are in back of the Yeshiva movement are aiming ultimately to spread their influence to Palestine and to turn Zionism into an orthodox movement. He quotes in this connection a publication of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Yeshiva where the hope is expressed "to take over the rule of the non-orthodox Zionists—to conquer them and to redeem the land according to the Torah and the traditions."

with the New York Committee on Synagogue and School Extension. Other appropriations recommended are \$5,000 to be expended in the next two years for a survey of the religious needs and opportunities of Jewish students at universities, and \$13,400 to pay salaries and expenses of regional rabbis for field work in small communities. The budget also calls for \$4,000 to carry out a program of youth work—preparing literature and stimulating by youth organizations the interest of Jewish boys and girls in the faith. Increased appropriations are also requested for the publication of tracts, sermons, and the magazine, "Young Israel."

Those present at the meeting of the Board of Managers were: Julius W. Freiberg, Cincinnati, presiding; Rabbi Morris M. Feuerlicht, Indianapolis; Dr. Solomon B. Freehof, Chicago; Dr. Ephraim Frisch, San Antonio; Morton J. Heldman, Cincinnati; Simeon M. Johnson, Cincinnati; Rabbi Joseph S. Kornfeld, Toledo; Herbert C. Oettinger, Cincinnati; Dr. Joseph Rauch, Louisville; Rabbi Sidney S. Tedesche, New Haven, and Rabbi George Zepin, Cincinnati.

The Board of Managers, taking into consideration a statement prepared by the joint committee representing the Commission on Jewish Education and the Board, approved the following declaration on religious instruction in the public schools:

"We are opposed to any form of religious instruction as part of the public school system or during the public school hours. It is our conviction that the latter recommendations of various religious bodies, no matter what form suggested, are hostile to the principles of democracy by virtue of which each group is entitled to the right of religious liberty, and the integrity of its religious interpretations."

"As these recommendations really mean an abandonment of the American principle of separation of Church and State we advocate as far preferable that the public schools reduce their time schedule by closing the entire public school system one hour or more at the end of the school day. The time thus put at the disposal of the children may be used by the parents for such instruction for their children as they see fit."

It also determined to join with Catholic and Protestant educational agencies in organizing the American Association on Religion in universities and colleges, and to include in its budget for the coming year an item of \$1,000 to be used in establishing agencies under denominational control to teach religion at colleges to such students who desire to register for these courses.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver was reappointed member of the Commission on Jewish Education at the expiration of his term, and Herman Wile was appointed to fill a vacancy in the Pension Plan Committee.

## BROOKLYN JEWS HONOR DR. S. PARKES CADMAN

A life-size bronze bust of Dr. S. Parkes Cadman was presented to him by Dr. Alexander Lyons, Rabbi of Congregation Beth Elohim, Brooklyn, during the Sabbath evening service. The presentation was made on behalf of the Jewish citizens of Brooklyn, through the Citizens' Committee under the Chairmanship of Meier Steinbrink.

The presentation was made before an audience of 2,000.

Dr. Cadman accepted the bust on behalf of "Christians and as an expression of the fraternity of man and the common Fatherhood of God." He asked the Jews present to forgive the Christians for the outrages the Jews have suffered at their hands.

The bust was modeled by Louis Keila, Jewish sculptor, and purchased by thirty-seven Jewish leaders of Brooklyn.
