SOVIETS FORM MINIATURE POLISH REPUBLIC IN UKRAINE SIMILAR TO JEWISH REGION New Settlers Freed from Land Tax For Three Years

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 16.—A miniature Polish Republic, similar in structure to the "first Jewish region" in the district of Charkoff, was created in southern Ukraine by the Soviet Government. The new republic consists of fifty vil-

At the first conference of the village representatives, 78 delegates participated, including representative of the German, Jewish and Ukrainian minorities of the "republic."

Riga, May 16.—An all Ukrainian conference of representatives of the Society for the Settlement of Jews on the land will be held in Kiev on May 21.

According to a government circular just issued, all Jewish settlers on the land will be freed from land tax during the first three years of their occupancy. Until now the government freed only those farmers who introduced modern methods in working the land.

POLISH JEWS OBSERVE MAY REVOLUTION ANNIVERSARY (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 16.—Anti-Jewish attacks took place in Falonica, a resort near Warsaw. A group of forty hooligans started the attack. The police intervened and

restored order. The first anniversary of the May revolution was observed in the synagogues. where memorial services were held for the Jewish soldiers who fell during Pilsudski's march on Warsaw last year.

UNEMPLOYMENT AFFECTS JEWS IN UKRAINE CITIES (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BRITISH JEWS WILL JOIN JEWISH AGENCY SOON. GOLDSMID ANNOUNCES Weizmann-Marshall Accord Brings Project Nearer Realization (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 16.—The participation of British Jewry in the Jewish Agency, along lines similar to those of the Marshall-Weizmann pact, will soon be nearer realization, according to an announcement made Sunday by D'Avigdor Goldsmid, president of the Board of Jewish Deputies, at the monthly meeting of the Board yesterday. Mr. Goldsmid reminded the deputies

that in April 1923, the Board decided to form a joint committee with the Zionist Organization to consider the participation of British Jews in the lewish Agency. This committee met in 1924 but the question was left in abeyance until the participation of American Iewry would have been settled. This has now come about and further progress in England is expected shortly, he stated.

227 YIDDISH BOOKS WERE PUBLISHED IN RUSSIA LAST YEAR, FIGURES SHOW

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, May 16.—The extent of the circulation of Yiddish publications in the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics, fostered by the Jewish section of the Communist Party, is evident from figures made known here.

According to these figures 227 books in the Yiddish language were published in the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics during the year 1926. Of these 42 were textbooks, 23 popular books on scientific subjects, 45 dealt with political questions, 18 were children's books, 24 belles lettres, 55 periodicals and 11 devoted to agricultural cooperative questions. In all 830,660 copies were printed.

ROUMANIAN COVERNMENT REFUSES TO RESTRAIN OUT-RAGES. LONDON BOARD TOLD League to Take Up Matter Soon. Lucien Wolf Reports (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 16.-No progress in the negotiations with the Roumanian goverument concerning the Jewish situation there was reported by Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee, to the Board of Jewish Deputies at its monthly meeting vesterday. The Secretary reported that the in-

vestigation Committee of the League of Nations will shortly consider the petition of the Joint Foreign Committee. submitted three months ago. If necessary, the Joint Foreign Committee will submit supplementary reports covering the latest period.

In describing the present situation in Roumania, Mr. Wolf stated that the Roumanian government still declines to restrain the vicious anti-Semitic propaganda. The numerus clausus is being made permanent in the country. The last lewist student was forced to leave the University of Transylvania. The new baccalaureate regulations for graduation from high school make it certain that no few will obtain his diploma permitting him to enter college.

VIENNA JOURNALIST GETS SENTENCE FOR JEW-BAITING (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Vienna, May 3.-A sentence of two weeks' imprisonment was passed on Lebel Kadar, anti-Semitic journalist. Kadar was brought up before the

Criminal Court at Szegedin on a charge of incitement against the lewish religious community in Hungary. Speaking at a public meeting he had said that the Jews had come to Hungary only in order to exploit the people of the country.

PHILADELPHIA RAISES \$150,000 AT INAUGURATION

OF U. P. A. \$400,000 DRIVE

Mack Deplores Indifference of Phila-delphia Non-Zionists (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Phila., Pa., May 16.—The Philadel-phia Jewish community inaugurated its drive for \$400,000 for the United Pal-

estine Appeal by contributing the sum of \$150,000 in less than one hour. The occasion was the banquet at the Hotel Benjamin Franklin Sunday night.

Fifteen hundred men and women were One hundred teams under the leader-

ship of Sol C. Kraus and Mrs. Max L. Margolis will carry on the campaign which will last ten days.

Judge Julian W. Mack, the guest of honor; and Judge William M. Lewis, National Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, were the speakers. Sol Kraus, Chairman of the drive, presided.

The backward position of the non-Zionists at this stage of the Palestine undertaking was deplored by Judge Mack in his address. "I regret that there are not among those present many of my old Philadelphia friends,

many of whom are non-Zionists.

The largest contribution was \$12,000 made by the Brith Achim Lodge. Five thousand dollars was contributed by Albert M. Greenfield. The rest of the \$150,000 was raised in sums of \$3,000 and less.

Press Comments on Proposal to Transfer Palestine Mandate to Italy The recent suggestion raised in Lord

Rothermere's organ, the London "Daily Mail," that Great Britain's mandate over Palestine be transferred to Italy is the subject of comment in a number of Anglo-Jewish weeklies. The papers all voice the conviction that such a change is not only impossible, since England would never consent to it, but that it is undesirable since it would spell disaster to the Jewish National Homeland work.

The "Canadian Jewish Chronicle" of Montreal (May 13 issue) observes:

"Though the Italian journals declare that if Italy were to assume a mandate over Palestine it would give the besi guarantees for the Jewish national home, the essentially different objectives which would direct its colonial policy would be disastrous to our national ends. Britain's interests in both Palestine and Mesopotamia are commercial. She trades with them; she obtains certain commodities from Mesonotamia. They also serve to maintain her chain of communication for the trade routes to the rest of her empire. Britain has no interest in Palestine which clashes with the intense colonization of the land by Jews. "But Italian policy seeks an outlet for its peasant population, and its desire

Palestine is too small and too poor to offer a haven for Italian immigration without jeapardizing Jewish settlement." The "Jewish Exponent" of Philadelphia sees danger to the Jewish cause

Athens, April 26.—Interpellations urging the necessity of solving the various Jewish questions in the country were introduced in the Chamber by Deputy Ventura, one of the Jewish representatives.

Deputy Ventura especially urged measures to grant facilities to Jews under the Compulsory Sunday Observance Law and subsidies for the Iewish charity institutions and the Jewish schools. The Minister of Education replied

that the Ministry had decided to allocate a sum of 300,000 Drachmas in the Budget for the Jewish schools.

Deputy Ventura also interpellated the Minister of the Interior with re-

gard to the recent distribution of anti-Semitic pamphlets in the streets of Athens. He said that he knew of several lawyers and doctors who were re-sponsible for their distribution, and he wanted to know whether the Government intended to take any action to put a stop to this distribution of literature which incited the population against their Jewish fellow-citizens. The Minister of the Interior replied

that the Government was taking steps to put a stop to the circulation of these anti-Semitic pamphlets. Two persons had been arrested and would be prosecuted for printing and distributing anti-Semitic literature. The trial would be opened during the

first week in May.
