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INTERNATIONAL UNION POST- PONES ACTION ON ROUMANIA JEWISH QUESTION UNTIL OCT.

Discusses Subject Heatedly All Day;
Jewish Delegates Refute Arguments
of Roumanian Representative
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 28.—Action by the International Union of League of Nations Societies on the Roumanian Jewish situation was postponed until next October, following a heated debate which took place in the committee on minorities.

The committee, which was in session all day Friday, continued the discussion on the Roumanian Jewish situation.

Emil Margulies, representative of the League of Nations Society in Czechoslovakia, and Mr. Wischniak, representing the Russian Democrats, took exception to the defense offered by Professor Pangrati, dean of the University of Bucharest, in his reply to the charges of Mr. Dizengoff, former Mayor of Tel Aviv.

The Roumanian Jews are loyal citizens of their country and do not deserve to be placed under legal disabilities and certainly not to be delivered to the wrath of the mob, the speakers contended. They introduced a motion asking that the International Union send an investigation Commission to Roumania. Finally, the commission (Continued on Page 4)

LADY BEARSTED'S WILL WARNS HER CHILDREN AGAINST INTERMARRIAGE

London, May 28.—"I express my heartfelt desire that all my children shall marry in the Jewish faith and bring up their children to do so and support communal institutions." With these words the late Viscountess Bearsted, wife of the late Lord Bearsted, concluded her will which was made public.

Lady Bearsted, left among other bequests, £5,000 to the Building Fund of the Jewish Maternity Home in White-chapel.

Lord Bearsted, who, as Sir Marcus Samuel, was Lord Mayor of London, founded the Shell Transport Trading Company, and left an estate valued at £4,000,000.

JEWES ARE AFFECTED BY POLISH TEXTILE STRIKE

Warsaw, May 28.—Several thousand Jewish workmen in the Polish textile industry were affected by the general strike proclaimed in Bialystok, one of the Polish textile centers.

The strike was called following the refusal of the workmen to accept an increase of eight per cent in their wages.

"DAILY EXPRESS" RENEWS ITS CAMPAIGN TO ABAN- DON PALESTINE MANDATE

"Trade of Palestine Brought England
No Rich Reward," Is Paper's
Argument
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, May 28.—The campaign urging that Great Britain abandon its mandates over Palestine and Mesopotamia, conducted several years ago, was renewed yesterday by the London "Daily Express."

The newspaper resumed its campaign against what it terms "waste of British millions in the Near East." The "Express" complains that Great Britain is still spending British taxpayers' money on Palestine "because Balfour tried to develop his quaint idea of a Jewish national home."

"The trade of Palestine has not brought England a rich reward. The government must end the unhappy affair of Palestine and Mesopotamia," the paper urges.

UKRAINE JEWISH REGION HAS FEW SCHOOLS Only 53 Per Cent of Farmers' Children Get Training

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, May 28.—The first conference of Jewish teachers in the newly-extended Jewish region in the Ukraine was held at Seide Menucha, the administrative centre of the region.

Reports submitted to the Conference showed that the school system in the region is very much under-developed. In the whole region there is only one school with a seven-year course. This school is in Seide Menucha. There are three four-year course schools, one each in Bobrovo, Kut and Lvovo, and six one-year course schools in the new settlements in the region. In all, 53% of the children of school age in the region are provided for in the school system. It is expected that (Continued on Page 4)

GERMAN JEWS ESTABLISH A SCHECHITA SCHOOL

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 28.—A school for schochitum, Jewish ritual slaughterers, was opened here under the auspices of the Federation of Jewish Communities in Prussia. The school is administered by a council consisting of three members of the Federation of Jewish Communities in Prussia and four rabbis, two in Berlin, one in Breslau and one in Frankfurt.

Until now German Jewry depended almost entirely upon ritual slaughterers coming from other countries. Candidates for admission will be required to have a knowledge of Talmudic literature, must be strictly Orthodox and will have to pass an examination in general knowledge.

GRAZ POLICE AVERTS ANTI-SEMITIC RIOTS AT SHAKESPEAREAN PLAY

Numerous Clausus Against Jewish
Theatregoers Causes Failure of
Theatre in Hungarian Town
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, May 28.—What might have amounted to serious anti-Jewish excesses was prevented by the intervention of the police at Graz.

The disturbances started during a Shakespearean performance in the municipal theatre. A crowd of anti-Semitic students interrupted the performance with outcries against the Jewish director, Marholm. The students attempted to arrange a street demonstration following the performance. The police dispersed the demonstrators.

Budapest, May 28.—A story of how the demand of anti-Semites to introduce a numerous clausus against Jewish theatregoers had disastrous results for the theatre, is circulated throughout the Hungarian press.

When the anti-Semitic Hungarian Race Purifiers of Keeskemet formulated a demand that the Jewish population of that town be permitted to purchase tickets to the extent of only five per cent of the seating capacity of the theatre, the Jewish population (Continued on Page 4)

MIZRACHI ORGANIZATION MAKES SURVEY OF RELIGIOUS CONDITIONS IN PALESTINE

Jerusalem, May 28.—(Conditions in Palestine from the Jewish religious point of view are being surveyed by a commission of the Mizrahi Zionist Organization.

The survey will also include the colonies in Judea. It was stated that a memorandum on the subject will be submitted by the commission to the forthcoming Fifteenth Zionist Congress.

Lilienthal — Lindbergh's Forerunner

The achievement of Lindbergh which now holds the attention of the whole world reminds the Cleveland "Jewish Independent" of the exploits of Otto Lilienthal, the German Jew, who was one of the very first pioneers in the conquest of the air and who lost his life after he had demonstrated the possibilities of aerial navigation. Says the paper:

"On August 9, 1896, there died at Rhinow, in Germany, a man who had given twenty-five years of his life to experimentation in aerial flights. Like Lindbergh, Otto Lilienthal was endowed with a bird-sense and in his attempts to pattern his air ship principles upon the flight of the bird, he finally gave the first real demonstration of the possibility of man's conquest of the air.

"In 1891, with a pair of curved wings, he made several successful flights, but five years later, during another test, came the fatal crash."

Sees Vast Possibilities in Felix Warburg's Ten-Year Plan

Felix Warburg's reported ten-year plan for Palestine reconstruction and Russian colonization would bring about, avers the "Day," not only vastly greater impetus and efficiency in the work of Jewish rehabilitation but also real unification and unity in American Jewry. Discussing the proposal of Mr. Warburg in its May 28 issue, the paper has this to say:

"If Felix Warburg would really undertake to carry out this plan it would mean a colossal step forward in the direction of true unity in American Jewry and would constitute a tremendous gain for the Jewish work in Palestine as well as in Russia.

"American Jewry can be brought together in real unity only on the basis of mutuality of Jewish work. When one part of American Jewry stands for Russia and another part for Palestine the distance dividing them must grow wider and wider, and should it happen that one party crosses the path of the other naturally a conflict rather than a friendly meeting is unavoidable. The best way to avoid quarrels and establish understanding is not to wait for the millennial era when all grievances will be forgotten, but to start without

delay to work together for a mutual cause and in this work to find the long-hoped-for understanding. Such a mutual effort can be based on the active interest of American Jewry in the two Jewish undertakings, in Palestine and in Russia.

"As regards the enterprise proper, nothing can be more significant for it than the guarantee that for the next ten years the work will proceed regularly, unhindered and undisturbed by financial difficulties. The coming ten years will be the deciding period both for the Palestine reconstruction and the Russian colonization.

"It needs but to be remembered for the sake of the work as well as American Jewry's unity, that partnership is partnership and that mutual work means equal rights and privileges as well. In such a partnership as Mr. Warburg proposes there must be no favoritism in any particular direction," the paper declares.

Favors Latin Characters for Hebrew

The recent publication in Palestine of a Hebrew book in Latin characters by Itamar Ben-Avi, son of the late Eliezer Ben Yehudah, who has set himself the aim of reducing Hebrew to the script prevailing in all countries of Western civilization, is the subject of extended comment by Dr. H. Danby, noted Bible scholar and translator of Dr. Klausner's "Jesus of Nazareth," in "The Near East" magazine of London. Writing in the May 5th issue of that paper, Dr. Danby expresses approval of Ben-Avi's idea but finds fault with his method of transliteration and doubts whether the new experiment will so quickly find imitators in Palestine.

"It is perfectly true," Dr. Danby says, "that there is an increasing number of people who speak Hebrew but who stop short of the ability to read it. Arabs pick up the language with the greatest ease; and owing to the wholesale use of the 'direct method' in teaching Hebrew adopted in the local classes for adult learners, there is an appreciable number of Jews and Gentiles whose energy takes them just far enough to make them able to converse freely, but fails to carry them through the initial difficulties of reading. Mr. Ben-Avi thinks both to benefit them and, at the same time, remove an aged incubus and a useless national burden. The present book is only a first instalment. But one is doubtful how far others will take his efforts seriously, or even how far he is justified merely from the opportunist standpoint—whether his possible public is not really too small to justify so radical a venture. It remains to be seen how large this public really is, and how far the experiment will be imitated by others—for such imitation alone will justify the experiment.

"The result of the transcription hardly looks appetizing; it makes Hebrew look very much like Magyar. But possibly a similar remark was

N. Y. FEDERATION FIGURES SHOW LAWYERS TO BE MOST PHILANTHROPIC GROUP

Lawyers head the list in the number of subscriptions to the New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, according to a report submitted yesterday preliminary to the publication next month of the Blue Book, containing a charity roster of 30,000 donors to the New York Jewish community chest.

The report is based on the response to the 1926 appeal for funds by the Federation and shows that 1,202 lawyers are among the 30,000 subscribers. Real estate men are second with 800 subscribers and the bankers and brokers stand third, with 870. Next in order among the leading trades and professions are the cotton goods trade, 741; physicians, 668; men's and boys' clothing, 661; educational and social workers, 659; dress industry, 563; jewelry, 552; silk trade, 484; cloaks, suits and skirt trade, 469; retired, 442 and insurance 404.

Standing far ahead of any of the trade or professional groups is the women's division, which numbers 6, members. The junior division has 1,194 members.

Ninety-eight Jewish students at the University of Illinois, Urbana, are among the 891 students who have been named for honors. Twenty-two Jewish students also have been elected to membership in six honorary scholastic societies.

The new building of the laboratories of the Daniel Guggenheim School of Aeronautics of New York University, University Heights, will be open for inspection next Saturday.

made when somebody, somewhere about Moses' time, first wrote Hebrew in Phoenician instead of cuneiform characters, or when Ezra or the Macabees or Barkoklaba played tricks with the script—as, apparently, they did.

"It is easy to pick holes in the transliteration adopted by Mr. Ben Avi. He wholly ignores, even if he is not ignorant of, the standard and more or less uniform methods of transliteration from oriental languages adopted by European scholars. His only standard is the possibilities of the various founts of European type at his disposal. He uses a fount no more elaborate than is necessary for printing French. The various accents serve to differentiate the numerous peculiarities of the Hebrew vowels; and the peculiar Semitic consonants, which are usually represented by a dot under the approximate Indo-Germanic consonant—these are represented in Mr. Ben Avi's transliteration by the simple device of turning the consonant upside down. Furthermore Mr. Ben Avi is no grammarian. He makes no attempt consistently to allow the transliteration to reflect the niceties of the Hebrew grammatical forms; they are sacrificed to short cuts at reproducing ordinary Palestinian Jewish pronunciation—a pronunciation not always very pretty, and very often grammatically inaccurate."

JEWISH THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY GETS \$1,467,113

The Jewish Theological Seminary of America receives \$1,467,113 under the will of Louis S. Brush. This amount, Maurice A. Stephenson, Deputy Commissioner of Taxation and Finance, reported in the transfer tax appraisal of Mr. Brush's estate, represented the value of the residuary estate. Mr. Brush, who died on November 7, 1926, at the Park Lane Hotel, left a gross estate of \$1,739,129 and a net estate of \$1,634,233.

Mr. Brush provided in his will that part of the residuary fund shall be used by the Jewish Theological Seminary for the "education, support and maintenance of as many worthy and capable young men as shall desire to avail themselves, so that students shall be thoroughly grounded with Jewish knowledge and inspired through such knowledge with the love of the Hebrew language and a spirit of fidelity and devotion to the Jewish laws." Mr. Brush also stipulated that "the worthy and capable young men to whom I refer are only such as would be unable to furnish, or have furnished them sufficient means for the purpose of obtaining such education and receiving maintenance and support while being so educated in such seminary." Another part of the fund is to be used for the construction of a fireproof dormitory.

Mr. Brush left bequests of \$500 to two Jewish congregations.

JEWISH SCHOLARS ACADEMY HOLDS ITS FIRST SESSION

The first annual session of the Jewish Academy of Arts and Sciences was held at the Hotel Manhattan Square, New York City, beginning Saturday evening, May 28.

Papers were read and discussed on the following subjects: The Mishnah-Middoth, or The First Hebrew Gematry, written about 150 C. E. by Dr. Solomon Gandz; Method of Developing the Neo-Hebraic, by Dr. Bernard Drachman; Rabbinical Halakah, by Dr. Bernard Revel; Cancer Among the Various Races of Mankind, by Prof. Isaac Levin.

The Historical Basis of the Book of Judith was presented by Dr. Pinus Churgin, Joseph Albo—Author of the Ickaria, by Prof. Isaac Husik. Study of Diabetes Among Jews, by Dr. Benjamin Jablons. The Exegesis of Luzzatto, by Dr. Klotz; Responsa of Rabbi David Ibn Zirma, by Rabbi I. Goodman, and Etymological Conceptions of Sickness in Hebrew and other languages by Prof. David I. Macht.

Prof. Nathan Isaacs, Prof. Moses Hyamson and Dr. Wolff Freudenthal were chairmen at the various sessions.

COURT SANCTIONS CONSOLIDATION OF EMANUEL-EL AND BETH-EL CONGREGATIONS

An order approving the consolidation of the congregations of Temple Emanuel-El and Temple Beth-El, of New York, was signed by Justice Gavegan of the Supreme Court on Friday.

The new temple will be at Fifth Avenue and Sixty-fifth Street. Louis Marshall is president of the congregation.

The order names the following trustees for the consolidated Emanuel-El Corporation: Louis Marshall and Benjamin Altheimer, who were presidents, respectively, of Emanuel-El and Beth-El; Henry J. Bernheimer, Davis Brown, Otto C. Dryfoos, Philip J. Goodhart, Daniel Guggenheim, Sydney H. Herman, Irving Lehman, Benjamin Mordecai, Samuel M. Newburger, Adolph S. Ochs, Edward Smaefel, William I. Spiegelberg, Roger W. Straus, Henry M. Tsch, Ludwig Vogelstein and Arthur Zinn.

The petition says the liabilities of the Beth-El congregation consist of mortgages for \$47,500 on its property at Fifth Avenue and Seventy-sixth Street and a liability to the Mount Hope Cemetery Association of \$17,777, which is to be paid at the rate of \$4,444 a year beginning next March. The liabilities of Emanuel-El consist only of a \$60,000 mortgage on property at 9 East Sixty-sixth Street.

The petitioning officers said that in order to perpetuate the traditions of Beth-El, the chapel connected with the new edifice being built by the Emanuel-El congregation was to bear the name Beth-El Chapel. They agreed to give "due consideration and make appropriate provision for the rabbis of the constituent congregations and adjust in an equitable manner any moral obligations incurred by them to their rabbis."

The petition also says that "although it is expected that as a result of the consolidation, there will be most perfect unity and harmony between all persons affiliated with the congregation," any society or organization conducted in connection with the respective corporations is to continue, "and their autonomy shall be recognized by the consolidated association."

The application says that "the constituent corporations believe that their consolidation into one corporation will be conducive to the best interests of their respective members, increase the usefulness that both institutions have exerted in the past, and strengthen and further the dissemination and teachings of the principles of Judaism."

ZIVION ELECTED PRESIDENT OF JEWISH WRITERS CLUB

Dr. B. Hoffman, member of the editorial staff of the "Forward," known under the nom de plume, Zivion, was elected president of the J. L. Peretz Jewish Writers' Club at the annual meeting of the organization held last week. R. Friedman was chosen vice-president.

Other members of the new executive are B. Z. Goldberg, J. Opotashu, Z. H. Minikes, M. Oshervitch and Mr. T. Hush, secretary.

NO NUMERUS CLAUSUS AT VIENNA UNIVERSITY

Vienna, May 16.—In view of reports which have been circulated that a secret numerus clausus is being introduced into Vienna University, the head of the Medical College has issued a statement declaring that it has been decided to exclude foreign students whose matriculation certificates are not good and those in whose native countries it will not be possible for them to practice with their Vienna Doctorate.

This step is being taken because the Professors of Anatomy have complained that there are too many students at the University and that it is therefore impossible to give the necessary attention to each of the students.

There is, however, the statement declares, no question of rejecting foreign students on any religious, national or political grounds.

NEW WHOLESALE ARRESTS OF RADICALS IN KOVNO

Kovno, May 28.—Many Jewish workers and students in the capital of Lithuania were arrested last week on the charge of Communist activity.

The drastic measures against the radical wings of the labor movement were initiated in Lithuania with the advent of the present government, which came into power with the coup d'état of the Waldemaras cabinet. This government has also introduced the court martial system which has caused wide protest in Eastern and Central Europe.

within the course of the next year the number will be increased to 73%.

There is an acute lack of school buildings in the region. It was stated that it is essential to build during the present year at least six new schools, for which, however, the budget of the region is unable to provide funds. The colonists will, therefore, be required to contribute towards the cost of the new school buildings.

The lack of schools in the new settlements is impeding the development of the Jewish colonization work, because many of the transigrants refuse to bring their families with them, on the ground that there are no facilities for the education of their children.

The region also lacks other cultural institutions. In the whole region there are only two village clubs, fifteen reading-rooms and two libraries.

Jassy, May 28.—A protest against introducing anti-Semitic propaganda into the Christian churches was voiced at a conference of the clergy of Mudavia in session here.
