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ANTI-SEMITIC PRESS IN POLAND OBJECTS TO LEVINE INVITATION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, June 13.—Dissatisfaction with the move of the Polish government in inviting Charles A. Levine and Clarence D. Chamberlin to fly to Warsaw is expressed by the Polish anti-Semitic newspapers. The newspapers argue that Levine is "an unnecessary ballast and the sound of his name is not agreeable to the Polish population."

The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that the government will pay no attention to the anti-Semitic press and that Levine and Chamberlin will arrive in Warsaw on June 18.

WILL DEBATE ADMISSION OF YIDDISH WRITERS TO INTER- NATIONAL AUTHORS' CLUB

Brussels, June 13.—Whether or not Yiddish writers are to be admitted into the International Pen Club will be a question considered at the club's international congress which will be opened here June 20.

Hitherto, the admission to the international club has been limited to a territorial basis and Yiddish clubs were excluded. The question was placed on the agenda of the first meeting. Leo Koenig, representing the Yiddish Writers Club of Poland, was invited to speak at the congress, but he will have no vote in the decision of the question.

BRITISH PRESS EULOGIZES LATE LORD SWAYTHLING

London, June 13.—The death of Lord Swaythling is mourned throughout the English press. The City regarded Lord Swaythling one of the richest men in the world, states the "Evening News," and considered that he had the quickest and most far seeing brain in the banking world.

MOVE TO CREATE JEWISH ELECTION BLOC IN ROUMANIA

Bucharest, June 13.—The first move to create a Jewish bloc for the forthcoming national elections in Roumania was made yesterday.

The Jewish National Club of Bucharest, together with the Jewish National Party of Transylvania, have registered with the election authorities. Negotiations are still being carried on for creating a United Jewish front for the elections.

SEMINARY CONFERS DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF HEBREW LITERATURE ON MARSHALL

Eight Rabbis and Twenty-five Teachers Graduated; Dr. Adler Presides at Commencement Exercises; Marshall Scores Sensationalism in Jewish Pulpit; Urges Emphasis on Learning

The degree of Doctor of Hebrew Literature honoris causa was conferred upon Louis Marshall in recognition for his life long service in the defense of the rights of the Jewish people and for his efforts in furthering the cause of Jewish learning and education, by Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the Jewish Theological Seminary, at the commencement exercises of the Seminary held Sunday at Town Hall.

Dr. Adler, who presided at the exercises which marked the forty-first anniversary of the existence of the Seminary, stated that the seminary has graduated 203 rabbis who serve in Jewish communities in the United States and Canada. One of the graduates of the Seminary is the Chief Rabbi of the British Empire, and another graduate holds the position of rabbi in Germany. The Teachers' Institute, which was started eighteen years ago, has graduated 624 teachers.

The degree of Doctor of Hebrew Literature was conferred upon Rabbi

Israel Goldstein, Rabbi Julius Maller and Rabbi Joseph Sarachek.

Describing the progress of the Seminary in recent years, the building up of its library, and reviewing the financial situation of the institute, Dr. Adler referred to recent bequests to the Seminary, particularly the bequest of the late Louis S. Brush, amounting to \$1,400,000. This fund, according to the will of Mr. Brush, is to be used for the building and upkeep of a dormitory on the seminary's site on West 123rd Street, and cannot be applied to the general financial needs of the seminary. Dr. C. E. Hillel Kauer of Denver, Rabbi Israel Goldfarb, and the Rev. Dr. Pereira Mendes spoke at the conclusion of the exercises which were marked by impressive solemnity. The auditorium was crowded and at the close of the exercises the audience sang Adon Olam.

What constituted an attack on sensationalism in the Jewish pulpit and a call for the return to the authentic sources of Judaism was sounded by Louis Marshall in his address. Mr. Marshall expressed his appreciation of the honor bestowed upon him and dwelt at length on the function of the rabbi in the community and what are the elements that make up a proper sermon. Mr. Marshall emphasized the close connection between the cupidity of many sermons and the indifference displayed by the intelligent Jewish youth.

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ELEVEN INJURED IN VIENNA STUDENT RIOTS

Vienna, June 13.—Eleven students were seriously injured, and scores of others badly beaten in riots which broke out Friday at the University of Vienna.

The trouble started during a lecture when a student shouted, "Jews get out!" The Social Democratic students tried to oust the interrupters, whom they termed Fascist students, but found them armed with brass knuckles and iron-tipped sticks.

Rector Molish is accused by the Social Democrats of having allowed several hundred more supposed Fascist students to enter a rear gate, when another affray occurred. Fighting also took place in the street. After the fight the police picked up hundred of sticks, brass knuckles and other weapons.

The University of Vienna was closed as a result of the riots.

NATHAN STRAUS RECOVERED, LEAVES MT. SINAI HOSPITAL

Nathan Straus, who was confined in Mount Sinai Hospital two weeks with appendicitis and bronchitis, was taken to his home in Mamaroneck on Sunday.

His condition is considerably improved, according to Dr. Leon Siglitz, his physician, who accompanied Mr. Straus home.

ZIONISTS PLAN REORGANIZATION AT FORTHCOMING 31ST ANNUAL CONVENTION

Delegates to Meet in Atlantic City June 26

The thirty-first annual Convention of the Zionist Organization of America, will be held in Atlantic City beginning Sunday, June 26th. The sessions of the Convention will open on Sunday the 26th in the Chelsea Assembly Hall, where the sessions will be held on Monday and Tuesday. Conventional Headquarters will be at the Hotel Ritz-Carlton.

A mass meeting will be held Sunday evening, June 26th, in the Chelsea Assembly Hall. The meeting will be addressed by M. M. Ussischkin, who is now enroute from Palestine to attend the Zionist Convention in Canada, following which he will come to the United States.

In issuing the call to the convention, the Administration Committee declared:

"The staggering responsibilities of a growing Palestine have placed burdens upon the organized Zionists of this country which requires not only a generous contribution to our funds, but a direct personal participation in the administration of our affairs in Palestine. It is becoming increasingly evident that these responsibilities cannot be evaded by us without causing serious impairment in the reconstruction work. During the past year, Palestine has gone through a severe crisis. The crisis has left its scars and the house must be put in order. There are divergent views with regard to Zionist policy. Many are displeased with certain phases of the work there, with the economic policy of the Organization. These are matters requiring the earnest consideration of our delegates to the coming Convention as well as of our representatives to the next Zionist Congress which is scheduled to be held in Ezer, August 24th."

The convention will deal with the problem of the internal reorganization of the Zionist Organization looking toward consolidation and coordination of the various bureaus and loosely attached agencies of the Zionist Organization. It was stated at Zionist headquarters that a complete plan of reorganization is now being discussed by a special committee that is holding public hearings on the subject, which after adoption will be announced on the eve of the Convention.

MARY FELS COMMENTS ON PALESTINE CONDITIONS AS AGENCY STARTS WORK

Criticizes Executive Policy, Charges Labor Is Theory Ridden

The report of the arrival in Palestine of the first group of American experts of the Palestine Survey Commission under the auspices of the Jewish Agency was welcomed yesterday by Mrs. Mary Fels, well known philanthropist and president of the Joseph Fels Foundation. Mrs. Fels has made substantial contributions to the Palestine upbuilding work and was largely responsible for the creation of the B'nai Benjamin Bank, which serves the needs of the sons of the first Palestine pioneers.

In an interview with the representative of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin", Mrs. Fels said:

"The commission of inquiry as a result of Mr. Louis Marshall's and Dr. Weizmann's efforts is a very necessary thing. Today, unfortunately, Jewish work in Palestine is not proceeding on sound lines. The Hadassah health work and the Zionist education work are being conducted with Zionist funds, thereby relieving the Palestine government of this responsibility and permitting it to concentrate its efforts on the Arab population.

"I believe that it will become evident to this commission that a surplus of revenue over expenditures in the Palestine Government's budget is only possible because the Zionists are financing undertakings which in every other country is the concern of the Government.

"I believe that the center of the activity in Palestine should be colonization. Expenditures of funds for such purposes will benefit the Jews.

The present unemployment crisis is due to the short sighted policy of the Zionist Executive in concentrating Jews in towns, as in Tel-Aviv. When Jews are placed on the land, there is no unemployment among them. On my last visit to Palestine, I arranged for the importation of 100,000 grape vines from the selected vineyards of France which were transplanted in many of the Judean colonies where the older Jewish settlements are located."

Commenting on the labor difficulties in Palestine, Mrs. Fels declared that unlike labor in England, which is the hope and strength of Great Britain, the Palestinian labor movement is theory ridden. The Jews of Eastern Europe who make up the recent immigration to Palestine, bring with them an outlook on labor conditions gained from their environment. The Jewish Federation of Labor in Palestine is attempting to fit Palestine to their theories instead of fitting themselves to Palestine's requirements. By ranting against capitalism in Palestine where none exists, they produce the effect of scaring off investments by middle class Jews. The Jewish Federation of Labor, by underbidding private contractors in construction work and forcing the Zionist Organization to contribute to its deficit, makes the Zionists responsible for the

LINDBERGH ACCLAIMED BY I. O. B. A. FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL CONVENTION

Congratulate Levine and Chamberlin for Heroic Flight; Dr. Wise Answers Opponents of European Conference on Jewish Rights; Conference to Be Held in Zurich, Not Geneva

Saratoga Springs, N. Y., June 13.—Acclaim for Charles A. Lindbergh as America's hero and Clarence D. Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine was voiced in resolutions enthusiastically adopted at the forty-first annual convention of the Independent Order Brith Abraham which opened its sessions at Convention Hall yesterday.

The resolution hailing Lindbergh read:

"The Independent Order Brith Abraham in convention duly assembled at Saratoga, N. Y., on Sunday, June 12th, 1927, greets and acclaims America's son and hero, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh and joins with the rest of the nation in paying to this fearless and daring pioneer fier across the Atlantic its glowing tribute of unbounded admiration for his marvelous achievement and glorious contribution to science and world progress and conveys to him and his dear mother heartiest felicitations and all good wishes for every honor, joy and happiness they so richly merit."

Chamberlin and Levine were congratulated for their heroic flight in the following resolution:

"The Independent Order Brith Abraham in convention assembled at Saratoga, N. Y., this 12th day of June 1927, in common with the rest of the world hails the extraordinary achievement of Clarence Chamberlin and Charles Levine and warmly and heartily congratulates them upon their historic and heroic flight across the Atlantic and extends to them and their dear ones every good wish for success and happiness in life."

The Jewish situation in Eastern Europe, the upbuilding of Palestine as the Jewish National Home and the effect of the Immigration Law on Jewish fraternal organizations in America were the three principal questions discussed at the first session. Eight hundred and twenty-one delegates representing 456 lodges are attending the sessions.

Messages from President Coolidge and Governor Smith were read by Judge Hartman at the opening session. Clarence Knapp, Mayor of Saratoga Springs, presented the key of the city to the Grand Master of the Order. In addressing the convention session the Mayor said, "The Jewish people were the first to appreciate the curative values of the springs of our city. They

The entire morning session was devoted to the question of Jewish rights in East European countries and the situation in Palestine.

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise in his address on Jewish rights which lasted over an hour, criticized those American Jewish leaders who are opposed to open fight against violations of the rights guaranteed to the Jewish population. "The policy of those leaders would never have improved the Jewish situation in Roumania as did our vigorous public protests," Dr. Wise declared. "When wrong is done to our brethren, it is our duty to cry out and by that awake the conscience of the nations. With our open fight against anti-Jewish excesses in Roumania, we reached the point where not only the Jews of America, but also the Christian world voiced its protest."

Praising the role played by the Independent Order Brith Abraham in the protests against Roumania, Dr. Wise stated that when the delegation appear-

ed before Secretary of State Kellogg, they were promised that the State Department would do everything to help the Jewish situation in Roumania. "If things are better in Roumania than they were before, it is only because we protest openly," Dr. Wise declared.

Speaking on the forthcoming conference on Jewish rights Dr. Wise said: "Those who are opposed to the conference are afraid that it may be misinterpreted to be an international Jewish conspiracy, but this is not going to be an international Jewish congress. It will only be a conference on Jewish rights in the countries of Eastern and Central Europe. If we Jews will be afraid to do the right things because people may misunderstand, then let us better quit. There is no reason to think we will be suspected of an international conspiracy just because we stand up with demands to give us the rights we are entitled to," he declared.

Dr. Wise announced that the conference on Jewish rights would be held in Zurich instead of Geneva as previously scheduled.

Touching upon the crisis in Palestine Dr. Wise bitterly criticized those who exaggerated the gravity of the situation. "It is true," he said, "that Palestine is now undergoing a grave crisis, but the situation is not as critical as it is put forth by people who are far from being interested in the welfare of Pal-

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teacher in Israel. Many are inclined to look for a thrill in the synagogue. I, for one, would prefer the dullness of sermons which contains a Midrashic tale and presents the wisdom of ages, to the so-called eloquence which touches upon the latest novel or the most recent public sensation and is in reality nothing but words, words, words," Mr. Marshall declared.

"I want the rabbi to tell me something I do not know, to point out a new line of thought, to present a new method of approach to the problems of life. I, for one, prefer such a thrill to eloquence. When I speak of this situation, I do not refer to any particular congregation," the speaker stated.

"I often hear people complain that young men and women are indifferent to the synagogue, especially if they have gone through college. The reason is that they are intelligent, although they are not as intellectual as they imagine themselves to be; the reason is that they are serious minded and do not find what they seek in the synagogue.

"A young man or woman who goes to the house of worship and listens to words, words, words, which scarcely ever precipitate an idea, who hear all kinds of sermons about Judaism, but hear nothing which is Judaism, such a person studies philosophy or something else and loses his interest in the synagogue."

Mr. Marshall then urged that the publication of a book in English on the essentials of Judaism, a book which would not be written down to a child's mentality but be written for an intelligent, thinking mind should be undertaken.

"Recently I received a communication from a young man who said: 'I am a Jew and I want to be a Jew. But I want to know what Judaism is, what are its essentials.' It is indeed deplorable," Mr. Marshall continued, "that there are no books available which would give the young man the answer to this question and enable him to defend Judaism against malicious attacks from anti-Semitic sources."

Mr. Marshall appealed to the Jewish public to lend financial support to the Jewish Theological Seminary. "Mr. Brush's bequest," he said, "is for a specific purpose and does not relieve the Seminary of its financial difficulties. More than once I have been told after such an appeal, 'You are perfectly right', but in spite of their hearty approval, no support was forthcoming. You can not ignore the work done by this institution of learning, otherwise our enemies will compel you to do your duty. You must not permit the Jewish youth to grow up in ignorance of the tenets of Judaism. Otherwise you deprive them of the opportunity of being staunch defenders of our faith," Mr. Marshall declared.
