

ROUMANIAN PEASANTS PARTY CONCLUDES AN AGREEMENT WITH JEWISH LEADERS IN TRANSYLVANIA

Goga, of Late Averescu Cabinet, Inspired Anti-Semitic Agitators, Roumanian Paper Discloses

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, June 20.—A rapprochement between Jewish circles and Roumanian political parties, which may result in the pacification of the country, is in sight as a result of negotiations now being carried on the eve of the forthcoming parliamentary elections ordered by the new government.

It was learned that the Jewish national party of Transylvania has concluded an agreement with Dr. Lupis, member of the Stirbey cabinet and leader of the Tzarists, the Roumanian National Peasants Party.

Under the terms of the agreement concluded, the Tzarist party guarantees to support the demand of the Jewish leaders for the rights of Jewish schools, to combat the anti-Semitic movement and to support Jewish candidates for election to the Chamber. Dr. Joseph Fischer is to be the candidate of the Jewish National Party for the Senate and Dr. Edward Fischer for parliament.

In a manifesto issued by the Tzarist party, it assures the Jewish population of its desire to bring about peaceful cooperation of all persons, irrespective of race and religion. The manifesto also guarantees "the free and unhampered development of national culture" of the minorities and to "further their collective interests."

Bucharest, June 20.—An agreement between the Union of Roumanian Jews, representing the Jewish population of Old Roumania and the Roumanian Liberal Party, was concluded here with a view of cooperation between the two parties at the forthcoming parliamentary elections.

It was learned today by the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that in this agreement the liberal party undertakes to advocate, through its representatives in the Roumanian parliament, the promulgation of laws concerning the organization of

GREAT SYNAGOGUE IN BUCHAREST BURNS DOWN

Bucharest, June 20.—The Great Synagogue of Bucharest was destroyed during a fire last night. Many houses in the neighborhood were also burned.

The Great Synagogue was the most beautiful Jewish house of worship in Roumania. Chief Rabbi Niemirower is rabbi of the synagogue.

Kehillahs throughout the Kingdom of Roumania, to support the demand of the Jewish leaders that Jewish schools be granted public rights, that the government make allotments to subsidize the Kehillahs and the schools and that the party will combat the anti-Semitic movement.

Under the agreement, the Union of Roumanian Jews will be given five seats in the Chamber and two in the Senate.

Bucharest, June 20.—Octavian Goga, Roumanian poet and Minister of the Interior in the former Averescu government, was the mainstay of the anti-Semitic agitators responsible for the excesses against Jews during the lifetime of the extinct government.

This disclosure was made by a member of the former cabinet, whose name is not given, according to a report published today by the Roumanian newspaper, "Lupta".

The newspaper quotes the Roumanian statesman as saying that "Goga was behind all anti-Semitic disturbances. He supported the anti-Semitic groups with secret funds."

GERMAN EXPERT CLAIMS HE LOCATED TOMB OF MOSES AND ARK OF COVENANT

American Explorer of Mount Nebo Believes Claims

Jerusalem, June 20.—A claim that the Ark and the Tomb of Moses have been located is made by a German specialist recently arrived here from Germany. He claims to be an expert in the science of discovering lost locations, of which he furnishes proofs from past experiences. He made a survey of Mt. Nebo on his own accord and declares that the Ark is located. He returned with plans and sketch documents written and signed by himself describing the exact location and the history of his trip on foot which he handed over to A. F. Futterer of the Los Angeles Bible Institute, who came to Palestine recently in search for the Ark of the Covenant.

Mr. Futterer, after careful examination of the document and plans of Nebo, declared that though the specialist proves himself to be totally ignorant of the Scripture narratives, he has, nevertheless described the exact locations of the Ark and Moses' Tomb, but with much more detail than is found in Scripture evidence, and from which, along with Mr. Futterer's own conclusions, it appears almost certain that both the Ark and Tomb of Moses have been located. ENGLISH JEWRY MAY APPEAL TO LEAGUE AGAINST HUNGARIAN NUMERUS CLAUSUS

Board of Deputies Expresses Appreciation to Wolf for Handling Roumanian Situation; Policy of Waiting Futile, It Finds

London, June 20.—Another appeal to the League of Nations against the Hungarian government for its continued practice of the numerus clausus, notwithstanding promises of its speedy abolition, may be directed on behalf of Anglo-Jewry, it was learned yesterday at the monthly meeting of the Board of Jewish Deputies.

Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee, in reporting on the situation in Hungary, was instructed by the Board to inquire into the expediency of another appeal to the League. This action was taken in view of the recent statement of Count Klebelsburg, Hungarian Minister of Education, that there is no prospect for an early modification of the numerus clausus and that it is even possible that the scope of the numerus clausus law may be extended.

London, June 20.—A resolution expressing appreciation of the work of Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint

Foreign Committee, in handling the Roumanian Jewish situation, was voted by the Board of Jewish Deputies, the federation of Jewish communities in England, at its monthly meeting yesterday.

The resolution refers to the remarkable way in which Mr. Wolf dealt with the Jewish question in Roumania. Mr. Wolf, in reporting on the situation in Roumania, stated that the Joint Foreign Committee, in view of the present change in the Roumanian government, considered the question whether or not the collection of documents should be published before the new government's attitude is ascertained. However, it was found that the same situation existed last year when the late government came into power and the Board gained nothing by its policy of waiting. It was therefore decided to proceed with action. The documents will be circulated freely, among non-Jewish bodies as well as Jewish, Mr. Wolf stated.

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PERMANENT MANDATES COMMISSION OPENS ITS SESSION IN GENEVA

Geneva, June 20.—Whether or not Germany, newly admitted into the Council of the League of Nations, is also to be given a place on the Permanent Mandates Commission will be decided at the session of the Commission which opened its deliberations here today.

The Commission will also take up the memoranda of the Zionist World Organization as the Jewish Agency, as well as the memorandum voicing the complaints of the anti-Zionist Palestine-Arab Executive.

The Commission has received no memorandum this year from the Vaad Leumi, the National Council of Palestine Jews.

Last year such action was taken by the Council, but it was decided to abstain from submitting any memorandum this year.

NEW TYPE OF AGRICULTURIST IN PALESTINE,

DR. LEE K. FRANKEL SAYS

Jerusalem, June 20.—Dr. Lee K. Frankel, one of the four commissioners of the Palestine Survey Commission of the Jewish Agency, summarized his impressions on Palestine at a reception given in his honor by the Zionist Executive Saturday night.

The rebuilding of Palestine is a task important for the whole of Jewry, he stated. His impressions during the fortnight which he has spent here were very striking. He was particularly impressed with the new type of agriculturist which is rising in Palestine, he stated.

Rabbi Abraham A. Neuman was elected by the Board of Directors of Mikveh Israel to preside over its Congregation which is the oldest in Philadelphia.

SOLOMON GUREVITCH SHOWN AS STAUNCH OPPONENT OF SOVIET RULE

Life Story of Jew Executed in Moscow Is Revealed

Kovno, June 20.—Interesting details of the life story of Solomon Gurevitch, one of the 20 persons recently shot in Moscow on the charge of contra-revolutionary activity, were made known here.

It appears that Gurevitch was a native of Kovno. He studied in the high schools of Kovno and Shavli. During the war evacuations, he was taken to Moscow where he studied at the University of Moscow. Later he volunteered for the Russian Imperial Army. When the first revolution broke out he was given a commission as staff officer in the republican army. When the Bolshevik revolution broke out, he escaped to Siberia and enrolled as a volunteer in Koltchak's army to fight the Bolsheviks. When Koltchak's army collapsed, he returned to Russia under a false passport. In Moscow he obtained a responsible government position and was the head of the Russian Boy Scouts and other sport organizations. In 1925 he was arrested under suspicion of contra-revolutionary activities and was kept in prison until his execution.

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT PROMULGATES ORDINANCE FOR LOAN OF £4,500,000

Jerusalem, June 20.—A government ordinance authorizing the floating of the Palestine government loan for the amount of £4,500,000, guaranteed by the British Exchequer, was published in the Official Gazette yesterday.

According to the ordinance, the amount of £1,640,000 will be used by the government for the purchase of the Palestine railways and other capital assets from the British government. The amount of £1,000,000 will be used for the Haifa Harbor construction and other port improvements, £1,115,000 will be used for public buildings, and a telephone system. The amount of £745,000 will be used for other works.

The ordinance authorizes the High Commissioner to issue stock or bonds through the Bank of England for the amount of £4,500,000. Payment of capital and interest is to be made from Palestine government revenues.

JEWISH MUSIC FEATURE OF INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION

Frankfurt-am-Main, June 20.—Jewish folk songs will be a feature in the International Music Exposition which opens here the end of June.

The program of the exposition includes performances of Jewish religious music and folk songs. Joseph Ziegler, conductor of the Jewish Song Union of Munich, will be in charge of the Jewish concerts. The choirs of three synagogues in Frankfurt will give concerts.

PALESTINE MANUFACTURERS OBJECT TO COMMERCIAL AGREEMENT WITH SYRIA

Ask Reduction of Tariff on Raw Materials

Jerusalem, June 18.—Objection to the proposed commercial agreement between Palestine and Syria were voiced by Palestine manufacturers.

The protest came to the surface in connection with the expected visit of the High Commissioner of Syria to negotiate a new agreement with the Palestine government introducing custom duties between Palestine and his country.

At a meeting of the Palestine Manufacturers' Association it was decided to urge the Palestine government to reject this agreement.

The opinion was expressed that if the agreement goes into effect it will endanger the interests of Palestine industry.

Tel Aviv, June 2.—K. W. Stead, Director of Customs, Excise and Trade Department, received representatives of various industries here on Sunday. N. Tishby, Assistant Director of the Zionist Department of Urban Colonization, acted as interpreter.

The manufacturers presented demands concerning the reduction of customs duties on some raw materials and increase of duties on some imported goods competing with Palestine productions. Mr. Stead promised to consider the demands most sympathetically.

JEWISH GIRL RELEASED FROM CRACOW CONVENT

Cracow, June 20.—Miss Komis, the sixteen year old Jewish girl who was held in a convent, was returned to her parents.

The girl related that she was taken to the convent by one of the Christian neighbors of her parents.

"I did not realize what was happening until I suddenly understood that my presence in the convent would lead me to abandon my faith. I then began to weep until the sisters permitted me to go home."

When the parents of Miss Komis learned that she was being kept in a convent, they demanded her return. Accompanied by friends and sympathizers they besieged the convent, demanding that she be released. The police dispersed the crowd and the girl's return was refused. An investigation was ordered by the District Attorney at that time.

THREE JEWISH INTERNES VICTIMS OF HAZING AT KINGS COUNTY HOSPITAL

Beaten, Gagged and Smeared with Dye as Climax to Prejudice—Six Doctors Under Bail

Prejudice against Jewish internes in Kings County Hospital reached a climax early yesterday when three Jewish doctors were dragged from their beds, hurled into ice water, smeared with dye, beaten, bound and gagged by other members of the hospital medical staff.

Six doctors at the hospital were brought into Flatbush Court yesterday formally charged with assault, third degree. More arrests on similar charges are expected.

Investigations by the police, the officials of the Department of Public Welfare, under supervision of which Kings County Hospital comes, and other agencies of the city are in progress.

Indignation abounds among sympathizers of the three victims who required surgical attention from the treatment they received and who are bent on pressing the prosecution of their assailants.

The outbreak is the culmination of race hatred against the Jewish internes that has been brewing two years, and a sentiment that harks back twelve years when a Jewish interne was forced out of Kings County Hospital because of dislike for his creed.

The prisoners are described as:

Dr. Frank Hannan, Nebraska; Dr. William Wills and Dr. Kenneth Clough, both of Brooklyn; Dr. Charles Adams, Illinois; Dr. Lorimer Armstrong, Omaha, Neb., and Dr. William Stratton, Texas.

The three victims are:

Dr. Hyman Solovay, Brooklyn, a graduate of Cornell University, an interne at the hospital two years; Dr. Louis Borow, of Fargo, N. D., graduate of the University of Louisville, and Dr. Louis Katskee, Lincoln, Neb., graduate of University of Nebraska, both of whom have been internes at Kings County Hospital seven months.

The six physicians were represented in Flatbush court yesterday morning by attorneys Peter B. Smith and George Steinbugler. The three victims were represented by attorney Nathan Sweedler, of 66 Court Street, and Benjamin Solovay, 391 Fulton Street, brother of Dr. Solovay.

JEWISH LABOR PARTY, BUND, APPEALS AGAINST COMMUNIST TERROR

Warsaw, June 20.—An appeal to stop the bloodshed caused by the Communist agitation was issued by the Jewish Labor Party, Bund.

The riots began last week when the Communists discovered that there representation at a Jewish labor conference here was inadequate. The manifesto of the Bund calls the workers to "defense against the provocators and bandits and to save the Jewish labor movement."

all three victims. Dr. Solovay suffered the loss of a nail on the big toe of his left foot when one of his assailants tore it away, a lacerated and bruised left eye and cuts and abrasions on the scalp.

The defendants were inclined to treat the affair lightly, stating that it was in the nature of a hazing party, and not intended to have vicious elements.

When brought before Magistrate Liota the prisoners denied the charges and bail of \$500 each was fixed. They were released immediately on bail after Magistrate Liota granted request of attorneys for both sides to adjourn the hearing until June 28.

The prisoners had obtained bail when brought to the police station through Dr. Coakley, a former interne at the hospital.

After the proceedings yesterday Attorney Sweedler stated that when the case comes up for hearing he will seek to have the charges against all six doctors changed to burglary. He alleges that the attacking physicians committed burglary by entering the rooms of the three victims.

Speaking for the three Jewish internes, Dr. Solovay said that conditions at the hospital were most disagreeable for himself and two companions because they were Jews.

He said he had been at the institution longer than Drs. Borow and Katskee, and that conditions were such when he was at the hospital alone that he took it up with hospital officials. He said Commissioner Coler's attention had been brought to the situation and that the Commissioner had decided to aid Drs. Borow and Katskee to the staff seven months ago.

The three Jewish doctors said that the score or more doctors on the hospital staff had ostracized them, even to the extent of forcing them to eat by themselves, snubbing them and prejudicing the nurses against them.

The trouble drew toward a climax early Sunday night, they said, with slight clashes between the three victims and some of the other doctors. When Drs. Solovay, Borow and Katskee retired about midnight, they declared, they suspected that the feeling against them was at a peak and decided to remain by themselves. Their quarters are on the third floor of the staff house in the east annex of the building.

After all had fallen asleep, they allege, they were pounced upon suddenly, held down in their beds while pillow cases were drawn over their heads, rushed downstairs to the basement and immersed violently into tubs or tanks of cold water.

They fought back, they said, but were powerless in the hands of so many attackers. They were brought back to their rooms gagged and bound and tossed into bed. Before being thrown into their beds, they allege, they were

ORDER SONS OF ZION OPENS CONVENTION SESSIONS

Dispute Over Revisionism Settled

Asbury Park, N. J., June 20.—The Eighteenth Annual Convention of the Order Sons of Zion opened here yesterday at the Carteret Hotel, in the presence of 200 delegates.

Mr. Sol. Friedland, Nassi of the Order, in his annual report, stated that the difference of opinion which had arisen last year between the Order and the Zionist Organization of America concerning the latter's adoption of the Revisionist platform, was settled. The Zionist Organization admitted that in matters pertaining to Zionist program, the jurisdiction lies not with the American Federation, but with the World Zionist Organization, he stated.

The Order has a deficit of \$19,000, the report shows, and the president in his message asked the delegates to find means to wipe out this deficit.

Six new camps were organized during the past year, the secretary's report showed.

Judge Jacob Strahl reported on the progress of the Judea Life Insurance Company, a subsidiary of the Judea Life Insurance, Ltd., of Palestine, both companies being owned by the Judea Industrial Corporation, an offspring of the Order. The new company has obtained licenses to operate in Maryland, Long Island, District of Columbia, New Jersey and New York.

NAPOLEONIC MOUNT IS TO BE EXCAVATED

Jerusalem, June 20.—The plateau known as the Napoleonic Mount, located between Tel Aviv and Petach Tikvah, was acquired by Isaac Goldberg.

The locality was a military center during the world war. Its name is derived from the circumstance that it played an important part in the Egyptian expedition of Napoleon in 1799.

In ancient times a settlement existed there and archaeologists are looking forward eagerly to the results of excavations which will be started there shortly.

HAGUIBOR-MACCABEES LOSE TO CHICAGO ALL-STAR TEAM

Zionists to Celebrate Palestine Day at Polo Grounds

Chicago, June 20.—Peel Cup All-Stars defeated the Haguihor Maccabees, of Palestine, 4 to 1, here yesterday. Over 12,000 spectators witnessed the match.

The Palestine players goal was scored by Rosenberg after two minutes of play.

June 26 has been designated Palestine Day by the Zionist Organization of America in honor of the Maccabee Soccer Team, the all-Jewish team from Palestine.

On that day the Maccabees will meet the Indiana Flooring Team at the Polo Grounds, New York. The Indiana Flooring team is considered the strongest opposition the Maccabees have met so far.

Palestine Day will be celebrated with a Maccabee Sports Festival at the Polo Grounds. It was announced that Mayor James J. Walker will kick off the ball. An additional feature of the day will be the presence of 15,000 Jewish school children, who will unite in singing Jewish songs.

In his message proclaiming June 26th Palestine Day Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, said:

"During the few weeks of their stay in this country the Maccabees of Palestine have already displayed a courage, determination and perseverance which is symbolic of the spirit of the pioneers of the Jewish Homeland. Against almost overwhelming odds they have emerged the victors. These Jewish players from Palestine have gained the admiration and respect of all American Jews. To Zionists especially has their high courage been an incentive for increased effort for Palestine. If the Jewish Homeland is capable of producing so sterling a group of men, then no work for the upbuilding of Palestine is in vain. Palestine Day is designed as an official welcome to the Palestinian players as it is also designed to stimulate interest in Palestine. All Zionists are urged to observe Palestine Day in honor of the visiting all-Jewish Palestinian team."

Patriotic greetings from the Mayors of seven communities in New York and New Jersey were carried to Mayor W. F. Frelaud Kendrick by runners representing Young Men's Hebrew Associations, for 135 miles in a road run from New York to Philadelphia on Sunday. This road run commemorated the sesqui-centennial of the adoption of the American Flag, and each runner carried in addition to the message from the Mayor of his community, an American flag and a greeting from the president of the organization which he represented.

The run was held under the auspices of the Metropolitan League of Jewish Community Associations affiliated with the Jewish Welfare Board, representing Y. M. H. A.'s in New York in cooperation with the Y. M. H. A.'s in New Jersey and Philadelphia. Two hundred men participated in the run.

Among the 173 Princeton seniors who will be graduated today with academic honors in their departmental work for the last two years are 8 Jewish students, winning high honors in the classics, economics, politics, history, modern languages and geology.

Twenty Jewish students are among the 460 graduated from Smith College yesterday.

JEWISH WOMEN'S CONFERENCE OPENS IN LONDON

London, June 20.—Problems concerning the scope and character of the activities of Jewish women's organizations were taken up in a wide discussion at the Conference of Jewish Women's Organizations in England which opened here today.

The conference is attended by representatives of Jewish women's organizations in the United States, Germany and South Africa. Mrs. Solomon of New York, Deputy Mme. Melzer of Poland, Mme. Papenheim of Germany and Mme. Basht of South Africa, were among those present.

Mrs. Model, the secretary, in her report, drew attention to the fact that the conference held in 1902 was confined merely to communal and philanthropic activities. Women of today have taken their place in public life and are no longer limited in their activities, as they were a quarter of a century ago. The Conference must consider the attitude of the Jewish women concerning representative Jewish bodies, the speaker urged. The Union includes Zionist and non-Zionist bodies, she stated.

Mrs. Spielman urged the Union to participate in political and legislative work. Miss Lucy Cohen opposed this view declaring that the Jews in England are Englishmen and it is unnecessary to undertake separate activities, except in Jewish matters. Mrs. Joseph H. Hertz, wife of the Chief Rabbi, urged that the Union help in the upbuilding of Palestine.
