

ZIONIST EXECUTIVE REPORTS TO LEAGUE ON PALESTINE CONDITIONS

Dr. Weizmann Renews Demands for State Lands for Jewish Colonization and Larger Government Allotments for Hebrew Schools; Describes Unemployment Situation; Files Weizmann-Marshall Pact on Jewish Agency

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, June 22.—Two points of issue, which are the subjects of negotiations between the Executive of the Zionist World Organization; and the British Government as the Mandatory Power for Palestine, were raised in presentations made by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the World Zionist Organization, in his memorandum submitted to the Permanent Mandates Commission, which is in session here, through the High Commissioner of Palestine, Lord Plumer.

In the annual report of the Zionist Executive concerning present-day conditions in Palestine, submitted to the Permanent Mandates Commission, covering the period ending December 31, 1926, and in a letter accompanying this document, Dr. Weizmann described Palestine conditions in the fields of immigration, agricultural colonization, urban development, industry, public health, education and finance.

Special attention is drawn to the conclusion of the Marshall-Weizmann pact concerning the extension of the Jewish Agency, aiming at the enlistment of the support of non-Zionists in the work of upbuilding Palestine.

The issues raised in Dr. Weizmann's letter concern the question of State lands for Jewish colonization in Palestine, particularly in the area of Bei-

san, and the question of government allotments for the Hebrew educational system in Palestine.

In the matter of State lands for Jewish colonization which was raised in the previous memoranda of the Zionist Executive, Dr. Weizmann draws attention to the fact that no definite decision on this point has as yet been reached. He expresses the hope of the Zionist Executive, however, "that the negotiations will shortly reach a conclusion which will give fair satisfaction to the Zionist point of view." In the matter of government allotments for the Hebrew educational system, the president of the World Zionist Organization expresses his "grateful appreciation of the substantial increase in the grant for which the Palestine government has found it possible to make provision in its budget for 1926-1927." This has reference to the allotment of

LEVINE AND CHAMBERLIN RECEIVE HONORS IN HUNGARY AND IN AUSTRIA

Resolution Asks New York Reception for Two Flyers

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, June 22.—President Hainisch yesterday gave a luncheon in honor of Clarence D. Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine, American trans-Atlantic flyers, now on a visit here.

Later the Americans were guests of the Mayor of Baden near Vienna.

Budapest, June 22.—The American trans-Atlantic flyers, Chamberlin and Levine, arrived here by air from Vienna, landing at the Matyasfoeld Aviation Field.

Chamberlin was presented with a silver loving cup and Levine with a silver laurel wreath by the Hungarian Aero Club.

Laudatory speeches were made by the American Minister, J. Butler Wright, the Burgomaster of Budapest, and the Hungarian Minister of Commerce.

Clarence Chamberlin actually compelled the Hungarian government to abstain from discrimination against Levine. The original invitation of the Hungarian government was directed

MAYOR WALKER ORDERS CITY WIDE INVESTIGATION IN JEWISH PHYSICIANS' HAZING CASE

Public Hearing to Be Held Next Thursday to Determine Whether Discrimination Is Practiced; Metropolitan Press Strongly Condemns Excesses

"It is impossible to couple benevolence with bigotry," was the reaction of Hon. James J. Walker, the Mayor of the City of New York, to the reports of the excesses perpetrated upon three Jewish internes in Kings County Hospital.

In line with this attitude, one of the first acts of the Mayor was to suspend the six internes accused by the three Jewish doctors of responsibility for the attack. The six are under criminal charges of assault.

A city wide investigation of hospitals and institutions to ascertain where there has been any discrimination in race, color or creed, will be undertaken by order of the Mayor. An open public hearing will take place at City Hall next Thursday, the Mayor announced. Mayor Walker will act as Magistrate at the hearing.

The investigation will embrace 25 municipally controlled hospitals and will affect three city government departments. Rumors have it that Bird S. Coler, Commissioner of Public Welfare, and Frederick A. Wallis, Commissioner of Correction, may be involved in the results of the inquiry.

When asked whether he planned to investigate if the application forms for

internes in city hospitals include questions pertaining to religion, the Mayor replied that this is one of the things he intends to take up. It developed that the application blanks at the Kings County Hospital contain the question concerning the religion of applicants.

Immediately upon the formulation of the charges, Mayor Walker went to Kings County Hospital to make an inspection of the institution. A committee of Brooklyn Rabbis, headed by Dr. Louis M. Gross, Rabbi of Union Temple, and Rabbi Harry Weiss, accompanied by Supreme Court Justice Edward L. Lasker, called on Commissioner Bird, submitting a complaint concerning the mistreatment of the Jewish internes.

Investigation of racial and religious prejudice at Kings County Hospital took an unexpected turn today when Nathan Szwedler, attorney for Dr. Hyman Solovay, insisted that the hazing of his client and two other internes originated under the influence of the Ku Klux Klan.

The excesses perpetrated against the three Jewish physicians were strongly condemned in editorials in many of the metropolitan newspapers as well as in the Jewish press.

JEWISH LEADERS DISCUSS WAYS OF COMBATTING WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC

Central American Countries Need Attention, Report Shows

London, June 22.—An international conference of representatives of Jewish organizations to combat white slave traffic was opened here yesterday under the chairmanship of Claude Montefiore, President of the Liberal Jewish Synagogue.

Seventy delegates were present at the opening of the conference.

Mr. Montefiore, in his opening address, declared that the general economic and social conditions in Europe, particularly in Eastern Europe, have become worse since the end of the World War. It is no secret that a wide-spread white slave traffic is in existence, and that a number of Jews are participating in it, both as dealers and as victims. Reference to this fact has been made in the experts' report of the League of Nations. Jews must

JEWISH PRESS WILL HAVE A SPECIAL SECTION AT IN- TERNATIONAL EXHIBITION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, June 22.—There is to be a special Jewish Section at the International Press Exhibition being held in Cologne from May to October. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency has taken the initiative in organizing a committee of representatives of Jewish institutions and organizations of Jewish journalists and writers in various countries in order to arrange for the Jewish Section.

The Jewish Section will consist of two parts—one historic and the other modern. The historic section will illustrate the beginnings of the Jewish news service and its development up to the present day. It will contain historic documents bearing on the development of the Jewish news service and copies of the oldest Jewish newspapers, as well as of all newspapers which have played an important part in Jewish cultural life. There will also be illustrations of events of Jewish historic importance, and pictures of outstanding Jewish personages. It will trace the development of Jewish printing, especially of Jewish art printing in the Middle Ages. There will be on view examples of the work of the famous Hebrew printing presses of Amsterdam, Venice, Prague, etc.

The modern section will be subdivided according to countries, languages and subjects. Each newspaper will be represented by copies of its first issue, its jubilee numbers, special numbers and the latest issue. There will be pictures of the offices and printing houses of the big Jewish newspapers and photographs, etc., of important Jewish personages of the present day and copies of documents bearing on Jewish life in modern times. The Section will contain exhibits making clear the system of work of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Louis Marshall Praises Highly 'Jewish Daily Bulletin' at Gathering in Honor of Jacob Landau's Return from Europe

Unqualified support of the work of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin' was given by Louis Marshall, president of the American Jewish Committee, at a round table dinner conference held at the National Republican Club, Sunday night, at which a group of prominent New York Jewish leaders were present.

The dinner was given by a committee consisting of Dr. Cyrus Adler, James N. Rosenberg, Samuel C. Lamport and Harold Korn, in honor of Jacob Landau, managing director of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin', upon his return from a trip to Europe and Palestine.

James N. Rosenberg, vice-chairman of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, acted as toastmaster. Samuel C. Lamport, Congressman Emanuel Celler, Dr. W. I. Sirovich, Harry Berman, John L. Bernstein and Irving Rosenzweig participated in the discussion which followed a presentation by Mr. Landau of the work of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and 'Jewish Daily Bulletin'.

In outlining the history of the Agency and 'Bulletin', Mr. Landau stressed the non-partisan policy and the endeavor to be of service to the Jewish community, to increase the knowledge of Jewish affairs in the Jewish as well as the non-Jewish world.

In his address Mr. Marshall stated: "Frequent requests have been made for my opinion as to the value and importance of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin'. I wish to say without the slightest mental reservation that it has my unqualified approval. From the time when its reports were issued in mimeograph form down to the present day, I have made constant use of them in the course of my public activities, and have found frequent occasion to refer to its files in dealing with the manifold Jewish problems which clamored for attention. These publications have become increasingly valuable. The news which they gather from every quarter of the globe is presented in clear and concise form, without exaggeration, free from partisanship, and without the tinge of sensationalism. ESTABLISH SUMMER COURSE FOR JEWISH SOVIET SECRE- TARIES, ON JEWISH NEEDS

It was stated that support is to come through the cooperation of Anglo-American banking firms.

the Palestine government during the past year of the amount of \$10,000. Dr. Weizmann, however, observes, that the increased grant is still considerably less than it would be "if the allocation from the government education budget were divided between Jewish and other schools in strict proportion to the number of pupils receiving instruction."

The Zionist Executive also urges the Palestine government to hasten the promulgation of regulations for the protection of women and children in industry, in pursuance of the Workmen's Compensation Ordinance issued by the Palestine government last November. It specifically asks for adequate factory laws and the developing of a program of constructive labor legislation in accordance with the needs of the country.

The memorandum submitted to the Permanent Mandates Commission states that the amount of capital brought into Palestine by new immigrants during the year 1926 was very much less than in the previous year. The influx of such capital had almost entirely ceased by the end of the year, but there are signs that it will resume its course before very long. Of the persons who emigrated from Palestine in 1926, a certain number went back to Poland for the purpose of finally winding up their affairs there and returning to Palestine in due course with fresh capital, the memorandum states.

Concerning labor conditions and the present economic crisis in Palestine, the report lays emphasis on the fact that the unemployment situation was caused by the crisis in the building industry which was the result of the checking of urban development, which started in October, 1925. Owing to the leading position occupied by the building trade among the industries of Palestine, the depression it suffered seriously affected the whole economic life of the country. Nevertheless the other industries, apart from those subsidiary to the building trade, did not fare materially worse than in the preceding year.

During the year under review, the Jewish rural population of Palestine increased by 7,000 persons, including labor transferred from the towns to the colonies, according to the report. The total of the Jewish agricultural population at present is about 32,000.

According to the latest census, the number of Jewish workers in Palestine is 31,821, of whom 23,447 are in the towns. In July, 1926, there were 592 Jewish factories in the country, with an invested capital of 1,840,227 Egyptian Pounds. These factories employed 5,711 persons. This represents an increase as against 547 factories with an investment of 2,000,000 Egyptian Pounds, employing 5,000 persons, in July, 1925.

Concerning the unemployment situation the report states: "The excess of immigration shown in the totals for 1926 was obtained entirely in the first

seven months of the year; in each of the last five months there was actually an excess of emigrants over immigrants. During this period the number of emigrants was unusually high. Both phenomena were closely connected with the prevalence of unemployment, which was an outstanding feature of Jewish economic life in Palestine in 1926.

"During the first ten months of 1925 there was comparatively little unemployment in Palestine. Most of the spare labor of the country—including new immigrants—was absorbed by the building-trade and its subsidiary industries, which were kept working at full pressure to supply housing accommodation for the immigrants with means, who were arriving in large numbers throughout that period. From October, 1925, the immigration of such persons declined considerably, and there was a corresponding decline in the demand for new houses. The result was that a large portion of the working classes which catered for this demand was thrown out of employment, as no new industries had been created meanwhile which could have absorbed them.

"In October, 1925, the number of unemployed was about 1,000; in November it rose to 3,000, in April, 1926, it was 5,000, and in July, 6,000. In the next two months it dropped to about 4,000, but then rose again, and at the end of the year was about 6,500, with a tendency (in part seasonal) to rise further. Unemployment was acute chiefly in the building and subsidiary trades; in other trades it was not on the whole greater than in the preceding year.

"About half the unemployed were in the building trade and were in Tel Aviv, where the immigrants with means had mostly settled at first, and where consequently building had been most brisk. On November 21, 1926, the registered unemployed were distributed as follows: Jerusalem, 769; Tel Aviv, 3,221; Haifa, 1,206; Tiberias, 100; Afulah, 250; Petach-Tikvah, 700;

"Notwithstanding the state of the labor market, the various branches of the Labor Organization have extended and consolidated their activities, more especially in the social and cultural spheres, in which marked progress has been made in the period under review.

"The existence of this large number of unemployed constituted a social problem of great gravity. Active relief measures were taken by the Palestine Zionist Executive, some assistance being also promised, towards the end of the year, by the Palestine Government. Between April, 1926, and the end of the year, the Palestine Zionist Executive spent £13,671 on relief (not all for working people), £38,722 on relief works, giving one or two days' employment a week, and £9,988 on reserve works. The principal works promoted were road construction and building in Tel Aviv, drainage work in Haifa Bay, and road construction and building in Haifa. The Labor Department of the Palestine Zionist Executive has given special attention to the problem of the reabsorption of unemployed labor, and has, among other measures, been instrumental in transferring about 5,000 un-

WELTMAN, SOVIET ORIENTAL EXPERT, DIES AT AGE OF 56

Moscow, June 22.—Pavlovitch Weltman, well-known Soviet Orientalist, died here yesterday at the age of 56.

Weltman was the chancellor of the Moscow Institute for Oriental Science and was regarded as one of the leading experts on Imperial Eastern problems. He was also among the leading Soviet experts to participate in the Peace Conference at Brest-Litovsk with the Russian and German Government. During the period of 1921-1923 he was a member of the Commissariat of Nationalities.

HADASSAH CONVENTION OPENS IN ATLANTIC CITY

join in the common endeavor for the moral purification of the world, Mr. Montefiore declared.

A presidium was elected consisting of M. Oungre, representing the Jewish Colonization Association, Prof. Soberheim of Berlin, Herr Klempner of Vienna and M. Becker of Danzig.

Arthur More, vice-president of the Association to Combat White Slave Traffic, praised the work of the Jewish committees in Warsaw and in Lodz.

From reports submitted by Rabbi Halphon, Chief Rabbi of Argentine, and Rabbi Raffalovich of Brazil, it appears that the Jewish committees to combat white slavery have succeeded in rescuing hundreds of young women. The new arrivals are met on the ships and wrenched from the hands of the traffickers. A new branch of the Society to Combat White Slavery was formed in Montevideo, where the traffic has assumed appalling proportions. New branches are necessary in Mexico, Peru, Chile, in other Central American countries, and in Turkey, reports state.

Attention was drawn to the fact that the activities of the society cannot be extended to meet the requirements because of the lack of funds.

Jerusalem, June 22.—Definite assurances that measures will be taken to prevent the recurrence of the violation of Jewish holidays were given by the Zionist Executive and the administration of the Jewish National Fund.

The statements were issued in reply to protests voiced at public meeting held in Jerusalem and Tel-Aviv under the auspices of the Mizrahi Orthodox Zionist Organization.

DR. STEPHEN S. WISE LEAVES FOR EUROPE

Dr. and Mrs. Stephen S. Wise left for Europe yesterday on the "President Harding", their first objective being Paris.
