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VANNAY, FORD'S PROTEGE, GUILTY OF ASSAULT ON HUN- GARIAN JEWISH STATESMAN

But He and Molnar Get Light Sen-
tences from Court

Budapest, June 25.—Laszlo Vannay, Hungarian anti-Semite, who recently started European anti-Semitic circles by obtaining \$3,000 from Henry Ford for his anti-Jewish work, was tried yesterday by the State Court here for his participation in the attack on the life of Wilhelm Vaszonyi, late Hungarian Jewish statesman.

Vannay was tried together with Franz Molnar for responsibility in the attack on the late Wilhelm Vaszonyi on February 16, 1926. Vaszonyi died June 1, 1926 of injuries received in the assault on him.

Vannay was fined only 48 pengo. (1 pengo equals 17½c.) Molnar was sentenced to 3 days imprisonment and a fine of 15 pengo.

HUNGARIAN GOVERNMENT IGNORES APPEAL TO ABO- LISH NUMERUS CLAUSUS

Budapest, June 25.—An appeal to the Hungarian government that it take the initiative in abolishing the numerus clausus was made by Rabbi Loew in the Hungarian Senate at Friday's session.

It is the moral duty of the government to take the initiative in this matter as part of the consolidation problem, the senator urged. The appeal of Rabbi Loew brought no reply from the government bench.

JEWS ELECTED TO WARSAW MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT

Warsaw, June 25.—Recognition of the Jewish representatives in the Warsaw City Council was a feature of the constitution of the Council.

Jaworowski, representative of the Polish Socialist Party, was elected mayor of the City of Warsaw. Mr. Meisel, a Jewish councillor, was elected vice-president. Two of the secretaries are Jews, Mr. Hindes, representing the Jewish National bloc and G. Zybert, of the Jewish labor party Bund.

COMMUTES SENTENCE OF JEWISH WORKER

Kovno, June 25.—The death sentence of Henoch Segalowitch was commuted to imprisonment for 20 years.

Segalowitch was sentenced to death on the charge of "Communism". Clemency was granted by the Lithuanian president.

THIRTIETH CONVENTION OF AMERICAN ZIONISTS OPENS SESSIONS IN ATLANTIC CITY

Reorganization Plan Subject of Wide
Interest Among Delegates

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Atlantic City, N. J., June 26.—Over 500 delegates have already arrived to participate in the thirtieth annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America, which begins its sessions this afternoon at the Chelsea Assembly Hall. It is expected that 800 delegates will attend the sessions.

A familiar figure at the Convention is Dr. Schmarya Levin who at the request of the World Zionist Executive has made a special trip to the United States in order to participate in the Convention. It is understood that Dr. Levin has come here with a special and urgent message from Dr. Chaim Weizmann bearing upon the present extraordinary state of the movement.

The subject which for the most part forms the topic of the pre-convention discussions in the lobbies is the reorganization plan put forth by the Administration in its attempt to unify and coordinate Zionist activities in this country. It is generally felt that the present emergency situation in Palestine, which demands extraordinary efforts from the Zionists of America to meet it, calls for a complete overhauling of the Zionist machinery and this the proponents of the plan hope to accomplish by consolidating all Zionist effort and concentrating it within a single Administration.

A significant utterance, in support of the administration, is contained in a letter to Mr. Lipsky from Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, made public here.

Last night a conference was held in the Royal Palms Hotel of investors and others interested in the American Zion Commonwealth, which has recently undergone a crisis in its affairs. A complete report on the status of the Commonwealth was given by Mr. Nor-

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GERMAN DIGNITARIES PAY TRIBUTE TO JEWISH ARTIST

Berlin, June 24.—High dignitaries of the German republic paid tribute to Max Liebermann, the famous German-Jewish artist, on the occasion of his 80th birthday, when a Liebermann exhibition was opened at the Art Academy here.

Representatives of the arts, science, leaders and personages in political and social life, were present when Chancellor Marx and Minister of Education Becker, led the octogenarian to the seat of honor in the Art Academy. In the addresses delivered on the occasion, Prof. Liebermann was hailed as "the great master".

JEWISH ORGANIZATIONS PLAN CAMPAIGN AGAINST WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC

U. S. Quota Law Separating Families
Gets Share of Blame

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, June 25.—A vigorous campaign to combat white slave traffic among Jews was decided upon at the international conference of Jewish organizations which concluded its session here.

The conference adopted a number of recommendations submitted by various committees. The recommendations urged the committees to seek the co-operation of the local rabbis, including the Chassidic rabbis, to issue public pronouncements for the suppression of vice and to carry on an intensive enlightenment campaign through the issuance of pamphlets in the languages of the country and in Yiddish.

The conference also recommended that rabbis be asked to refrain from officiating at so-called secret weddings.

Rabbis and lay leaders of the communities are to be asked to assist in this campaign which will have the co-operation of the Jewish Colonization Association, the Alliance Israélite Universelle, the Hilfsverein der Deut-

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ATTEMPT TO CLEAR KINGS
COUNTY HOSPITAL OF CHARGE**

Attempts to clear the administration of Kings County Hospital of the charge of anti-Semitic bias resulting in mistreatment of Jewish patients and physicians were made during the week-end by the Alumni Association and the Medical Board of the hospital. The Alumni Association, at a meeting, adopted resolutions in which the mistreatment of three Jewish internes was termed "hazing" and a traditional custom. "No one escapes and it is usually accepted in the spirit in which it is given," the Alumni Association resolution declares.

The resolution also emphatically denied that any physician, nurse or patient ever was discriminated against because of race or religion and specifically there was no discrimination against Jewish internes in the past. The Alumni particularly defended Dr. Mortimer D. Jones, superintendent of the hospital and denied that there had been anti-Semitism in the past or present.

The medical board of the hospital issued a statement denying the charges of racial or religious discrimination in the hospital with regard to patients or the appointment of the visiting staff.

The Alumni Association also went on record as requesting Commissioner Bird S. Coler to reconsider his decision of evict the six suspended internes and to permit their return to the hospital pending the disposition of the case in court.

A new feature of the situation developed when the charge was made against two of the three Jewish internes, accusing them of misbehavior toward two nurses. The accusation that one of the internes attempted to kiss a nurse and that another interne publicly rebuked one of the nurses was ridiculed by Nathan Sweedler, attorney for the three Jewish internes. The attorney termed these charges a typical "Klan stunt" which is "always playing

Jewish farm women have been invited to attend the Conference on Rural Home Life which will meet on August 1st, at the Michigan State College, East Lansing, Michigan, according to an announcement by Mrs. Elmer Eckhouse, Chairman of the Department of Farm and Rural Work of the National Council of Jewish Women. Mrs. Eckhouse stated that the Jewish farm women have been invited for the first time to participate in this conference.

A special round table on the problems of the Jewish farm women, of which Mrs. Eckhouse will act as Chairman, will be held during the conference. Representatives from Europe and America attending the International Country Life Conference and the American Country Life Association will discuss proposals for bettering the conditions of the farmer and the rural districts.

schen Juden and the Independent Order B'nai Brith.

Louis Oungre, representing the Ica, proposed that the committees combating white slave traffic coordinate their activities with the Jewish emigration committees. He expressed the hope that the American institutions will help the conference in its decision to establish an international Jewish Fund to combat white slave traffic.

Rabbi Schoenfeld, in speaking on the subject, expressed his fear that the conference has exaggerated Jewish responsibility in this problem.

"We must not forget that the white slave traffic is an international problem and does not affect Jews alone." He urged that the steamship companies be warned against transporting women who are not properly accompanied.

London, June 24.—A deplorable condition existing in certain sections of the Jewish population in Eastern Europe was traced to the rigid enforcement of the United States immigration laws, which brought about the separation of families, at an international conference of Jewish organizations to combat white slave traffic, in session here.

The sanctity of the Jewish home, which has for centuries been the distinct characteristic of Jewish life, is no longer a dominant factor, Mme. Teplicka of Lodz, Poland, declared in her report. Many Jewish women have become victims of white slave traffic due to the post-war impoverishment of the masses, Mme. Teplicka stated. Mme. Teplicka also blamed the United States quota law which prevented thousands of women from joining their husbands.

Dr. Lubinsky of Kovno reported that due to the terrible economic crisis prevailing in Lithuania, prostitution has increased. Of the 1,200 prostitutes registered in Kovno, 241 are Jewish, he stated.

Mme. Blankstein of Vilna urged a program to provide farm and trade schools for Jewish girls. The speaker traced the deplorable condition to the change of political frontiers, the pogroms, the mass emigration, the separation of families, the condition of the "man without a country" in which many find themselves, the shortage of housing, the unemployment, starvation, and the rapid changes in the social structure of the Jewish population in Eastern Europe, when the Iutmensk class is rapidly disappearing.

RESOLUTION OF RABBIS' CONVENTION CALLS FOR INTERNATIONAL PEACE

Central Conference of American Rabbis Denounces Anti-Jewish Discrimination in Kings County Hospital

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cape May, N. J., June 25.—The renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy was called for in a report submitted yesterday by a Committee on International Peace, at the thirty-eighth annual convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis here. The report was read by Rabbi Joseph L. Kornfeld, of Toledo.

"International peace as an ideal found no finer expression than in our Bible," said the report. "The Prophets of Israel had not only a most beautiful vision of peace, but the best understanding of the means of its attainment. The Prophet Isaiah had given to the world the best formula for domestic tranquility and international peace when he said: 'The work of righteousness shall be Peace, and the effect thereof, quietness and assurance forever.'

"However distant the time when righteousness will become the spring of all our actions, thus removing all causes and provocations for conflicts, yet we hold firmly to the belief that the rule of right will eventually displace the rule of might. To this consummation, the best minds and hearts of humanity are working today possibly with greater zeal than ever before.

"Another indication of the aroused public mind in regard to international peace, and America's responsibility to promote it, was the prompt expression of the American people regarding our attitude toward Mexico and Nicaragua, in removing the differences that may occur between us and our neighbors. There was a will to peace on the part of the American people, and they demanded of those in authority to find a way to peace.

"The nation's attitude toward war-torn China is a matter of deepest concern of the lovers of peace in America and elsewhere. It is the hope of all right-minded people that China will soon return into the paths of peace, and that her unity and integrity will be unimpaired. It is very gratifying to note that our country, while doing her full duty to protect American lives and property, has been showing most commendable forbearance in a most irritating situation."

A suggestion submitted by the Com-

mittee on International Peace at the Conference recommended that the "Government of the United States should clearly show its desire to keep open the way for such further conversations as will lead to the adherence of the United States to the Permanent Court of International Justice."

The Conference Committee on Goodwill recommended the renewal of the pact with the Federal Council of Churches of Christ which affirms that "because of our mutual respect of the integrity of each other's religion and desire that each faith shall enjoy the fullest opportunity for its development and enrichment, these Committees have no proselytizing purpose."

Bitter denunciation of organizations which attempted to proselytize Jews was voiced by delegates attending the convention. "Proselytizing is a snake screen for anti-Semitism," declared Dr. M. H. Harris of New York, "and it is an insult to us that Christians should try to teach us a religion. This Conference should take a more aggressive attitude against the movement to proselytize the Jews, which is the parent religion of Christianity. It is an insult to our religion and also an attempt to undermine the faith of our people in Judaism."

Dr. Abram Simon of Washington, D. C., in his report on the Commission on Good Will declared that forty-nine cities have witnessed over one hundred good-will meetings during the year. The youth work, particularly in New York and Chicago, has developed friendly cooperation between young people's groups where programs of social educational nature have been evolved. Dr. Simon declared that the Commission is at work upon a program which calls for a scientific study by a commission of psychologists and social workers of the causes of the difficulties between the Jews and Christians and of the creation of a program for the removing or offsetting their cause. The report further stated "that the appeal to Christians to aid the Jewish relief work in Europe was strongly supported by the Christian members of the Commission on Goodwill."

"The religious life of the Jewish student must be carefully watched," declared a report of the Committee on Religious Work in Universities, read at the afternoon session yesterday by Rabbi I. E. Marcuson of Macon, Ga.

A resolution was unanimously adopted by the Conference condemning the recent outbreak of ill-treatment of three Jewish internes at Kings County Hospital, Brooklyn and commending Mayor Walker for his prompt action toward full investigation of this incident.

The motion was introduced by Dr. Abram Simon of Washington, and Dr. Frederick Cohen, of Omaha, Neb. The resolution read in part:

PALESTINE ARABS ABROAD SEEK NATURALIZATION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 18.—Of 3,600 Palestine Arabs living abroad who have applied for Palestine citizenship, 317 have been naturalized by the Palestine Government and another 900 applications are under favorable consideration, according to official figures published here.

The Arab press is dissatisfied with the Government's action and objects to the explanation of the officials that the applications of those who have been away from Palestine for more than five years cannot be considered.

The Arab press reports that a number of Palestine Arabs in Honduras have sent a petition to the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations and to Lord Plumer, the High Commissioner, protesting against the refusal of the Government to naturalize them.

In this connection the "Sawt Ashdud" writes: "We never heard about any regulations in the world whereby an emigrant is forced to return to his fatherland and stay there for a period equalling that required for a foreigner in order to secure his natural nationality, when he has real estate properties in his country of origin for which he pays heavy taxes to the Government.

"As this measure is not consistent with right and logic, nor with the principles applied by other nations, the people of Bethlehem, Betjala and Betsahr have deemed it necessary to establish a Committee for the defence of the rights of Palestinians abroad who are refused Palestinian nationality and to contemplate the organization of a Conference in Palestine devoted to this matter."

A group of Jewish physicians, specializing in urology and dermatology, have organized a campaign committee to raise \$100,000 for a urological department for the medical school of the Hebrew University. Dr. David Kaliski called the meeting to organize the campaign.

"Whereas, this evidence of anti-Semitic hostility in a city-owned institution is especially reprehensible, and shocks the sensibilities of well-thinking men and women of all denominations, and thus interferes with the orderly progress of good will in our national life,

"Therefore, be it resolved that the Central Conference of American Rabbis, in session assembled, condemns this recent outburst of ill-will and commends Mayor Walker for his prompt action toward a full investigation of this unfortunate incident."

"Our legal rights have been imperilled in this city hospital," declared Rabbi Louis Gross of New York. "This hospital belongs to all creeds and it is especially reprehensible that such a condition should exist in an institution of this kind."

PALESTINE CRISIS AS VIEWED BY GOVERNMENT

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 18.—Building operations in Palestine during 1926, as compared with the previous year, decreased considerably, according to the Department of Customs Excise and Trade, which published a report here in the "Commercial Bulletin" of the government. This was due to the trade depression that set in towards the end of 1925 as a result of the considerable immobilization of capital in land speculation and forward buying abroad, the report states. The appreciable decrease in the number of independent immigrants entering the country during 1926 is another reason for this decline. Large numbers of laborers were cast out of work as a result of the decline in building operations thereby aggravating the trade depression.

Tel-Aviv which alone invested some ££436,000 in 1925 spent only about ££270,000 in 1926. Labor conditions in this town are consequently difficult and this is reflected on the whole life of Tel-Aviv and with varying degrees on the other centres of the country.

Building operations in Jerusalem and Haifa, were more active in 1926 than in 1925, the approximate expenditure for Jerusalem being ££393,449 as compared with ££226,936 in 1925 and that of Haifa being ££156,003 compared with ££111,100 during the previous year.

Municipal expenditure of Public Works has increased in 1926 over 1925 by ££123,183. Expenditure by the Civil Government on Public Works increased by ££61,600.

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PALESTINE GOVERNMENT PLANS MODERNIZATION OF TIBERIAS HOT SPRINGS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Jerusalem, June 2.—Mr. Abramson, the District Commissioner of the Northern District of Palestine, attended an extraordinary meeting of the Tiberias Municipal Council held yesterday, and read a draft agreement submitted by the Government to the Municipality for the regulation of the development of the Tiberias Hot Springs. According to the agreement, the springs and the surrounding lands will belong to the Government which will let them to the Municipality. The Municipality would receive two-thirds of the profits.

The District Commissioner suggested that the agreement be approved by the Municipality. Otherwise, he proposed, the Municipality should agree to submit the matter to an arbitration committee headed by the Chief Justice of Palestine.

The Municipal Council has decided to appoint a commission to consider the question and report within two months.

Refusal of a wife to embrace her husband's religion after she had agreed to do so was termed cause for annulment of marriage in an opinion by the Appellate Division of the New York Supreme Court.

Albert Rustein, an Orthodox Jew, married Miss Gertrude E. Ruge, an Episcopalian, in Hoboken, in June, 1926.

Suing for annulment before Supreme Court Justice Delahanty, Rustein said that five days before the marriage he had told Miss Ruge he would wed her only on condition that she embrace the Jewish religion. She said she would do so, he testified. She further agreed, he said, that if there were any children they would be brought up in the Jewish faith.

After the ceremony by a Justice of the Peace, Rustein asserted, he asked her to make good her promise, but she refused, saying she had never had any intention of embracing his religion.

Justice Delahanty dismissed the complaint and Rustein appealed. In reversing the decision, the Appellate Division held that the husband's testimony justified an annulment. The vote was four to one, Justice Martin dissenting.

Among the countries whose quotas have been filled are Germany, with 31,227 immigrants; Great Britain and Northern Ireland, with 34,007; the Irish Free State, with 28,567; Sweden, with 9,561; Norway, with 6,433; and Poland, with 5,982 preference and non-preference immigrants.

Other countries filling their quotas are Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, the Free City of Danzig, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, New Zealand, Persia, Roumania, Russia and Spain.

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INCREASES EFFICIENCY—
MENTAL AND PHYSICAL

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HADASSAH TO RAISE \$120,000 FOR MEDICAL WORK

Atlantic City, N. J., June 25.—A decision to raise \$120,000 during the summer for the medical organization maintaining the hospitals and health centers and clinics in Palestine was taken at yesterday's session of the Hadassah Convention here.

The budget for the entire year is \$600,000. The expansion in the work of Hadassah includes the creation of educational facilities for the teaching of Jewish history to the members and for the study of Jewish problems in Palestine and the diaspora.

In addition to the Junior Hadassah, it was also recommended that a third Hadassah group be organized of young girls of the ages of twelve to eighteen as the "Younger Sisters" of the Junior Hadassah. This group is to be known as Hadassah Buds.

Steps to issue Jewish literature in Braille for the benefit of the Jewish blind throughout the country are being taken by the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, according to an announcement by Mrs. Walter Freiberg, president.

At present very little reading matter is available for the use of Jewish men and women who have lost their sight, except such transcriptions of general literature as have already been made in many languages. The National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods plans not only to provide for the adult blind but for the religious education of Jewish boys and girls who have lost their sight.
