PAINTING OF HEBREW UNIVERSITY OPENING IS PRESENTED TO KING GEORGE

To Be Brought to United States
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, June 29.—A painting of the opening of the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus, which took place on April 1, 1924, with the participation of Lord Balfour, was presented to King George at Buckingham Palace on Saturday.

The painting is the work of the Jewish artist, Pilichowsky. The presentation to the royal family was made in the Coronation Hall of the Palace. The King and the royal family expressed appreciation of the painting, which was taken from the Palace to the Whitechapel Art Gallery for exhibition. After the exhibition the painting will be taken to the United States.

URGE NUMERUS CLAUSUS BE EXTENDED AGAINST JEWISH LAWYERS IN HUNGARY

Budapest, June 29.—The demand that the Hungarian government introduce a numerus clausus against Jewish attorneys, limiting the number of Jewish lawyers at the Hungarian bar, was submitted to the government in a memorandum signed by 600 Hungarian lawyers.

The memorandum was submitted by a deputation of lawyers to the Minister of Justice, urging him to take steps to introduce the necessary legislation in parliament. The government was initiated and is being headed by former minister Doemoeter.

DR. FRANKEL LEAVES PALESTINE FOLLOWING SURVEY

Jerusalem, June 29.—Dr. Lee K. Frankel, one of the four Commissioners of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission of the Jewish Agency, accompanied by Dr. Maurice B. Hexter and Dr. Charles F. Wilinsky, are leaving Palestine today on their return to the United States.

When interviewed by press representatives, Dr. Frankel stated that during his stay in Palestine he visited 20 Jewish colonies of different types and that he inquired into all branches of Palestine life. He has obtained a picture of the situation which will enable him to participate in the preparation of the report of the Commission.

THIRTY COMMUNISTS ARRESTED IN HAIFA

Haifa, June 28.—Thirty Communists were arrested following a Communist demonstration here. During the demonstration inciting speeches were made in Arabic as well as Yiddish.

LIPSKY ADMINISTRATION IS RETURNED TO POWER BY ATLANTIC CITY CONVENTION

Heated Contest Over Candidacy of Abe Goldberg and Mrs. Kross; Paid Officials Ineligible for Administrative Committee, Is New Rule; Homogeneous Administration Demanded by Hadassah; Endorse Weizmann Policy

Atlantic City, N. J., June 29.—The Lipsky administration, somewhat modified and strengthened by the inclusion of new members in the Administrative Committee, was returned to power at the closing session of the thirtieth annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America which ended here last night.

Louis Lipsky, who came out the victor under the attack of the opposition, when on the day preceding the convention adopted the report of the administration by an overwhelming majority, was unanimously re-elected president by an enthusiastic vote of acclamation. Similarly, Miss Henrietta Szold was elected vice-president of the organization. The change in the composition of the administration was manifested in the fact that no other vice-presidents were elected as had been the case in previous years.

The Administrative Committee was reconstituted in such a manner as to bring about greater harmony and consolidation between the various constituencies and factions within the organization. For this purpose the number of members in the Administrative Committee was increased to 25 and includes, outside of the president, a number of spokesmen for the group which came into power following the

Cleveland convention, as well as a considerable element of the Brandeis group. The composition of the Administrative Committee, coupled with certain resolutions adopted by the convention concerning the administrative policies, were termed by the factions which remained dissatisfied with the result, as an introduction of "Brandeism without Brandeis." This opinion is better understood on the background of the opening days of the convention when the possibility of the return of Justice Brandeis to active participation in Zionist leadership was heatedly discussed.

The following were elected to the Administrative Committee: Samuel Rosensohn, Morris Rothenberg, Norvin R. Lindheim, I. D. Morrison, A. Liebowitz, Philip Wattenberg, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, Albert Rosablatt, Lawrence Berenson, Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan, Elihu D. Stone, Irma L. Lindheim, Mrs. Robert Szold, Mrs. Anna Moskowitz Kross, Mrs. Israel Goldstein, Mrs. Archibald Silverman, Judge William Lewis, Maurice Samuel, Harry P. Fierst, Isaac Meister, Louis Topkis, Dr. A. Coranick, Dr. David J. Kaliski and Jacob Fishman.

The formation of the new Administrative Committee was brought about not without considerable delay and a painful process of elimination and political combinations. As rumor had it, the fact that the Zionist constituencies were apparently divided over the Bran-

MEMORIAL TO JEWISH WAR DEAD IN BERLIN UNVEILED

Berlin, June 29.—Representatives of the government, including Generalissimo Heye of the German marine and representatives of the Jewish community were present at the unveiling of a war memorial to 3,500 Jewish soldiers who fell in the world war.

Thousands of Jewish soldiers who served in the Germany army during the World War attended the ceremonies. Addresses were delivered by Rabbi Leo Baeck and Herr Wolff, president of the Kehillah.

The addresses delivered by the representatives of the Jewish community contained a note of complaint that the fraternal spirit which was manifest during the war period has died and that the memory of the Jewish war dead has been desecrated by the anti-Semitic agitators. The speakers expressed the hope that the era of peace is near.

The army band played and Kaddish was said for the fallen soldiers.

CHAMBERLIN AND LEVINE GIVEN RECEPTION IN WARSAW

Warsaw, June 29.—Charles A. Levine and Clarence D. Chamberlin left here yesterday following a state reception given in their honor.

When interviewed by press representatives, Mr. Levine stated that he has no relatives in Warsaw and that he came to Poland not as a Jew but as an American.

**HABIMA HEBREW PLAYERS
TROUPE SAILS FOR EUROPE**

Twenty-five members of the Habima, the Hebrew players of Moscow, left yesterday on the Berengaria for Berlin where they plan to play during the summer season.

Four members of the cast, headed by Naum Zemach, founder of the Habima, are remaining in this country. It is the intention of Mr. Zemach to establish a Hebrew theatre and studio in New York and to continue his efforts for the organization of a Hebrew theatre in Palestine.

Anna Rovina and Tchemerinsky were among the players who sailed.

**MARGOLIS NAMED ORT
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

Jacob Margolis, formerly editor of the Detroit "Jewish Chronicle," was appointed Executive Director of the American Ort, following the resignation of Abraham Tuvim.

Of the 839 graduates from the University of Chicago at its regular spring commencement, 279 degrees were awarded to Jewish students.

One hundred and fifty-two Jewish students at Northwestern University received degrees at the Commencement Exercises at which 1,162 diplomas were awarded. Of the Jewish graduates, eighteen were among the honor students and two of them were mentioned for highest distinction.

**MAYOR WALKER STARTS INQUIRY ON DIS-
CRIMINATION IN CITY HOSPITALS**

The city wide inquiry into "customs and practices" existing in the city-owned and supervised hospitals, was begun yesterday afternoon by Mayor Walker. The inquiry started with Kings County Hospital, in which it is charged racial and religious discrimination has been practiced against internes and patients.

The Mayor's decision to hold an inquiry to determine how the city hospitals under the Departments of Health, Correction and Welfare are being conducted followed his trip to Kings County Hospital a week ago to investigate charges that six of the internes there had overpowered three Jewish internes early on the morning of June 20, gagged and bound them, immersed them in ice cold baths and strapped them to their beds.

Thousands crowded City Hall yesterday when Mayor Walker started his inquiry into anti-Jewish discrimination in Kings County Hospital. Dr. Mortimer Jones, superintendent of the hospital, on being questioned for three hours about the system of employing internes, admitted that an Internes Committee classifies the applicants into four groups, conducting confidential investigation and giving preference to "sons of leading citizens".

Mayor Walker exhibited applications of two internes who themselves stated that they had no high scholastic standing, yet they were admitted into the hospital while others more qualified were rejected. Mayor Walker stated:

"Sometimes, if not frequently, internes were admitted as a result of influence."

Dr. Jones admitted openly that this was true. Dr. Jones refused to admit that anti-Jewish discrimination was practiced in the hospital, stating that he had never received any complaints from patients or doctors except the last one. However, Mayor Walker declared that he would ascertain the truth of this through impartial investigation.

An interesting light on the religious attitude in the hospital was thrown by the testimony of Dr. Jones when answering Mayor Walker's question if applicants must answer the question to which religion they belong. Dr. Jones stated that a Committee of Internes decided last Thursday to eliminate this question from the application. When the Mayor asked why the question was not eliminated until now, Dr. Jones explained that he wanted God-fearing doctors on his staff and therefore he wanted to know their religion. However, now after the incident, he thought it would be better to eliminate this question because some applicants may consider it an offense.

After expressing his opinion that the system of employing internes should be changed Mayor Walker called on the witness stand Rabbi Louis Gross who was first to complain to the

Mayor on June 21 about the discrimination which was practiced in the Brooklyn hospital. The Mayor asked Rabbi Gross to prepare a list of all discriminating facts against patients and internes and to be ready with these facts for the continuation of the hearing which was adjourned until Friday at two o'clock.

In the meantime Rabbi Gross is to present these facts today to Mr. Higgins, Commissioner of Public Accounts.

More than fifty witnesses have been summoned to appear before Mayor Walker during the course of the hearing.

Court action on the hazing charges brought a week ago against six internes of the Kings County Hospital by three Jewish internes attached to the institution will be delayed a week or more, it was learned.

The hearing was scheduled for Monday morning, but was postponed at the request of both sides. Nathan Sweedler, counsel for Dr. Hyman Soloway, Dr. Louis Borow and Dr. Edward Katske, announced that more of the internes were involved in the attack and that he would seek to have them held.

Jesse W. Fuller, jr., chairman of the committee on character and fitness which examines Brooklyn applicants for admission to the bar, entered the case as an associate of Mr. Sweedler. He will assist in a voluntary advisory capacity. Bernard Bloch and Adolph Feldblum have also offered their services.

Counsel for the three Jewish internes have sixty witnesses prepared to testify at the Mayor's investigation into the city hospitals, which began yesterday.

**TALMUDIC HIGH SCHOOL
OF YESHIVA GRADUATES 48**

The Talmudic High School of Yeshiva College graduated forty-eight students at its ninth commencement exercises Sunday afternoon in the auditorium of the Central Jewish Institute, 125 East Eighty-fifth Street. The class, the largest ever graduated by the school, consisted of a January group of twenty-six and a June group of twenty-two students.

Highest honors went to Sanders Toflovsky and Emanuel Rackman. Fifteen other students won medals and prizes.

The commencement sermon was delivered by Dr. H. Pereira Mendes, pastor emeritus of the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue. Dr. B. Revel, head of the college; Dr. S. R. Safir, Principal of the high school, and Dr. Henry Keller were among the speakers.

Dr. Phillip Joseph, of Montreal, Canada, has been awarded the Laura Spelman Rockefeller scholarship. The scholarship carries with it a plan of travel including Moscow, Berlin, Hamburg, Paris, London, New York, Washington and San Francisco.

LIPSKY ADMINISTRATION IS RETURNED TO POWER BY ATLANTIC CITY CONVENTION

deis issue was taken advantage of by the Hadassah, the Zionist Women's Organization, which, according to rumor, had originally negotiated with the sponsors of Brandeis' return. It was reported that an understanding between the Hadassah leaders and the spokesmen for the Lipsky administration was reached, by which the new administration was to include a certain number of representatives of the Hadassah as well as a certain number of men who were formerly of the Brandeis group. With the argument that the new administration is to be of a homogeneous character that would be in a position to gain the one hundred per cent confidence of the Zionist public, the Hadassah leaders insisted on the exclusion of certain elements of the former administration.

In line with this trend, a policy was outlined, formulated in a set of resolutions, concerning the financial affairs of the organizations and limiting the rights of Zionist paid officials to be eligible for elective offices in the administration of Zionist affairs, in addition to the curtailment of the rights of the convention to fix the annual budget and to make the detailed allotments for the various activities of the organization—a prerogative transferred to the Finance Committee subject to the approval of the National Executive Committee. The convention, however, voted that paid Zionist officials may be eligible for election to the National Executive Committee. The ruling with regard to paid officials being ineligible to the Administrative Committee is not applicable to the president.

The issue was contested over the candidacy of Abraham Goldberg, vice-president of the Zionist Organization of America in the former administration and a member of the Administrative Committee, and that of Mrs. Anna Moskowitz Kross. The clash came when the Nominations Committee submitted its report. It appeared that notwithstanding the agreement reached between the administration and the Hadassah leaders, the majority of the Nominations Committee, headed by Elihu D. Stone of Boston, insisted on the inclusion of Abraham Goldberg in the Administrative Committee of 25. The minority, which was represented on the convention floor by Mrs. Archibald Silverman of Providence, presented an identical list of names with the exception that the name of Mrs. Anna Moskowitz Kross was substituted for that of Abraham Goldberg. The fight which ensued was bitter and many dramatic scenes impressed themselves upon the delegates.

The situation became more complicated when both parties argued that their insistence on the election of the candidate they favored was based on their desire to uphold the Lipsky administration. During the dispute Mr. Lipsky confirmed that the list presented by the minority of the Nominations Committee, including Mrs.

Kross's name, was the one suggested by the president. The sponsors of the Goldberg candidacy were animated by a feeling which was directly traceable to an opposition to the "feminine rule" and the action of the Hadassah to dictate its policy, as well as by the feeling that the older generation of Zionist workers is not to be brushed aside.

Both Mrs. Kross and Mr. Goldberg were given the floor on personal privilege. Mrs. Kross, declaring that she withdraws her name, argued that it was a question of principle involved in the issue. Similarly, Mr. Goldberg argued that he would not insist on his candidacy were it not for the principle involved. When voices in the audience shouted "Louder, louder," Mr. Goldberg replied, "I lost my voice yesterday in defense of the Lipsky administration." Mr. Stone, in urging the election of Mr. Goldberg, termed the insistence of the Hadassah leaders "an assassination on character."

The issue was finally put to a ballot at the late Tuesday night session, when Mr. Goldberg's candidacy was defeated by a majority of 20 votes.

The convention adopted the proposal of the Administrative Committee to bring about a merger of all Zionist publications in the English language into one national magazine, including the "New Palestine", the "Hadassah News Letter" and the "Young Judea."

The result of the vote was announced close to adjournment. Miss Henrietta Szold introduced a note of optimism in the depressed atmosphere of the convention following Mr. Lipsky's concluding remarks in which he said the convention did not produce what was expected.

Miss Szold expressed her confidence that the new administration and the reforms which it will institute will relieve the crisis in Palestine. "I prophesy one year from today there will be a different story to tell," she declared. Miss Szold disagreed with Mr. Lipsky's appraisal of the convention. She also criticized Rabbi Jacob Sanderling for his attack in a preceding address on the new element which is entering into the administration, which he had said could supply money but not soul, which comes from the East European Jews and his description of the present convention as a conflict between Eastern and Western Jews. Miss Szold said the Western Jews also have a soul and a union of the two elements will produce advantageous results.

The report of the American Zion Commonwealth was presented by Samuel J. Rosensohn. He accused Charles Passman, former manager of the Commonwealth, with exceeding his authority, neglect of duty and careless agreements with the Meshek. Judge Rosenblatt replied that the Commonwealth possesses assets of \$50,000 over liabilities, the assets consisting partly of lands worth more than the sums paid for them. He also stated that the last

PERMANENT MANDATES COMMISSION INQUIRES INTO PALESTINE SITUATION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, June 29.—The examination of the reports on the situation in Palestine, submitted by the Palestine government and the Zionist Executive, was taken up yesterday by the Permanent Mandates Commission.

The report of the Palestine government was amplified by oral statements made to the Commission by Sir John Shuckburgh, British representative to the Mandates Commission. The situation in Palestine has considerably improved during the last few years with regard to the relations between the Arabs and Jews. Better relations of mutual tolerance and goodwill have developed, he stated.

Several members of the Permanent Mandates Commission directed questions to the British representative concerning the Palestine Communities Ordinance, the Jewish colonists, the progress of Jewish agriculture and the financial crisis now prevailing in the country. Particular attention was drawn in the questions to the decrease in Jewish immigration to the country.

The examination of the reports will continue at today's session of the Commission.

acquisition in the Haifa Bay region, consisting of 45,000 dunam and a 25,000 dunam waterfront concession from the government for ninety-nine years is the key to Palestine.

Lawrence Benenson reported on the Palestine Securities, Inc. He stated that the company had a deficit of \$39,000. Judge Rosenblatt replied to this that the actual deficit is only \$19,000, because \$20,000 is due on bonds sold and \$19,000 was in the good investment of the good will of the business.

Dr. Schmarya Levine delivered the closing address of the convention, urging the Zionists to keep up their courage and continue in the work of upbuilding Palestine.

A resolution was passed extending to Nathan Straus wishes for his quick recovery from his illness.

Endorsement of the Weizmann policy was expressed in a resolution adopted, in which the American delegation to the forthcoming Zionist Congress was instructed to select the members of the Palestine Zionist Executive not according to party affiliation but according to expert knowledge and ability. Another resolution expressed support of the American Jewish Congress and recommended to each Zionist District to contribute ten cents for each member toward the Congress. The Administrative Committee was also instructed to take steps to organize Zionist units in all parts of the country.

Unveiling of two tablets at the Mount Sinai Sanatorium, near St. Agatha des Monts, Canada, was held Sunday afternoon. Louis Salomon, President of the Institution, presided at the ceremonies.

Leon Cohen, one of the honorary presidents of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of Montreal, of which the Sanatorium is a constituent society, Michael Hirsch, and Rabbi H. A. Abramowitz were the speakers.

AVUKAH CONVENTION

CHOOSES NEW OFFICERS;

RHOADE IS REELECTED

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Atlantic City, N. J., June 28.—Max Rhoads, of Washington, D. C., was unanimously re-elected national President of the Avukah, American Student Zionist Federation, at the second annual Convention of that organization, which concluded its three-day session here yesterday. Other officers elected on the new administration include five Vice-Presidents: Samuel Blumenfeld, of New York; Milton Goell, New York; William Bernard Rudenko, Philadelphia; Leo Schwartz, Boston; and Hymen Smoler, Chicago. Dr. Carl Goldenberg and Emanuel Aaronson, both of Washington, were elected Foreign Secretary and Treasurer respectively. Max Rhoads and Samuel Blumenfeld were also elected representatives of the Avukah on the National Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, with which the Avukah is affiliated.

Plans for the cultural and practical work of the Organization for the ensuing year were adopted. A national cultural committee, of which Leo Schwartz was named chairman, was appointed for the purpose of preparing comprehensive programs and material for the cultural work of the twenty-nine Avukah chapters in forty universities and colleges in the country. Other members of this committee include: Miss Rebecca Schmuckler, of New York; Rabbi Aaron Kessler, Dr. Julius Siegel and Miss Anna Harris, of Philadelphia, Mr. Max Schenk and Mr. Isaac Shapiro of New York.

The persecutions of Jewish students in Roumania were strongly condemned in a resolution passed by the Convention. A resolution was also passed by the Convention expressing sympathy for the young Zionists in Russia who are under imprisonment as a result of a policy of oppression adopted by the Soviet Government.

It was decided that the budget for the internal maintenance of the Avukah organization should have priority over the work for Palestine, but that all surplus funds should be applied to the support of whatever Palestine project is adopted.

SAIL TO VISIT PALESTINE

Leo Wolfson, President of the United Rumanian Jews of America and Hermin Speier, Executive Secretary, members of the Delegation of the American Jewish Congress to the Conference on Jewish Rights, which will be held in Zurich, Switzerland, on August 17, will sail for Europe on the S.S. Ile de France on July 2nd.

Mr. Wolfson will deliver an address on the present situation of the Jews in Roumania, at the Zurich Conference. Before going to the conference Mr. Wolfson and Mr. Speier will visit Palestine. Mr. Wolfson is a member of the National Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization of America.

Harry P. Fiester sailed last night with his family on the Berengaria for Palestine, where he will stay four weeks. Mr. Fiester will go to Basle to attend the Fifteenth Zionist Congress before returning to the United States.

More than 11,000 campers will be provided for in 24 camps conducted by constituent societies of the Jewish Welfare Board during the forthcoming season.

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GERMAN ANTI-SEMITIC PAPER, "BEOBACHTER," FINED

Berlin, June 28.—A fine of 500 marks was imposed upon a dealer for exhibiting an anti-Semitic picture in his shop.

The Cassel court fined the dealer Dolzberg 500 marks for exhibiting a picture from Hitler's organ, "Der Illustrierter Beobachter." The picture alleges to portray Jews cutting the throat of Saint Rudolf and catching the blood in a vessel.

The state attorney declared that by the inscription "Judenpiegel," the picture publicly insults a religious community. The court ordered the confiscation of all copies of the issue of the "Beobachter" in which the picture is printed and the destruction of all plates from which the picture was made.
