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## **BRITISH GOVERNMENT'S REPORT TO LEAGUE URGES CONSOLIDATION OF JEWISH POSITION IN PALESTINE**

**Equality of All Citizens and Good Government Is British Contribution to Jewish National Home**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, July 5.—The situation in Palestine as viewed by the British Government as the Mandatory Power was described in the report submitted by England to the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations at its session last week and made public here today.

According to the British government's report, the economic condition of Palestine is less favorable than last year. The financial situation of the Jewish population is unsatisfactory in comparison to the previous two years. This has affected trade generally.

While the public finances of the country are not unsatisfactory, the report proceeds, the situation demands a cautious policy.

The considerable increase in revenue is due mainly to the large influx of Jewish capital, but Jewish enterprise has not yet succeeded and cannot immediately succeed in increasing the country's production to a level which would maintain its increasing population. Therefore, expenditure must be kept low, because of the difficulty in insuring financial stability.

It is possible that there is some danger that unduly pessimistic inferences will be made from the present situation regarding the establishment of the Jewish National Home, the report states. While the facts controvert those optimists who demand unrestricted immigration, criticize the government and urge a forward colonizing policy, it must be remembered that time is the essential, perhaps the prime factor in effecting a successful Jewish settlement in the country. All availa-

ble monies and efforts should now be directed toward the consolidation of positions already gained.

The report praises the spirit and fortitude of the Jewish population during the crisis and their determined struggle through the difficult period.

Answering the Mandates Commission's question as to what measures are being taken to secure the establishment of the Jewish National Home in Palestine, the government states in the report that its policy aims to place all inhabitants, irrespective of race or religion, on a footing of equality. ## **EXPULSION OF JEWS FROM HUNGARY IS CONTINUED**

Budapest, July 5.—The authorities continue their policy of expulsion of Jews. Even those whose fathers were born on Hungarian soil, but whose grandfathers came from Eastern Europe, are not spared.

Among those who were to be expelled was a family by the name of Losh, which had been domiciled in Hungary for the last 150 years. When the head of the family learned that they were to be driven from their home, he attempted to commit suicide. The city authorities have granted him time in which to make an appeal.

## **WARSAW JEWS UNABLE TO SUPPORT CULTURAL BODIES**

Warsaw, July 5.—The Kehillah Council rejected all motions for subsidies for cultural institutions. A motion that support be extended to the widow of J. L. Peretz, who was for some years an official of the Kehillah, was also defeated.

## **ANTI-SCHECHITA BILL IS DEFEATED IN NORWAY**

## **CONSERVATIVE JUDAISM URGED TO ASSERT ITSELF IN AMERICAN JEWISH LIFE**

**Rabbis of United Synagogue Meet in Annual Assembly; Renew Recommendation for \$5,000,000 Campaign to Strengthen Traditional Judaism; Theological Differences to Be Ignored as Unity in Practical Work Is Necessary**

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Asbury Park, N. J., July 5.—The religious future of American Jewry rests with the United Synagogue, the branch of American Jewry which stands between the ultra-Orthodox and the ultra-Reform. This was the gist of the message of Rabbi Max Drob of New York City, president of the Rabbinical Assembly of the Jewish Theological Seminary, in his message delivered before the twelfth annual convention of this ecclesiastical body, which opened here at the Hotel Clarendon Brunswick today.

About 100 rabbis, graduates of the Jewish Theological Seminary, and leaders of congregations throughout the United States and Canada were present at the first session of the Assembly.

Mayor C. E. F. Hetrick, welcomed the delegates in behalf of the city. Rabbi Max E. Davidson, of Asbury Park, delivered the prayer opening the convention. Among the outstanding leaders of Conservative Judaism who

are participating in the convention are Professor Louis Ginsburg, Dr. Cyrus Adler, Professor Davidson, Rabbi Max Drob and others.

In his presidential message Rabbi Drob urged the leaders of Conservative Judaism to reassert its position in American Jewish life. He further expressed his opinion that close observance of Jewish life in America must agree that Reform Judaism is decaying, while Orthodox Judaism, which he termed East European Judaism, must prove ineffective if its leaders will not

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## **STATISTICS ON DESECRATED GERMAN JEWISH CEMETERIES**

## **GERMAN CHANCELLOR RE- CEIVES ALFRED M. COHEN**

Berlin, July 5.—Alfred M. Cohen, president of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith, will be received by Chancellor Marx. Last night Mr. Cohen was the guest of honor at a dinner arranged by the Berlin lodges of the Order.

Mr. Cohen arrived in Germany a few days ago from London, where he installed the officers of the Grand Lodge comprising England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland. He also visited lodges in Amsterdam and Rotterdam.

From Berlin he will go to a number of German cities and will then proceed to Czechoslovakia, Austria, Switzerland and France.

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**HEAD OF HUNGARIAN  
LANDESKANZLEI DIES**

Budapest, July 5.—F. Mezzy, the  
newly elected president of the Jued-  
ische Landskanzlei, died here today.  
Mr. Mezzy was formerly secretary of  
the Landskanzlei and was for many  
years one of the most active members  
of the Jewish community in Hungary.

The Landskanzlei is composed of  
the so-called Neolog part of the Hun-  
garian Jewish community. While they  
are distinct from the Orthodox Jewish  
community, they are conservative as  
compared with the Reform Jewish  
communities in Germany and the United  
States.

**HAKOAH WINS AUSTRIAN  
SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Vienna, July 5.—Guth and Loewy,  
two members of the Hakoah Vienna  
sports club, were the winners of the  
women's and men's swimming cham-  
pionships of Austria for 1927. The  
championship swim comprised the  
length of the city on the Danube.  
They were presented with wreaths tied  
with the blue and white colors.

Another Hakoah member, Ernst  
Stern made the record for the swim  
from Vienna to Krems, a distance of  
75 kilometers, which he covered in  
seven and a half hours. Stern is pre-  
paring to swim the English Channel.  
He will be the first Austrian to make  
this attempt.

**DIAMOND INDUSTRY PROTEST  
AFFECTS JEWISH WORKERS**

Antwerp, July 5.—Thousands of Jew-  
ish workers are among the 15,000 af-  
fected by the critical situation in the  
diamond industry here.

By a decision of the Employers As-  
sociation, in agreement with the Work-  
ers' Syndicate, work in the whole  
industry will be stopped on July 11, in  
protest against the South African Sena-  
te's Bill limiting the alluvial diamond  
production.

It is expected that Amsterdam will  
join in the protest.

**HAZED JEWISH INTERNES TELL OF PERSISTENT  
DISCRIMINATION AT KINGS COUNTY HOSPITAL**

How Jewish patients suffered because  
of racial discrimination in Kings Coun-  
ty Hospital was told yesterday at the  
public hearing conducted by Mayor  
Walker at City Hall, by Dr. Louis  
Zweifel, one of the Jewish internes  
hazed at the hospital on the night of  
June 20th by their Gentile colleagues.

"In October, 1926," Dr. Zweifel re-  
lated, "I was assigned to the female  
ward to treat Mrs. Kessler, a Jewish  
patient who suffered from heart trou-  
ble. During the time she was under  
my care she was satisfied with the  
medical treatment received. About two  
weeks later I received another assign-  
ment but when visiting my old cases  
the woman told me how poorly the  
Gentile internes treated her. They call  
me 'kike' and 'Jew,' the woman cried.  
She was compelled to address her com-  
plaints to the officials of the hospital,  
and to communicate with outside indi-  
viduals."

Dr. Zweifel also related that phone  
messages were never delivered to him  
even when the messages came from  
nurses on duty. "The nurses used to  
tell me later when I came to the ward  
that they called me with regard to the  
patient, but never were any of their  
calls delivered to me.

"In a conversation with Dr. Curry,  
assistant superintendent of the hospital,  
I complained to him about the miser-  
able life I was living and about the  
petty quarrels that made my life in the  
hospital bitter. I couldn't afford to  
leave the hospital. Dr. Curry agreed  
with me, stating that this is purely one  
of the tricks to get rid of Jewish in-  
ternes."

To illustrate how anti-Semitism was  
practiced as a policy in the Kings Coun-  
ty City Hospital, Dr. Zweifel told of a  
case where a Gentile interne, Dr. Camp-  
bell, frankly admitted, in conversation  
with him, that he is compelled not to  
greet him. Dr. Campbell used to greet  
Zweifel only when alone. Taking him  
out once for a ride in his car, Dr.  
Campbell apologized before Zweifel  
for the general attitude.

"You don't know how badly I feel  
about the anti-Semitism in our institu-  
tion. I am almost ready to resign,"  
Dr. Campbell had told Dr. Zweifel.

Describing his humiliations, Dr. Zwei-  
fel continued to testify about the pro-  
fessional embarrassment which he suf-  
fered at the hands of nurses and offi-  
cials entirely because of his Jewish  
faith. "It interfered many times with  
the efficiency of my medical duties," he  
stated.

Dr. Aaron Trainin of Brooklyn Zion  
Hospital was the second witness to tes-  
tify at the hearing about the anti-Jew-  
ish discriminations practiced at the  
Kings County Hospital where he worked  
as physician in the summer of 1921.  
"Dam Jew" was the phrase constantly  
repeated by internes to Jewish patients,"  
Dr. Trainin told the Mayor.

Permission was asked by Dr. Trainin  
of the mayor not to relate publicly a  
certain incident which took place in the

Kings County Hospital while Trainin  
was working there in the laboratory.  
"Because of professional ethics I would  
prefer to relate this incident to the  
Mayor privately," Dr. Trainin said. The  
Mayor granted his request.

A graphic description of the humili-  
ations suffered by Jewish internes was  
also given by Dr. Hyman Soloway who  
was the first Jewish interne to be ap-  
pointed in the Kings County Hospital,  
since 1916. He has been there since  
1925.

"The first day I entered the hospital  
I had to sit alone in the dining room.  
I tried on the next day to sit at an-  
other table where the Gentile internes  
were seated, but was snubbed and ig-  
nored. Not suspecting any anti-Sem-  
itism, I sat at a different table, but here  
also I was totally ignored. Things  
grew worse from day to day, but I did  
not complain because I knew if my  
complaints would not be rectified, con-  
ditions would become worse.

"Once I came up to my room and  
found things upset, my books torn, my  
bed turned over. I did not complain  
even then, but when this continued for  
two months two or three times each  
week, I complained to the office, but  
received a very cold answer.

"After making this complaint, I al-  
ways kept my door locked, but this  
was of very little help. The next week  
I found the door open and the room  
full of broken eggs. My clothes were  
all smeared and my books scattered  
and messed. This has never been done  
to Gentile internes. Even the janitor  
who used to clean my room was fur-  
ious."

Dr. Soloway went on to relate how  
everybody but Jewish internes were  
invited to the graduation exercises of  
the nurses' training school. Once when  
he was passing by a group of internes  
and nurses, he overheard a part of  
their conversation. "What does that  
Jew want here? We don't want any  
Jews," they had said.

The case of the three hazed internes  
will be brought to court in Brooklyn  
tomorrow.

**ARABS ASK REPRESENTATION  
IN JEWISH LABOR FEDERATION**

Jerusalem, July 5.—A petition signed  
by 600 Arab workers was submitted to  
the conference of the Histadruth Ha'  
Ovdim, the Jewish labor organization  
in Palestine, at its session today. In

the Histadruth. Five Arab delegates  
were elected to the conference.

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adopt modern methods in promulgating the ancient faith.

Rabbi Drob formulated a demand that leaders of the Jewish Theological Seminary and the institutions affiliated with it should launch a campaign for \$5,000,000 to strengthen traditional Judaism in the United States. This recommendation was made a year ago by the Rabbinical Assembly but could not be put into effect due to prevailing conditions. It is now time that the effort be launched, Rabbi Drob declared.

In the president's message were included a number of recommendations for raising the status of the rabbinate and improving conditions in the congregations. One of the recommendations called for the establishment of a rabbis' pension fund, similar to those created by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and various Christian denominations. An initial sum toward this fund was made available by Mr. William Praeger. A sum of \$500,000 would be necessary to establish this fund, the president stated. This item should be included in the \$5,000,000 to be sought by the Assembly and the United Synagogue.

In his address Rabbi Drob declared: "It requires no prophetic vision to realize that the future belongs to the type of Judaism which we are promulgating. Reform Judaism died spiritually at the Pittsburgh conference in 1885 and only as a social force has it since maintained some semblance of life. With the growth in social power of the Jews from Eastern Europe even this social prestige is being wrested from it. The symptoms of decay are plainly visible in the large cities and will no doubt spread to the smaller communities. Likewise the East European Judaism, which refuses to utilize modern methods in promulgating the ancient faith will prove ineffectual. If Judaism will prevail, it will be a Judaism of our type, which, deeply rooted in the past, will use every modern method for preserving it in the present and thus transmit it unimpaired to the future," he declared. "To attain these results we must strengthen the hands of the Jewish Theological Seminary and the United Synagogue, both of which are essential to us in promulgating traditional Judaism.

"It is this practical work which must occupy our time even to the exclusion of theological and doctrinal bickerings," Rabbi Drob continued. "There are those who claim that the theological differences in our midst preclude action on the part of the Rabbinical Assembly. Those who argue that ignore Jewish history. Was there ever unanimity in Israel on the theological question? Surely not in the days of the prophets, for the Talmud already realizes the differences between Isaiah and Ezekiel in their vision and conception of God.

"Surely not in the days of the Rabbis, when Beth Shammai and Beth Hillel

debated the most difficult conceptions of theology. Surely not in the days of Maimonides when his views were challenged in no uncertain terms by a Raved. However, they all agreed on the binding character of the Torah and the sanctity of the ceremonial law. They all labored together for Jewish observance in the synagogue, the school and the home.

"Following their example, let us as individuals retain our various theologic and philosophic differences but as an Assembly, let us strive to make traditional Judaism a reality in the land," he declared.

"Let this be our motto: The secret things belong unto the Lord our God, but those things which are revealed belong to us and to our children forever that we may do all the words of our Torah.

"I am certain that American Jewry will rally to the cause even more liberally than in the last campaign when over one million dollars was pledged and over \$400,000 in additional pledges were received as a result of the campaign, though not credited to the campaign committee.

"It is about time that we assert ourselves in every phase of Jewish life. We are now one of the strongest bodies in Judaism and must be reckoned with in every movement. It is fully admitted, for example, that our men bear the brunt of the United Palestine Appeal throughout the land. We are therefore justified in demanding that the upbuilding of Palestine be spiritual as well as economic. We should make it clear that a godless Palestine is a contradiction in terms and that only adherence to the Torah can justify our existence as a separate people.

"Likewise, we must utilize every ounce of our strength for making traditional Judaism prevail. Ours will be the task of maintaining the pristine sanctity of the Sabbath and Kashruth and the preservation of Hebrew as the language of prayer in the synagogues and as the medium of instruction in the Hebrew schools. We look askance at the terrible decline in the use of Hebrew books in the home and unless something is done to create a market for Hebrew books in America, we will soon be the people without the Book.

"Above all, it should be our task to restore the sanctity of the Jewish home and to resist every effort to tamper with the divine institution of marriage," the president declared in his message.

The sessions of the convention will continue until Thursday. Governor Moore will be one of the speakers at the dinner to be held tomorrow night.

## MORTIMER L. SCHIFF REPORTS JEWISH BOARD OF GUARDIANS' PROGRESS

Expansion in the work of the Jewish Board of Guardians along the lines of psychiatry, mental hygiene, firmer contacts with the public schools and growing confidence in the work of the Board are listed as accomplishments of the last year in the sixth annual report of the organization submitted to the State Legislature and Mayor Walker by Mortimer L. Schiff, president.

Progress was also reported toward a more highly trained staff of volunteer workers and better co-ordination between the various sub-divisions of the society, which is charged with the handling of delinquency problems among Jewish children. The Federation of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, of which the Board of Guardians is a constituent agency, contributed \$225,681 toward its work and the City of New York \$103,250, according to the report.

"Subject to the limitation of the financial support accorded to us," Mr. Schiff said, "we are covering the ground without the confusion arising from the disconnected efforts of unrelated societies. We are cutting down the expenses and wasted effort of over-large activities, and since we are treating the matter of delinquency in its entirety, there is developing, as the year passes, a greater understanding of the characters of the unfortunates with whom we deal, as well as a more practical knowledge of what it is humanly possible to do for them.

"Since there is scarcely a case of wrongdoing or violation of law that is not involved with other cases or with conditions that need correcting, it makes it obvious that the only way to deal with them is to take them as a whole and not as isolated problems. The problem of the delinquent boy, for example, may also be the problem of a broken home, and that of the wayward girl, the problem of incompetent parents. All the forces at our command must be turned to get at the underlying causes and to bring about a better showing in future years.

"From the mildly difficult child to the most hardened criminal," he report continued, "our treatment will always have prevention in view. These departments deal with boys and girls between eight and sixteen who have not been in correctional institutions and are young enough to strengthen our efforts with a large measure of helpfulness.

Contrary to general belief, the majority of children do not come from the Children's Court. Only 10 per cent of the 422 new cases accepted last year came from the court, others being referred by parents, social agencies, the Board of Education and similar sources.

"During the year," the report said, "934 boys and 528 girls were under supervision and on the last day of the year 447 boys and 223 girls were of the committee. Of 745 cases closed during the year, 222 were closed with satisfactory adjustments and 76

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## WASHINGTON OFFICIALS TO CONFER WITH CHAS. LEVINE'S REPRESENTATIVES

Washington, D. C., July 5.—A conference will be held in New York City between representatives of the Department of Justice and Samuel I. Hartman and Charles H. Innes of Boston, attorneys for Charles A. Levine, after the latter's return to the United States this month. The conference will concern the Government's half million dollar claim against Levine in connection with post war salvage material, the Jewish Daily Bulletin correspondent here is informed by the Department of Justice. The purpose of the New York Conference will be to reach an amicable settlement if possible, otherwise a civil suit against Levine will become necessary.

It was repeated by Department officers that there is nothing unusual in this claim against Levine. More than one hundred claims of a similar character against other parties are pending.

Some resentment was expressed against the efforts made by New York Jewish newspapers to give the impression that anti-Jewish feeling is involved. This is incorrect, officials declare, asserting that the government would have been more insistent in its claim which was pending before Levine made the non-stop trans-Atlantic flight but has shown Levine every courtesy.

create conditions favorable to the development of the Jewish settlement in Palestine, it states.

The report enumerates the number of Jewish immigrants to the country, the increase in the land acquired for Jewish settlement, the expenditures of the Zionist Organization in promoting the development of the country. It also refers to the Jewish Agency agreement.

Jerusalem, July 5.—The economic conditions in Palestine will be described in a Blue Paper to be issued by the Palestine government. A decision to issue a report on the economic conditions in the country was made by the Palestine administration.

C. B. Lewis, head of the Klan in New York State, declared that the Klan stands for registration of immigrants and the deportation of aliens found guilty of violating the law. Franklin Ford also addressed the Klansmen.

The Maccabee soccer team of Palestine played the first game of their United States tour at Hawthorne Field, Brooklyn, Sunday afternoon against the Brooklyn Wanderers. The Wanderers were the victors, scoring 2 goals to the Maccabees' 1.

A crowd of 300 witnessed the match. All the scoring was done in the first half, the Maccabees being the first to take the lead.

## JOSEPH MARCUS, LATE BANKER, LAID TO REST

Funeral services for the late Joseph S. Marcus, President of the Bank of the United States, who died on Sunday, were held Monday in the Temple of the Congregation Bnai Jeshurun, West 88th Street, New York.

The services were conducted by Dr. Israel Goldstein, assisted by the Rev. Jacob Schwartz, cantor.

The funeral cortege was headed by a police motorcycle squad. Burial was in Union Fields Cemetery, Brooklyn.

Among those attending the services were Supreme Court Justice Aaron J. Levy, Judge Albert J. Cohn of the Bronx County Court, George C. Van Tuyl, former State Superintendent of Banks; Joseph H. Cohen, President of Beth Israel Hospital; Max Weinstein, and Magistrate Maurice H. Gottlieb.

Joseph Marcus became prominent in banking circles after coming to America as an immigrant boy. He was born April 9, 1862, at Memel, Germany, near the Russian border. When he was sixteen, with little more than his passage money, he came to New York.

Mr. Marcus found employment as a tailor in a clothing shop. He remained at this trade for twenty-five years.

In 1906 he founded the Public Bank of New York, of which he became president and director.

Six years later he founded the Bank of the United States.

were referred for continued service to other agencies. Most of the offenders are listed as 'incorrigible'—there were 104 truants, 50 were referred because of improper guardianship, 21 were runaways, 31 were brought to the Children's Court because of stealing, and 13 refused to work."

The report discussed the work of the constituent agencies, especially the Hawthorne School for delinquent boys and the Cedar Knolls School for delinquent girls, with Mr. Borg as Vice Chairman of the joint committee for both and Mrs. Arthur Hays Sulzberger as Chairman of the Cedar Knolls subcommittee. At the end of last year Hawthorne had 216 inmates and Cedar Knolls 38. At the boys' school 68 inmates were orphans or came from homes where parents were divorced or separated.

The Committee on Field Activities, of which Mrs. Sidney C. Borg is chairman, and Edward S. Greenbaum vice-chairman, with headquarters at 228 East Nineteenth Street, reported good results with preventative work.

Besides Mr. Schiff, the officers of the Board are Henry Solomon and Mrs. Morton M. Menken, Vice-Presidents; Sidney C. Borg, Treasurer, and Edgar J. Kobler, Secretary.

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## GERMAN GOVERNMENT CONFIRMS BERLIN KEHIL- LAH COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Berlin, July 5.—The government confirmed the elections of the Jewish community in Berlin held May 1926. According to the elections the Zionist conservatives will have 11 representatives while the Liberals will have 10 members. This election ends the Liberal majority uninterrupted in the council for more than a hundred years.

## TELLS OF EDUCATION AMONG PALESTINE NOMAD TRIBES

London, July 5.—The educational work being done among the nomad tribes in Palestine was described by Mr. Bowman, Director of Palestine Education, at the Imperial Education Conference here.

Mr. Bowman stated travelling teachers are provided for the nomad tribes. Some of the tribes are building permanent schools and this may have an important political effect in settling them, he said.

## POLISH ZIONISTS OPEN THEIR EIGHTH CONVENTION

Warsaw, July 5.—The eighth conference of the Zionists of Poland opened here today. One hundred and thirty-eight delegates are present from all parts of the country.
