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FORD CONSIDERED JEWS ESSENTIAL TO WORLD, J. A. PALMA EXPLAINS

Throws Light on Steps Leading to Ford's Recantation

An explanation of his part in bringand about Henry Ford's apology was given by Joseph A. Palma, head of the United States Secret Service in New York, in a statement to the press.

In his statement Mr. Palma said that it was he who gave Mr. Ford the first intimation that misstatements of fact were appearing in "The Dear-born Independent". The Secret Servborn Independent". The Secret Service man went to Ford to complain about errors that had appeared in another article, and during the conference mention was made of the anti-Jewish articles. The retraction of last week, the Palma statement says, was made "without thought of personal gain, politics or anything else except to right a wrong to the very best of his ability." The statement in part read:

"Several months ago 'The Dearborn Independent' published an article in which my department was interested. At my first opportunity I took this up with Harry Bennett, chief of the Ford sercret service, whom I have known for a number of years, and called his attention to a number of inaccuracies. When I questioned him as to where he got such information, he made it very plain indeed that his department had had nothing to do with gathering it; that it had been handled entirely by the organization of 'The Inde-pendent'.

"I then asked him if the same thing was true in regard to the Jewish articles, and he said that it was; that the Ford secret service had had nothing to do with them. Then he further surprised me by saying that Mr. Ford was really an admirer of the Jews.

"'He regards them as an essential people,' he said. "Subsequent to my talk with Ben-nett we called on Mr. Ford and took

OVER 100 DEAD IN PALESTINE EARTHOUAKE TENTATIVE SURVEY SHOWS

N. Y. Head of U. S. Secret Service Hebrew University and Jerusa'em Public Buildings Damaged in Earthquake; Tel Aviv, Haifa and Tiberias Unaffected; Christian Holy Site Suffers Shock; Situation Not Alarming, Zionist Executive States

Jerusalem, July 12 .- Over 100 persons on the Mount of Olives were shaken were killed in Palestine cities and vil- during the earthquake vesterday afterlages during the carthquake Monday noon. afternoon, tentative figures published here indicate.

According to the list compiled 60 persons were killed in Nablus, 12 in Ramleh, 30 in Ludd (railway junction) and two in Jerusalem.

The Mosque of Omar, the Moslem shrine erected by the followers of Mohammed on the site of Solomon's Temple on Mount Moriah, was badly damaged by the shock, as was the govern-ment house on the Mount of Olives.

In addition to the dead in the cities, there were a number of casualties in the villages. No definite information as to the number has been ascertained.

BRITAIN SHOULD PRESERVE PALESTINE ANTIQUITIES SAYS SIR FLINDERS PETRIE Urges Creation of Palestine Museum to House Results of Excavations (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 12.-The creation of a Palestine museum to preserve the antiquities of the country is the obligation of the mandatory power in the opinion of Sir Flinders Petrie, famous British archaeologist who is advocat-

ing the idea of a Palestine Museum. Writing today in the "Times", Sir Flinders Petric urges the establishment of a Palestine museum in London. "Britain is responsible for the management of Palestine," he writes, "therefore it is under obligation to conserve its remains and history. There is not adequate spare space in the British Museum. The Palestine Exploration Society has a valuable collection in space incapable of re-The important disceiving more. coveries at Gerar by the expedition of the British School of Archaeology are now being shown at the London University. But the collection must be removed in a few weeks and it has nowhere to go.

"It is a thankless task for the excavators to struggle in their searches if the results of their investigations are not properly housed," Sir Flinders declares.

The buildings of the two institutes of

the Hebrew University were badly cracked and experimental machinery in the Chemistry department was destroy-The damage to the Hebrew University was estimated at several thousand pounds.

Research work at the Hebrew University had to be discontinued due to versity had to be discontinued that to the serious damage to the buildings and equipment. Dr. Judah L. Magnes, for-merly of New York, who is dean of the University, announced today that the lectures will have to be continued until the end of the term in a hall in the city.

Semi-official figures made known this morning place the deaths in Jerusalem and vicinity at twenty-five. Reports received today from Tel-Aviv, Haifa and Tiberias confirm the previous messages that the cities were not affected by the shock.

The Jewish population does not seem to have suffered casualties.

(The Institute of Jewish Studies is conducted on the income of a \$500,000 fund established by Felix M. Warburg and administered by the New York Community Trust. A fund of \$250,000 was created by the late Sol Rosenbloom of Pittsburgh. Upon his death Mrs. Rosenbloom donated the amount of \$500,000 to erect a building to house the Institute).

Jerusalem, July 12 .- A scientific record of the earthquake which shook Palestine yesterday, made by a seisme-graphic apparatus in Tel Aviv, shows that the quake moved from north to somb.

A tentative survey made by government officials discloses the approximate extent of the damage. The Allenby bridge was damaged at both ends. The Government House located on the same Mount was badly damaged. The private rooms of the High Commissioner, Lord Plumer, and Lady Plumer, who are now on vacation in England, were wrecked. This building was also declared unsafe by the authorities.

Jerusalem, July 12.-The earth tremor here yesterday afternoon lasted seven seconds. The building where the Zionist Executive is housed was one of the many in the Old City damaged. Many houses on the Mount of Olives col-lapsed. Four persons were killed.

Concurrent with the earthquake in

Palestine severe tropical storms swept over European cities and earthquakes were felt in various parts of the world. Tremblors were reported in Euroa, Victoria and in Cairo, Egypt. In Lon-don the storm interrupted traffic. Streets and tube stations were flooded and windows were broken by hailstones. Paris was almost flooded.

A cablegram received by the Zionist Organization of America from Col. Frederick H. Kisch, political representative of the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem, stated:
