THREE HURT AS PALESTINE IS SHAKEN

BY ANOTHER EARTH QUAKE-

Many Houses Damaged; Americans Escape Injuury; Straus Praised By Arabs.

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, July 18 - Three of barracks to house the families of persons were slightly wounded during a small earthquake shock felt in

the country Sunday morning.

Although the new tremor caused no damage in Jerusalem, some added loss was felt in other Palestine towns and villages. Several houses were and vinages. Several houses were badly damaged in Hebron in yester-day's shock. The tremor was felt in Nablus, Hebron, Tel-Aviv, Herzbah, Pekyin, Tul-Keren, Jaffa, Haifa, and Jerocho. The tremor was also felt at Amman, the capital of Transjordania, and at Es Salt.

A survey made by the correspon-dent of the Jewish Telegraphic A-

gency established the fact that none of the American visitors or residents in the country were injured during the earthquake. A message of sympathy was received today by the Acting High Com-

missioner from King George V. Plans to administer to the needs of the victims of the earthquake were

formulated by the Jerusalem committee formed to give relief. The Committee, which is carrying on its operations with the \$25.000 fund cabled by Nathan Straus, welll-known New York philanthropist, has allotted an amount of L. 1,000 for immediate relief to the inhabitants of Nablus, Ramleh, Ludd, and in the Transjor-danian cities. CHARGES AGAINST CHARLES A. LEVINE

Department of Justice Ready to Settle Old Contract Controversy Out of Court

It begins to look as if the Wash- timations of prosecution against Leington Administration has decided to tone down what has been criticised as a virtual campaign to discredit Charles A. Levine, a despatch from Washington to the New York World

When the thirty-year-old self-made millionaire, who hopped into his Bellanca plane unexpectedly and made the flight to Berlin with Clarence Chamberlin, returns to the United States the Department of Justice's threatened actions against him are to be settled peacefully out of court, according to present signs.

Ever since Levine underbid former Assistant Postmaster General Paul Henderson's company for the New York-Chicago air mail route and was denied the contract, Administration officials have circulated rumors and reports castings the most serious re-

flections upon Levine.
Postmaster General New, under whom Henderson served, denied favoritism had been shown Henderson, who is the son-in-law of Representative Martin B. Madden, prominent Administration Republican and Chair man of the House Appropriations Committee. Mr. New impugned Le-vine's integrity, and referred to him as having been "mixed up" in war contracts which the Department of Justice was investigating with a view to prosecution.

It now appears after rumors of impending indictments, that what the Department of Justice had under review was a post war contract which Levine made with the War Depart-ment to buy shell casings, ammunition and other salvaged materials.

The department contends that Levine obtained more material than his contract called for. Levine's attorneys insist, on the contrary, that he failed to receive as much as was due him. The department claims run up to approximately half a million. Apparently the only ground for action would be a civil suit to have the courts determine which side is right.

The National Air Transport, Henderson's company, was thereby de-clared the winner and received the award. The Postmaster General's next conflict with Levine was launched within a few hours after the Bellanca had landed.

IEWS WOULD SUPPORT FORD PRESIDENTIAL BOOM, "FORUM" WRITER CLAIMS

Reveal that President Wilson Suppported Ford's Candidacy For White House.

Henry Ford's sudden about-face) on the Jewish question lends a special interest to an article on "Woodrow Wilson's Ford Boom", which appears in The Forum magazine.

It is written by A. R. Pinci, veteran political writer, who declares that as a Presidential candidate Ford could probably beat even President Coolidge. He also says that in the pre-vious Ford Boom for the Presidency, the "Jewish vote" was already behind him, in spite of the Dearborn Independent's anti-Semitic propaganda.

The article also contains the revelation that Woodrow Wilson was the original Ford backer, and that Ford's senatorial candidacy was Wilson's wish rather than Ford's. It declares that Wilson was actually grooming Ford for the Presidency, and that had he lived and kept his health, Ford would be in the White House to-day.

"Would Ford have acquiesced, had Wilson nominated him" asks Mr. Pin-

ci, and answers his own question:
"Would Ford have acquiesced, had
Wilson nominated him? Undoubtedly, for Ford is nothing if not a good soldier. Any appeal by Wilson to expand the Ford industrial doctrine by making it political and international, - to make possible, in other words, the emancipation of foreign peoples from the vicious war psychology by setting them to work at high wages, - would have been irresistible. And none of the Democrats, - nine out of ten of them Wilson men anyway,would have dared to deride Ford's candidacy, for to have done so would! have been to deride their master's

WISE PRAISES FORD

FOR APOLOGY.
PARIS, July 18 (J.S.A.) — Rabbi Stephen S. Wise termed Henry Ford's retraction of statements against the Jews in his "Dearborn Independent" as "manly and honorable", in an interview given the Paris Herald, European edition of the New York Herald Tribune, to-day before leaving for Geneva. He said he rejoiced for Mr. Ford's own sake that he had seen fit to withdraw his "lamentable"

"I am not prepared to discuss the question that has arisen in respect to the reasons that moved Mr. Ford to withdraw his libelous charges against the Jews," Rabbi Wise said. "It doesn't seem fitting or even de-

(Continued from Page 1) cent to question the integrity of motives of one whose words and acts are those of a penitent. In any event, the words have been spoken. Mr. Ford has made a manly and honorable retraction.

"Of course, there is no such thing as making amends when a people is libeled, for millions have given credence to Mr. Ford who will pay little heed to his retraction. The Ku Klux movement in America doubtless was strengthened by the charges of Mr. Ford. I hope this retraction will serve to indicate to those lightly bent upon maligning a people that no graver injustice can be done than to make unsubstantiated charges against

a whole people". Rabbi Wise praised the courage of Aaron Sapiro in challenging Mr. Ford and also that of Nathan Straus, saying he thought Mr. Straus's challenge caused Mr. Ford to consider the gravity of his charges against the Jews.

"What amazes me, is not that he has just stopped it, but that a man of his national prominence would have continued so long to sell little fords of hatreds to the prejudiced public," stated Dr. C. Everett Wagner at the West Side Methodist Church on Sunday, with reference to Henry Ford. "Organs of prejudice would not have a large audience provided people were not streaked with prejudice. When one of these organs stops it is a sign of better days for humanity".

"A full blossom of racial prejudice is lynching. Legislation will help get rid of this barbaric trait. But the real change required to abolish lyn-ching is a change of heart in public opinion in the sections where practiced, and change of hearts in individuals. These roots of intolerance are deep in human nature and are shot full with emotion.

What are the sources of these bigotries? Where did we get the present prejudices that we now have? It is a long, tedious, complicated history. We have our present bundle of pre-judices from our parents, school teachers, ministers, friends, newspapers, magazines, pictures, motion pictures. books, radio, politics, government, the social heritage and certain tendencies within nature itself.

"To eradicate these intolerances requires an intricate difficult and very long process. However, if every per son who considers himself a friend and a lover of God should begin at once to refuse to give voice to action emotion and deed to any prejudice a superb start would be made.

"Roots of prejudices will only be destroyed when other roots grow in the same soil. The first of these seeds to germinate and grow is 'God is no respecter of persons,' which includes every race, religion, color and nation. differences. When these seeds grow, The human race is the common denominator of all. Humanity has funda- led out".

Jewish and Christian organizations and individuals were urged to provide a relief fund for the victims of the Palestine earthquake in an editorial in the New York "Times" last Sunday. In its second editorial on the subject,

the New York "Times" stated:

"The earthquake in the Holy Land will not be a wholly ill thing if it helps to banish the bitter feeling which at times rises to unseemly heights of intensity among the sects gathered around its sac-red monuments. The voice of GOD was not in this earthquake in the sense that it was an "act of GOD" with some human punishment as its purpose, as it was not in the earthquake that passed before ELI-JAH when he stood on the mount before the Lord; but it may be heard as the "still small voice" in the expressions of human sympathy and mercy that come from all parts of the world to that land which has blest them all through the teachings that, coming forth from that least of territories, have encircled the earth. A cable has been received stating that a General Committee has been formed of all denominations under the chairmanship of Lieut. Col. G. S. Symes, the Chief Secretary of the Palestine Government, for the Earthquake Relief Fund. Mr. Nathan Straus's prompt and generous gift is adequate for the immediate need. but the later requirements are likely to be great; at any rate, far beyond those which even this large contribution can meet. Here is an opportunity for Protestant and Catholic, Jew and Gentile, alike thus masked. to cooperate with the Moslem in a charity which makes the whole world kin,"

The earthquake has caused a mood of depression in Palestine, according to a cable despatch of the Fel-Aviv corres-pondent of the New York "Day." Many persons are leaving the country, the cable states.

The Tel-Aviv correspondent of the "Jewish Daily Forward" reports that many Arabs, in fear of a recurrence of the earthquake, have asked their Jewish neighbors to give them shelter in their homes, expressing the belief that "God protects the Jews from disaster."

Belief is also current among Arabs in Jerusalem that the earthquake came as a nunishment for the Arabs' transgression in throwing stones at the Wailing Wall, the cable states.
