POGROM PROPAGANDA FOLLOWS CESSATION OF RIOTS IN VIENNA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, July 20.—Violent pogrom agitation is now being conducted by the anti-Semitic press of Vienna on the background of the unsuccessful revolution.

The anti-Semitic journals publish inciting articles in which the Vienna population is urged to "take revenge on the Jews for the bloodshed". Austrian Jewry is being blamed for the Vienna riots.

No action was taken by the State Attorney to confiscate these journals, notwithstanding the fact that representatives of Jewish organizations have urged the authorities to take measures to prevent the publication of such inciting propaganda, which is extremely dangerous in the present excited atmosphere.

JEWISH DISTRICT IS RE- NAMED KALININDORF

Riga, July 20.—Sadeh Menauchah, the oldest Jewish colony in the Ukraine and the principal settlement in the newly established Jewish region was renamed Kalinindorf.

A decision of the Wzlik, Central Executive Committee of the government, confirmed the change of name. The whole Jewish district will be known under the name of Kalinindorf, in honor of Michael Kalinin, President of the Soviet Republic.

PROTEST AGAINST BUILDING STABLES ON CEMETERY

Riga, July 20.—Representatives of the Jewish population of the city of Homel protested to the Soviet authorities against the action of the military authorities with regard to the Jewish cemeteries in the town.

Stables for the red army were constructed on the old Jewish cemetery in Homel. On the oldest Jewish cemetery in the town a timber yard was set up. The authorities also destroyed the Catholic cemetery.

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT TO GIVE HEBREW SCHOOLS £20,000 FOR THIS YEAR

Jerusalem, July 20.—A 100 per cent increase in the allotment of the Palestine Government for the maintenance of the Hebrew School system in Palestine was announced today.

It was learned that the Government's contribution towards the Hebrew School system this year will amount to £20,000.

PALESTINE MILITARY AD- MINISTRATION EXPENDITURE CONSIDERABLY DECREASED

London, July 20.—The expenditure of the British Government on the military administration of Iraq and Palestine was considerably decreased, the British Government declared in its Middle Eastern estimates submitted to the House of Commons.

This expenditure was decreased by £936,500 and now amounts to £2,519,000. Palestine's share in this expenditure amounts to £166,600.

The Government, in this paper, further reviews the economic condition of the country and states that steps have been taken to improve the marketing of citrous and other fruits. Fourteen government forest nurseries, including over a million trees, are functioning.

The estimates also mention the municipal elections recently held in Palestine, the reorganization of the defense force and the four and a half million pound loan which is to be floated by the Palestine Government with the guarantee of the Exchequer.

AMERICAN ARCHAEOLOGICAL EXPEDITION FINDS TRACES OF ANCIENT MESOPOTAMIAN RACE

Jerusalem, July 20.—Traces of an ancient race which lived 6,000 years ago in Northern Mesopotamia were discovered in that region by an American Archaeological expedition, according to Prof. Speiser of the American School of Oriental Research in Bagdad, who arrived here today.

In an interview with the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here Prof. Speiser stated that the archaeological survey conducted by him disclosed that Northern Mesopotamia and the Middle East was populated by a race which was neither Semitic nor European. It used flint implements and produced painted pottery which is identical with the earliest pottery of the Suza and Ur area.

Further light on the history of this ancient race is expected to be given as a result of new excavations which will be started in September near Mosul.

THROWS PASSENGER OVER- BOARD BECAUSE HE IS A JEW

Berlin, July 20.—Meyer Berkowitsch, a Jewish passenger on the Tilist-Memel waterway, was thrown into the water by another passenger. Berkowitsch, who was a native of Neustadt, was drowned. He was 25 years old.

The culprit, who was arrested, could give no other reason for his act than the fact that the passenger was a Jew.

CANON DANBY ISSUES NEW BOOK ON CHRISTIAN- JEWISH RELATIONS

Jerusalem, July 20.—A new and interesting book on the relations between Jews and Christians has just been issued here by Dr. Herbert Danby, well-known scholar and publicist and residential Canon of St. George's Cathedral, in Jerusalem. Last year Dr. Danby translated from the Hebrew, Dr. Joseph Klausner's book "Jesus of Nazareth."

The book represents five lectures delivered by the author last year in London and previously in Jerusalem. It deals with the Jewish attitude towards Christianity from its inception up to the present time.

While arguing as a Christian and an active servant of the church, the author takes an impartial attitude towards Jewry from the point of view of Jewish-Christian relations. The "profession de foi" of the author is contained in the following two passages:

"The more Christians have conformed to the spirit of Christ, the more has Jewish respect been drawn to Christianity and to Christ. The farther Christians have drawn back from following after Jesus in spirit and truth, so have Christians brought into discredit Christianity and Christ Himself." And a little further: "If the Jew did, in truth, become the deepest hater of Christianity, it was most certainly the Christian who had the largest share in making him so."

GERMAN STUDENTS DECIDE TO CONTINUE RACIAL POLICY

Berlin, July 20.—The National Federation of German Students has by a majority of votes decided to continue its adherence to the principle of race in determining its policies and in the composition of its membership.

This question, heatedly debated at the national convention held yesterday in Wuerzburg, was decided due to the votes of the students affiliated with the Voelkische groups. The resolution, it was stated, will increase the differences of the organization with the German Minister of Education Becker, who is opposed to this policy, and may also lead finally to a breach in the organization.

PAUL DAVIDSOHN, GERMAN FILM PIONEER, DIES

Berlin, July 20.—Paul Davidsohn, general director and one of the founders of UFA, died here yesterday.

The pioneer of the German film industry, was 56 years old.

**UNIVERSITY LIBRARY GETS
VALUABLE PENTATEUCH MS.**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 20.—The Jewish National and University Library in Jerusalem has acquired, through the generosity of Mr. Sidney Peitz and Mr. Max Hirsch, a Samaritan Scroll comprising the Five Books of the Pentateuch written in the original Hebrew with Samaritan characters. The particular value of the Scroll lies in its great age, for according to the date which is to be found in the text, the Scroll was written in the year 800 of the Mohammedan calendar, that is, 1485.

The Scroll differs in many respects from the Masoret text of the Jewish Pentateuch since the Samaritans did not accept some of the verses contained in the traditional Jewish Pentateuch.

This Scroll has changed hands several times, and in recent years was secured as a loan till it was released by the Hebrew University. Remarks at the end of the Scroll tell the story of the manuscript.

The Jewish National and University Library has acquired during the last few months a great number of manuscripts in Hebrew and Arabic, some of which will appear in the Bibliographical Quarterly of the Library, Kinshat Sefer.

**ITALIAN NAVAL CADETS
TO VISIT PALESTINE**

Rome, July 20.—The students of the Royal Naval Academy at Livorno will make a cruise in the Eastern Mediterranean in the month of August on board the battleships "Pisa" and "Ferruccio." These two ships will anchor in the port of Jaffa on August 21st and will leave on August 25th. The interval will be used to visit Jerusalem together with the officers.

**OFFICIALS THANK STRAUS
FOR QUAKE RELIEF FUND**

Work Proceeding Satisfactorily, Jerusalem Advice States

The relief work for the victims of the Palestine earthquake is proceeding satisfactorily, according to advice received from Jerusalem by Nathan Straus, donor of \$25,000 for the relief fund.

Mr. Straus made public yesterday the cables he received from Col. Symes, Acting High Commissioner of Palestine, and from Emir Abdullah, ruler of Transjordan, and from Dr. Blumstone, general director of the Hadassah Hospital in Palestine, to whom the \$25,000 was cabled by Mr. Straus.

Col. Symes's cable reads as follows: "On behalf of suffering through earthquake I send grateful thanks for your most generous assistance. Immediate relief work is proceeding satisfactorily. Symes."

The cable from Emir Abdullah says: "On behalf of my people I thank you for your generous gift."

Abdullah."

Dr. Blumstone's message is as follows: "Organized mixed committee under government auspices for immediate execution of your instructions. Palestine deeply grateful."

Blumstone."

Mr. Straus sent the following cable to Col. Symes: "Very much pleased you are lending cooperation in distribution of fund for earthquake sufferers. My modest amount will only suffice for immediate needs. As newspapers report here General Committee of all denominations under your honorary chairmanship has been formed. Hoping and praying that their appeal will result in overwhelming success all over world and that Protestants and Catholics, Jew and Gentile alike participate in rebuilding, bringing permanent relief to stricken people of Holy Land. Straus."

**POPE FORBIDS CATHOLICS
TO ATTEND CONFERENCE**

Washington, D. C., July 20.—A despatch from Rome to the National Catholic Welfare Conference states that the Pope "has just issued a most important decree, confirming a previous decree, according to the terms of which all Catholics are expressly forbidden to assist at conferences or reunions of whatsoever kind of non-Catholics whose purpose is to foster, as it is customarily expressed, 'peace between the churches'."

"The decree of the Holy Office was occasioned by the forthcoming conference to be held at Lausanne, Switzerland, August 3 to 21, under the auspices of the World Conference on Faith and Order," the Catholic News Service states.

**JEWISH REFUGEES IN CHINA
FACE DIFFICULT SITUATION**

Emigdirekt Makes Charges Against

Local Community

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Berlin, July 3.—The Jewish emigrants in China are living through a difficult time, according to a report received here by the Jewish Emigration Society, Hias-Lea-Emigdirekt, from its offices in Harbin.

"We have just obtained reports from Jewish emigrants in Hankow, the seat of the Kuomintang Government," says the report, "which show that the greatest part of the foreigners have left the area, and that as a result of the general chaos, the emigrants have no work. All of them would gladly go to Shanghai, Tientsien, or Harbin, but the cost of travelling on the Yangtze River now is prohibitive. The journey from Hankow to Shanghai takes five days and costs at least \$75. The Jewish emigrants, who have no money and have not all the necessary papers find themselves in great trouble."

The office also draws attention to a recent report published in the Jewish Press in America and Europe through the Jewish Telegraphic Agency to the effect that the Jews in China are doing good service in the military forces. "This report," it says, "emanates from 'Israel's Messenger,' the organ of the wealthy Jews of Shanghai, who spend \$300,000 on a new synagogue, but will not let a Jewish emigrant over their doorstep. The fact is that it is impossible for a Jew to do military service because the dominant spirit in the Shanghai army is that of the Russian Black Hundreds, of the officers of Kvitshak and Semenov."

**JEW IS ELECTED TO
CAPE TOWN SENATE**

Cape Town, July 20.—Franz Ginsberg was elected a member of the Cape Senate, in succession to the late Senator Fuller.

Mr. Retief who nominated Mr. Ginsberg at a joint sitting of the Cape members of Parliament and the Cape Provincial Council, said that Mr. Ginsberg would be missed in the Chamber. He had been associated in public life with him for a long time, and found him a true South African, a man sincerely attached to the land of his adoption, and very much interested in its advancement and welfare. He was a man of ripe experience, sound judgment and fully acquainted with all the requirements and needs of this country. Mr. Retief stated.

It is believed that this is the first occasion upon which a Jew has been elected a Senator, the previous Jewish Senators, the late Hon. Samuel Marks and ex-Senator Charles P. Robinson, being nominated to that body.

Franz Ginsberg was born in Germany in 1862. He is the owner of one of the largest match, candle and soap factories of South Africa, situated at King William's Town, which he has hitherto represented in the Cape Provincial Council.

JEWS IN SOUTH AFRICA HAVE STRONG BACK TO LAND MOVEMENT

Capetown, June 20.—There is a distinct "back to the land" movement among Orange Free State Jews at the present time, states the "South African Jewish Chronicle" here. A friend who has just returned after a comprehensive tour of that territory reports the keenness of every class of Jew for a farming career. Wherever he went he met Jews who expressed a desire to give up trading in favor of farming. There are many storekeepers who also run small farms, and these all look forward to the time when they can "close shop" and concentrate entirely on the land. Fruit growing, mealies, stock raising, all have an attraction for them, and run around commercial lines, they have no doubt that they can achieve success.

There are many Jewish farmers in the Free State, and they are noted for the success they have attained. No one does they specialize in cereals and fruit but those who have gone in for sheep and cattle have done a lot for the farming industry as a whole. The quality of the stock raised by the Jews is of the highest order. In the Free district two of the most successful farmers are the Friedmans. They head the list in regard to the milk production. In the Heilbron district Mr. and Mrs. Raphael are leading farmers, whilst, of course, Mr. Laurie still retains the title of "The Potato King." Mr. Rabinowitz is one of the largest and prettiest farms in the Free State. His is a red farm, and a great attraction is the avenue he has made with 100,000 pine trees. In Vrededorp Mr. Simon is a successful sheep farm. These are just a few. There are numerous others who have turned to the land. There is hardly a town or dorp that is not its Jewish farmer.

In South Africa particularly has the Jew shown that he can make a success of farming. Not only in the Free State, but throughout the Union. Fearer home we have the Sarenbocks, of Ceres, who have done so much to improve the quality of fruit exported from South Africa.

In Prince Albert, Mr. Elias Cohen is a prominent fruit grower, whilst up and down the province there are numerous co-religionists tilling broad acres and raising sheep and cattle and generally taking a prominent and leading part in the farming industry. The methods they employ enable them to produce the best, and this, whilst being to their own advantage is to the benefit of the country in its relation to overseas markets. Anyhow it is a healthy sign, this movement.

MANY RABBIS AMONG FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS, SURVEY SHOWS

Sig. Saxe Publishes Result of Inquiry Among Members of Central Conference of American Rabbis; Lists of Members and Un-affiliated Given

Membership in the Society of Free and Accepted Masons, known as the Free Masons, one of the most influential social factors in American life, is widely spread among American rabbis, according to the result of a survey conducted and made public yesterday by Sig. Saxe, of 200 Fifth Avenue, New York.

The survey also discloses that many of the Rabbis who are members of the Society of Free and Accepted Masons have achieved the 33rd degree, which is the highest honor conferred upon Masons.

The survey conducted by Mr. Saxe was limited only to the spiritual leaders of the Reform Jewish congregations in America. Inquiry was directed by Mr. Saxe to the 289 members of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, asking them to state whether they were members of the Masonic fraternity or not. Responses were received from 233 members of the Central Conference while 56 did not reply. Of the 233 Rabbis who responded, 140 stated that they were members of the Society and 93, that they were not, showing that 60 per cent of the Rabbis who have replied are members of the Masonic fraternity. Sixty-one belong to the Scottish Rite and 37 to the Shrine.

LONDON GOODWILL SOCIETY ISSUES A MANIFESTO

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 20.—A manifesto was issued here by the committee of a newly formed society which states that it has been created in order that Jews and Christians should be able to confer together on the basis of their common ideals and with mutual respect for differences of religious belief.

The honorary secretaries are Miss Jean Miller and Mrs. R. N. Eicholz. "In the first place," the manifesto says, "Jews and Christians have both been largely responsible, in recent years, for the growth of a national conscience in social affairs, and for the applications of religious principles to the whole of life. Much of the work of both groups could and should be done in cooperation.

"Jews and Christians are equally concerned as citizens in matters of national and international policy, and the religious motive which actuated both communities cannot fail to be a powerful factor for righteousness and peace.

"Thinking along these lines, a group representative of both communities was formed in 1924. This group has since arranged annual conferences on a religious basis on such subjects as Education, Race problems, and Industry, and intends to hold others on similar matters of common concern.

"A Society of Jews and Christians has, therefore, been formed. This permanent organization will give opportunity for similar meetings for the more intimate discussion of religious subjects and of social problems from a religious standpoint, distribution of publications which shall be in accordance with the aims of the society, interchange between synagogues and churches of Jewish and Christian speakers."

KANSAS DISTRICT COURT TO DECIDE SABBATH DAY

Interesting Case Develops as Ministers Bring Charge Against Jewish Theatre Owner

Kansas City, Kans., July 20.—A decision on what day of the week is the Sabbath day, as named in the Kansas laws, will be made soon when Lewis Linx goes on trial charged with violation of the law prohibiting motion pictures on the Sabbath.

Linx, a Jew, operated his theater last Sunday and aroused the indignation of the local ministers' alliance.

"It is Linx's contention that he did not violate the State law in that the statute declares the showing of motion pictures on "the Sabbath shall be prohibited." Linx declares his Sabbath day is Saturday, and that as all the employees of his theaters are either of the Jewish faith or are Seventh Day Adventists they did not violate the law.

The District Court at Winfield will be called upon to decide whether Linx can be prosecuted.

**DR. BRAMSON, ORT LEADER,
VISITS JOHANNESBURG, S. A.**

He also addressed a Conference of the Jewish Colonization Fund.

FORD APOLOGY IN 'DEARBORN INDEPENDENT' IS DEMANDED

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, July 20.—Publication of Henry Ford's recantation in the "Dearborn Independent" is demanded by the "American Israelite," one of the outstanding Jewish weeklies in the United States.

In its issue of today it carries the following in a box:

"Whenever Henry Ford publishes in the 'Dearborn Independent' his 'apology' and retraction, together with the solemn assurance that he has forever abandoned his course of vilifying the Jews, he will be regarded as honest and sincere in his protestations of repentance and desire to make amends."

Commenting on the Ford apology, the "American Israelite" remarks:

"With full appreciation for the actual and diplomatic part Arthur Brisbane had in the adjustment of this matter as Ford's representative, our hats should come off to Louis Marshall of New York, lawyer, representative of the best in American Jewry, president of the American Jewish Committee."

"It was Mr. Marshall who was selected to receive the official copy of Ford's 'apology,' which he did with evident reluctance, as not wishing to have anything to do with so contemptible a matter, but being therein bound himself with dignity and a manner that must impress all thinking people with the immense superiority of a class that can produce a Louis Marshall over the one that gives us Henry Fords."
