BRITISH JEWS REFUSE TO PARTICIPATE IN CONFER- ENCE ON JEWISH RIGHTS Palestine Jewry Will Be Represented at Zurich

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 25.—The Joint Foreign Committee of the Board of Jewish Deputies and the Anglo-Jewish Association has declined the invitation of the Committee of Jewish Delegations in Paris to participate in the Conference on Jewish Rights in Zurich.

The Board of Jewish Deputies, in its session of today, gave its approval to the refusal of the Committee.

The letter of the Committee denies the assertion of the Delegation with regard to contradictory intervention caused by the multitude of Jewish organizations. The letter states that the Committee has no recollection of any important occasion when contradictory Jewish petitions were presented to the League of Nations. It points out that the Joint Foreign Committee is composed of British subjects, and is therefore in a position to frequently consult the British Government, while an international committee would be unable to do so.

The Joint Foreign Committee, the letter further points out, has always been ready to enter into friendly consultation with other bodies for the purpose of coordinated effort.

Mr. Lucien Wolf further points out that the American Jewish Congress is not in a position to effectively intervene because of the fact that the United States of America are not represented in the League of Nations. Participation in the Conference has been refused by Mr. Louis Marshall, the Alliance Israelite Universelle, the Hilfsverein deutscher Juden and by Mr. Sliosberg's Russian-Jewish Kehil-

FORD ENDS BERNSTEIN SUIT WITH APOLOGY

Promises to Withdraw Libelous Books Containing Articles Reprinted from "Dearborn Independent"

Settlement of the four-year-old libel suit in which Herman Bernstein, author and editor, sought \$200,000 damages from Henry Ford because of a series of anti-Jewish articles published in the "Dearborn Independent" was announced yesterday by Samuel Untermyer, counsel for Mr. Bernstein.

Mr. Ford retracted and apologized for the parts of an article concerning Mr. Bernstein which appeared in the "Dearborn Independent" and for an "alleged interview" with Mr. Ford also appearing in that paper, in which the

automobile manufacturer was quoted as assailing Mr. Bernstein.

The settlement agreement also included payment of a sum, not made public, by Mr. Ford toward the expenses of Mr. Bernstein in the suit.

Mr. Bernstein's suit, which was filed in the Federal Court Aug. 18, 1923, was the first of the actions brought against Mr. Ford because of his anti-Jewish campaign. The settlement negotiations, which have been under way for a fortnight, were conducted for Mr. Ford by Clifford B. Longley of Detroit, De Lancey Nicoll, De Lancey Nicoll, Jr., and Martin C. Ansoorge of this city; Joseph Palma, local head of the Federal Secret Service, a personal friend of Mr. Ford, and J. Kostmarr of Chicago also participated in the settlement conferences.

The agreed letters which were exchanged by Mr. Bernstein and Mr. Ford follow.

Mr. Ford's letter to Mr. Bernstein reads:

"You are of course familiar with the context of the public retraction and apology for the articles appearing in the 'Dearborn Independent' that I have made and had spread broadcast. I sincerely regret any harm that may have been occasioned to the people of that great race and am anxious to make whatever amends are possible.

"I take this occasion also to retract and apologize for those parts of the article that appeared in the 'Dearborn Independent' concerning you and for the alleged interview with me assailing you that was published in that paper.

"It was not intended in that article

JEW MAY BE NAMED ROUMANIAN MINISTER IN LONDON, IS RUMOR

Roumanian Jews Mourn Death of King Ferdinand

Bucharest, July 25.—Mr. Rosenthal, noted Jewish lawyer, will be appointed Roumanian Ambassador to London, according to rumors circulated in political circles here.

The London post has become vacant due to the acceptance of the portfolio of Foreign Minister by the Roumanian Minister to St. James Court, Titulescu.

Bucharest, July 25.—Memorial services in honor of the deceased King Ferdinand were held on Saturday in all synagogues in Roumania.

Chief Rabbi Zirelson, in Kishinev, received a telegram from the Minister of Education, notifying him of the death of the King, and asking the Rabbi that services be arranged in the synagogues of Bessarabia.

NEW EARTH TREMOR FELT IN PALESTINE

Anglo-Jewish Association Appeals for Palestine Earthquake Victims

Jerusalem, July 25.—A slight earthquake shock was felt yesterday in Jerusalem, Jericho and Bethlehem. No damage was caused.

London, July 25.—The Anglo-Jewish Association will make a public appeal in behalf of the victims of the Palestine earthquake. Mr. D'Avigdor Goldsmid announced at today's session of the Board of Jewish Deputies.

Two hundred fifty pounds have already been forwarded to Acting High Commissioner Symes, and promises of an additional £280 have been obtained.

This appeal will not interfere with that of the Zionist Organization, Mr. Goldsmid declared.

LITHUANIAN PRESIDENT APOLOGIZES TO RABBI

Kovno, July 25.—President Smetona has tendered his apology to Rabbi Katz of Palangon, whose hat was snatched from his head by the chief of police of Palangon, when the Rabbi came to welcome the President on the latter's visit to the town. The Rabbi had refused to remove his hat on religious grounds.

The "Lietuvos," official organ of the Roumanian Government, publishes the apology of the President.

JEWISH COMMUNISTS WILL BE DEPORTED

NATHAN STRAUS ESTAB- LISHES \$75,000 HEALTH CENTER IN TEL AVIV

A health center at the cost of \$75,000 will be established by Nathan Straus in Tel-Aviv, the Jewish city in Palestine, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns.

The offer to establish this Center has been made by Nathan Straus in a letter to Mr. Blau, the famous Hebrew poet. The offer is contingent on the city's providing a proper site. The Town Council of Tel-Aviv has called Mr. Straus, advising him that the most appropriate site would be placed at his disposal by the town for the Health Center.

According to the plans of Mr. Straus the Health Center will include milk pasteurization work, prenatal child welfare work as well as serving as a health center for parents.

This gift of Mr. Straus is in addition to the gift of \$500,000 for a Health Center in Jerusalem, which he recently established.

SWAYTHLING, IN LAST WILL, APPEALS TO CHILDREN NOT TO INTERMARRY

London, July 25.—Solemn injunctions not to abandon the Jewish faith are contained in the last will of Lord Swaythling.

Lord Swaythling, who left an estate of £400,000, expresses in his last will the wish that no child of his should in any time and under any circumstances abandon the faith of the fathers, or to intermarry. The bulk of his estate was left to his family. His son Iver, who recently married a tyrist, received a bequest of only £12,000.

REPORT TELLS OF TEMPLE SISTERHOODS ACTIVITIES (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, July 25.—A wide range of activities are disclosed in reports received by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations from hundreds of Temple Sisterhoods throughout the United States. These reports, made at the close of the active synagogue year, cover the activities of Sisterhoods in not only the large centers of population, but in small far-western and southern communities. The Sisterhoods show steady progress in their efforts to serve the Temple, to attract the youth to worship, to welcome the stranger and to practice benevolence and philanthropy. Following are brief pictures of the work of some of these groups:

Mishkan Israel Sisterhood, of New Haven, Conn., featured again during the past year a series of Parent-Teachers' meetings which have attracted attention all over the country. Sending birthday cards to babies on its "cradle roll" until the child is old enough to enter Sabbath school was an innovation of the past year, according to the report of Mrs. Arthur Weil, president of the Sisterhood.

The Sisterhood has raised during the past two years over \$2483, out of which it built a new ark for the temple and refurnished the assembly room, among other things, and started an organ fund.

Holiday treats to inmates of local sanitariums and penal institutions occupied the attention of Beth El Israel Sisterhood of Mansburg, New York, which is headed by Frances Levy, president; Bessie Schiff, first vice-president; Matt Markel, second vice-president; Violet Kaplan, secretary, and Birdie Schiff, treasurer.

The Ladies Auxiliary of Temple Anshe Chesed of Vicksburg, Miss., met in June for the Hebrew Union College Scholarship Fund, contributed toward the renovation of the Temple and participated in relief work among the victims of the Mississippi flood.

Five hundred seventy-two Uniongrams and 126 Union calendars were distributed by the Har Sinai Temple Sisterhood of Baltimore. A public sale for \$500 and people was a featured event. These are the outstanding features of the report of Mrs. Abraham E. Engel, president of the Sisterhood.

Sabbath, Chanukah and Purim were again days in the calendar of activities of the Oakland, Calif. Temple Sisterhood, in which occasions in addition to entertaining at the Temple, many Jewish homes were opened to University students.

Mrs. S. I. Frankenthal, president of the Temple Sinai Sisterhood of Oakland, Calif., reports a visit by Mrs. B. Lieberman of Cincinnati. The Sisterhood was hospitable to the students and faculty of the Pacific Theological Seminary who came to view the temple's collection of ceremonial objects. A public Sefer was held and the other festivals brightly observed.

Miryah Temple Sisterhood of Chattanooga, Tenn., is reported by the president, Mrs. Jay L. Goodman, presented each of the children of the Sabbath School with annual subscriptions

of "Young Israel" and made a substantial contribution to the Hebrew Union College Dormitory and Maintenance Fund.

An extensive program of activities was successfully carried out by a dozen committees of Temple Berith Kodesh of Rochester, N. Y., under the leadership of Mrs. Madeline S. Heilbrun, the president.

The Sisterhood of Memphis, Tenn., had a record breaking year in the sale of Uniongrams, according to Mrs. Eugene Greener, the president, giving credit to Mrs. Ben Jacobs, chairman of the committee in charge, for winning third place in the race by the Sisterhoods throughout the country to dispose of the largest number.

Courage under trying circumstances is revealed in the report of Mrs. I. Howa, president of the Temple Israel Sisterhood of Miami, Fla., who says: "It has been our lot always to work under difficulties, especially this year, with no home and no place to use as a pivotal center for our activities."

Rockdale Avenue Temple Sisterhood of Cincinnati, of which Mrs. A. Strassman is president, added \$2000 during the past year to its building fund, besides generous contributions to various philanthropies.

In Marshall, Texas, the Temple Sisterhood leaves cards for all Jewish traveling men stopping at the hotels, inviting them to services. According to the report of Mrs. C. Josephs, president, the Sisterhood has enrolled practically every Jewess in the city and a number from out-of-town. With \$3700 in the treasury, the Sisterhood is endeavoring to raise \$1500 more to build an annex to the Temple to house all of its activities.

The Sisterhood of Temple Beth-El, Detroit, which this year celebrated its 25th anniversary, provides fruit and vegetables to the local hospitals, maintains a scholarship at the Hebrew Union College in the name of Paula Kohn Brown. Mrs. Oscar Robinson, the president, reports that its sewing circle produced 2169 garments for various philanthropies.

The Sisterhood of Temple Emanuel, Los Angeles, had the satisfaction on March 18th last of burning a mortgage on the \$10,000 pipe organ which it has installed in the temple, and presenting the instrument to the congregation free and clear. This, according to the report of Mrs. Simon Lewis, the president, was the biggest year financially in the history of the Sisterhood.

JEWISH TEACHERS BARRED FROM POLISH SCHOOLS, SEJM DEPUTIES COMPLAIN

Warsaw, July 25.—No Jewish teachers are being appointed in the Polish State schools, an interpellation of the Jewish Sejm Club in the Polish Parliament complains.

The interpellation demands that in the future all appointments be based on the ability of the applicants, and not on their nationality.

COMMUNICATION TO THE EDITOR

Declares Alarm Concerning the World Conference on Jewish Rights is Increasing in European Jewish Circles and Threatens to Provolve Discord Among the Jews

"Sir—

Alarming is the fact itself of the sudden convocation of a Jewish World Conference by a small circle of Jews in behalf of organizations with very responsible denominations but rather irresponsible composition. The 'American Jewish Congress', although founded in Philadelphia and sitting sometimes in Washington, is very, very far from representing American Jewry in the same measure as the American Congress represents the American nation. Likewise, the Paris Committee of Jewish Delegations has exceedingly few delegations—to be more precise, it has none at all!

Still more alarming is the apprehension that, under the name of a pan-Jewish Congress, the Jews are pursuing by their initiative, or wrongly, a considerable portion of Jewish public opinion considers the enterprise of the 'American Jewish Congress' and the 'Committee of Jewish Delegations' as an attempt to bring over to one Jewish party, the Zionist party, the direction of Jewish politics everywhere, in the Diaspora as well as in Palestine. And this is regarded as extremely dangerous to the Jews of the Diaspora—not only by the adversaries of Zionism, but also by many of those Jews who have much sympathy with the work of the Zionists in Palestine. The organizers of the Jewish World Conference, the President of the American Jewish Congress, and the President of the Committee of Jewish Delegations, have publicly denied that they are pursuing by their initiative purely Zionist intentions. It cannot, however, be denied that both these organizations have been created by the Zionists—the American Jewish Congress in 1916, the Committee of Jewish Delegations in 1919—for the precise purpose of enabling the Zionists to appear before the Peace Conference as the representative of the whole World-Jewry. Nor can it be denied that the convocation of the Jewish World Conference by these two bodies alone, pushing deliberately aside all other Jewish organizations, even the most representative and respected, in no way bears testimony to a desire of friendly co-operation with the whole Jewish commonwealth. The organizers state themselves that the decision to convocate a Jewish World Conference was taken by them as long as a year ago. But up to this very day even the most important Jewish organizations, such as the Alliance Israelite Universelle, the Joint Foreign Committee of the British Jews, and the American Jewish Committee, have not received an invitation to participate either in the preparation of that 'Jewish World Conference', or in the Conference itself.

to imply that any of the matters concerning the Jews appearing in the 'Dearborn Independent' were based upon information furnished by you. You have at no time said anything to me that would justify such an inference.

"From the explanations made to me by my counsel through your counsel, Mr. Samuel Untermyer, I realize the damage that may have been caused you among the people of your race and in your profession as an author, editor and newspaper correspondent by the articles of which you complain in your suit, and the expense, which you could ill afford, to which you have been put by the protracted litigation to vindicate the good name of the Jewish people and your own reputation against the charges contained in those articles.

"I quite agree that no mere money damage will make good the harm done you and that it is not in my power to compensate for that injury. Meantime I should like to pay toward reimbursing you for the expense incident to the suit.

"I am informed through your counsel that the articles in the 'Dearborn Independent' have been translated into many languages and distributed throughout many countries of the world in book form under the title of 'The International Jew'. Neither I nor the 'Dearborn Independent', as far as I know, have had anything to do with the translations, publications or distribution, and I am not only willing but anxious to actively cooperate with you to the end that the volumes shall be withdrawn and destroyed.

"I hope you will accept this assurance of my deep regret for whatever was said in either of these articles. I have been made to realize that the articles in which you are charged with having furnished me with information on which the publications in the 'Dearborn Independent' were based have brought down upon you the undeserved wrath of your people from which you have greatly suffered—both financially and in your peace of mind—and can only hope that this apology will set you right in this respect."

Mr. Bernstein's reply to Mr. Ford reads:

"Your letter of retraction and apology on July 23, taken in connection with your public statement of July 7 addressed to the Jewish people, makes the 'amende honorable' to the fullest extent within your power to right wrongs that from the nature of the case cannot be fully repaired, and is accepted by me without reservation in the spirit in which it is extended.

"I assume you fully realize that no matter how great the wrong and injury to me personally I would not have brought the suit, nor would Mr. Untermyer have consented to act for me, except as a vehicle and the only responsible means of judicially exposing and disproving the tissue of unspeakable falsehoods and forgeries against the Jewish people. ASK FOR REINSTATEMENT

OF ABRAHAM GOLDBERG

The reinstatement of Abraham Goldberg as a member of the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization of America was demanded in resolutions adopted by the Executive Committee of the Connecticut Regional Union at a meeting held in Hartford, and at a special meeting of the Waterbury Zionist District.

The resolution of the Executive Committee of the Connecticut Regional Union reads in part:

"Resolved, that in view of the crisis in Palestine and of the utmost need of unity in the Zionist Organization, the Executive Committee of the Connecticut Regional Union urge upon and demand of the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization that immediate steps be taken by the Administrative Committee to co-opt Mr. Abraham Goldberg as a member of the Administrative Committee, in order that full confidence may be restored in the leadership and harmony prevail in the Organization.

"Resolved, that we urge upon Mr. Abraham Goldberg to accept, when, and if called upon, to serve on the Administrative Committee."

At a meeting of the Atlantic City District a committee was appointed to arrange for a banquet in honor of Abraham Goldberg prior to his departure to Europe to attend the Zionist Congress. The committee will ask leading Zionists in other cities to join in this occasion.

Jews, so happened that the offending articles, which falsely and without semblance of excuse charged me with having imparted to you personally on the peace ship the information upon which the assaults upon the Jews in the 'Dearborn Independent' were based, made proof of the falsity of the charges themselves competent which would not otherwise, under any combination of circumstances, have been possible.

"Although an individual may recover for a libel uttered against him, there is, strange to say, no way by which falsity may be proved or redress secured for libels perpetrated upon an entire nation or people. Under these circumstances, Mr. Untermyer and I felt it our duty to our people that I avail myself of that exceptional situation to establish the falsity of the articles. I am advised that the limitations placed by the Court on the range of the testimony in the Sapiro case would not have applied in my case.

"That closes this unfortunate chapter, and I trust in that way that will go far to prevent future assaults upon the people of my race and will thus promote the arrival of the era of the true brotherhood of man. If that shall prove the result, you will, by your present attitude, have accomplished even more toward confounding and discouraging anti-Semitism than was accomplished by the offending articles in tanning and keeping alive the flames of bigotry and race hatred."

POLISH STATESMEN FAVOR PRO-PALESTINE COMMITTEE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, July 25.—"I am a warm adherent of Zionism," former Prime Minister Skrzynski stated when he was approached by the Zionists in connection with the Pro-Palestine Committee. "The Jews have achieved wonders in Palestine," he continued. "I stand by the declaration I made to Nahum Sokolow, while I was Foreign Minister. The non-Jewish world regards the reconstruction work being carried on by Jews in Palestine with great respect. I will gladly give the Pro-Palestine Committee my active support," Count Skrzynski concluded.

Mr. Thugut, leader of the Radical Peasants' Party, declared: "As a Democrat I naturally recognize the right of the Jewish people to its own homeland. It is the duty of the Polish Government to support the Zionist movement."

Mr. Daszynski, the Socialist leader, expressed his surprise that the whole Jewish people does not support the Zionist movement. "The Pro-Palestine Committee," Daszynski declared, "should be formed, but my cooperation depends upon its composition."

JEWISH NATIONAL CLUB IS OPENED IN LONDON

London, July 11.—The Jewish National Club, recently established in North London, was formally opened last night.

Dr. Ch. Weizmann, the President of the Zionist World Organization, sent a message to the gathering in which he said that he was very happy at the opening of the Club and wished it every success in its efforts to centralize Jewish national endeavors in one part of the metropolis. "London," he wrote, "needs such centres." He trusted that the Club would be national in the fullest historic sense of the term and would become a valuable centre of Jewish efforts for the home of all Jews, the National Home.

Mr. Nahum Sokolow, the President of the Zionist World Executive, delivered an address in the course of which he said that he was impressed by the fine building of the Club and its library. It was an example for the Jews of other districts and of other countries. They should create a centre for Jews who wanted to meet their fellow Jews to discuss with them the problems of Jewry.

Mr. Leo Kenig said that it was not just to accuse London Jews always of inactivity and spiritual poverty. In every branch of Jewish activity, London Jews played its part in Zionism, Socialism, Hebrew and Yiddish literature and Press. It was only necessary to co-ordinate all these activities.

Mr. Leibowitz, the President of the Club, said that they wished to create a centre for the Jews of North London, to give the Jewish youth an opportunity to meet in a Jewish atmosphere. He appealed to the Jewish intellectuals, writers and artists in London to assist them.

FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF ESPERANTO CELEBRATED

Moscow, July 25.—A special stamp has been issued by the Moscow Post Office in honor of the fortieth anniversary of Esperanto. The stamp bears the picture of Zamenhof, the author of Esperanto, with an inscription of the word "Esperanto" in Russian.

Warsaw, July 25.—The nineteenth Esperanto Congress which will begin its session Thursday in Danzig will hold its concluding session in Warsaw, in order to attend the unveiling of the tombstone at Zamenhof's grave in the Jewish Cemetery in Warsaw. From Warsaw, the members of the Congress will proceed to Bialystok, in order to witness the placing of a memorial plate on the house where Zamenhof was born.

HABIMA TO PLAY AT BASLE DURING ZIONIST CONGRESS

Berlin, July 25.—The offer of the Moscow Hebrew Theater Habima to play at Basle during the Zionist Congress has been accepted by Dr. Chaim Weizmann.

A European committee for the promotion of the interests of the Habima has been founded.

MACCABEES SCORE VICTORY OVER GALICIAN FOOTBALL

Jerusalem, July 25.—The Palestine League of Nations Union will be represented at the Conference on Jewish Rights, which has been convened by the Committee of Jewish Delegations and the American Jewish Congress, to be opened at Zurich on August 11.
