

BIBLE PASSAGE IN PLAY PROHIBITED BY CENSOR; CONTROVERSY DEVELOPS

Theatre Ordered to Expunge Quotation from Chap. 39, Genesis

London, August 12. — Is a Bible passage subject to the rulings of state censorship.

This interesting question has developed into a controversy between the management of the Globe Theatre and the state censor.

The censor prohibited the reading of a passage from the 39th chapter of Genesis dealing with the story of Joseph and Potiphar's wife. The manager of the play, "Potiphar's Wife," wanted to have the passage read from the stage. Following the prohibition of the censor, the theatre management asked permission to print the passage in the program.

HAIFA JEWS STORM THEATRE FOR SABBATH PERFORMANCE

Jerusalem, July 24.—A crowd of Orthodox Jews stormed the Empire Cinema at Haifa yesterday and tried to stop the performance by force, as a protest against the violation of the Sabbath.

The police were called in and dispersed the crowd. There was a considerable amount of fighting between the crowd and the police before the crowd was dispersed.

DOLE SYSTEM ABOLISHED, Z. O. EXECUTIVE ANNOUNCES

Jerusalem, August 12. — The sole system applied by the Zionist Executive in recent months for the relief of the unemployed Jewish workers will be discontinued in Haifa, Afulah and Jerusalem, the Executive announced to-day.

Instead of the sole system work will be provided for the unemployed. The doles will be retained only in Tel Aviv where they will gradually be reduced.

RUTTENBERG BEGINS WORK OF HARNESSING JORDAN

Sixty-five laborers were engaged to begin the work.

NEW PALESTINE ORDINANCE FRAMEWORK FOR ORGANIZING JEWISH COMMUNITIES

Establishes One Community Principle
But Provides for Dissenters
(J. T. A. Mail Service)

Jerusalem, July 21.—The intricate questions of the internal organization of the Jewish communities in Palestine, a matter of long dispute between the ultra-Orthodox and the Zionists, are dealt with in the government ordinance promulgated here. The principle set forth in the ordinance that no more than one community in each town or village is permitted was taken exception to by the ultra-Orthodox in communications to the Colonial Office. The ordinance makes provision for dissenters, imposing the obligation upon the community to satisfy the specific needs of the dissenting groups.

In any place in which not less than 30 members of the Community have their residence a local Community shall be constituted, the ordinance provides. In any place in which less than 30 members of the Community have their residence, such members shall form a local Community if the District Commission, on the application of the General Council (Vaad Leumi) approves of the constitution of a local Community. If the General Council does not apply for the constitution of a local Community in any place in which less than 30 members of the Community have their residence or if the application made by the Council is not approved by the District Commissioner, the members of the Community in that place shall.

HAS HEAD WITNESSES EMIGRANTS' DEPARTURE FOR SOUTH AMERICA

Berlin, Aug. 12.—A group of forty Jewish artisans from Latvia and Lithuania left here yesterday for South America.

The departure of the group was witnessed by Abraham Hermann, president of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid and Sheltering Society of America, who is now touring Europe in the interests of the society which is aiding the emigrants.

The group which consists mainly of skilled workers is accompanied by an official of the Hicem, the organization created by the Hias, Ica and Enigidek to assist East European Jewish emigrants with necessary information and training.

EXTREME WINGS WIN IN Z. O. CONGRESS ELECTIONS IN GERMANY, RETURNS SHOW

Same Trend Indicated As In Other
Zionist Constituencies

Berlin, August 12.—Final returns of the elections of delegates to the Fifteenth Zionist Congress from the Zionist societies in Germany were made public here to-day.

The trend indicated in other Zionist constituencies of the strengthening of the extreme wings is seen also in Germany. According to the returns, the Left-Center bloc received 2,313 votes, thus electing four delegates. The Mizrahi having received 2,076 votes, elected 4 delegates. The Poale Zion with 1,540 votes elected 3 delegates. The Radical Zionists with 465 votes elected one delegate. The Zionist Revisionists received 302 votes and are not entitled by this vote to any delegates to the Congress.

PREDICTS HUGE DRIVE FOR ANTI-EVOLUTION STATUTES

Washington, D. C., Aug. 12.—Predictions that a nation-wide campaign to write anti-evolution legislation into the statutes of every State in the Union, would exceed the efforts of the Anti-Saloon League in bringing about the adoption of Eighteenth Amendment, were made by Dr. Albert C. Diefenbach, editor of the "Christian Register and Modernist Leader," while attending the sessions of the Institute of Politics. He declared he would bend every effort to gather forces to combat the campaign which he alleges is conducted by the Fundamentalists.

NEW APPOINTED VENEZUELA CONSUL GENERAL IN CANADA

Toronto, August 12.—Max Aiken, a Toronto lawyer, was appointed Consul General for Venezuela in Canada. The appointment was made by the President of Venezuela.

Mr. Aiken has been Acting Consul for the past year.

BAVARIAN BARON CONFESSES TO MURDER OF KURT EISNER

Madrid, August 12.—Baron George Wilhelm von Arco, of Bavaria, when arrested here confessed to the police that in 1919 he murdered Kurt Eisner, the first president of the Bavarian Republic.

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WINS ST. LAWRENCE RIVER 30-MILE SWIMMING CONTEST

TEL AVIV JOINS IN PLEA FOR SACCO AND VANZETTI

At the same time the Council adopted a protest against the persecution of Zionists and Socialist Zionists in Soviet Russia.

PALESTINIAN IS HONORED BY FRENCH GOVERNMENT

HE-CHALUTZ ORGANIZATION PREPARES TO HOLD WORLD CONFERENCE IN DANZIG

Warsaw, Aug. 12.—A world conference of the He'Chalutz, the international Zionist youth organization which prepares for pioneer work in Palestine, will be held in Danzig September 14, immediately following the Fifteenth Zionist Congress in Basle.

The conference was convoked to consider the situation in the light of the new decisions which are expected to be taken at the Congress with regard to the Chalutzim and the question of immigration. Eleven countries, it was stated here today, will be represented at the conference. The organization has a membership of 20,000.

In view of the present situation in Palestine, the headquarters of the He'Chalutz conducted a thorough survey of the Chalutzim in the various countries who are prepared to emigrate to Palestine. The He'Chalutz has decided to ask the Congress to obtain permits for the entry of 1,800 Chalutzim who are fully qualified and especially adaptable to Palestine conditions. Their entrance into Palestine in view of their training will not add to the unemployment, the He'Chalutz leaders believe. Preference is to be given in this group to the Chalutzim who are imprisoned in Russia and whom the Soviet government is willing to permit to go to Palestine.

JUDEA LIFE GETS LICENSE TO OPERATE IN ILLINOIS

Permission to write insurance in the State of Illinois has been granted to the Judea Life Insurance Company of New York, according to an announcement made yesterday.

With the State of Illinois, the Judea Life Insurance Company is now operating in New York, Maryland, New Jersey, Maine, Ohio, Minnesota, Rhode Island, and the District of Columbia.

The completion of the sale of forty thousand shares of the capital stock of the Judea Industrial Corporation of New York and the investment of the proceeds amounting to \$1,000,000, in the Judea Insurance Company Ltd. of Palestine, which has established the Judea Life Insurance Company in New York, is announced in a statement issued to the Jewish Daily Bulletin. CONVENTION OF PALESTINE LABOR WELCOMES JEWISH COLONIZATION IN RUSSIA

Jerusalem, July 24.—The Palestine Labour Convention which was concluded a few days ago at Tel-Aviv adopted resolutions against the arrests of workers in Palestine and their deportation from the country. Other resolutions adopted by the convention demand free immigration, extension of agricultural colonization, labor legislation, proper representation of Jews in the Palestine-Trans-Jordan Frontier Force, labour representation on the Jewish Agency and a more democratic form of election to the Palestine municipal councils including votes for women.

Other resolutions adopted by the Convention greet the people of Russia on the tenth anniversary of the Revolution, protest against the Red Terror in Soviet Russia, demand the release of all Socialists imprisoned in the Soviet prisons, and greet all Zionists and Hebraists in Russia.

The Convention further welcomes the Jewish colonization work in Russia.

A message of greeting has been sent by the Convention to British Labour, urging it to assist the workers in the British colonies and mandated territories in their fight for liberation and to help the Jewish workers in the establishment of a free and economically sound Jewish society in Palestine.

Other resolutions deal with the danger of war, demand freedom for China, unrestricted immigration to all countries and the release of Sacco and Vanzetti. Greetings have also been expressed to all who are fighting fascism.

The convention welcomed the Palestine Communities Ordinance.

PROJECTED CONGRESS OF SEPHARDIM IS POSTPONED

Jerusalem, Aug. 12.—The Sephardic World Confederation has decided to postpone the projected World Congress of Sephardic Jewry until the summer of 1928. Missions will visit the Sephardic centres in North and South America, the Balkans, Mesopotamia, India, to conduct propaganda on behalf of the Congress.

The Confederation is negotiating with its organizations in the various countries with a view to fixing on a place at which to convoke the Congress. Suggestions have been made that if the Congress cannot be held in Palestine, it should be called for Salonica, Vienna or Brussels.

on the order of the Council, if approved by the District Commissioner, either be attached to the nearest local Community or combine with members of the Community residing in another place or places to form a local Community consisting of not less than 30 members.

There shall not be more than one local Community in each town or village, but any section of the Community comprising not less than 30 adults may claim the satisfaction of its religious and cultural needs according to its own principles and the local Community or its Committee, as the case may be, in providing and administering communal services of a religious character, shall take fully into account the needs of such section, and shall apportion that part of the revenue of the local Community which is devoted to religious and cultural purposes between the local Community and any section of the Community in proportion to the number of their members.

The Committee of the local Community shall carry out the instructions of the General Council (Vaad Leumi) and the decisions of the general meeting of the local Community in matters within the respective competence; be the recognized representative of the Community before the District Administration in matters which are within the competence of the local Community; execute any administrative orders addressed by the Government to the local Community or its Committee; appoint and dismiss any officials of the local Community other than officials of the Rabbinical Office; and supervise the administration of any property or institutions of the local Community.

The Committee shall be entitled on behalf of the local Community to hold movable and immovable property of every description, to enter into contracts, to execute deeds, to sue and be sued, and to appear in arbitration proceedings.

The budget of the local Rabbinical Office or Rabbi, as the case may be, shall be settled jointly by the Rabbinical Office or Rabbi and the Committee of the local Community. It shall be the duty of the Committee of the local Community to provide for the expenditure of the Rabbinical Office or Rabbi in accordance with the budget.

The Court fees received by the Rabbinical Courts of First Instance shall be paid over to the Committee which shall place them in a separate account together with such contribu-

tions towards the expenditure of the Rabbinical Office or Rabbi as may be payable by the local Community out of fees charged in respect of ritual slaughter, burial and the baking or sale of unleavened bread.

A Board shall be constituted in each Local Community to control the affairs of ritual killing and matters pertaining thereto. The composition of the Board shall be determined by Regulations to be made jointly by the General Council (Vaad Leumi) and the Rabbinical Council; in case of disagreement between them the matter shall be referred to a Board composed in the manner prescribed in Regulation 9 (1) hereof. The Regulation shall ensure the representation on the Board, in proportion to the number of its members, of any congregation consisting of persons not registered as members of the Community which desires to be represented. Any such congregation may appoint killers who shall slaughter according to its special rites for butchers of congregation under the supervision of inspectors of the congregation.

Nothing in this Section shall derogate from the right of any congregation consisting of persons not registered as members of the Community to carry out ritual killing independently of the Board; provided always that any such congregation shall levy fees on the meat killed by its slaughterers at the same rates as prescribed by the Board.

A Burial Board shall be constituted in each local Community. Any congregation or any association of Jews within the Community may form a Burial Society and may acquire land to be used as a cemetery for its members. Every such society may charge a fee for a plot in its burial ground and the burial expenses, provided that the maximum amount of such fees shall be determined by the Committee of the local Community in consultation with the representatives of the Society concerned, according to the ordinance.

Nothing in this Regulation contained shall be held to derogate from the right of any congregation of persons who are not members of the Community to make its own arrangements for burial, subject always to any Regulations issued by the Government or local authority; and no fee shall be payable to the Community on account of such burial.

Subject to the approval of the local Community at the general meeting, it shall be lawful for the Committee of a local Community to arrange with the local Rabbinical Office or the Rabbi for the issue of licenses to bakers or sellers of unleavened bread, and subject to the provisions of Regulation 13 hereof, to charge

FORGET VERSAILLES, JEWS ARE ADVISED BY SMETONA, LITHUANIAN PRESIDENT

Kovno, Aug. 1.—Canon Tumas, who accompanied the President of the Republic, M. Smetona, on his recent tour of the country, publishes in the Press a description of the manner in which the Jews received the President. The representatives of the Jews everywhere, he states, expressed the hope that Lithuania would regain her capital Vilna. The President replied to the Jewish delegations.

"Yes, we shall have Vilna back again. We shall enter Vilna with a clean conscience, as if we were going to Jerusalem, without enquiring into the religion of each individual. Our hero Vitovt gave the Jews much freedom. Nor shall we withhold freedom from the Jews. But we demand of them that they should have in mind the needs of the state and should not form a state within a state. The Jews will do well to depend on the Lithuanian State instead of depending on certain papers and instead of remembering that the Jewish rights were guaranteed at Versailles," the President said.

fees for such licences. The net receipts from such fees, after the deduction of any expenditure incurred in the issue of the licence, shall be applied towards the expenses of the local Rabbinical Office or Rabbi in the manner provided in Regulation 25 hereof.

In the exercise of its powers under this Regulation the Committee shall comply in ritual matters with any Regulations or directions of the Rabbinical Council and in administrative matters with any Regulations or directions which may be made or given by the General Council.

Pending the election or appointment of the Rabbinical Council and Rabbinical Offices, the Elected Assembly, the General Council (Vaad Leumi) and Committees of local Communities in accordance with the provisions of these Regulations, the functions of those Councils, Offices, Assembly and Committees as prescribed in these Regulations shall be discharged by the Rabbinical Council, Rabbinical Offices, Elected Assembly, General Council (Vaad Leumi) and Committees of local Communities existing at the date hereof; and the powers of such bodies shall not be deemed to be impaired by reason of any changes due to the occurrence of casual vacancies.

The Public Notice concerning the election and powers of the Rabbinical Council dated March 18th, 1921, published in the Official Gazette of April 1st, 1921, is hereby cancelled, the ordinance states.

10,000 MORE CHILDREN TO GET

JEWISH EDUCATION IN N. Y.

Joseph J. Goldstein, Chairman of the Campaign Committee of the Jewish Education Association, announces that the Association will launch a campaign for funds in the six-week period between November 15th and December 15th, 1927. The purpose of the campaign is to enable the Association to place 10,000 additional children in the Jewish religious schools in New York City.

At a meeting of the temporary Campaign Committee of the Jewish Education Association, plans for the campaign were discussed and the opening date fixed for November 15th. Joseph J. Goldstein presided at the meeting and the following officers of the Association were present: Israel Unterberg, President; Samuel Rosenbergh, Vice President; Bernard Samuel, Hon. Secretary; E. E. Liebowitz, Treasurer; A. E. Cohen, Israel S. Orlitzky, Educational Director; Abraham E. Cohen, Director for Organization.

The Committee instructed its Chairman to make public the date and the intention of the Jewish Education Association.

Abraham E. Cohen was appointed to direct the campaign. Mr. Cohen has for the past few years has been affiliated with Jewish communal work in New York City.

Seventy-two girls and 87 boys, camp scholarship winners, who have distinguished themselves by making a perfect record in effort, progress and attendance while pursuing Jewish studies in the Jewish religious schools in New York, left today as the guests of the Jewish Education Association for the children's camp of the General Jewish Institute in Fort Jervis, New York.

The Association distributes 180 free camp scholarships and over 4,700 prizes annually.
