ZIONISTS SATISFIED WITH

ROME'S DENIAL OF CLAIM TO PALESTINE MANDATE

Viewed with Relief

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Basle, Aug. 26-The denials issued simultaneously in Rome and Berlin concerning the reported agreement between Germany and Italy with regard to the Palestine mandate called forth a feeling of satisfaction among the delegates arriving for the Fifteenth Zionist Congress.

The possibility that Palestine in the enoch of its rehabilitation should again come under the reign of Rome. historically associated with the destruction of the Jewish state in Palestine, was a source of anxiety among

many Zionists, it was stated here. The mere possibility that "Rome and Jerusalem" should meet again on the political field and that Jerusalem is to be subject again to Rome, re-called unpleasant historic reminiscences. Particular objection to Italy's claim on the Palestine mandate was based on the influence of Fascism on present day Italy and the probability that in case of Palestine becoming subject to Italy, the influence of Catholicism, far from being friendly to the Jewish rehabilitation of Palestine, would become a decisive factor in the development of the country, thus hindering the Zionist efforts to rehabilitate Palestine as a Jewish national

DATA ON RELIGIOUS BODIES IN U. S. WILL BE PUBLISHED (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D. C., August 26.— With the issuance of the first of a series of summaries of the denominational returns of the 1926 census of religious bodies, the chief statistician for population of the Bureau of Census of the Department of Commerce, Leon E. Truesdell, announced that practically all of the religious bodies in the United States will be covered in summary and bulletin form within the next six months.

The first summary, made public August 24, covers the Christian Reformed Church.

The census of religious bodies is decennial the last having been taken in 1916. All of the statistics, according to Mr. Truesdell, are obtained by the Bureau of the Census directly from the churches themselves throughout the country.

CONGRESS OF NATIONAL MINORITIES CLOSES ITS

DELIBERATIONS IN GENEVA Reports From Rome and Berlin Are Demand Freedom of Press. Make

Recommendations to League (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Geneva, Aug. 26-The Congress of

National Minorities in European countries, which was in session here for three days, concluded its deliberations vesterday.

The series of resolutions aiming at bringing about a betterment of the situation of the national minorities

and regulating the relations between the minorities and the states were unanimously adopted. The resolutions laid particular emphasis on the demand of the national minorities to exercise full freedom of their press and contains suggestions of improvement in the procedure of

The resolutions were based on the recommendations contained in the report of Dr. I. Wilfan, president of the Congress. Dr. Wilfan is one of the outstanding leaders of the national minorities movement in Europe. He is a member of the Italian parliament where he represents the Slovanian minority. VIOLATION OF PROHIBITION LAW CAUSES WITHDRAWAL

OF ALIENS' CITIZENSHIP Naturalization Commissioner Issues

Warning Citing Court Cases (Jewish Daily Bulletin) Washington, D. C., August 26, -Violation of the prohibition law by an

alien who desires to become a naturalized citizen may result in refusal to grant citizenship, according to a statement made by the Commissioner of Naturalization, Raymond F. Crist. He reviewed decisions of Federal judges who refused citizenship on the ground that the applicants had violated the Eighteenth Amendment. In one case cited by Commissioner

Crist the naturalization certificate of a recently naturalized citizen was withdrawn because after receiving it he pleaded guilty to unlawful possession and sale of intexicating liquor and to the charge of assault on Internal Revenue officers of the United States. In that case the Federal judge held that the defendant had shown bad faith in violating his oath that he would support the Constitution of the United States.

In the case of U. S. vs. Mirsky, a certificate of naturalization was granted by a State court nothwithstanding the applicant, during the probationary period, had pleaded guilty of and been fined for violation of the National Prohibition Act.

Judge Thacher of the United States District Court of the Southern District of New York, in entertaining the application for cancellation, said:

"Neither the fact that in this and in other communities there are many citizens who are not attached in thought or deed to the principle em-

"We Jews in America have for over a quarter of a century been drawn into the fight against the stage Jew who is after all not less dangerous than the movie Jew. However, with all our sympathies for the purpose of the fight undertaken for the Irish, we must draw to their attention that both the form and the means proposed by them are from satisfactory. "The start made by the 'Irish

World' is very regrettable. If one protests against ridiculing one's own race, one should at least have sufficient understanding and dignity not at the same time to attack another race. The spokesman for the Irish have, however struck an undignified, repelling, anti-Semitic, inciting tone, just as if the Jewish people had any part in the production of the film.

"The truth is that together with this vulgar caricature 'Murphy' picture, the same Loew's theatres exhibited a Jewish comic which contained a repelling offense to the Jewish character. This comic portrays not one person but a whole series of persons. There the father 'frames' an 'accident' case in which the entire family participates. The future son-in-law, the lawyer, plays the worst role and if the Irish have protested, the Jews have more reason and more right to protest because of the comic"

Two of the four members of the Commission, Dr. Frankel and Mr. Warburg, have recently visited Palestine. Of the experts, the following are already at work in their several fields: Professor Adams, Mr. Henriques, Mr. Ryerson, Mr. Strahorn, Dr. Rosenau, Dr. Wilinsky. The Secretariat of the Commis-

sion has not yet been finally constituted, but Mr. M. Kisselev and Mr. M. Naamani have been appointed as members of the Secretariat on the nomination of the Zionist Organization, while Mr. Marshall has nominated Dr. Maurice B. Hexter, Harvard University, Director of the Federation of Jewish Charities in Boston. In view of the magnitude and

importance of the work on which the Commission is engaged, some time must necessarily elapse before it is in a position to report. At the present stage it is impossible, in the nature of the case, to fix a definite date for the completion of its investigations, but it is hoped that its report may be ready not later than the spring of 1928.

CANADIANS BRING \$300,000 TO BASLE FOR LAND PURCHASE (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Basle, Aug. 26 .- The sum of \$300,-000 for the Jewish National Fund was the contribution brought by the Canadian Zionist delegation to the Fifteenth Zionist Congress which will open here on August 30.

The sum was given on the understanding that the money will be used exclusively for the purchase of land by the Jewish National Fund and not for the payment of past debts. The directorium of the National Fund has accepted the conditions.
