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## ULTRA-ORTHODOX JEWS IN POLAND PLAN NEW PARTY; OPPOSE AGUDATH ISRAEL

To Combat Democratization of East  
Galician Kehillahs

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Lemberg, Sept. 20.—The ultra-orthodox wing of Polish Jewry under the leadership of rabbis will assert itself on the political arena at the forthcoming national elections to the Polish Sejm, it was learned today following a closed conference of East Galician rabbis.

The conference, whose participants are not members of the Orthodox World organization, Agudath Israel, was called chiefly to deliberate on ways and means to oppose the planned democratization of the kehillahs in Eastern Galicia as is contemplated in accordance with a recent government decree extending to Galicia the provisions of the Pilsudski decree which was previously valid only for Congress Poland.

The Agudah, which allied itself with other Jewish political groups during the last elections, was severely criticised by the leaders of the ultra-orthodox wing.

The conference it was stated, decided to create an extreme right orthodox party which will not join the minorities bloc

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## LEMBERG UNIVERSITY BARS JEWISH STUDENTS FROM REMUNERATIVE PROFESSIONS

Lemberg, Sept. 30.—Interesting figures concerning the enrollment of Jewish students at the University of Lemberg were made known today.

According to a compilation by the Lemberg Yiddish daily "Morgen," 535 non-Jewish students and 170 Jewish students were enrolled in the law school of the university. Eight hundred applicants, mainly Jewish, were rejected. In the medical school the non-Jewish enrollment was 112, while the Jewish students admitted numbered only 12. In the school of philosophy the enrollment was 325 non-Jews and 315 Jews.

## ZIONIST EXECUTIVE HOLDS ITS FIRST MEETING TODAY

## HENRY FORD'S RECENTATION REACHES FARMERS' FIRESIDE IN LANDS OF EAST-EUROPE

Three Aged Colonists Claim Him as  
Brother

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Sept. 20.—Henry Ford's withdrawal of his anti-Semitic campaign and his apology to the Jewish people have penetrated to the remotest corners of Eastern Europe.

Hearing the news of Henry Ford's recantation, three farmers living in a village near Wolkowyski, "recalled" that Ford is their brother.

The brothers Kort, Gustave, 80, Robert 75, and Julius 73, old German settlers in the district, appeared yesterday in the editorial office of the Wolkowyski Yiddish weekly, "Wolkowysker Leben," and told the following story.

Their family comes from Frankfort a/ Main. They settled a long time ago as farmers in the village Konstantynowa, district of Bialystok. They had a younger brother named Henry who emigrated to America, where he changed his name to Ford. They are glad now, they said, that Henry has withdrawn his anti-Semitic campaign and has made up with the Jews. They request American Jews to persuade Henry Ford to send aid to his poor brothers in Poland.

(Henry Ford was born in Greenfield, Michigan, July 30, 1863.)

## ROSALSKY SATISFIED WITH DECISIONS OF Z. O. CONGRESS

Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, chairman of the United Palestine Appeal in New York in the 1927 campaign, returned yesterday on the steamer Majestic. Upon his arrival he stated to a representative of the Jewish Daily Bulletin that he was satisfied with the decisions of the Fifteenth Zionist Congress and declared himself to be in full accord with the Weizmann-Lipsky policies.

Rabbi J. Levinson, head of the Mizrahi, returned on the same steamer.

## PALESTINE STARTS BANANA GROWING; COMPANY FORMED

Jerusalem, Sept. 20. — A Palestine banana company to promote the growing of bananas on a large scale for export was formed here on the initiative of Professor Otto Warburg.

The first plantation on an area of 100 dunams will be started in the vicinity of Migda. The first crop is expected in 1929. Professor Warburg is confident of the successful development of a Palestine banana industry.

## TURKISH PROSECUTOR MAKES CHARGE AGAINST I.O.B.B. FOR THE JEWISH DEMONSTRATION

Utters Inciting Accusations; Police  
Raid Lodge Offices

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Constantinople, Sept. 20.—The Turkish branch of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith, the American Jewish fraternal organization engaged in religious and welfare activities in many countries, figured prominently in the accusation formulated by the state attorney at the trial of nine Constantinople Jews held on the charge of having participated in an anti-Turkish manifestation at the funeral of the Jewish girl, Elsa Niego.

The prosecutor declared in his address yesterday that the Constantinople lodge of the I. O. B. B. contributed the amount of 4950 toward the funeral expenses of the Jewish girl who was murdered by the Turkish official, Osman Bey, when she rejected his marriage offer. By asserting that the I. O. B. B. made this contribution the prosecutor attempted to prove that "the Jews had planned the anti-Turkish manifestation beforehand."

A raid was made by the Constantinople police on the offices of the I. O. B. B. lodge following the prosecutor's address in court, but nothing incriminating was found. The event called forth great excitement in Constantinople, particularly among the members of the Order.

In his address the prosecutor played up to the anti-Semitic agitation which is now going on in the Turkish press in connection with this affair. He made accusations against Judaism and alleged that not only the nine Jews who are held

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## LAND DEEDS TO AMERICAN BUYERS ARE CONFIRMED BY PALESTINE GOVERNMENT

Jerusalem, Sept. 20.—A large number of Kushans, land deeds issued by the Menorah Palestine Building Corporation, an American Jewish land purchasing and selling agency, were registered by the Palestine government Land Office.

In addition to the 313 Kushans issued recently, the present registration includes 1,109 Kushans for holders of lots in parcels A and C in the district to the south of Jaffa. The property of the Menorah is held by 400 Jews in Palestine and Egypt, and by 1,000 American Jews.

The land is in the vicinity of the Baith V'gan. Construction of 40 houses was begun recently. A road connecting South Jaffa with Tel Aviv has already been built.

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## PARENTS WILL BE SERVED WITH "SUMMONS" IN DRIVE FOR JEWISH EDUCATION

Several thousand women who attended meetings in fifteen sections of the city on Monday under the auspices of Irviah, the Women's Division of the Jewish Education Association, have adopted the plan of serving a "summons" on Jewish parents who fail to give their children a religious education. The women will conduct a home-to-home canvass in the course of which they will leave the "summons" in the homes.

It is the aim of Irviah to increase the registration of the Jewish religious schools this year by at least ten thousand, and the "summons" which is printed in the form of the legal document is expected to help in persuading Jewish parents to send their children to Jewish religious schools. Mrs. Gabriel Hamburger is in general charge of the work for which she has secured the cooperation of Temple Sisterhoods, Women's Auxiliaries of Synagogues, Jewish Parents Association and other Women's Organizations.

The summons of parents is being served in the name of "The Jewish Community of the City of New York and Your Own Conscience" as the plaintiffs, and reads: "You are hereby summoned to answer the complaint in this action that you do not send your children to a Jewish religious school. Within seven days after the service of this summons, exclusive of the day of service, notify Irviah. In case of your failure to appear or answer, you will be held responsible for having failed in your duty to your people, to yourself and to your children."

## JAPANESE INTELLECTUALS COMBATING ANTI-SEMITISM Declare it is a Product of Western Influence

Shanghai, Sept. 20.—The existence of an anti-Semitic agitation in Japan which is vigorously opposed by Japanese intellectuals was commented upon by Dr. Shogun Sakai, a prominent Japanese clergyman of Tokio, in an article "Israel's Messenger," Anglo-Jewish weekly published here.

Dr. Sakai who describes the Japanese as "the lost tribe of Judah," has sailed for a visit to Palestine. He claims that anti-Semitism in Japan, where the Jewish community numbers only 700, is due to European and American influence on an Occidentalized Japan.

"It is amusing to see a movement started in Japan akin to anti-Semitism, in a land where there are more or less 700 members of the Jewish faith," Dr. Sakai writes. "Up to this day Japan was the only country where the Jews had every freedom, with no persecution or bad feeling, where anti-Semitism was practically unknown. To my mind, Japan should be the last place in the world where the old play of race hatred will be tolerated. The signs of the times are always changing, and we notice that even Henry Ford, the flivver king, retracted all his insinuations and drafted a public apology, thereby proving his honesty of purpose. Therefore, is it not strange to see such child-play in Japan? Is there any reason why the Japanese should stand up against the Jews?"

"The propagandists say that the Jew signifies a Shylock, but why, in the name of fairplay, do they not mention him as a Maccabean?"

"The Japanese have no bad feeling for Judaism or the Hebrew race, as the European races have, yet how can we account for this feeling in Japan? The only comment one can pass is that the movement is part of a fashion-show, which has no actual foundation."

## HERMAN, HIAS PRESIDENT, RETURNS FROM EUROPE TRIP Aid to Emigrants more Urgent than Ever, He Says

Abraham Herman, President of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America returned on the Majestic following a two months tour in Europe. Mr. Herman studied Jewish conditions in Poland, Roumania, Germany, France, Latvia and Lithuania, with special reference to the question of emigration. He conferred with the leaders of the Jewish Colonization Association and the United Jewish Emigration Committee of Europe in respect to the new work undertaken by Hias in conjunction with these organizations in settling Jewish immigrants in South America and other countries.

"I have come back from my trip all the more convinced that immediate steps must be taken to settle the thousands of Jewish wanderers, who must leave their native countries because of economic and other conditions, in countries where they can establish themselves and earn a livelihood under favorable circumstances," Mr. Herman said.

"While general conditions in Europe have somewhat improved, as far as Jewish immigrants are concerned, the problem has by no means been solved. The general economic stress as well as the continued anti-Semitism make it imperative that the situation be relieved in order that these immigrants, who formerly would have come to this country should go to other countries. Hias, together with the Ica and the Emigdirect are now opening up settlements in South America and other countries. In Europe these immigrants are being prepared for emigration. They are taught the language of the country to which they are going and given instruction in various trades. Many immigrants are being fitted for farm work. In several South American countries committees have already been formed for the reception of these immigrants and there is every reason to believe that through this concerted effort Jewish immigrants will be permanently helped.

"The inability of wives and children to join their husbands and fathers in this country in a reasonable time" Mr. Herman continued, "is working great hardships and the consensus of opinion is that the American government, in a spirit of humanitarianism, should facilitate the coming of these families to join the breadwinners here."

Mr. Herman was met at the pier by the directors of the Hias.

## JEWISH COMMUNITIES IN ALL PARTS OF AMERICA PREPARE FOR HIGH HOLIDAYS

The Religious School of Congregation Emanu-El, New York, will reopen on Sunday, September 25th.

Dr. Sidney E. Goldstein of the Synagogue will preach on "The Relation of Religion and Life."

The Sunday morning services will be resumed on October 9, when Dr. Wise will preach on the subject, "Henry Ford's Retraction: Some Further Lessons."

In October and November, the pulpit will be occupied by Aaron Sapiro, and Dr. Louis L. Mann of Chicago Sinai Congregation.

## GERMAN JEWISH JURIST HONORED ON BIRTHDAY

Berlin, Sept. 6.—Dr. Julius Magnus, one of the most prominent lawyers in Germany and the editor of the leading legal publication in the country, celebrated his sixtieth birthday today.

The Legal Faculty of the University of Frankfurt in honor of the occasion conferred an honorary doctorate on him. The Prussian Minister of Justice called to-day to express his congratulations. Other visitors were the representatives of the Legal Faculty of Berlin University, of the Solicitors' Association, the Law Society, and other bodies.

Dr. Magnus was for many years a member of the Board of the Berlin Jewish Community and is at present a member of the Curatorium of the German Keren Hayesod.

## EAST EUROPEAN JEWS IN METZ FORM COMMUNITY

Paris, Sept. 7.—A community of East European Jews now resident in Metz was formed at a meeting held in that city.

The Jewish population of Metz consists of 500 immigrant families from Eastern Europe, mainly from Galicia.

The former Chief Rabbi of Petrograd, Dr. Aisenstadt, who is now the Rabbi of the Community of Russian Jews in Paris, Grand Rabbi Netter, and the President of the Community of French Jews, participated in the meeting.

Two hundred members of the new community were enrolled.

It was decided to establish during the coming school year a Talmud Torah for the Jewish children of Metz, concentrate in the hands of the community the whole of the Jewish relief work in the town, create a Jewish arbitration tribunal, etc.
