

TURKISH JEWS INTERVENE WITH GOVERNMENT TO HALT ANTI-JEWISH AGITATION

**Excesses Break Out In Thrace; Res-
trictions Are Removed**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Constantinople, Sept. 28.—Representations on behalf of the Jewish community of Turkey in connection with the recent wave of anti-Jewish propaganda in the country were made by a delegation of Jewish leaders to Kazim Pasha, president of the Turkish National Assembly, at Angora.

The delegation, which consisted of the members of the commission to reorganize the rabbinate in Constantinople, declared to Kazim Pasha that the events at the funeral of the Jewish girl, Elsa Niego, had no connection with the Jewish community. In view of the fact that the murder took place in the Jewish quarter, it was natural that it should have caused an intense feeling. Because the street near the cemetery is narrow, it was natural that the crowd attending the funeral blocked the traffic. A street car tried to break through the crowd and this led to the necessity of police intervention. Soon, however, everything had quieted down and there were no anti-Turkish cries as there were no attacks on the police, the delegation declared.

The president of the Turkish National Assembly assured the delegation that the Turkish government knows well that the Jewish community had no connection

MARSHALL DENIES REPORT THAT HE IS DISSATISFIED WITH ZIONIST CONGRESS

Cabled reports from London to the effect that Louis Marshall had expressed his dissatisfaction with the decisions of the Fifteenth Zionist Congress in Basle were denied by Mr. Marshall, according to the Jewish Morning Journal.

The newspaper published a London cable based on a report in the London Jewish Post, which alleged that the Zionist Executive in London was in receipt of a cable from Mr. Marshall expressing dissatisfaction with the Congress decisions. The Post's report called for wide discussion in London Zionist circles.

An attempt was made to verify the report with the Zionist Executive. The Executive, however, neither confirmed nor denied the report.

The Morning Journal quotes Mr. Marshall as saying that "there is not a single word of truth in the report. I never sent such a cable."

RACIAL ANTI-SEMITISM PLANS NEW OFFENSIVE IN HUNGARY, DEAN ANNOUNCES

**Says He Has Bio-Chemical Device
To Aid Campaign**

Budapest, Sept. 28.—A new offensive of the so-called racial anti-Semites, conducted on pseudo-scientific lines, will be waged in Hungary, according to statements made by Professor Mehely, the new dean of the University at Budapest, in his inauguration address.

Count Klebelsberg, Hungarian Minister of Education, was present at the exercises. The new dean of the University urged the Education Minister to introduce a bill into parliament "aiming at the protection of the Hungarian race." He asserted that this bill is necessary to protect the Hungarian race against the admixture of Jewish blood which is, he stated, of inferior quality. The difference between Aryan and Jewish blood and the inferiority of the latter can be established, he asserted, by means of a bio-chemical device of which he is the inventor.

The address of Professor Mehely called forth wide resentment among Hungarian Jews who were indignant particularly at the fact that Count Klebelsberg did not protest against these statements.

BERLIN LIBERAL JEWS WON'T SERVE ON KEHILLAH BOARD

Berlin, Sept. 28.—The Liberal Jews, once the ruling element in the Jewish community of Berlin, are not represented on the praesidium of the Kehillah.

The board was constituted last Sunday at a meeting of the Kehillah. Geheirat Stern, semi-Conservative, was elected chairman of the board, Dr. Alfred Klee, Zionist, and Herr Loeb, Conservative, were elected vice-chairmen. The Liberal Jewish representatives who are in the minority, declined to accept posts on the praesidium.

ROTHSCHILD DECLINES TO RUN FOR PARLIAMENT

London, Sept. 28.—James de Rothschild has declined the invitation of the Liberal party to be its candidate in the forthcoming parliamentary elections from the Ely division. The reason for his decision was given as ill health.

SYNAGOGUE IN UKRAINE, CLAIMED BY COMMUNISTS, IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

**Orthodox Jews Lament the Destruction
of Holy Scrolls**

Moscow, Sept. 28.—The Great Synagogue of Tcherkasi, Ukraine, was destroyed by a fire on the eve of the High Holidays.

The synagogue, which was known as the Schickler synagogue, had been the object of strife between the congregation and a group of Jewish free thinkers who demanded that the building be converted into a club. In the fire all of the Holy Scrolls were burned.

The destruction of the synagogue and the Holy Scrolls made a great impression upon the Jewish population. Observant Jews closed their shops and abstained from work during the "funeral" which was arranged for the burned Scrolls.

The strife between the congregation and the Communists continued after the destruction of the building, the latter claiming the insurance amounting to 3000 roubles for the erection of a club. A final agreement was reached for the erection of a school for Jewish children.

"Der Stern," Yiddish Communist daily of Charkoff, urges its readers to wage a fight against the Jewish religious observances, especially against Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The paper adds, however, that the fight must be carried on through methods of enlightenment and not through insults and anti-religious demonstrations.

HUNGARIAN GOVERNMENT STOPS ANTI-ALIEN RAIDS

Vienna, Sept. 28.—The anti-alien raids aimed primarily at Jews were stopped by an order of the Council of Ministers, reports from Budapest received here state.

Following a meeting of the cabinet held on Saturday, the Minister of the Interior sent out a telegraphic order to the authorities in the provinces to discontinue the raids.

BERLIN JEWISH COMMUNITY GIVES TO HINDENBURG FUND

POLISH BUTCHERS' GUILD SEEKS BILL AIMING AT PRO- HIBITION OF SCHECHITA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Sept. 28. — A movement to prohibit the Schechita, the Jewish method of slaughtering animals, in the Republic of Poland was initiated by the Guild of Polish Butchers in a memorandum submitted to the Polish Ministry of Agriculture. This move which found support in the Ministry of Agriculture, however, opposed by the Minister of the Interior and the Minister of Religious and Education.

In their memorandum urging the prohibition of the Schechita, the Guild presented the following arguments: First, the Schechita is to be prohibited on humanitarian grounds. They complain that the Schechita involves cruelty to animals. Secondly, because of the Schechita, the Jewish butchers are able to charge so much for those parts of the animal which the Jews are allowed to eat, that they can undersell the guild butchers on the parts not eaten by Jews. This makes it impossible for the Christian butchers to compete with the Jewish butchers. The Christian butchers are forced to sell these parts below cost and are compelled to charge higher prices for other parts, thus increasing the price of meat, they argue.

The Ministry of Agriculture is in favor of this, as approved in principle the memorandum of the Butchers Guild and was inclined to favor a bill prohibiting the Schechita.

An inquiry sent by the government to the directors of the Warsaw municipal slaughtering houses elicited the reply

DEPUTY ISAAC GRUENBAUM JOINS NAUMBERG IN DENY- ING CHARGES BY STEUER

Issues Statement in Interview with
"Forward" Correspondent

Deputy Isaac Gruenbaum, one of the Polish Jewish leaders quoted by Max D. Steuer in his allegations against the Joint Distribution Committee, added his denial to that of H. D. Naumberg in an interview with M. Singer, Warsaw correspondent of the Jewish Daily Forward.

The correspondent cables that: Gruenbaum told him that he "never spoke with Steuer concerning the currency losses of the J.D.C." According to Mr. Singer, Deputy Gruenbaum stated that he spoke with Mr. Steuer only concerning the economic situation of Polish Jews, mentioning the losses which they have suffered through the fluctuation of the Polish currency and the currency speculations which were going on in the country and which led to an illusion of prosperity.

Gruenbaum added that he does not remember the entire conversation. It is possible, he stated, that he mentioned the J.D.C. en passant, but he certainly said nothing concerning the money affairs of the organization. His opinion concerning the work of the J.D.C. in Poland has already been published by the Committee. He believes that the J.D.C. has helped much and has greatly influenced the Jewish situation in Poland. Although the J.D.C. has not succeeded entirely in restoring the economic position of the Jews, it has done much by bringing about better cooperation between the various elements which in itself was a great communal achievement.

TEL AVIV UNEMPLOYED ASK FOR RESTORATION OF DOLES

Demonstration Is Averted on Eve of
Rosh Hashanah

Tel Aviv, Sept. 28. — A demonstration of unemployed workers was averted Monday night on the eve of Rosh Hashanah through the intervention of Jewish labor leaders.

Several hundred unemployed workers gathered outside the Friday, the city hall, threatening to hold a demonstration unless it would be declared that the dole system will be restored. Several of the crowd entered the building, destroying some of the records.

Following addresses by labor leaders the crowd dispersed. A handful of Communists remained on the streets and made unsuccessful attempts to arrange a demonstration.

The Schechita does not involve cruelty to animals and that it has no relation to the high price of non-kosher meat. It is generally believed that this opinion will check the movement for an anti-schechita bill.

SIMON DUBNOW COMPLAINS JEWISH INTEREST IN TRIAL OF SCHWARTZBARD WAXING

Truth of Anti-Jewish Horrors Must
Be Told, Historian Insists

Berlin, Sept. 28. — The complaint that the interest of European Jewry in the forthcoming trial of Sholom Schwartzbard, slayer of Semion Petlura, has abated was voiced by Dr. Simon Dubnow, well known Russian Jewish historian in a statement he made public here. Dr. Dubnow urges in his statement that the Schwartzbard trial be regarded by Jews as an event of the gravest importance for disclosing to the world the full extent of the horrors committed against the Jewish population in the Ukraine in the period 1918 to 1920, not in an attempt to seek revenge, but to champion the truth.

"Jewish public opinion seems to have forgotten that there is in the Paris prison a man who has sacrificed himself for the honor of the Jewish people. The entire world must know the motive for this tragic act."

Dr. Dubnow compares the Schwartzbard trial to the Beilis trial which stirred the entire Jewish world. "Now we are on the eve of a trial which must be transformed into a court of the world's conscience to judge those who committed the inhuman horrors against the Jewish population in the Ukraine. Ukrainian Chavurin's endeavor to depict Semion Petlura as a hero of their people and attempt to cover what we intend to reveal, namely, the most horrible tragedy of Jewish history. The Jewish community should never allow this to happen. With thousands of documents and living witnesses, we must establish what happened between 1918 and 1920. We do not desire revenge, but we must insist on revealing the terrible truth. The entire Jewish people must now come to the aid of the Schwartzbard Defense Committee," Dr. Dubnow declared in his statement.

Z. O. THANKS BASLE FOR ITS HOSPITALITY TO CONGRESS

Basle, Sept. 28. — The thanks of the Zionist movement for the hospitality of the city of Basle during the Fifteenth Zionist Congress were expressed by the secretaries of the congress in an audience with the president of the city government.

The secretaries presented the president with a copy of his inscription in the Golden Book of the Jewish National Fund. The inscription was made in accordance with a resolution of the congress. The president expressed appreciation for the honor and declared that Zionists will always have the hospitality of the city of Basle.

SYNAGOGUES, INSTITUTIONS AND CENTERS DEDICATED (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 28.—The new Emmanuel Synagogue of this city was opened for the first time Monday night when the congregation met to observe Rosh Hashanah. The formal dedication will take place next month when the school building which adjoins the synagogue will be completed. The auditorium of the new synagogue seats more than 1,000 worshippers. The synagogue services opened with Rabbi Morris Silverman delivering his first sermon in the new edifice.

The combined Y.M.H.A. and the Y.W.H.A. will conduct classes in religious instruction in Hartford. The classes will be held in the new Y. building which was formally dedicated last week.

Jacksonville, Fla., Sept. 28. — The cornerstone for the new Jacksonville Jewish Center building, was laid last Sunday afternoon.

Lionel D. Joel, vice-president of the Jewish Center, acted as chairman of the meeting.

The cornerstone was laid by Harry Finkelstein, president of the center.

The center will be erected in two units, at a total cost of \$250,000. The first unit, for which the cornerstone was laid Sunday, will be ready for occupancy on November 1 and will cost \$125,000. Work on the second unit will begin in the near future.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 28.—Two new Talmud Torah community center buildings to cost approximately \$330,000 were authorized by the building committee of the Federation of Jewish Charities, according to an announcement made by Justin P. Allman, president of the Federation. These buildings are to be located in the southern section of the city and are to replace the structures now being used for Jewish educational purposes.

Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 28.—More than 1,000 persons were present at the exercises marking the opening of B'nai Brith Old Folks Home here.

Rabbi Elijah Stampfer, of Baron Hirsch synagogue, Mrs. Arthur Jacobs and Charles J. Haase were the speakers.

The largest services in Chicago for the High Holidays were held by the Temple Shalom Congregation, where 4500 persons gathered to worship. The services were conducted by Rabbi Abraham Hirschberg. A choir of fifty under the direction of Professor Joseph Schwickler sang.

Benjamin M. Engelhard, President of Temple Shalom Congregation, announced that 1,000 free tickets were distributed at the doors of Medinah Temple.

The services at Medinah Temple were broadcast by radio from WGN, the Chicago Tribune Station.

UNION PLANS TO CONDUCT CAMPAIGN IN NOVEMBER **Spiritual Reawakening Necessary,** **Ludwig Vogelstein Urges** (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 28.—The month of November will be devoted by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations to a campaign for the purpose of securing adequate support for the work of the organization. Two hundred and seventy-nine meetings are being planned in Reform synagogues affiliated with the union. One hundred Rabbis and laymen, headed by David A. Brown, chairman of the Finance Committee of the Union, will address the meetings.

Cooperating with Mr. Brown will be the Alumni Association of the Hebrew Union College which at its recent annual meeting passed a resolution pledging support of its members in a financial drive in behalf of the Union. A meeting was held last week at the office of Mr. Brown in Detroit, at which were present a special committee appointed by the Alumni Association, which included Rabbis Morris Feuerlicht, of Indianapolis, chairman; Joseph Rauch, of Louisville, Ky.; Jonah B. Wise, of New York City; Dr. Julian Morgenstern and George Zepin of Cincinnati. Plans for the intensive drive were adopted at this conference.

Announcement was also made at the meeting of the support of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods and the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods.

A spiritual reawakening on the part of the Jews was urged by Ludwig Vogelstein, chairman of the Executive Board of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, in a New Year message to American Jewry. Mr. Vogelstein made a plea to the Jews of America to rally to the support of spiritual and educational institutions, striving to bring Judaism to the Jews.

"The Jews of America are entering the year 5688 under favorable auspices," he said "living as they do in a land of freedom and enjoying full political and economic opportunities. It is both easy and pleasant to point to our material prosperity, to the manifestations of our wealth as expressed in our Jewish hospitals and other institutions of social welfare. We may also be justly proud of our beautiful synagogues, our rabbinical seminaries and of our great Jewish libraries. But we are distressed to note the religious indifference and the spiritual lethargy of many of our fellow Jews.

"According to Jewish tradition, New Year's day is not a day of hilarious celebration, but one devoted to retrospection and introspection. Therefore, we must ask ourselves whether we

have lived up to the high ideals of our religion or whether we have worshipped at the altar of the Golden Calf. At the sound of the Shofar, our souls are bared before our Supreme Judge and we must again send forth the stirring call of the Prophet of old: 'Return, O Israel, to your God!'

"Thousands of our brethren are not affiliated with the Synagogue, several hundred thousands of children grow up without religious education; even our charitable institutions have an uphill fight to raise sufficient money for their maintenance. It requires the superhuman efforts of self-sacrificing men and women to extract from grudging givers what should be forthcoming voluntarily. Our synagogues and educational institutions are constantly appealing for support and recognition.

"We cannot believe that benign Providence has preserved our people through centuries of cruel persecutions to let us die spiritually in a country where we enjoy the fundamental human rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

"If our customs differ from those of our oppressed forefathers, our spirit and our faith in God remain the same. For this reason we should be ready to make sacrifices in money and service for the preservation and revitalization of the spiritual life of our brethren. This would be a valuable contribution to American civilization and would show our gratitude to our Father in Heaven who has brought our fathers to these hospitable shores.

"In extending to you my sincere wishes for a happy New Year, may I express the hope that you will start the year by helping to raise the religious and spiritual standard of the American Jew, by supporting freely our religious, educational and charitable institutions. Thus you will manifest your adherence to the Jewish faith and your belief in a spiritual life.

"May the New Year be for us, for Israel and for mankind: A year of peace and contentment, of joy and spiritual welfare," the message concluded.

MILWAUKEE RAISES \$50,000 QUOTA IN U.P.A. CAMPAIGN

Milwaukee, Wis. Sept. 28.—The drive for the United Palestine Appeal for 1927 in this city was oversubscribed, the total amount raised being \$50,228, the quota of \$50,000 being exceeded by several hundred dollars.

The final report of the workers was made at a luncheon held in the Hotel Wisconsin. The drive opened officially on September 10 was scheduled to end on September 17, but the workers voted to continue the drive for several days.

The drive was launched at the opening dinner on September 10, with an initial gift report of \$19,075. The men's team procured a total of \$23,074.50 and the women's teams \$6,772.25. Gifts sent direct to the campaign office made up the balance.

The silver loving cups, donated by Chairman Alfred A. Strelzin to the leading teams in the men's and women's division, were won by the team headed by I. V. Brossell which reported the highest total of \$5,620, and by the Mrs. Rose Cohen team which reported \$1,303, the highest total for the women's teams.

The High Holiday services were broadcast in the South through arrangements made by Rabbi Israel L. Kaplan of the Congregation Ahavath Chesed of Jacksonville, Fla. The services were broadcast over Station WJAX, the municipal station of Jacksonville.

Rabbi Marius Ranson of Congregation Beth Emeth of Albany, also broadcast holiday services over Station WGY in Schenectady.

Through the national committees on Student Activities of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods and the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods, each Sisterhood and Brotherhood affiliated with the national body made arrangements to provide for worship for students at colleges and universities during the Holidays. Tickets of admission to local Temples were distributed and arrangements made for many students to participate in the Holiday observance at Jewish homes.

Plans for the reorganization of the Zionist activity in Region No. 4 which comprises Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware, with a view to coordinating the work to secure a maximum of results with a minimum of expense, were announced by William B. Leaf, Chairman of the Committee. The consolidation of all Zionist cultural membership and fund raising activities into one central Bureau, has been effected in Philadelphia, in accordance with the resolution adopted at the last Zionist conference in Atlantic City.

According to the new plan of coordination, all Palestinian endeavors in Eastern Pennsylvania, Southern New Jersey and Delaware will be merged into one organization. Benjamin Schwartz, Executive Director of the United Palestine Appeal, will be the Executive Director of the entire unit.

with the affair and that it is impossible to hold the community responsible for an ordinary police incident. Kazim Pasha was extremely cordial to the delegation and authorized it to make public the results of the interview.

Constantinople, Sept. 28.—Anti-Jewish demonstrations took place in Uzumkiupuru, Thrace, on Saturday. Stones were thrown at Jewish houses and windows were smashed. A proclamation was issued urging the population to boycott Jewish merchants who are termed "traitors to the fatherland."

Constantinople, Sept. 28.—The government ordinances prohibiting Jews from travelling in the interior of Turkey have been abolished, reports in the Turkish press state today.

Consolidating into one body under the name of the Congregation of Beth-El members of the Jewish Center of Long Island City and the First Hebrew School of Astoria will open a drive to erect a synagogue.

The building, it is estimated will cost \$250,000. Ground will be broken in November, and it is expected that the structure will be completed early next year.

Benjamin Moss is president of the new congregation; Louis Snider, vice-president; H. Levitt, secretary, and F. Klein, treasurer.

The will of Rabbi Rudolph Grossman, for thirty years rabbi of the Congregation Rodeph Sholom, who died last Friday, was filed for probate in the Surrogate's Court. The will leaves the bulk of his \$5,000 estate to his widow.

Dr. Grossman left his library to his congregation, with instructions that it be put to the best possible use, perhaps as a gift to some college or Jewish library. The will provides that Mrs. Grossman give certain books to each of their three daughters before the library is turned over to the Rodeph Sholom Congregation.

Isidore Ziferstein, one of the nine winners of the Pulitzer scholarships to Columbia, ranked highest in both the college entrance examinations and the intelligence test given to candidates for admission to Columbia University, making 90.67 per cent in the examinations and 108 in the psychological test. He is eighteen years old and has been in America seven years, following his father here from the Ukraine in 1916.

Three of the scholarship winners are foreign born. Oscar Keller was born in Eperjes, Hungary, in 1903, and came here four years ago with a record of scholarships won in his native land. He rated 82.9 per cent in examination and scored 87 in intelligence.

The third of the foreign born winners was Leslie D. Taggart who was born in Glasgow, Scotland.

The scholarships, established in 1889 by the late Joseph Pulitzer, carry an annual stipend of \$250 and free tuition in Columbia University or in the School of Mines, Engineering and Chemistry, Architecture or Journalism of the university.

NEW YORK CITY GREETES JEWS ON ROSH HASHANAH

Official felicitations of New York City were extended by Acting Mayor McKee to the Jewish community.

In his message the Acting Mayor said: "Here in America, and more particularly in New York City, where the Jewish population has grown so great in number, there is especial occasion for thankful prayer that the forces of bigotry and prejudice, which have so long hampered the Jew, have found no sympathy. Instead, there has been a spirit of broad-mindedness that has permitted every man, irrespective of race or creed, to take his place as a leader in the various activities that have made New York the centre of the entire world."

An enrollment of seventy men for the academic year 1927-28 in the Daniel Guggenheim School of Aeronautics at New York University was announced by Prof. Alexander Klemin, head of the school.

Thirty-four courses are included in the curriculum offered. A staff of eight faculty members, besides visiting specialists, and the College of Engineering members, will teach in the Guggenheim school.

The Jewish Division of the New York Public Library will close on Oct. 5, 1927, at 6 p. m. and reopen Oct. 7, remaining closed for Rosh Hashanah.
