CONSTANTINOPLE POLICE ORDERS INQUIRY ON I.O.B.B. IN RECENT DEMONSTRATION

**Investigate Alleged Part in Funeral
of Jewish Girl**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Constantinople, Oct. 1.—An inquiry into the part alleged by the state attorney to have been played by the Orient lodge of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith in the anti-Turkish demonstration alleged to have been staged at the funeral of the Jewish girl, Elsa Niego, was ordered by the Constantinople police.

A special commission was appointed to investigate the books of the Orient lodge and to ascertain whether the funeral demonstration received support from the Order.

TROTZKY EXPELLED FROM COMMUNIST INTERNATIONAL FOR LEADING OPPOSITION

Moscow, Oct. 1.—Leon Trotzky, outstanding leader of the opposition to Stalin and Bucharin, was excluded from the Executive of the Communist International by a unanimous decision of the Executive Committee.

The expulsion from the international was motivated by Trotzky's oppositional activities, it being alleged that the friends of Trotzky and Wuyowitch, who was also excluded, were carrying on illegal activities and maintaining secret printing presses for propaganda purposes.

2800 ARE THREATENED WITH EXPULSION FROM HUNGARY

Budapest, Oct. 1. — Twenty-eight hundred persons, long resident in Hungary, are threatened with exile as a result of the anti-alien raids mainly directed against Jews carried out by the authorities in the northeastern part of Hungary.

Proceedings for their deportation have been started.

JEWS IN PALESTINE ARE SEEKING NATURALIZATION

Jerusalem, Oct. 1.—The movement among the Jews to become naturalized is making progress, it was stated yesterday at the meeting of the Council of Jerusalem Jews.

Last week over seventy persons applied in Jerusalem for citizenship papers.

DEAD SEA CONCESSION HAS NOT YET BEEN GRANTED; 4 GROUPS SEEK FRANCHISE

**Agreement in Principle Reached By
Government and Concessionaires**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 1.—The reports which have appeared recently in the Jewish and general press to the effect that the Colonial Office has granted a concession for the exploitation of the Dead Sea are partly premature and partly based on inaccurate information, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here learns.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency is able to state the correct facts concerning the plans now under consideration by the Colonial Office and the present position of the matter.

Four groups have submitted to the Colonial Office for consideration definite technical and financial schemes for the exploitation of the Dead Sea salts with a request that they should be granted a concession. These are: W. H. Tottie, banker, representing an English group; Major D. Henry, mining engineer, and Mr. Edwards, representing an Australian group; Professor Thomas Norton, an eminent American chemist, representing an American group, and M. Novomeysky, mining engineer of Palestine and Major T. G. Tulloch, civil engineer of London, representing an Anglo-Palestine group.

An article appeared in the Financial Times some time ago written by its travelling correspondent on his visit to Palestine, stating that the concession has been granted by Lord Plumer, the High Commissioner for Palestine, to the fourth

FIVE JEWS AMONG ST. LOUIS TORNADO VICTIMS: JEWISH COMMUNITY CENTER DAMAGED

St. Louis, Oct. 1.—With many of the dead not yet identified, five out of the ninety victims of the tornado were Jewish.

The funeral of Jennie Schneider, seventeen year old Jewish girl, will take place Sunday. Her body was found with four others under the debris of the Central High School.

The property of the Jewish Community Center and the Columbian Club was greatly damaged. The roof of the club was destroyed. Many Jewish business houses and homes were in the way of the storm which devastated the central part of the city.

SEPARATIST JEWISH COMMU- NITY IS FORMED IN PALESTINE BY AGUDATH ISRAEL

**Agudah and Keneseth Israel Join
Forces Against Vaad Leumi**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 1.—The Agudath Israel and the Keneseth Israel Central Committee have declared their intention not to be incorporated in the Jewish Community Regulations, published by the Government about two months ago.

Although these two factions have not been in friendly relations with each other, they have now joined together and formed a United Orthodox Congregation, which will be opposed to the suzerainty of the Vaad Leumi. Some of the leading members of the Keneseth Israel Central Committee belong to the Ashkenasic section of the Chief Rabbinate.

TURKIZATION OF JEWISH MASSES SOUGHT BY CON- STANTINOPLE LEADERS

Constantinople, Oct. 1.—The Turkization of the Jewish population in the country is the object of a new organization founded by a number of leading Jewish notables here.

The program of the new agency is to promote the spread of the Turkish language among the Jewish masses, to introduce Turkish in all Jewish schools and to open evening classes for adults.

The Turkish press expresses satisfaction with this move of the Jewish notables, calling it a patriotic action.

2 RUSSIAN PEASANTS TO DIE FOR MURDERING JEW

Moscow, Oct. 1. — Two Russian peasants, Jurko and Janko, were sentenced to death by the district court of Borisoff for the murder of a Jewish peddler, Bimstein.

The murder was committed when the peasants attacked the peddler to rob him of 16 roubles.

COLONIAL OFFICE ORDERS PALESTINE REDUCE BUDGET

Jerusalem, Oct. 1.—The Colonial Office has asked the Palestine Government to reduce its budget by £E.100,000, in view of the decrease in revenue, it is learned here. This reduction in the budget will compel the Government to abandon certain works which had been projected.

AUSTRIAN JEWISH WOMAN IS
HONORED ON 80TH BIRTHDAY

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
Vienna, Oct. 1. — Madame Regina Ullmann, one of the pioneers of women's rights in Austria and a leading Jewish philanthropist, was honored on her eightieth birthday.

The President of the Republic, Dr. Hainisch, sent his congratulations and conferred an Order upon Madame Ullmann. A delegation visited her on behalf of the Ministry of Public Welfare. The Mayor of Vienna, Herr Seitz, also sent his congratulations.

Many women's organizations here have elected her Honorary President. The Women's Zionist Organization expressed their congratulations.

Madame Ullmann has been an active worker for women's rights for over fifty years and has also taken a prominent part in Jewish social work. She was one of the participants in the Congress of Jewish Women which was held in Vienna a few years ago.

Delegates to the Sixteenth annual convention of the New Jersey Federation of Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Associations, to be held in Trenton, October 5 and 6, will be greeted by Mayor Donnelly in behalf of the city of Trenton and former Governor Edward C. Stokes, who will attend the meetings of the Chamber of Commerce.

Philip Newman, Assistant United States District Attorney, will preside at a luncheon to be held Sunday in the Y.M.H.A. Community Home.

The business of the meetings will be made by Felix Fuld, of Newark, president of the New Jersey Federation.

AGUDAH ADOPTS PLAN FOR
WIDE POLITICAL ACTIVITY

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

Cracow, Sept. 13.—The decision of the Agudath Israel, the orthodox world organization, to enter the field of political work for the protection of Jewish rights, adopted at the conference of the Executive here, met with opposition within the organization's ranks.

Reporting to the Executive, Dr. Pinchas Cohn, the president, spoke of the legal position of the Jews in the various countries and explained the grounds on which the Agudah declined to take part in the Zurich Conference for the protection of Jewish Minority Rights.

Deputy Kirschbraun, in supplementing the report, proposed the establishment of a Political Committee consisting of members of the Executive of the Agudah, which should have the task of defending Jewish rights in those countries where the Jews live in compact masses. An animated discussion followed, several of the speakers agreeing with Deputy Kirschbraun, and others objecting that the proposal was outside the scope of the Agudah as an organization for the defence of traditional Judaism. It was finally decided, however, with only one dissenting vote, to establish a Committee for the Defence of Jewish Rights, the members being Dr. Pinchas Cohn, Jacob Rosenheim, Frankfurt, M. Saly Guggenheim, Basle, Dr. Braun, Czechoslovakia, Dr. Loewenstein, Zurich, Deputy Kirschbraun, Deputy Rabbi Levin and Isaac Meir Levin, Poland, H. A. Goodman, London, Professor Weil, France, and Rabbi Dubin, Latvia.

It was decided that the Commission, while strictly observing the principle of autonomy of the various countries, should endeavor to bring about a certain amount of unification in political fundamentals on a religious basis and to draw up measures for the protection of Jewish rights so far as it falls within the competence of the Agudah.

Dr. Cohn also reported on the political activity of the Executive. In the matter of the Jewish Communities Ordinance in Palestine, the Agudah had, despite the active resistance of the Zionist Organization, he said, obtained from the Mandatory Government several important concessions. The Executive of the Agudah had conducted negotiations also on other matters of importance with the Mandatory Government of Palestine and with the League of Nations.

In the debate on the report, several speakers complained that the political success were not always satisfactory. Several speakers demanded that the seat of the Executive should be transferred from Vienna, preferably to London. It was decided to leave this question to a meeting of the Central Council to be held on December 25th, with the Chairmen of the Agudah Organizations in various

ARABS IN AMERICA TO RAISE
FUNDS FOR QUAKE VICTIMS

Jerusalem, Sept. 3. — Palestinian Arabs in the United States have formed a committee in New York for the purpose of raising funds for the relief of the earthquake victims in Palestine, reports from New York in the Arab press state.

A number of Arab notables have been touring the villages in the Huleh Valley, collecting gifts in kind for the relief of the earthquake victims. Forty-seven tons of wheat have been collected so far in this way.

The Municipal and Government engineers, who have been inspecting the buildings damaged by the earthquake at Hebron, have ordered 189 houses to be pulled down and 752 to be repaired. The total loss caused by the earthquake at Hebron is estimated at about £E.200,000.

The Municipality of Jerusalem is beginning to pull down a number of buildings which were badly shaken in the earthquake and have not yet been destroyed by their owners. The work of demolition will be carried out first on those buildings which are situated near the main thoroughfares, where the constant traffic renders them more dangerous.

countries taking part. The same meeting of the Central Council will also decide regarding the convocation of the next Agudath Israel Congress, as well as on the convocation of a Palestine Conference in conjunction with a Conference of the Keren Hathora.

A lively discussion took place on the general principles of the policy of the Agudah. The discussion was opened by Julius Hollander of Frankfurt, who demanded a revision in the present political policy, so that the bridges leading to the traditionally observant Jewish elements standing outside the Agudath should not be broken down. Dr. Pinchas Cohn and Jacob Rosenheim replied to the debate. No decision was made on the question.

The Polish members of the Executive submitted a confidential report on the inner political Jewish conditions in Poland. The Conference also considered at length the question of the Agudist youth organizations and of the Poale Agudath Israel.

A discussion took place on the position in Palestine, in regard to the new Jewish Communities Ordinance. A resolution was adopted calling on all traditionally observant Jews in Palestine to form a unified independent Orthodox community. The Executive of the Agudath Israel will send a delegation to Palestine shortly to assist in carrying out this resolution.

TWO NEW SYNAGOGUES DEDICATED IN LONDON (J. T. A. Mail Service)

London, Sept. 18.—Two new London synagogues were dedicated today by the Chief Rabbi, Dr. J. H. Hertz. The first was the enlarged synagogue at Golders Green, and the other was the new Bow and Mile End synagogue. The opening ceremony in both cases was performed by Sir Robert Waley-Cohen, Senior Vice-President of the United Synagogue.

In the course of his address at the Golders Green synagogue, Dr. Hertz recalled that when preaching at the original opening of the synagogue he alluded to the kindness and large-heartedness of the vicar of St. Albans, Golders Green, who had allowed his church hall to be used as a place of worship by the Jewish congregation of Golders Green. He was glad to learn that the Jews of Golders Green had gained the best respect of their non-Jewish friends in the district, and that a bond of friendship existed among all creeds in that locality.

The new Bow and Mile End synagogue was erected at a cost of \$45,000.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IN PALESTINE HAS CONFERENCE (J. T. A. Mail Service)

Jerusalem, Sept. 1.—A conference of representatives of the Palestine Chambers of Commerce was held here yesterday under the chairmanship of Colonel Symes, Chief Secretary to the Palestine Government. Seventeen delegates were present from the Jerusalem Chamber of Commerce and from Jewish and Arab Chambers of Commerce in Jaffa and Haifa.

There were also present Mr. Davis, the Treasurer to the Palestine Government, Colonel Holmes, the General Manager of the Palestine Railways, Mr. Stead, Director of Customs and Trade, and Mr. Drayton, Acting Attorney General.

The meeting discussed a number of questions, including the Stamps Ordinance, the Government's customs policy, customs relations with Syria, railway rates and fares, and the creation of a Bank of Emission by the Government.

The Government representatives said that the proposals put forward by the delegates from the Chambers of Commerce would be placed before the Government for consideration.

William R. Blumenthal, director of the Jewish Center of Cleveland has resigned from his post.

Mr. Blumenthal will leave the middle of the month for Palestine where he will make a three month's tour.

On his return he will assume the position of regional director of the United Palestine Appeal in Indiana and Michigan.

ALUMNI YOM KIPPUR CALL URGES GREATER SUPPORT FOR HEBREW UNION COLLEGE

**Vigorous Effort for Reform Judaism
to be Made in November
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)**

Cincinnati, Oct. 1.—The Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Hebrew Union College are not receiving the support needed for their maintenance, according to a call issued by the Alumni Association of the College which will be read in Reform synagogues during the memorial services on Yom Kippur.

The message was issued by Rabbi Morris M. Feuerlicht, president of the association and all members of the alumni will read it before their congregations.

"The Jews of America are to be congratulated for the dignified and elegant manner in which they have provided for the housing of their temples and educational centers. This is one of the distinctions of American Judaism," the message reads.

"It must be pointed out however that the same solicitude has not been shown for the national religious institutions which furnish the guidance and direction to the Reform movement. The Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Hebrew Union College are not receiving the support needed for their maintenance.

"A great movement is to be set on foot in the near future to bring home to every Reform Jew in America the necessity and value of the Hebrew Union College and the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. These are the well-springs of our religion in America.

"In November of this year there will be a tour of the United States by a committee under the leadership of that incomparable Jew, David A. Brown. In 279 congregations throughout the land there will be mass meetings to consider the survival of Judaism, to consider the part that Reform Judaism is to play in the drama of Jewish history which we are enacting in America. A meeting will be arranged in this city. Every one of you is urged to come and participate.

"Our congregation is a member of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. We have been supporters in some slight measure of this our guiding institution. But our support thus far has been inadequate to its needs. The Union faces a deficit of \$100,000 for this year alone.

"You will be called upon not only for your presence and your vote of confidence but for your actual support, each man to the degree of his ability. When the call comes do not neglect it. Do not pass it with the many calls for money. Undoubtedly they are all good. They are all worthy but this is most pressing and necessary. Your response to the call

BRITISH CHIEF RABBI SEES JEWISH POSITION IMPROVED (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 1.—Evidence of definite amelioration in Jewish conditions in most lands is seen by Dr. J. H. Hertz, Chief Rabbi of Great Britain, in his New Year message.

"The last year has seen signs of 'moral disarmament' among the nations and a further return of the world's life towards the paths of peace. Even the waves of hatred that so often threatened to overwhelm Israel are ebbing, and in most lands there is evidence of definite amelioration in Jewish conditions," the Chief Rabbi declared.

"All the more are we filled with deep anxiety by the war against religion which still rages in Soviet Russia. Religious instruction to children in groups of more than two, constitutes a heinous crime; and this prohibition is carried out with special vindictiveness by the Jewish communists against their mother Faith. Jewish public opinion throughout the world does not fully realize the grave and inevitable consequences of such a deliberate attempt to cut off the future of three millions of Jews by strangulation of soul. With heavy hearts will we remember our sorely-tried brethren on the Days of Awe, and fervently pray that the Shofar of the New Year proclaim the passing of persecution and the dawn of true freedom among all the children of men.

"In Anglo-Jewry, the manifold communal endeavor evidenced in so many directions during the year that is closing, gives us courage for the tasks that are still unachieved, nay, unattempted. One cause especially is dear to my heart and gives me no rest — how to relieve the desperate misery of the widows and orphans of our poorer clergy. May the coming year bring a solution of this problem, and crown all undertakings for the advancement of Israel, whether in the sphere of religion, philanthropy, or national rebirth, with lasting and beneficent results."

The Women's League of the United Synagogue of America, at its last Executive Council meeting, appointed a Religious Observance Committee, which will concern itself this coming year in stressing the observance of the Sabbath, and the attendance at Synagogue on the Sabbath. It will also emphasize the importance of observance of the dietary laws at all public functions and urge that these functions should not be held on the Sabbath.

Education will bring refinement to man. Your response to charity will keep you from suffering but your generous answer to the call of religion will keep you yourself from destruction," the message concludes.

JEWISH EX-SOLDIERS IN GERMANY EXPLAIN STAND ON TANNENBURG SLIGHT

Berlin, Sept. 30.—In connection with the decision of the Union of Jewish Ex-Soldiers in Germany not to take part in the unveiling ceremony of the Tannenberg Memorial, the East Prussian Branch of the Union issued a statement explaining their stand.

"The Memorial Committee arranged that, together with the Protestant and Catholic Chaplains, Rabbi Dr. Levin of Koenigsberg, who was one of the Jewish Chaplains in the Field, should take part in the religious service and deliver an address," the statement declares. "This arrangement was published in the official program and in the newspapers. The text of the Rabbi's address was submitted to the Memorial Committee for approval, but no acknowledgment was received. To our astonishment, the next thing that happened was that the Rabbi was asked not to take part in the religious service, and it was suggested to him that he should deliver his address after the ceremony at the Memorial, during the second part of the celebrations.

"We Jewish soldiers who fought at the Front regard this change in the program as an affront to our religious feelings and to our rights as citizens. We are proud of what our Jewish spiritual advisers did on the field of battle. It is our right that at a Memorial service which unites Christian and Jewish soldiers in common reverence to our dead comrades the Jewish Chaplain should have his word equally with the Protestant and Catholic Chaplains."

Two professors at the University of Illinois, Frederick C. Dietz of the department of history, and Arthur W. Secord of the department of English, have been appointed to fellowships in the John Simon Guggenheim memorial. A traveling fellowship from the Social Science Research council was granted Dr. J. Wasserman, of the department of economics and will enable him to pursue his research in France. P. Jacobson of the Department of architecture was awarded a medal by the American group of the Societe des Architectes Diplomes par le Gouvernement Francais.

A Board of Trustees for Young Judea, Zionist Youth organization, will be created to extend the work of the organization. It was announced by Samuel J. Borowsky, Executive Chairman.

Nathan Straus will be the Honorary Chairman of the new board. Dr. David de Sola Pool, Rabbi of the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue, will be the Honorary Vice-Chairman. The Board of Trustees will be instrumental in solving the problem created by the withdrawal of the subsidy hitherto granted to Young Judea by the Zionist Organization of America.

The Palestine government has decided to reduce the salaries of all officials by 10 percent, as a measure of economy. The decision presumably relates to the special cost of living allowance which the Government has been paying to its officials since 1920 over the salaries.
