FROM BASLE: DISCUSSES OUTCOME OF CONGRESS part of American Jews

Miss Henrietta Szold, American member of the lerusalem triumvirate. arrived in New York Wednesday on the steamer "De Grasse."

"I am certain that the Jews of America, particularly those who have contributed to the Palestine funds in previous years, will cooperate with us now that American Zionists have been given a great share in the administration of Zionist affairs in Palestine. Failure at this moment is unthinkable," Miss Szold stated.

Miss Szold expressed satisfaction with the results of the Fifteenth Zionist Congress and with the achievements of the American Zionist delegation. "However," she said, "it would not do any harm for American Zionists to create a special fund for sending its delegates to the congresses. Such a fund would enable us to have delegates who are well versed in Zionist affairs and who would remain at the congress until the business is finished."

POLISH GOVERNMENT IN-SISTS ON WITHDRAWING CONCESSIONS FROM JEWS

Expects More Cooperation on the Finance Ministry Proceeds Despite Assurances of Government (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Oct. 7 .- The question of

the withdrawal of the concessions on monopolized articles from Jewish concessionnaires, long threatening the economic existence of many Jewish families, is again becoming acute as December 31 draws near.

Notwithstanding assurances given by the government to Jewish leaders that the concessions will not be withdrawn. the Ministry of Finance insists on carrying out the withdrawal of concesssions for the sale of alcohol and spirits. The Ministry refuses to prolong the stav beyond December 31.

In several instances the local authorities permit the spirit dealers to retain their shops by taking Polish war invalids as partners. According to the ordinance enacted by the Seim, the concessions are to be withdrawn from the present holders and given to the war invalids. But in no case has a Jewish war invalid been proposed as a partner for the Jewish concessionaires. The Jewish deputies in the Polish

parliament intend to take up the matter with the government.

HITLER MOVEMENT GIVEN FINANCIAL SUPPORT BY FOREIGN ORGANIZATIONS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Berlin, Oct. 7. - The anti-Semitic movement in Germany in recent years received the support of anti-Semitic organizations in France, Switzerland and Czechoslovakia, according to the findings of a special committee of the Bavarian diet.

The committee was appointed to investigate the background of the Hitler organization in connection with the trial of Adolph Hitler in May 1923. The evidence also shows that the movement was supported by several of the industrial leaders in the Rhine region. No account of the monies received was ever rendered by Hitler.

The question of whether financial support was received by the German anti-Semitic movement from Henry Ford was not cleared up. According to the testimony of witnesses Ford at one time met with the former editor-inchief of the "Voelkischer Beobachter," the chief organ of the German anti-Semites.

COMEAT ANTI-SCHECHITA MOVEMENT IN GERMANY

Hears Report

GERMAN JEWISH BODY TO

Berlin, Oct. 7.-The Central Union of German Cinizens of the Jewish Faith has

started a campaign to fight the movement which is being carried on in Germany to bring about the prohibition of Sheshita in connection with this movement Chief Rabbi Dr. Carlebach and Herr Arm Schweriner, Syndicus of the Central Union, addressed a public meeting attend-

ed by nearly a thousand people at the High School in Hamburg. Dr. Carlebach said that the Tewish religion forbade all forms of crueity to animals. Judaism prohibited the hunting of animals for sport. Judaism provided a day of rest for animals as well as for human beings. This spirit also dominates the lewish laws of slaughtering animals

for food. Shechita was the most humane form of killing. All experts agreed that the incision resulted in the animal immediately losing consciousness and that what some imagined to be movements by the animal after the incision were really only reflexes. The movement to prohibit Shechita. Dr. Carlebach said, was inspired not so

much by love of the animals as by the desire to curtail the liberties of the lewish population. It was that which had to be fought. Herr Schweriner said that there was a grave danger of Shechita being prohib-

Office of the Polish government. During that year 49,893 persons emigrated as compared with 38,449 in 1925.
The statistics give detailed information

as regards sex- nationality, and the occupation of the emigrants for every month except January. Of the total numher of overseas emigrants 30,182 were men and 13,741 were women, the other 5,970 persons not being classified according to sex. Apart from 10,656 emigrants registered as being of no occupation and 9,847 whose occupation is not known, the principal trade groups represented among the Polish oversea migrants in 1926 were agricultural workers (19,377), industrial workers (6,536), commercial employees (1,093), and domestic servants (1,035). Among the emigrants were 19,600 Jews. 13,757 Poles. 10,454 Ruthenians,

Jews. 13.757 Poles. 10,454 Ruthenians, 527 White Russians, and 418 Germans, no details being given concerning the other 5,128 persons.

The principal countries of destination

The principal countries of destination of these emigrants were Canada (15,-

810). the Argentine Republic (44,425), followed by the United States (8,249), Palestine (6,840), Brazil (2,490), other American countries (1,491), and Australia (339). It is stated with reference to these figures that they underestimate the real situation and that the true figures of Polish and foreign emigrants leaving Poland in 1926 should be about 10,000 persons for the United States, 16,500 for Canada. 15,000 for the Argentine Republic, and 3,000 for Brazil.

The Polish provinces supplying the largest contingents of oversea emigrants in 1926 were Tarnopol (8,121), Lvov (7,123), and Warsaw (5,778).

CHARLES LEVINE MAY FACE \$500,000 SUIT ON HIS RETURN
