

LEGISLATION FAVORABLE TO JEWS TO BE ENACTED IN ROUMANIA, REPORTS STATE

New Parliament Session to Receive Government Bills

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Oct. 10. — Legislation which will introduce favorable changes in the status of the Jewish population in Roumania as a result of the recent agreement concluded between the Liberal party and the Union of Roumanian Jews, of which Dr. William Filderman is the leader, will be enacted during the forthcoming session of parliament, it was learned to-day.

According to well informed sources, the Roumanian cabinet has decided to submit a bill at the new session of parliament which will open Saturday, regulating the status of alien religions.

The government organ, "Cuvintul," states that the government is preparing a bill to revise the citizenship law which will in all likelihood enable 10,000 Roumanian Jews to become citizens.

CRIMEA JEWISH POPULA- TION DECREASES; NUMBER OF COLONISTS GROWING

Moscow, Oct. 12.—Seventy-two nationalities inhabit the peninsula of Crimea which has a population of 413,823, according to the official census of the Soviet authorities.

The Jewish population of Crimea numbers 39,921 representing 5.6 per cent. of the total population. The Russians number 42.2 per cent and the Tatars 25.1 per cent.

A comparison with the figures of the census taken in 1921 shows that the Jewish population in Crimea has decreased 19.2 per cent. Simultaneously, the number of Jewish colonists in Crimea has increased from 1,000 in 1921 to 4,000.

WISE URGES FORD TO START COMMISSION FOR SCHOLARLY STUDY OF ANTI-JEWISH LIBELS

Christendom Owes It to Jew to Prevent Resurrection of Libel; 'Day' Criticizes Suggestion

A suggestion to Henry Ford that, as a result of the withdrawal of his anti-Semitic charges, he make it possible for a commission to conduct a scholarly study of the literature of anti-Jewish libels, so that these libels may never be resurrected, was made by Dr. Stephen S. Wise in a sermon delivered at the Free Synagogue. This sermon was the first public statement of the American Jewish Congress on Ford's recantation.

"Would it not add something of reparation to his retraction," Dr. Wise declared in his sermon, "if he were to make it possible for a commission to make a scholarly study, if necessary over a term of years, of such anti-Jewish material as the 'Protocols of the Elders of Zion,' which could be adequately documented and nevermore resurrected. A fully documented study of the rise and development of anti-Semitism is owing from Christendom to the Jew. Why should it be left to a Dr. Bloch to answer Professor Rohling in Vienna, or an Edward Lasker to answer Treitschke in Berlin? To make this possible is an opportunity of reparation, the use whereof would indeed be Henry Ford's distinction."

MAVROMMATIS, GREEK ENGI- NEER, LOSES HIS CLAIM FOR JERUSALEM CONCESSION

Permanent Court of International Justice Upholds England (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

The Hague, Oct. 12.—The claim of the Greek engineer, M. Mavrommatis, for £217,000 damages alleged to have been caused through the British government's delay in the approval of his plans for the Jerusalem electrification concession which he held under a grant of the Ottoman government, failed to-day.

The Permanent Court of International Justice, by a vote of seven to four, upheld the objection taken by the British Government to the international court's jurisdiction to hear the Greek Government's claim against Great Britain for a violation of international obligation.

Sir Douglas Hogg in arguing the case before the court for the British Government, presented the contention that there might have been a breach of contract, but in no case was there a breach of international obligation. Consequently, the Courts of Palestine alone had jurisdiction. "Even admitting for the sake of argument," he said, "that it was a question of a breach of international obligation, that breach would not be one committed in the exercise of the powers of public control provided for in Article II of the Mandate, and that was the only case in which the Court was given jurisdiction."

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT GETS LOAN FOR NOMADS

Jerusalem, Oct. 12. — A loan of £30,000 on easy terms was secured by the Palestine government for the nomadic tribes in the country.

The loan was secured to alleviate the condition of the nomadic tribes in Southern Palestine who suffered as a result of last winter's drought.

COUNCIL ON JEWISH RIGHTS OPENS OFFICES IN GENEVA

VIENNA NEWSPAPERMEN IN ROW OVER INSULT TO ARTHUR SCHNITZLER (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, October 10.—A free for all
fight among newspapermen because of
a remark insulting to Arthur Schnitz-
ler developed yesterday at the press
conference arranged by the Austrian
Broadcasting Company.

When one of the speakers mentioned
the name of Arthur Schnitzler as rep-
resentative of Austrian culture, a news-
paperman representing a Hakenkreuz-
ler paper protested, declaring that
Schnitzler was merely a Jewish porno-
graphic writer. All the other news-
papermen jumped to their feet and
attacked the Hakenkreuzler journalist
who was severely beaten.

The conference had been called to
discuss the complaint of Schnitzler
that Austrian radio stations had broad-
cast excerpts of his works without
permission.

FELIX M. WARBURG GIVES DINNER FOR JUDAH MAGNES

Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of
the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, and
Mrs. Magnes were the guests of honor
at a dinner given by Mr. and Mrs. Felix
M. Warburg at the Hotel Biltmore last
night.

Dr. Magnes came to America last
week to report to the University Com-
mittee, of which Mr. Warburg is chair-
man, on the progress of the University
during the last two years. The Uni-
versity is now three years old and already
has departments in Judaism, Oriental
studies, Mathematics, Public Hygiene,

FRENCH OFFICIALS WARN AGAINST ALARMIST RE- PORTS ON SCHWARTZBAR (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Oct. 10. — Warnings against
alarmist reports concerning the forth-
coming trial of Sholom Schwartzbard,
slayer of Semion Petlura, were issued
here from authoritative sources.

Well informed sources emphatically
denied reports circulated in the Yid-
dish press in Europe concerning the
nature of the indictment against
Schwartzbard. All these reports are
definitely untrue, it was declared. The
contents of the indictment will be dis-
closed on the opening day of the trial
and nothing concerning the character
and tone of the indictment has hither-
to been announced.

Warsaw, Oct. 10.—Twenty-two Uk-
rainians who are to appear as wit-
nesses for the Petlura party at the
Schwartzbard trial have left Poland for
Paris. The group includes persons who
held high positions in the Petlura re-
gime in the Ukraine.

Attorney Czeslaw Poznanski left for
Paris to prepare a civil suit on behalf
of Madam Petlura.

SEPHARDIC JEWS CHARGE DISCRIMINATION IN PAL- ESTINE IMMIGRATION (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Sofia, Oct. 10.—A complaint on be-
half of the Sephardic Jewish commu-
nity, alleging discrimination by Zionist
officials in the admission of Jews to
Palestine was submitted to the interna-
tional conference of the Union of
League of Nations societies in session
here.

The complaint was received by Dr.
Mezan, a delegate to the conference.
The memorandum of the Sephardic
Jews was not presented to the confer-
ence, but it was stated, will be submit-
ted to the Zionist Executive in London
with a remark concerning the serious-
ness of the charge.

MORE JEWISH COMMUNISTS ARE EXCLUDED FROM PARTY (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Riga, Oct. 12.—Three more Jewish
Communists were excluded from the
Communist party for oppositional ac-
tivities, a report received here states.

The excluded members, Drapkin,
Kursin and Gorelik, were banned by
the Homel district committee.

JOINT FOREIGN COMMITTEE WATCHES JEWS' INTERESTS AT 8TH LEAGUE ASSEMBLY (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Oct. 12.—Lucien Wolf and
J. M. Rich, were present during the
Eighth Session of the Assembly of the
League of Nations, in behalf of the
Joint Foreign Committee, the Alliance
Israelite Universelle and the Jewish
Colonization Association.

Except in the matter of the Russian
refugees, the Assembly and its various
Commissions have not been directly
concerned with any Jewish questions,
but Mr. Wolf availed himself of the
opportunity of discussing all pending
Jewish and minorities questions with
the officials of the Secretariat and the
diplomats who are attending the As-
sembly as delegates of their respective
countries. Among the matters dealt
with are the qualifications of candi-
dates for membership on the Council,
the procedure for giving effect to the
League's guarantees of the minorities
treaties, the problem of the Staatenlose,
the Roumanian memorandum on the
Jewish question, the grievances of the
Jews of Salonika and the numerus
clausus law in Hungary.

On the first and the last of these
questions, Mr. Wolf presented formal
notes to the Secretariat. The first took
the form of a renewal of the applica-
tion made by the Joint Foreign Com-
mittee on September 13, 1926 for cer-
tain amendments to the regulations
governing the election of new members
of the council, the object being to
render ineligible states in default in
their obligations under the minorities
treaties. Attention was drawn to the
note in the official journal of the as-
sembly on September 10, 1927 and
copies were circulated among all the
members.

With regard to the numerus clausus,
Mr. Wolf called attention to the non-
observance by Hungary of the pledge
given to the Council by Count Klebels-
berg on December 12, 1925 and ex-
pressed the opinion that the matter
should be reconsidered by the Council
with a view to a definite pronounce-
ment on the legality of the Numerus
Clausus Law.

On the Salonika question a prolonged
conference took place with M. Michal-
okopoulos, the Greek Minister of For-
eign Affairs, and it was agreed that the
Greek Cabinet should immediately take
the Jewish grievances into their con-
sideration. A full report on these and
other questions will be presented to
the Joint Foreign Committee as soon
as Mr. Wolf returns to London. Mr.
Wolf also attended the meetings of
the Consultative Committee on Refu-
gees of the International Labor Office
and the International Conference of

"If it is true that Ford's anti-Semitic books are still in circulation in Germany, it must be brought to his attention for this would throw a shadow on his sincerity more than it might harm the Jews. Outside of this, the Jewish account with Ford is closed," the paper declares.

GEN. ABEL DAVIS'S BRAVERY IN WORLD WAR HONORABLY MENTIONED BY U.S. OFFICER

The bravery of Gen. Abel Davis of the Illinois National Guard, a colonel during the world war, at a crucial point on the Front on July 4, 1918, was given honorable mention in the intimate account of Major Henry S. Hooker, acting adjutant of the 33rd Division at the time of the taking of Hamel, as an event which was celebrated by the Allies all over Europe as significant of the entrance of the American army into the actual battle.

Major Hooker, speaking in connection with the statement of Earl Haig at the luncheon to American Legion delegates in London last Friday, described the action of the late General George Bell, Jr. in leaving the division in the British sector despite orders that they be withdrawn.

"Four companies," Major Hooker stated, "about 1,000 men went over under the command of Col. Abel Davis, and that proved the value of America's new army as Cantigny had proved the value of our regular army in actual combat."

CANADIAN IMMIGRATION SERVICE PLACES 20 DOC- TORS IN EUROPEAN PORTS (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—In accordance with the new policy of the Department of Health, twenty physicians will be placed in European cities as immigration officers to leave for Canada. It was announced that selections for the posts have already been made.

Dr. H. R. Jellie of Toronto, who now represents the Health Department as medical adviser to the Department of Immigration, has been appointed chief medical officer of the new service, which will embrace Continental Europe and the United Kingdom. Dr. F. S. Farney of Toronto will act as his assistant.

METHODIST CONFERENCE GREET'S JEWS ON YOM KIPPUR (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Oct. 11.—Resolutions expressing the sentiments of the Rock River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, being held in Oak Park, a suburb of Chicago, at the Jews on the occasion of Yom Kippur, were unanimously adopted.

"The home of religion in Chicago or any large city is in all divisions of the religious army getting together, including Jews, Catholics and Protestants," declared the Rev. Lynn Elliott Brough, pastor of the Central Church of Detroit in delivering the keynote address before the conference.

PALESTINE OPERA CONDUCTOR PERMITTED TO LAND IN U.S. AFTER 3 DAY DETENTION

Mordchay Golinkin, conductor of the Palestine Opera and former director of the Petrograd Opera was permitted with his wife, Lea, lyric soprano, and G. Giorini, dramatic tenor, to land in the United States after they had been detained on Ellis Island for three days.

Mr. Golinkin, who has come here to raise a fund of \$200,000 to build an opera house in Jerusalem or Tel Aviv, was detained on Monday by the immigration authorities when he left the liner Patria on which his party had come from Jaffa. The reason given for the detention was that he had no contracts for performances in this country and therefore "had no means of support."

Herman Bernstein posted a bond for \$1,500 after which the conductor, his wife and the tenor were permitted to enter. Mr. Golinkin said he had been conducting performances in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and Haifa in the past four years. Seventeen pieces had been staged, he said, the most popular being Aida, and Faust. All performances were in Hebrew.

The opera is as popular in Palestine as the cinema is here, he declared. The singers are popular idols. The entire population turns out to hear them at one time or another. The best seats sell for \$2.50.

Abram G. Hutzler, Baltimore, died on Sunday morning. Mr. Hutzler, who celebrated his ninety-first birthday last March, was one of Baltimore's oldest and best known merchants, the founder of the Hutzler Brothers Company, which maintains one of the largest department stores there. He remained active in business up to the time of his death.

Two years ago Mr. Hutzler endowed the Abram G. Hutzler Chair of Political Economy at the Johns Hopkins University. In establishing that professorship, Mr. Hutzler made an outright donation of about \$125,000.

Mr. Hutzler was formerly president of the Associated Jewish Charities. Born in Bavaria, Mr. Hutzler was brought to this country by his parents when a boy. In 1858 he opened his first store in Baltimore.
