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ZIONIST EXECUTIVE IN PALESTINE IS AWAITING FUNDS FROM AMERICA

Plans of Jerusalem Executive Depend
on Further Remittances
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 29.—Great financial difficulties are now being faced by the new Jerusalem Executive owing to the absence of sufficient funds to carry on its work. It was stated here that the difficulties now facing the Zionist Executive are due especially to the fact that the minimum monthly quota promised by the Zionist Organization of America is not being filled.

"During the month of September only \$50,000 were received here from America and so far nothing at all for October," it was stated here today at the headquarters of the Keren-Hayesod. It was added that the plans of the Zionist Executive are endangered if the American Zionist Organization will not remit the monthly quota regularly.

ROTHSCHILD'S DREAMS ARE FULFILLED IN PALESTINE

WASHINGTON HEARS NOTHING ABOUT RIOTS IN BUDAPEST

Washington, Oct. 28.—Official confirmation of reports that anti-Semitic agitation has broken out in Hungary, more especially in Budapest has not reached Washington. The State Department has not received a word by telegraph from J. Butler Wright, the American Minister, on this matter. It was stated here.

The expectation is that Minister Wright is sending a report by mail, if at all.

JEWISH EDITOR, I NAGEL, IS ARRESTED IN POLAND

Warsaw, Oct. 29.—Isaac Nagel editor of the magazine, "Freie Jugend," organ of the Left Poale Zion Party in Poland, was arrested here today. The reason for his arrest was not made public.

SAYS FIRM MOVE AGAINST ANTI-SEMITIC STUDENTS WOULD MAKE THINGS WORSE

Count Klebelsberg Makes This Statement in Hungarian Parliament
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Oct. 29.—A demand that the government take drastic steps against the anti-Jewish excesses organized by the anti-Semitic students because of the proposed modification of the numerus clausus law was voiced today in parliament by Deputy Rassay.

Deputy Rassay declared in his address that the excesses cannot be tolerated in view of the fact that the number of anti-Semitic students is small in comparison to the general university attendance and that the entire work at the universities is disturbed by the outbreaks of this minority.

Count Klebelsberg, minister of Education, in reply to Deputy Rassay declared that if severe measures are taken it will make the situation worse. "Although the anti-Semitic students in the universities are only about thirty per cent. of the general number, the situation in the universities would become worse if very severe punishment will be imposed upon them for participating in the outbreaks," the Education Minister stated. "However, order will be restored anyway," he declared.

Jews Sell No Liquor in Palestine

Under the British mandate every important railway station in Palestine sells wine, and sometimes other liquors.

Of the 300 liquor licenses in Jerusalem 299 are held by Christians, one by a Moslem, and none by the Jews, reports the "Golden Age," Protestant weekly published in Brooklyn, N. Y.

MINORITY GROUPS SEEK UNITED FRONT FOR SEJM ELECTIONS IN POLAND

Warsaw, Oct. 29.—The Jews and the Ukrainians in Poland will play an important role in the forthcoming elections to the Sejm, it became known.

In connection with the elections, negotiations were started today by the minority groups in Poland with the Jews and Ukrainians in order to create a minority bloc.

The minority groups have very good prospects to carry a large number of votes if they succeed in forming the bloc, it was stated here.

'FLYING SQUADRON' TO TOUR UNITED STATES IN COURSE OF UNION DRIVE FOR FUNDS

Laymen and Rabbis to Stimulate Interest at Rallies

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, O., Oct. 29.—A "flying squadron" will tour the United States in an effort to increase the income to meet the budgetary needs of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

One hundred and sixty-four prominent laymen and Rabbis will compose the flying squadron which will tour the United States during the month of November. David A. Brown, chairman of the Board of Finance, will head the group. Two hundred and seventy-nine mass meetings are being planned in as many Reform synagogues. Cooperating with Mr. Brown will be the Alumni Association of the Hebrew Union College, which is maintained by the Union.

A minimum budget of \$513,000 is needed to take care of the religious activities of the Union and its affiliated bodies for the current year. Of this sum \$280,250 is set aside for the work of the Hebrew Union College. The Department of Synagogue and School Extension requires \$103,731. The budgets of the other departments include \$69,178 for the work of the Executive Board, \$14,345 for the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, \$11,759 for the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods, \$28,433 for the New York Committee for School Extension.

CENTRAL CONFERENCE EXECUTIVE IN ANNUAL MEETING

Cincinnati, O., Oct. 28.—Whether the Central Conference of American Rabbis will hold its next convention in St. Louis during April, 1928, or in Chicago during June, is to be decided by the members of the conference in an election to be conducted through the mails. The decision was made by the executive board of the conference which concluded its annual meeting here yesterday. The election will begin within the next few weeks.

The board gave permission to Rabbi H. G. Enelow, of New York, president of the Central Conference, to appoint representatives of the conference to attend the biennial meeting of the World Union for Progressive Judaism next summer in Berlin.

Dr. Krinsky's election to the post formerly held by Bernard A. Rosenblatt, was brought about by the unanimous consent of the various factions which participate in the collections for the fund and are represented on its board.

ORTHODOX PAPERS ATTACK
RABBI LANDMAN FOR NEW
TESTAMENT IN CURRICULUM

Term it Conversion; Rabbi Landman Gives His View on Innovation

The inclusion of the study of the New Testament in the curriculum of the Adult School of Religion conducted by Temple Israel of Far Rockaway in Lawrence L. I. was bitterly criticized by the "Jewish Morning Journal" and "Jewish Daily News", organs of Orthodox opinion.

The criticism was voiced in connection with the opening of a class, which has 18 students from among the Temple membership, by Dr. Isaac Landman, Rabbi of the Temple and editor of "The American Hebrew."

The "Jewish Daily News" in reporting this fact terms it "a conversion class." "The Reformers have finally thrown off the mask and shown who they really are and what their goal is: conversion, acceptance of Christianity," the paper asserts.

The "Jewish Morning Journal," commenting on this matter editorially declares: "It is difficult to find words to express our indignation at this unheard of audacity before the eyes of the largest community of devoted Jews in the world. It seems that Dr. Landman has systematically led the patrons of his Temple directly to the New Testament. Now that they are there he has no other choice but to 'deliver the goods.' Woe to the generation which has such leaders," the paper writes.

In a statement issued to the "Jewish Daily Bulletin," Dr. Landman explained that the study of the New Testament from a scientific point of view was introduced only in the Adult School of the Temple, the purpose being an "evaluation" of the elements of Judaism and Christianity which may contribute toward the development of a universal religion. Dr. Landman expressed his hope that other Jewish congregations may emulate his example. In his statement Dr. Landman declared:

"The time has come when the New Testament should no longer be a closed book to the Jews. Not so long ago the name of Jesus and the Christian holy book were anathema among our people. The Jews will never be able to understand their Christian fellows until they know what there is in the New Testament which creates a wall of misunderstanding between them.

"Our New Testament course comes after five years' study of the Jewish Scriptures, the Apocrypha, and Jewish Apocalyptic literature. Our students are well prepared on both the Jewish and pagan background to the New Testament, religious and cultural.

"We shall study Christian Scriptures from the modern, scientific point

CONG. CELLER OFFERS PLAN
FOR TENTH ANNIVERSARY
OF BALFOUR DECLARATION
Suggests to British Ambassador that
Palestine Issue Special Coins

Interesting suggestions to the Palestine government on how to mark the tenth anniversary of the issuance of the Balfour Declaration were made by Congressman Emanuel Celler in a communication to Sir Esme Howard, British Ambassador to the United States.

Mr. Celler proposed that the government issue coins commemorating the occasion. These coins could be sold for the benefit of the Hebrew University and other institutions in Palestine. Mr. Celler suggests in his letter in which he stated:

"November 2nd will mark the Tenth Anniversary of the issuance by the British Government of the famous letter of Earl Balfour to Lord Rothschild, popularly referred to as the Balfour Declaration.

"It seems to me that this anniversary, marking a decade of achievement by the Jews in Palestine, should be fittingly commemorated. To that end could not the Palestinian Government be prevailed upon to issue a series of stamps commemorative of significant events of the last ten years relating to its administration in Palestine such as Lord Allenby entering Jerusalem; the dedication of the Hebrew University at Palestine by Earl Balfour; the harnessing of the waters of the Jordan River, etc.?"

"In addition this anniversary of the

of view as we have done our own. We shall ascertain which ideals and precepts in its pages are Jewish and which are pagan; which are in their nature temporal and which enduring. We shall attempt to analyze and understand the point of cleavage between Judaism and Christianity as these are presented in the two Testaments.

"There is a blank page between these Scriptures which can best be filled in by Jewish scholars. It is amazing that Jews have permitted Christian scholarship only, to write and interpret this fascinating period of human history to which we have contributed so fundamentally. We inaugurate this course under the aegis of the synagogue with the hopes that other Jewish congregations will follow.

"Religion today is undergoing changes for more radical in the spiritual evolution of mankind than were those in the days of Jesus and Paul. We ought to evaluate what there is in the Books of Religion of both Judaism and Christianity: what elements in them may contribute toward the development of a universal religion," the statement concluded.

YIDDISH PRESS OF NEW YORK VOICES COMMENT ON SCHWARTZBARD VERDICT

Paris Jury Fastened Guilt on Petlura, Exonerated Schwartzbard and Ukrainian People, is Consensus of Opinion; Better Relations between Ukrainians and Jews Sought

A statement formulating the views of Ukrainian Jews in this country was issued by the Federation of Ukrainian Jews in the United States following the conclusion of the Schwartzbard trial.

"Acquitting Schwartzbard, the French court has also acquitted the Ukrainian people of the accusation made by the Petlura defense against the Ukrainians," the statement declared.

"From now on it will be known: Petlura was guilty in the pogroms, but not the Ukrainian people. We Ukrainian Jews have always asserted that were it not for the inexcusable inciting of the followers of Petlura, Denikin and the others, the Ukrainian people would not have committed the pogroms and the peace between the Jews and the Ukrainians would never have been disturbed. Due to the pogrom agitation, tens of thousands of Jewish lives were taken. It was this agitation which led to Petlura's death at the hands of Schwartzbard, who is now acquitted by the French court.

"We are satisfied with the verdict and we are convinced that the Ukrainian people will now recognize that not the Jews are their enemies but those who incited them to pogroms against the Jews," the statement declared.

The Yiddish press in the United States expresses satisfaction with the verdict of the French jury. The "Jewish Daily Forward," Socialist newspaper, sums up in the following manner:

"Not only the Jews but also the Ukrainians can be satisfied with the verdict. Many of the Ukrainians probably did not realize that the defenders of Petlura endeavored to take the guilt for the anti-Jewish pogroms from him and place it entirely on the good name of the Ukrainian people. It meant that the beast, the people, committed the pogroms, while Petlura could not have stopped them. In the court, however, it was proven that Petlura and his lieutenants did more to incite the people to pogroms than to stop them. In court it was proven that a great number of Ukrainians pleaded with Petlura to stop the pogroms, but he did not heed them. For the Ukrainians who love their people it is better to hear that the pogroms against the Jews in the Ukraine were called forth by the powers above, as was the case of the pogroms in Czaristic Russia, than by the people below. It is in this explanation as to where the main guilt for the anti-Jewish pogroms in the Ukraine rests, one should see the great significance of the verdict of acquittal."

"The Day" also discusses the impli-

cations with regard to the Ukrainian-Jewish relations resulting from the trial. "It was the Ukrainians who wanted the Schwartzbard-Petlura trial to be transformed into a trial of the Jews against their murderers and pogrom makers. No agent provocateur, no liar, no apostate—the entire personnel which is always called forth by the anti-Semites of every variety whenever they enter into a public trial with the Jews—was absent here. They had the same success this time as always. Their words had the effect that they themselves were condemned, despised and excluded from society, as has been the case since the beginning of the nineteenth century. The hysterical statements of the other Ukrainians had no better effect. Not justice but anti-Semitism spoke through their mouths.

"However, they have failed. The horrible pogroms and massacres in the Ukraine were judged before a world court. They, their inspirers and perpetrators, were put on the bench of the accused. France has learned, and through France the entire civilized world has recognized, what was committed in those bloody years in the Ukraine by the bands which received the material support of the same civilized world. The nations did not know this. Public opinion was not informed, but those in power knew and kept quiet. They also, indirectly, were now judged and condemned. This is the greatest revenge against our hangmen and murderers, whether they did it directly or indirectly.

"Petlura was declared responsible for the pogroms. No excuses and no masks were of any avail. The Jewish blood shed in the Ukraine will remain for many generations the Mark of Cain on the memory of the 'Butcher of the Ukraine,' on the foreheads of all those who live but in his spirit and who walk in his footsteps.

"This was the verdict of French justice," the paper declares.

The "Jewish Morning Journal" writes: "The greatest number of pogroms of the sort which occurred in the Ukraine in 1919 could not have occurred were they not sanctioned by the powers above. It is true that a people sometimes goes wild and commits bloody deeds. But it is for this reason that a government exists and it is for this very reason that a military force is kept. Just as a government suppresses, or at least attempts to suppress, revolutions directed against itself, it is its duty to suppress murders of one class or section against another section of the population.

"The Paris verdict is a condemnation

of the massacres organized or sanctioned—it makes no difference—by the powers above. We say frankly that if the powers above would know that it is dangerous to organize or to sanction massacres, no man in power would so lightly and easily permit the 'lower classes' to run wild. The Bolsheviks have proven that the 'lower classes' can be held in check by a strong government."

The paper pays tribute to the ability of Henri Torres and polemizes with those who opposed the methods of the Schwartzbard defense. It concludes: "We join the exclamation of the public in and outside of the Paris court when the verdict was rendered: Vive la France."

The Orthodox "Jewish Daily News" declares: "By the verdict of the Paris jury, France has shown that there is a sense of justice there for everybody alike. By this verdict France has at least taken off a part of the guilt which rested upon her because of her silence for political reasons, during the time when the atrocities were being committed in the Ukraine.

"The verdict means that Schwartzbard is not a murderer. He is a Goel Ha'Damm (avenger) of an unfortunate race and he should therefore not be punished for his act.

"Any other verdict would have been a serious attack on the sense of justice and of humanity. It would have been a desecration of the martyrs, it would have been a mockery of the memory of the saints who fell by the hand of the Petlura murderers. It would have been a declaration that one committed pogroms and remained a gentleman, if one was only clever enough not to draw the knife himself. This is the importance of the verdict: not only was Schwartzbard acquitted, but Petlura was condemned in Paris. The verdict has proven that he who encourages pogroms is himself a murderer and as such he must be considered. This is the word of France. This is France's verdict, no other verdict could have been accepted. The Schwartzbard trial will remain historic as an expression of the higher conscience of mankind.

"Another verdict would not only have been a heavy blow to the Jews, but a great insult to the Jewish people. It would also have been an indirect approval of the pogroms. All this was avoided by the verdict of acquittal in Paris."

The paper highly praises the abilities of Henri Torres, Schwartzbard's counsel.

Warsaw, Oct. 28.—A warning against boisterous expression of satisfaction with the verdict in the Schwartzbard trial was sounded by the "Hajnt," Yiddish daily here. There is no reason for any special demonstration as the dead of the pogroms will not come

back to life. The verdict of acquittal affords no satisfaction any longer as it is simply a temporary postponement of the gruesome pain and a warning for the future. All that we can say is "Vive la France," the paper writes.

"Der Moment" expresses the belief that Jews in Kiev as well as in Lemberg, in Paris as everywhere else, cherish the hope that better times will come.

The Ukrainian nationalist paper in New York, "Yevroda," has so far made no comment on the verdict. Discussing the trial the paper wrote in an editorial which appeared on Oct. 25, the day when Schwartzbaum was declared acquitted:

"As could have been expected, the Jews tried to convert the trial of Schwartzbaum, who killed Petura, into a trial against Petura and the entire Ukrainian nation. It came to such a point that Schwartzbaum considers himself not only an avenger of the pogrom victims, which took place in Ukraine during the last revolution, but also an avenger for all the wrongs done to the Jews hundreds of years ago. He speaks about the times of Saloman in order to impress on world public opinion that the Ukrainian nation was always a nation of pogroms, who killed Jews and Catholics.

"Our unhappy Ukraine is now run on trial. The trial is conducted against her for her anti-Semitism at the very same time when the Jewish Telegraphic Agency reports articles from the 'Communistische Freiheit,' the organ of the Communist youth in Russia, saying that on the territory of Russia anti-Semitism is now being developed. The Bolshevik paper tries to justify itself by saying that the anti-Semitic movement is still a result of the old Czaristic regime. For the anti-Semitism that comes from Moscow they find justification, saying that the Czar is responsible, and for the pogroms that took place in the Ukraine under the influence of the reactionaries from Moscow, they hold the Ukrainian nation responsible."

Funeral services for Mrs. Neelie J. Freilberg, wife of Bernhard Freilberg, who died at her home Sunday, were held here Tuesday afternoon. Mrs. Freilberg was a granddaughter of Dr. and Mrs. Bernhard Wise, the first couple to be married in Cincinnati's first synagogue. Mrs. Freilberg was a member of the fourth generation of her family living in Cincinnati. Mrs. Freilberg was active in civic and philanthropic work having been a director of the Council of Jewish Women and Chairman of the Membership Board of that group. She was also a director of the Cincinnati Temple Synagogue and Chairman of the Membership Board.

PRO-PALESTINE COMMITTEES TO HAVE ACTIVE CAMPAIGN

Berlin, Oct. 29.—International cooperation among the Pro-Palestine Committees in the various countries is being planned. Dr. Victor Jacobson, representative of the World Zionist Organization, declared today in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

An active campaign during the forthcoming winter is being planned by the German Pro-Palestine Committee, which is composed of German statesmen and financiers interested in assisting the upbuilding of Palestine. The German committee is planning a series of mass meetings to which members of the English and French Pro-Palestine Committee will be invited.

EXHIBITION OF PALESTINE PAINTINGS BY E. NEWMAN

The exhibition of Palestine paintings by Elias Newman was held at the Galerie Lucerne, 127 Riverside Drive, last night. J. Lapson, Chairman of the Exhibition Committee, presided at the opening last Saturday. An address was delivered by Commissioner Louis Harris on the "Appeal of Palestine Art to American Youth."

The exhibition consisted of twenty oils and fifteen water colors of Palestine scenes. Newman, who received his training in this city, recently returned to America from Palestine where he gave three exhibitions last winter. Among those present at the opening were Jacob Epstein, and Boris Anisfeld, Russian painter.

The exhibition was given under the auspices of the Council of Jewish Youth Organizations.

Rabbi Louis J. Epstein, rabbi emeritus of Temple Avenue Temple, Buffalo, New York, has accepted a call to the pulpit of North Shore Congregation, Levitt, Glenview, Illinois. Rabbi Epstein is a graduate of Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, Class of 1902. He was founder and chairman for five years of the Interdenominational Theological Committee of the City of Buffalo, and served as a member of the Board of Jewish Education. Balfour Declaration might be used as the occasion for the minting by the Palestinian Government of commemorative coins. These could be struck off possibly with the heads of Earl Balfour and Dr. Theodor Herzl founder of the Zionist movement, with appropriate notations thereupon in English, Arabic and Hebrew. These coins could be tendered to the Zionists World Organization at par value, and by it in turn to be sold to members throughout the world at a higher price. The profits to be derived therefrom could be devoted to the Hebrew University and to other undertakings in Palestine.

"Recently, the United States Government mined coins in commemoration of the events of our Civil War and these coins, under similar conditions were sold by the Stone Mountain Association. I am informed that said Association secured two hundred and fifty thousand special silver fifty-cent pieces and they were given the right to dispose of the same at a higher price. The Association thereby secured a large sum of money enabling it to build a magnificent memorial at Stone Mountain.

"I would indeed appreciate your reaction to the sentiments contained herein."
